TidBits City Buys Land For New Sewer Plant

WHERE DOES the right to free living end and responsibility, begin, or vice versa? Everyone believes in freedom of speech, freedom of choice and all kinds of freedoms, as guaranteed by our founding fathers.

Can one be too free? It would seem so, judging by a telephone conversation this week from a distraught county mother, grandmother, who's looking for help in returning her son and family to society. In tears, the woman tells a sad, sad story: Her 29 year-old son, holder of a masters degree, and his wife of the same age, (daughter of another county family) who were childhood sweethearts in the county high school where they graduated. They're now the parents of a nine-year-old girl and a five-year-old son.

It all sounds good up to this point, but the point is that this degree-holding countian chucked it all not long ago, left a job with a well-known corporation in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and moved his family to the Ozarks of Arkansas to live in a commune, presumably to raise herbs commercially. Only there's no plows, and the living is hard.

This distraught grandmother went to the commune recently to hopefully bring her brood home. They didn't want to come. Leader of the commune is a Cuban known as Pete and the some 20 members of his clan are still called Dubies. They range in age from pre teens to full adults.

The grandmother found her son and his daughter in poor health; she suspects malnutrition and rickets, and she doesn't think they could survive a winter on that mountain. They live in tents and sleep on the ground--yet they don't want to leave.

The locals learned of the whereabouts of their kin when the nine-year-old girl slipped away a couple of months ago and called the grandmother. What's to be done, the mother wants to know.

Naturally, she wants her brood back to society, particularly the children, and the grandmother would like to see laws passed to prohibit such living. What's to do.

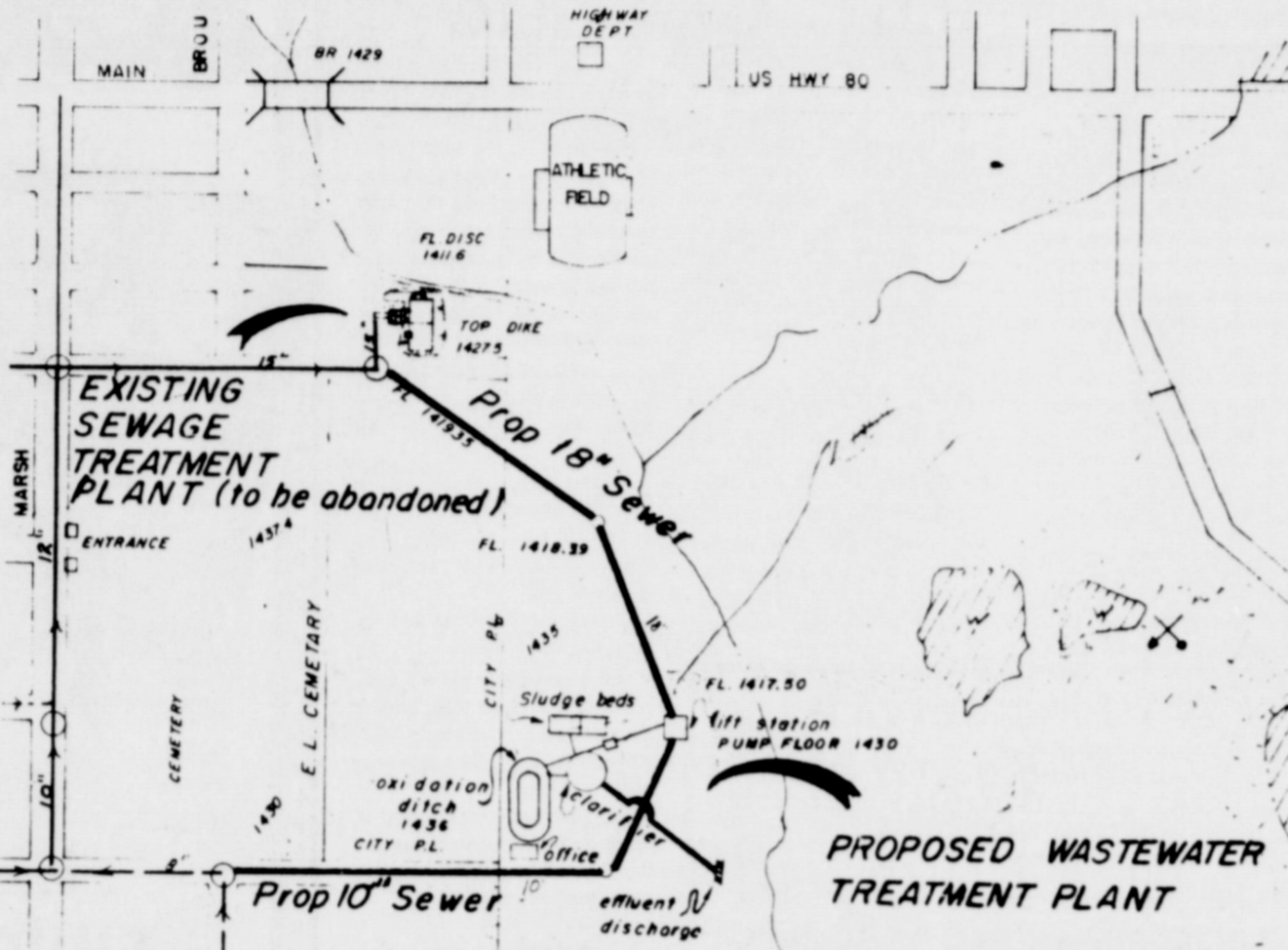
Seek legal counsel was our advice, and petition the legislators on such matters. Perhaps others feel strongly about this and would express themselves.

A 7.73 acre-site has been purchased by the City of Eastland for its new sewerage disposal plant as the result of action at the regular commission meeting Monday evening.

Located relatively near the present site, the new \$198,000 plant will be built on a tract of land bounded on the north by the north side of Hill St., on the south by the south side of Sadosa St.; located on the east side of Eastland, near the N. Fork of the Leon River. A 50-foot estment to the river will be secured for discharge.

Among paid by the city for the property is \$3,000. The existing plant will be abandoned and an 18-inch line will be constructed to the new plant. Eastland voters overwhelmingly approved (356-3) the issuance of \$92,000 in bonds to help finance the new plant last month. Yeatts and Decker are design engineers and the First Southwest Corp. is handling financing for the city. Federal and state funds will be secured to assist with the program.

In other business, Commissioners heard Mr. Neal Moore regarding television reception and agreed to assist in drafting a petition to the Federal Communications Commission regarding the practice of protecting stations and other matters.

Mr. Jackson King of Brownwood appeared and talked to Commissioners about the possibility of opening a branch mental health office here.

Commissioner H. V. O'Brien was absent.

A report was made on the city's sanitary land-fill program presently going through a shake-down cruise, as City Manager Lewis Tiner reports that the city was able to get into the program on Thursday and Friday of last week and that while there are still some road problems, it appears that most are being solved and that the new system should be in operation in a couple of weeks. "We want to make sure we've got it under contrl of before we lock up the other dump ground," he said.

Located south of town, the giant pits were dug in highway work and quite some time has been taken in pumping water out of them. They're virtually dry now, and the land-fill program appears to be on schedule.

Dr. Banks To Open CJC Series

Dr. Murray Banks, famous New York Psychologist, will deliver what is one of the two most frequently-given talks in the world at Cisco Junior College when he kicks off the CJC 1971-72 Current Affairs Series on Monday evening, October 25, at 8:00 p.m. in the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium.

Dr. Banks' speech, "What To Do Until the Psychiatrist Comes," has been delivered by him in person more than 5,000 times, and he will make it one more in Cisco on Monday evening.

Dr. Leland Willis, Cisco Junior College President, stated in a recent interview that Dr. Banks' Monday night lecture would undoubtedly be the best speech to date from the CJC Current Affairs Series platform.

"Dr. Banks' popularity throughout the world is due to the fact that he entertains royally while he subtly instructs," Willis said. He continued, "His observations on personal adjustment are so great that we keep several copies of his speech in the form of record albums in our library's media center, and listening to 'What to do until the Psychiatrist Comes' is required listening for all of our Freshmen Orientation students."

The phenomenal success of Dr. Banks is more than amply documented. When he appeared at the Princess Theatre in Melbourne, Australia, he outsold the hit show of the day, "Hello, Dolly," even though he was the only one on stage in his presentation. An outstanding newspaper in the South ran a lead editorial about him recently, saying: "The man is a marvel. We are certainly mistaken in saying he gave a lecture here. It was anything but a lecture. Two hours of deadly serious fun is perhaps a better description...He will do anybody good."

Dr. Banks is scheduled to arrive in Abilene via commercial airline late in the afternoon Monday. He will be met there by Eris Ritchie, CJC Public Relations Director who is in charge of all arrangements for the Current Affairs Series. He will be introduced to the Cisco audience by Dr. Leland Willis, President of the college.

Testimony got underway in 91st District Court Wednesday morning in the James Creel murder trial after seven days of jury selection, after the 12th juror (Cisco Attorney W. B. Wright) was seated Tuesday afternoon.

Selection began Monday, a week ago, and Attorney Wright was the 90th person questioned for jury service. Mrs. Jackie Wilson of Eastland was accepted by both prosecution and defense attorneys Tuesday morning.

Wright is the first attorney to serve on ajury in Eastland County. Up until recent selection revisions, attorneys were automatically exempt. Originally, 246 were called for possible srvice, and 15 additional prospects reported Monday, and Presiding Judge Earl Conner, Jr. ordered 25 more to report Tuesday.

Overage (65) appeared to be the largest single disqualifying factor, Judge Conner said, with the average running around 40 percent. Mothers with children under ten were also excused.

Defense attorneys used 14 of their allotted 15 strikes and the state used 7 of their 15.

Creel, a 33-year-old Illinois native with 16 years' of service in the United States Air Force, is charged with the March 15th strangulation death of Tona Worthington, 10, of Abilene.

Sgt. Mathews Tells P-T-O About Traffic Laws

Recent changes in traffic laws affecting youngsters were discussed by DPS Sgt. Jerry Mathews Tuesday for members of the Eastland Parent-Teachers Organization. These included school bus laws, pedestrian law and the bicycle law.

He emphasized that any traffic law affects children, and pointed that the important thing is to remember what is required and what is allowed for drivers.

about school bus changes, he said when the bus is stopped discharging or taking on passengers and the lights are on the bus, the law now requires vehicles passing or meeting the stopped bus to stop until the bus resumes motion.

The new law includes control inside city limits as well as outside city limits. There are three ways to pass a bus: if the bus is stopped and the lights are off; if the driver motions to go around; or when the bus resumes motion -- then it's okay to pass, otherwise a vehicle cannot pass a bus that is stopped.

He also brought out that the buses in Eastland do not have the flashing red lights. Orange lights are used here.

Pedestrian law: the requirements and allowances are when a vehicle yielding to pedestrians other vehicles behind him must also stop.

Pedestrians must yield to cars where there are no marked walkways or lights. Here he suggested that the P-T-O or the schools might help by providing marked walkways. There are no such walkways around the schools and it puts the burden on the youngsters, he said. When sidewalks are provided, the pedestrians are to walk on the left side or with their shoulder facing the traffic.

BICYCLE LAW: Traffic laws pertaining to drivers of automobiles are the very same.

Under the new law, the bicycle riders are affected by the same laws as those affecting motor vehicle operators. Bicycle riders are to ride as near the right side of

the street as possible. And a break is required on all bikes he said.

Another important point he brought out was that driving your vehicle and knowing what is allowed the other driver. "Protect the child of another as you would have another protect your child."

A question and answer period followed.

It was brought out that 5 years is the minimum age limit for minip-bike and that for motorcycles is the same as for automobiles.

He said many youngsters are driving minibikes and motorbikes are too young.

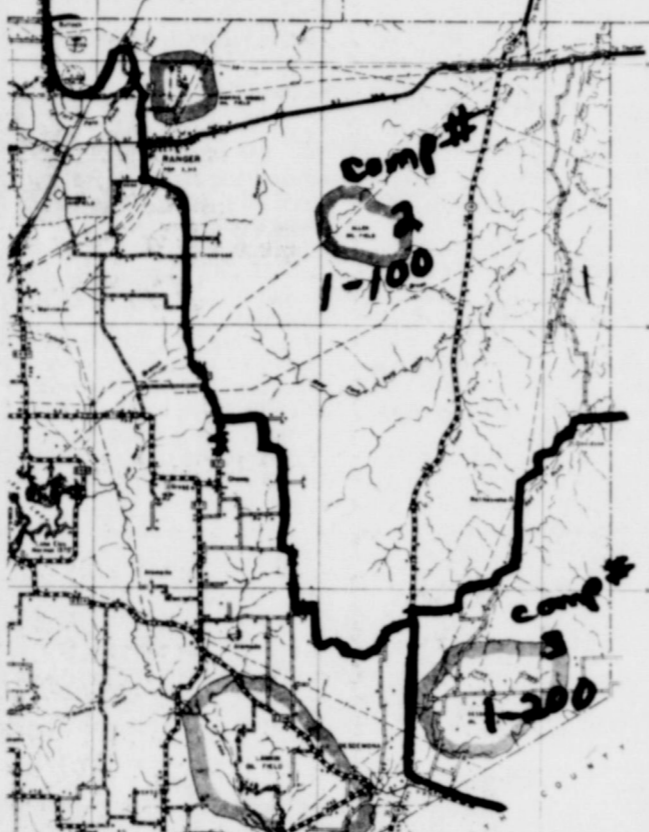

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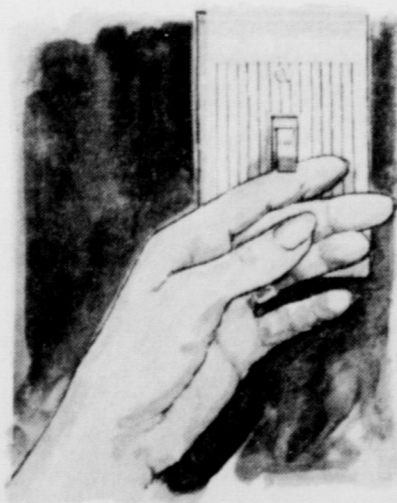

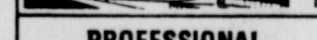
