THREE BOYS BEING HELD; **ANOTHER SHOOTING PROBED**

Youth At Coleman Admits Firing Fatal Shot and Acknowledges Another Shooting, Officers Say-Boy At Dallas Makes a Full Statement.

DALLAS, Tex., March 27.—A young boy, barely out teens, today finished telling county officials the detection the slaying Thursday night of W. L. Echols, 65, night watchman at Van Alstyne.

Clifford Harris, 16, was arrested early this morning and confessed that he was one of a trio of youths who attempted to capture Echols and who ransacked stores in the Grayson county town.

The youth implicated two other boys who are reported town in West Texas.

Harris said the fatal shot was fired by a boy called Dick. He met the two boys in Dallas last week and they suggested to him that the three of them take a trip, Harris said. They bummed on trains to Abilene where they stole an automobile and then drove to Van Alstyne where they planned some robberies.

Harris said they saw a man, who later proved to be Echols, standing in an alley between two bank buildings. It was suggested that the watchman be captured and held in custody so that the trio might pillage some of the stores. One of the boys went into the alley and started taking with Echols and, after a few minutes, Harris said, he heard some shots and the boy who had been talking with the watchman ran out of the alley toward the car. to be in the county jail at a town in West Texas.

The result, of course, is that England's crime situation is kept



Tyler, March 27.—A jury composed mostly of farmers seemed almost certain today to be called upon to decide the guilt or innocence of a garageman charged with murder of a pastor because of the pastor's romance with the garageman's choir-singer wife.

With cleven jurors chosen, the twelfth man was expected to be obtained today in the trial of Loys Wilson for killing Rev. Fount Wellace, 26, both of Troup, nineteen miles south of here.

In a sudden burst of speed and with the venire of 150 men rapidly being exhausted, nine jurors were chosen late Monday, after a day and a half had been consumed in obtaining the first two. Sheriff Tem Sikes had summoned lifteen mere men today from which to pick the last man.
