AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 12 - Different prices in different communities under the same conditions will be barred in an "unfair discrimination" bill, drafted by the Attorney general's department, offered in the Texas House of representatives yesterday afternoon y administration leaders and fa-

vorably reported last night. The bill is offered after a six nonths investigation of varying prices conducted by the Attorney General's department under the supervision of First Assistant Atarney General Galloway Calhoun. It applies not only to gasoline, which was the first thing probed, but to all commodities.

Penalties for unfair discrimination range from \$50 to \$1500 fine. Injunction proceedings also are authorized to stop violations.

Under the bill "Unfair Discrimiration" is defined as price fixing fer the purpose of destroying a competitor or charging difference price for the same commodity in difference communities after making due allowance for difference in grade or quality, necessary cost of transportation and necessary differences in the cost of market-

Rep. John Wallace, one of the members offering the bill, says it will meet complaint of unfair ice competition in Texas. A bill to declare ice a public necessity and place it under control of the utili-ty division of the the railroad commission was killed in the House

Opponents of the ice bill claimed it was really sponsored by the Big Ice Companies".

Rep. O. F. Chastain of Eastland fought the bill. He charged that the cities would be better off regulating their own prices. The railroad commission, he asserted, permitted 75 cents a thousand be charged for natural gas in Eastland with natural gas all around it, and blocked efforts of the city to hold the price to 50 cents.

#### HE HASN'T DISAPPEARED

We often hear that the old-time country doctor is passing out of fashion. His place, we are told, is being taken by the modern specialist; the old general practitioner ready on a moment's notice to do anything from setting a broken arm to delivering a baby, is out of date and will soon be extinct.

This may be so. Certainly the trend is in that direction. Yet things happen, now and then, that make one wonder.

A few days ago a bitter blizzard struck a certain middle western state. Snow, high winds and zero weather lashed the countryside. Roads were buried under six feet of snow. People living in farms were isolated. All traffic was stopped. Nobody ventured out until the state highway department had got busy with its snowplows. Nobody? Excuse us. A few country doctors were abroad.

How they managed to get around isn't quite clear. But get around they did. There were people who needed them. In one lonely, frost-bitten farm house, a woman was about to have a baby. In another, a child was dangerously ilt. In another a man had a broken leg that needed attention. So the doctors-the old-fashioned, out of date country doctors-went

More people live in cities now than was the case a generation ago; but the country isn't completely urbanized yet, for all that. People who do live in cities are apt to forget that. They are too quick to assume that changes that have come over city life have come over rural life as well.

That's a mistake. In the town, the general practitioner may indeed be passing; but not in the country. It's a safe bet that he'll linger there for a long time to

So long as people live in lonely regions, far from help; so long as bitter winter weather isolates them and makes any illness a critical affair; so long as young medical graduates go out into the world with an eagerness to help their fellow men-just so long the country doctor will continue.






