

If all the shade trees were to live and thrive that are being planted this year, and that will be planted in West Texas during the next few years, our section would soon be converted into a veritable "primeval forest." Sad to say, however, more than seventy-five per cent of all trees and shrubs, planted at great cost of time and money, fail to survive and are not only a total loss but

The cause of all this is plain and convalescent period.

The prime cause for these failures is undoubtedly due to a lack of knowledge concerning the right method of planting; and the proper care of the plants after planting. In climates less rigorous than ours, where both soil and moisture are favorable to the growth of trees, Nature comes to the rescue and bridges over the mistakes of the tree planter. In our section, however, where proper conditions must be artificially inade and maintained, at least in the early life of the tree, any one of a half a dozen mistakes means a dead tree.
