Verna Smith, size 16, alters size 14 slip pattern to fit her. The pattern was made three inches larger in the bust and 11 inches shorter. The yoke of the pattern was cut into two pieces along the under-arm seam, and spread to make sufficiently large. A three inch tuck was taken at the waistline of the pattern and an eight inch tuck taken below the hips. In this way the shape of the pattern was retained and still made to fit.
