## "UNFAIR DISCRIMINATION" BILL OFFERED IN HOUSE

### Eastland County Is Winner In Contest

### MEASURE IS DRAWN BY THE ATTORNEY GENERAL'S DEPT.

#### MAKES FIFTH PLACE AND \$600 CASH

Competition With the 50 Leading Agricultural Counties of the State Over a Period of Three Years, Eastland County Ranks Fifth in Contest Arranged by State Fair Association.

Competition with the 50 leading agricultural counties of the state over a period of three years, Eastland county has won fifth place in the contest arranged by the State Fair Association.

Six hundred dollars will be awarded to Eastland county as the prize for fifth place.

County Agent J. C. Patterson stated that the contest was originally planned by the fair association to cover five years but those in charge declared that in three years much had been accomplished as had been hoped for in five, so the contest has been brought to an end and a new competition over a period of 10 years will be launched.

The declaration was made by the fair association officials, in announcing the close of the present contest, that Eastland county was the only one that might have any right to complain of all the other counties in the contest were merely holding their own or were dropping back while Eastland county was gaining.

However, Eastland county was tirely willing for the contest to be and the citizens are highly satisfied at the high mark won. The first year found Eastland county in eighth place. It will be recalled that the county exhibit had a very high rating that year and half the score in the contest is based upon the boys' club work and the girls' club work.

The \$600 in prize money will be apportioned 50 per cent for adult work; 25 per cent for girls' club work and 25 per cent for boys' club work under the supervision of a committee nominated by the commissioners' court and approved by the State Fair association.

#### Will Raise Million Dollars for Baylor

DALLAS, Tex., Feb. 12—Members of the medical staff of Baylor university joined forces with Dallas leading business men of Dallas in carrying forward the appeal now in progress for a one million dollar fund for the local medical institution.

The fifteen business men constitute the board of counselors to cooperate in administering the affairs of the university. Two committees of physicians have been formed to work with the committee of business men this week in soliciting funds.

#### RECESS TAKEN, STATE LAND INVESTIGATION

Bank Tellers Testify to Checks Being Drawn on the Funds by Land Commissioner Robison In Favor of His Wife and Son.

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 12—Recess has been order until this afternoon in the State land investigation which yesterday probed the handling of the rebates on land appraisal funds, which Land Commissioner J. T. Robison admits he used from time to time.

Bank tellers testified to checks being drawn on the fund by commissioner Robison in favor of his son and wife.

Robison made no denial of the checks. The fund he claimed was not a State fund. It originated with an assessment of a cent an acre against West Texas lands to pay the cost of viewing them and re-assessing their value. This cent an acre produced \$65,000. The reappraisal cost \$29,000 less than estimated. Rebate checks for their prorata of the total assessment were mailed back to the land owners.

E. W. Early testified that because of the "miserly" \$2,000 a year salary paid the Land Commissioner and his activities for benefit of the land owners it was agreed the refund be donated to him. Robison said the rebate checks came back endorsed by the payees and the State had no interest in them.

#### Moody Signs 13 New Bills by Legislature

Measures Signed Appropriate Total of More than \$1,768,000 for Court Expenses, and Departments.

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 12—Thirteen bills passed by this session of the Legislature were filed this morning by Governor Moody with his signature attached.

Bill signed are: Raising salaries of Judge of Harris county courts at law and fixing jurisdictions; permitting cities to sell abandoned park sites; accepting only registered brands as evidence of cattle ownership; extending teachers certificates; authorizing credit unions to operate in cities as asked by Fort Worth postal clerks; allowing constables expense accounts; increasing number of directors of large banks; creating district courts in Midland and Motley counties; appropriating \$119,500 for court expense deficiencies; \$148,646 for departments and \$1,500,000 to be added to the available school fund.

#### Heated Rows Feature Trial of Johnston

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 12—Heated rows in which attorneys, Senators, and a witness took part featured the second day of Henry S. Johnston's gubernatorial impeachment trial on charges of incompetence.

As an anti-climax, Senator Fletcher Johnson made his way to the press table and tried to whip a newspaper reporter. Presiding chief Justice Charles W. Mason interfered and prevented any blow being struck.

#### Man Wanted Here Is Held in Detroit

In far-away Michigan, a legal fight looms to bring back to Eastland county a man accused of embezzlement.

Armed with requisition papers signed by the governor of Texas County Attorney Joe H. Jones and Deputy Sheriff Steele Hill are aboard a train en route to Michigan where they will see the governor at Lansing to get him to honor the requisition.

W. J. Hatten, charged with embezzlement, will resist being brought back to face a district court in this county, local authorities are advised.

#### Brownville and Mexico Air Mail Service

BROWNVILLE, Tex., Feb. 12—Air mail service between Brownville and Mexico City, linking the lines of Mexico and South and Central American lines, will start on Feb. 23 according to George Rihl, owner of the Mexican Aviation company which will operate the route.

Rihl expressed the belief that service on the Houston - Brownville leg would start on the same day.

Col. Charles A. Linbergh has been invited by the Mexican government to fly the route between Mexico City and Brownville on the opening day and is reported to have accepted the invitation.

#### FOUR FOUND GUILTY IN 88TH COURT

Only One Out of Seven Convictions by Jury Monday, Got Suspended Sentence—Four Charges of Forgery and Two of Car Theft.

Seven times Monday a jury said "Guilty" in 88th District court. Only one of the defendants received a suspended sentence.

Grady Owen and W. B. Collier, deputy prosecutors, represented the State. The convictions, according to the authorities, were: M. H. Neeloy alias Niceley Hope, two years for stealing Don Sivalls' car; Leonard Harvey, two years for the same offense; C. G. Hendrick, two years in four cases—two for forgery and two for passing forged instrument—two of the sentences to be cumulative, making a total of four years' imprisonment.

J. E. Putman's two years' suspended sentence, for forgery. In Putman's case, he was accused of forging a check for \$13 but did not obtain any money. Testimony was to the effect that after the defendant's arrest he had swallowed concentrated lye and a doctor said that this was eating the lining out of his stomach.

#### POPE GIVES HIS BLESSING TO THE WORLD

Vast Crowd Fills Square in Front of St. Peter's and Pays Homage—Was a Crowning Act of Pope's Day of Triumph.

By Thomas B. Morgan United Press Staff Correspondent ROME, Feb. 12—While a great multitude filled the vast square in front of St. Peter's paying him homage, Pope Pius XI appeared on a balcony today and gave his blessing to the whole world.

It was the crowning act of the Pope's day of triumph, in which he celebrated the seventh anniversary of his coronation and the consummation of peace between the Vatican and Italy after 58 years of estrangement.

It was estimated that the blessing was bestowed in the presence of 100,000 persons. The Pope appeared on the balcony accompanied by a cross-bearer, the colleges of Cardinals in their scarlet robes, and the members of the papal court. It was a pageant of medieval splendor.

The crowd was one of the greatest ever gathered in the square. All turned toward the mighty facade of the church. All during the morning all traffic in the city seemed converging toward St. Peter's.

The blessing "Urbis Et Orbis" (of the city and the world) came at the conclusion of a pontifical high mass in the Cathedral, which was attended by a crowd that filled every available inch of space.

The blessing was significant of the Pope's changed status and the restoration of his temporal sovereignty. It was a custom abandoned by the Popes in 1870, when they retired into seclusion in the Vatican. It was revived only twice, by the present Pope, once at his election and again at his coronation. Then he returned to the precedent of his predecessors and for seven years the blessing had not been restored.

#### BROWNS IN STORAGE TANK

SAN ANGELO, Tex., Feb. 12—While attempting to get a bucket of water, Will H. Rogers, about 69, fell into a concrete storage tank on a farm near Carlsbad and was drowned. His body was found by his sons.

#### Different Prices for Different Communities Will Be Barred If New Measure is Passed—Other Matters Considered by Legislators.

#### FLASHES

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 12—Different prices in different communities under the same conditions will be barred in an "unfair discrimination" bill, drafted by the Attorney general's department, offered in the Texas House of representatives yesterday afternoon by administration leaders and favorably reported last night.

The bill is offered after a six months investigation of varying prices conducted by the Attorney General's department under the supervision of First Assistant Attorney General Galloway Calhoun. It applies not only to gasoline, which was the first thing probed, but to all commodities.

Penalties for unfair discrimination range from \$50 to \$1500 fine. Injunction proceedings also are authorized to stop violations.

Under the bill "Unfair Discrimination" is defined as price fixing for the purpose of destroying a competitor or charging difference price for the same commodity in different communities after making due allowance for difference in grade or quality, necessary cost of transportation and necessary differences in the cost of marketing.

Rep. John Wallace, one of the members offering the bill, says it will meet complaint of unfair ice competition in Texas. A bill to declare ice a public necessity and place it under control of the utility division of the railroad commission was killed in the House late yesterday.

Opponents of the ice bill claimed it was really sponsored by the "Big Ice Companies". Rep. O. F. Chastain of Eastland fought the bill. He charged that the cities would be better off regulating their own prices. The railroad commission, he asserted, permitted 75 cents a thousand to be charged for natural gas in Eastland with natural gas all around it, and blocked efforts of the city to hold the price to 50 cents.

A House Committee last night reported favorably a substitute by Rep. Bob Long of Wichita Falls for the original Pro Ration Oil bill. It provides for regulation of oil fields by the oil and gas division of the railroad commission and establishes penalties that make enforcement of the commission rules possible. It omits the pro ration sections of the original bill.

Commercial motor truck operation will go under the railroad commission under terms of a bill offered today by Leonard Tillotson of Sealy.

The bill calls for the State assuming control in practically the same way as motor buses were taken under regulation two years ago.

All bona fide operators of motor truck lines on Oct. 1, 1928 will get temporary permits. If not protest is lodged against them in 30 days the permits will become permanent. Lines established after that will be on permits issued by the commission on showing of public need.

Truck lines will be divided into two classes. One will include lines with regular scheduled and route and stopping places. The other will include those making occasional trips.

Interest Grows In Carbon Dairy School C. H. Colvin, vocational agricultural teacher in the Eastland High school, and who is teaching a series of poultry and dairying schools at Carbon, reports a very interesting and well attended meeting Monday night. Possibilities of dairying in this section and the profits to be derived from that source were discussed at the meeting.

Interest in the meetings is growing nightly according to Mr. Colvin, who states that they will continue for at least another week.

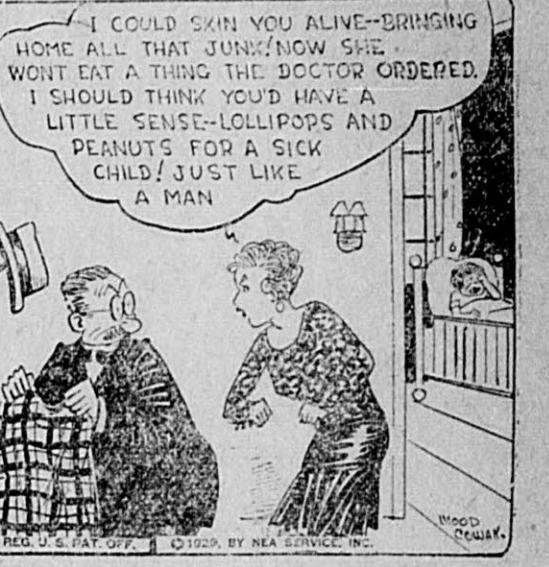

town and its happenings, as well as that of a booming oil town. She writes unerringly of her neighbor who reads all morning in the shade and then serves buttered radishes for lunch. She gleams the "purple of a wild bird's wing and the gold that the moon lets spill" and weaves them into her songs. She loves "bright things like candle lights upon a window ledge, a maple tree that's all ablaze and ships' lanterns far at sea."

If one has fault to find with the book, it is that her love poems are perhaps too much upon one theme — that she repeats herself over and over. But no less a person than Witter Bynner has been guilty of this fault. "Red Heels" has a freshness, a newness, a young bloom upon it that no amount of criticism can tarnish. If there be now and then a harsh line of a trifle brittle tone, the reader can forgive it because of the bubbling spontaneity and the lyric beauty that adorns nearly all of the poems.

Has Unusual Insight  
From the world that is a small town this author has gleaned the knowledge which she puts into an eight-line poem called simply: "Gossip":  
Before I knew how cruel  
Just common talk can be,  
I thought that words were  
Singing things  
With colors like the sea.

But since I've felt their caustic lash  
And know how they can sting,  
I hold my breath when words go by,  
For fear they will not sing.  
"Red Heels" is a book that will be read and remembered.

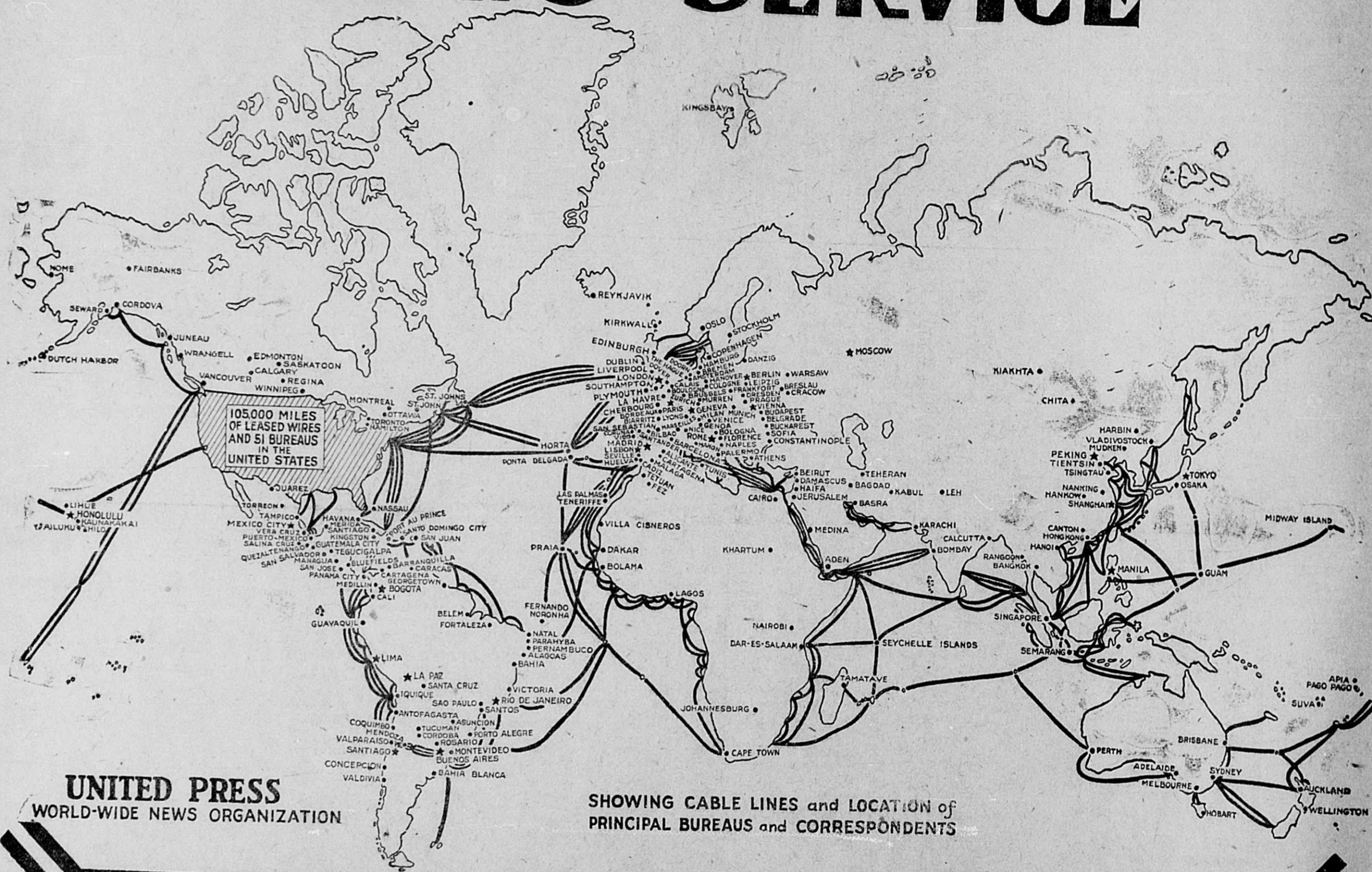

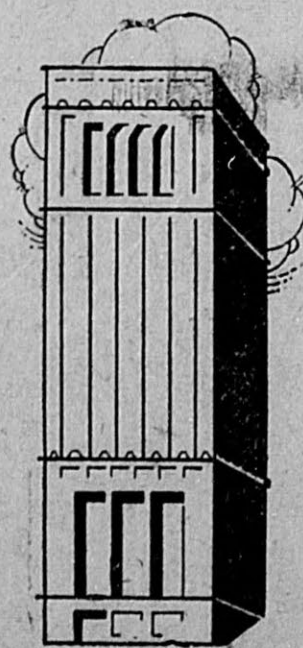

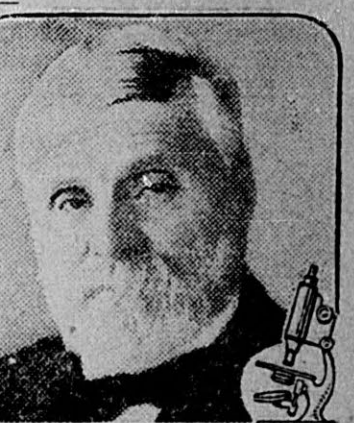

**SCIENTISTS HOPE THAT ARTIFICIAL HEART WILL WORK**

**Russian Experiment of Machine to Restore Life.**

MOSCOW. — Experiments by which young Russian scientists hope to be able to restore life to dead organs or even entire organisms have been made by the Moscow Scientific Chemo-pharmaceutical institute for the past four years.

Some surprising results have been obtained.

Dr. S. S. Brukhanenko and Dr. S. I. Chechulin, in charge of the experiments, have constructed an apparatus which they hope to substitute for a worn out heart. The machine is impressive in its simplicity and is made of glass metal and rubber tubing. It is operated by a dynamo.

The theory of the experiments is that if the blood can be kept from congealing after death the subject animal can be restored to life. It has been observed by the scientists that the body continues to live at least three minutes after the heart stops beating.

Taking advantage of those three minutes, the Russian scientists hope to keep the blood a fluid by using the artificial heart and make repairs on the heart to restore the body to its normal functions.

The experiments have brought out apparently the processes of death are active rather than passive, that cessation of organic functions continues gradually until the animal is said to be dead. Some organs live longer than others, and the fact that the head of a dog has been kept alive by the artificial heart has indicated that the brain outlives the heart.
