Mothers' March On Polio Tonight

Eastland March Of Dimes Dance Tonight At Nine

Deadline For Filing Allotment Blanks On Crops Is Feb. 5

Application blanks for a new grower cotton allotments and new grower peanut allotments are now available at the Stabilization and Conservation office of the Department of Agriculture in the Eastland county courthouse, Emmett E. Powell, manager, said Thursday.

Powell said four requirements must be met by farmers. Cotton farmers must (1) file all applications by Feb. 5; (2) neither the operator or the landlord may be interested in another farm on which a cotton allotment has been established; (3) the applicant must expect to derive more than 50 per cent of his income from the farm; and (4) the operator and landlord must both sign the application except in extreme cases.

Mrs. Amis was a longtime resident of Eastland county, having moved here with her husband, the late T. J. Amis, in 1889. She had made her home in Eastland since 1916. Mrs. Amis was married Oct. 8, 1882. She was born Oct. 28, 1856 in Holly Springs, Ala. Survivors include two brothers, E. L. Amis of Big Spring and Tom Amis of Eastland; four sisters, Mrs. V. L. King of Eastland, Mrs. J. W. Cawley of Rising Star, Mrs. Ura Samuels of Eastland and Mrs. Alice Grey of Eastland; 20 grandchildren; 39 great-grandchildren; and seven great-great-grandchildren. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery with Hamner Funeral Home in charge.

DIMES DANCE IS SET HERE FOR TONIGHT

The Eastland March of Dimes dance will be held Thursday night from nine until 12 at the American Legion Hall.

All proceeds from the dance will go to the March of Dimes drive here. Tickets sell for \$1.50 a couple and may be purchased at the hall or at several places downtown. The dance will be one of the last opportunities that Eastland citizens will have this year of contributing to the drive. Eastlanders were urged to buy a ticket, "even if you can't attend."

F. L. Bleck, who is in charge of the dance, said that a dance band would be on hand to play during the entire three hours. "We want folks to come and have a good time and at the same time help a good cause," he said.

"The Eastland quota of \$3,600 must be met," he said. The Eastland county quota is \$24,000 and the national goal is \$75,000,000. This year everyone has been urged to give twice as much as before to cover the cost of the trial polio vaccine tests.

Three Injured In Collision Near Eastland

Three persons were injured Tuesday night when two cars collided five miles south of Eastland on State Highway 6. All of the men were from Carbon.

Injured were Joe Walker, J. T. Wilson and Ray Rhyme. Walker suffered a broken leg. Wilson a badly bruised hip and chest injury and Rhyme a facial cut. All three were taken to the Eastland Memorial Hospital and Wilson and Rhyme remain patients.

Walker was driving a 1940 Ford and Wilson a 1953 Plymouth. Rhyme was a passenger in the Ford. The accident took place about 11 p. m. Both cars were badly damaged.

Church Census Will Be Made In Eastland

A church census will be taken in Eastland, Feb. 14, the General Ministers' Association announced Thursday. The Association made the announcement after a meeting at which further plans for the advancement of the movement of church attendance in Eastland was discussed.

Members of churches in the city will take the census, which will be for all people of the community. Each church will have several workers and the town has been divided into 32 blocks or areas. All census takers will meet in the Fellowship Hall of the First Baptist Church at 1 p. m. Feb. 14. Every home will be contacted that afternoon.

Got Your W-2 Form? Then Get Busy Brother

"Begin preparing your income tax return when you get your Form W-2 from your employer." That is the advice of Ellis Campbell Jr., district director. Employers are required to distribute Form W-2's (tax withholding statements) to all employees by January 31, Campbell said. For many taxpayers, the W-2 form provides all the principal information needed to file an income tax return, the Internal Revenue official said.

Even before receiving his W-2 forms, the taxpayer can take a big step toward filing his tax return by listing other income, business expenses and allowable personal deductions. "Then, when the W-2 is received," Campbell said, "preparing the tax return will be easier."

Any taxpayer who worked for more than one employer during 1953, must receive a Form W-2 from each employer who withheld Federal income tax from his wages or who would have withheld tax if the employee had claimed only one withholding exemption. All W-2 forms must be attached to one's income tax return, which must be mailed to the District Director of Internal Revenue, 2101 Pacific Ave., Dallas, Tex., by midnight of March 15.

"Salaried persons cannot file their income tax returns until they receive all their W-2 forms," Campbell said, "but when they are in the taxpayers' hands, the taxpayer should prepare his return and mail it in well before March 15."

3,349 Persons Have Paid Poll Tax In County

Three thousand, three hundred and forty-nine Eastland countians had paid their poll tax Thursday morning and Tax Collector - Assessor Stanley Webb's office staff was getting ready for the last minute rush. The total included those poll taxes paid at sub-stations throughout the county, including those at Ranger, Cisco and Gorman. The Ranger sub-station is located at C. E. May's.

Mrs. Westfall said the street captains would choose more mothers to help them. She urged that anyone who hasn't been contacted by 8 p. m. to telephone his street captain.

And throughout the nation more than 2,000,000 women volunteers will start visiting an estimated 20,000,000 homes throughout the country tonight as participants in the Mothers' March on Polio, climax of the 1954 March of Dimes appeal for \$75,000,000 in polio fighting funds.

The Mothers' March will be conducted in some 40,000 communities. Similar marches will be held in other communities on subsequent evenings depending on local circumstances.

Each march opens with a blast of fire sirens or the ringing of churchbells. Then the women begin visiting homes where lighted porcheights or doorways signal that a contribution is waiting.

Across Helen Hayes, who is daughter Mary MacArthur died of bulbar polio in 1949, is leading the marching mothers this year in her role as national chairman of women's activities for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Mrs. Hayes and Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower will join in a Mothers' March torchlight ceremony at the White House in Washington on Thursday (4:30 p. m., Jan. 28).

A record number of women have been drawn into the marches this year, Miss Hayes said, "because of their interest in the Polio Prevention Program being launched by the March of Dimes."

"From now on," she said, "the success of the March of Dimes is strictly up to the mothers. It will be up to them to assure that sufficient funds are raised for polio prevention and the other needs of the overall polio fight."

Since 1951, Mothers' Marches have added \$22,973,000 to the attack on polio. This is nearly 18 per cent of the funds which the National Foundation received during the past three years.

The Marchers have plowed through snowbanks, rowed boats through flood areas, plodded through congested cities and visited isolated homes to make their record possible. "It is a proud and thrilling record," commented Miss Hayes. "I am confident that no one will be disappointed in his desire to give this January."

In some localities, men have helped their wives by canvassing the business district, wearing tags which proclaimed: "Tonight I am a Mother."

The impressive Dogs, making good use of their height advantage, grabbed a 16-9 lead in the first quarter and then won the game going away. Ranger was paced by Rod Carter and Tom Hinds while Stan Harris was the big man in Eastland's attack with seven points. Carter had 20 for Ranger and Hinds scored 19.

Ranger's smooth teamwork and high percentage from the court were too much for the Mavs. Eastland's chances weren't helped any when George Harris was injured and had to sit out much of the game.

Ranger led 33-15 at halftime and 51-30 going into the final frame. Coach Boone Yarbrough used his tall reserves during much of the final period.

The B team game was far more exciting than the main attraction. Eastland's B team made a great comeback in the final quarter to hoop through 17 points while holding Ranger to 6. Their efforts gave the B Mavs a 41-39 victory. It was the efforts of Dell Slatton more than any other thing that gave Eastland the win. It was his final four points that gave Eastland the win.

AUTO PLATES TO GO ON SALE IN EASTLAND COUNTY FEB. 1

The Eastland county tax collector's office was busy this week getting the 13,500 auto license plates which recently arrived ready to go on sale. Tax Assessor-Collector Stanley Webb said the plates would go on sale Feb. 1. Of the 13,500 plates, 8,500 are for passenger cars. The Huntville product has a black background with orange numerals, just the opposite of the '53 license. County licenses will have a prefix of "CP" and "CN" in 1954. Webb said that Sam B. Stewart, investigator of the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department, had posted notices in his office giving the requirements of the Texas Registration Law regarding registration of vehicles in the county of your residence. Stewart said that operation of a vehicle registered elsewhere subjects you to a fine up to \$200 and re-registration in your home county. During 1953 the Highway Department filed a large number of complaints against vehicle owners for this violation. Stewart said that by placing posters in all Tax Collectors' offices, the department hopes to place the motoring public (Continued on Page Five)



Nazarene Church Annual Report Shows 'Gains'

Substantial gains in every phase of international work of the Church of the Nazarene were reported in year-end statistics released today by Dr. S. T. Ludwig, general secretary of the denomination, which maintains its international headquarters in Kansas City, Mo.

Setting the pace of progress was the amount given by members for all purposes—nearly thirty and one-half million dollars, which is a per capita giving of \$118.33, the largest in the history of the denomination.

During 1953 membership climbed to 258,000, a gain of more than three per cent. The report also lists, 8,826 established churches in the United States, 117 in Canada, and 97 in other world areas, for a total of 4,040. In addition, the church now has 265 missionaries and 1,150 native workers on 25 foreign fields.

The Sunday School organization showed similar gains, reporting 537,000 enrolled. This is an increase of three per cent over last year and more than twice as many as listed for church membership.

The Eastland Nazarene Church in Eastland is making considerable progress under the leadership of its new pastor, Rev. Eugene Twining. Numerically, financially, and spiritually the church is on the upward climb.

Rev. Orville W. Jenkins, District Superintendent of the Abilene District Church of the Nazarene, will be speaking in the Eastland Church of the Nazarene February 17-21.



Average Cow Produces 3,300 Pounds of Milk

COLLEGE STATION (Sp.)—Experiences of thousands of dairymen interested in research indicate that production records and herd replacements may hold the key to the future development of higher producing dairy herds.

The average for all cows in Texas, says R. E. Burlison, extension dairy husbandman, is 3,300 pounds of milk and 140 pounds of butterfat. The Texas DHIA herd averages 6,800 pounds of milk and 303 pounds of butterfat.


DHIA information indicates a production of 5,000 pounds is necessary for cows to break even, says Burlison. At an average price of \$5.50 per hundredweight, a 6,800 pound producer is making about \$100 while the 3,300 pound cow loses about that much.

In 1927, the DHIA herd averaged 265 pounds of butterfat, an increase since then of 38 pounds. Butterfat average for all cows in the state now is at a standstill.


Where will dairying be a quarter century hence? Records and herd replacement programs are perhaps the determining factor, Burlison says. Records are simple to keep, yet too few dairymen are keeping them. Even monthly milk weights will do a fair job of spotting brood cows from which calves for replacement should be kept. And not enough dairymen remember that one-half of a heifer's inheritance comes from the cow, he says.

All available records should be analyzed when a herd sire is selected. A proved bull with at least five dam-daughter comparisons would be first choice when an aged bull is selected. In the case of a young male, the specialist continues, the son of a proved bull and a consistently high producing dam should be chosen.

Burlison advises against purchasing herd replacements. This is generally the best way to stand still, or even go backwards in the dairy business.





IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Home Purchase Contract
No Casual Matter

The signing of a contract of sale is an extremely important step in the purchase of a home. Once buyer and seller have signed, they are bound by the provisions of the contract. Their respective legal rights in the transaction are thereby set and determined. If the contract is poorly and haphazardly drawn, a harvest of regret may be reaped at a later date.

Sales contracts are often called by other names, such as earnest money contracts, binders, receipts, etc. All of them are for the same purpose and almost without exception involve the deposit of money by the buyer. Some require the seller to put up a good faith deposit. The fact that such deposited sums are usually to be forfeited in event the depositor later fails to go through with his specified contractual obligations lends additional weight to the often stated admonition that no contract should be signed without complete understanding as to its terms.

But many home purchasers (and sellers) rush to sign a hastily prepared contract with very little knowledge of its content. The pressure of time, the informality of the occasion, the casual appearance of the contract, and perhaps the fact a partially printed form is used may contribute in causing the true importance of the act to be overlooked. At any rate, many are lulled into a lapse of good business judgment.

Every significant detail of the bargain should be crystallized in unmistakable terms in the contract of sale. Land and fixtures being sold should be clearly described. A complete description of the property by lot and block, or by metes and bounds, is a must, the street number being inadequate by itself. Articles and fixtures included

in the sale but not always sold with houses generally should be specifically listed. Included in this category are such items as venetian blind, removable floor coverings, draperies, air conditioning units and others. In purchasing property under construction, complete plans and specifications form an essential part of the agreement.

The price to be paid must, of course, be specified, along with method and terms of payment. If a certain sized loan is a prerequisite to the buyer's ability to complete the purchase who loses his earnest money when a contemplated loan transaction falls through, his contract requiring payment of the entire consideration in cash.

The sales contract should also state the quality of the title to be conveyed to the buyer and the type of title evidence to be furnished.

The buyer's individual circumstances and desires may require that various matters not mentioned above be provided for in the contract. All too often people try to squeeze a sales contract to fit the type of printed form on hand, omitting or leaving to easy misinterpretation of forgotten oral agreement many vital provisions. Do not fall into the "pitfall of the printed form." Too many unfortunate enlargements have been announced by clients to lawyers with the words, "I have just turned a receipt for a house on Blank Street. Will you take over now and see that everything is O. K.?"
