Eastland county poll tax sales totaled an estimated 5,152, Stanley Webb, tax assessor-collector, said Thursday.

Webb said the figure was about 77 per cent of the 1952 quota and about 90 per cent of the 1950 sale. The last day for purchasing poll taxes in the county was Sunday.

Eastland's Mavericks blew a four point lead in the third quarter as they folded like an accordion to drop a 47-43 District 7-A East Zone tilt to DeLeon in Eastland Tuesday night. The loss, for all practical purposes, killed Eastland's hopes for a district crown.

The Mavs started off cautiously, but built up a 7-5 lead at the end of the first period. By halftime the score was 22-18 and Eastland appeared to have the game under control.

Coming out after the halftime rest, DeLeon caught fire and Eastland showed signs of a deep freeze. The Bearcats took control of both goals, scored 14 points and held the Mavs to three to gain a 32-25 lead. Eastland couldn't do anything right in the quarter and DeLeon apparently could do nothing wrong.

The Mavs got together a fourth quarter rally which fell just four points shy of victory. J. D. Hanson paced Eastland in the period, scoring six of the 18 points netted. Dale Slotton, who played a great game in the B team tilt, came in in the final few minutes of play and added four points. Doug Williamson took scoring honors for the night with 14 points.

## Eastland Vs. Ranger In Do-Or Die Battle Friday

### Cold Weather Blamed For Gas Bill Increases Here

Cold weather which began in late December accounted for 55 per cent more heating weather for Eastland residents during January this year than last year, according to Hubert Westfall, local manager for Lone Star Gas Company.

Based on his findings on U. S. Weather Bureau tabulations, Westfall was answering a query from the writer to explain the effect of this year's cold weather

on gas consumption as reflected in current gas bills.

"While rates for gas service have increased in Eastland, the cold weather has had considerable bearing on January gas bills," Westfall said.

He explained that heating weather, of which there has been considerably more this year, exists whenever the average temperature falls below 65 degrees.

"According to weather statistics, every day in the 30-day period through January 20 this year, has required heat for comfort because the daily average temperature has been 65 degrees or less," Westfall said.

"During the period there were 15 days when the minimum temperature fell below freezing and on only one day did the average warm up to 64 degrees."

For the same period in 1953, he pointed out, there were two days when the average went above 65 and only 10 days, as against 15 this year, when the minimum temperature was below freezing. The highest average daily temperature for the 1953 30-day period was 68 degrees.

U. S. Weather Bureau people, explains Westfall, figure this heating weather in DDD's or what is called "degree days." They are computed by adding the number of degrees the average temperature each day falls below 65.

For example, if the maximum temperature for the day is 50 degrees, the mean or average is 35. When this is subtracted from 65, the number of DDD's for that day is shown as 30. The formula is based on the fact that normally whenever the mean or average temperature for the day falls below 65, some heating is required for comfort.

This heating requirement is increased proportionately, too, when humidity is greater and high winds accompany the cold.

Records of the Weather Bureau show that in January 1953 there was a total of 403 DDD's for the period mentioned earlier, while in January 1954 the same period, there were 623 DDD's or an increase of 220 DDD's this January. The difference spelled 55 per cent more heating weather and a comparative increase in gas consumption, said the Lone Star manager.

Westfall said that the gas rate now in effect in Eastland is the same standard rate in effect in over 100 other cities and towns on the Lone Star System. He said it is the same as that of Abilene, Wichita Falls, Baird, Albany and many others.

"For almost 20 years Eastland had in effect a rate which was considerably below standard compared to other towns on the system. The rate was actually reduced in Eastland in 1934 in the depths of the depression and no change had been made since that time," Westfall concluded.

He was born Dec. 24, 1888 and lived in the Sabanno community until he moved to California in January of 1952.

Other survivors include two sons James of Compton and Ray of Fort Worth, and another daughter, Mildred Gage of Compton.

## Ninety Per Cent Of County Taxes Have Been Paid

Tax payments in the county totaled \$279,277.

"We expect to collect about five per cent more by June 30," Webb said, "we will have to do that to equal last year."

If you are planning to buy a black and white television set, you needn't be afraid that color television will make you set obsolete. It will be at least five years, before color television comes into its own, reports the Better Homes & Gardens Magazine.

In addition, color television will produce better reception on black and white sets—a much improved picture of unusual clarity, depth and softness, according to TV experts.

A representative of the National Television System Committee says that "color television will come as an evolution and not a revolution. Color will prove to be supplementary service and will not quickly, or perhaps ever, completely replace the black-and-white service.

Sixteen hours of daily network television in color is a long way off because of production headaches. Color TV will necessitate costly sets, costumes, props and equipment. 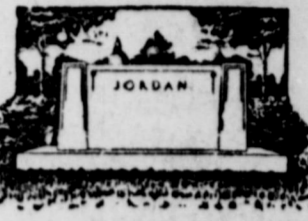

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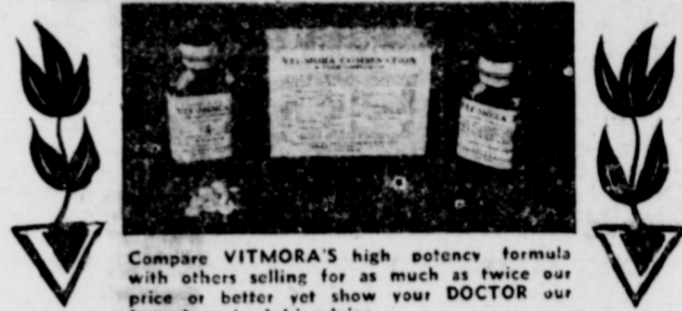

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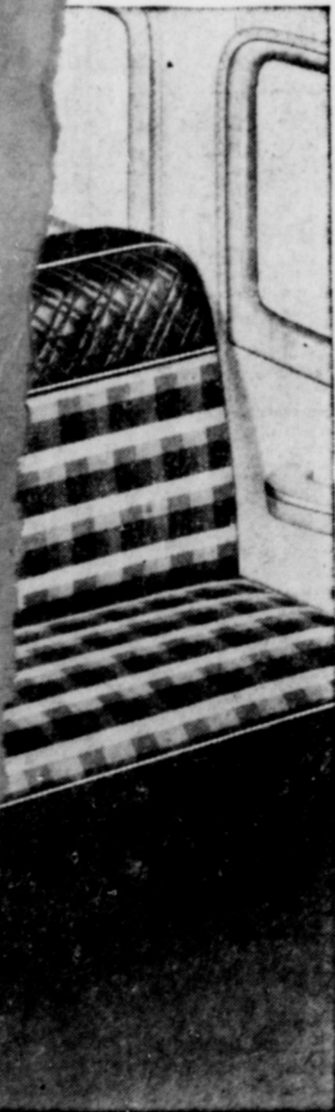

**'As It Looks From Here'**

**Two Amendments May Be Congress Chief Debate Subjects In 1954**

WASHINGTON, D. C.— This session of Congress will produce many heated discussions of and arguments about the Fifth and Sixth Amendments to the Constitution of the United States. These two amendments are integrated parts of the Bill of Rights. It would be well for all Americans to acquaint themselves fully with these two amendments, if you have not already done so. The Fifth Amendment contains the provisions behind which many witnesses before Congressional investigating committees have hidden themselves for a number of years. The Sixth Amendment contains the provision affording an accused the right to be confronted with the witnesses against him. The spotlight was placed on this particular amendment in the speech made by President Eisenhower before the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League at the Mayflower Hotel recently. The Washington Post quoted him in an editorial as follows:

"In this country if someone dislikes you or accuses you he must come up in front, he cannot hide behind the shadow, he cannot assassinate you or your character from behind, without suffering the penalties an outraged citizenry will impose."

You may not have a copy of the Constitution handy, so I am going to quote these two amendments as they appear in the Constitution:

**AMENDMENT (V)**

"No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb, nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without just compensation."

**AMENDMENT (VI)**

"In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right of a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense."

The language, "to be confronted with the witnesses against him," was not original. Actually, it was a right enjoyed under the English common law. Its inclusion in the Constitution was to preserve that right, but not to broaden it. This right, however, did not prevail in many other jurisdictions. Probably the most famous of the historical cases involving the violation of that right was the trial of Joan of Arc in France. In a recent history of that trial, it was pointed out that not a single witness appeared in person before the court against Joan of Arc. All the evidence was produced in the form of affidavits, and these were always written in the third person, the object being to conceal completely from the accused both the name and the identity of the witness.

The whole controversy, of course, will center around the Communist menace. Their tactics have been to employ our Constitution

and our laws to protect themselves while they work diligently at the task of trying to overthrow that Constitution and those laws. It will primarily concern employees of the federal government and perhaps many State and local governments in this country, as well as employees of manufacturing concerns engaged in defense work. No matter who a man is or where he comes from, he should not have even the color of right or privilege to work for any of the branches of our government, national, State, or local for any industry engaged in defense work or work incidental thereto, unless he or she is completely and devotedly dedicated to our form of government, our way of life, and the basic principles on which they were founded, with no ifs, ands, or buts.

Every American should read our Constitution and weigh every word, phrase, sentence, and paragraph therein very carefully.

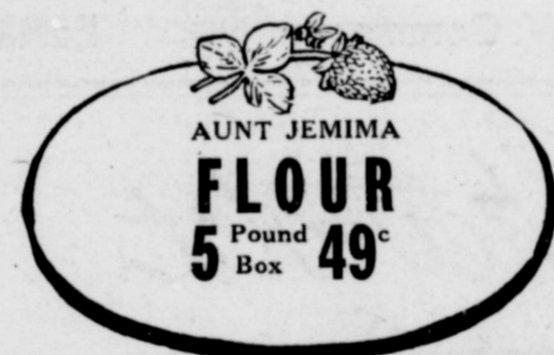

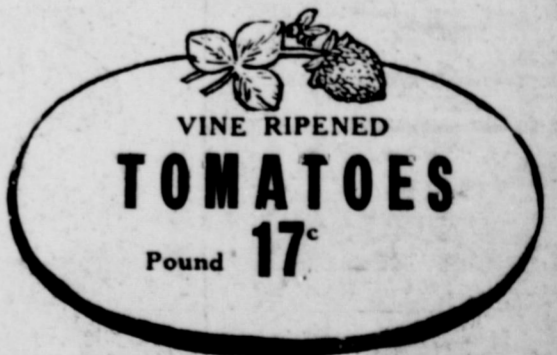

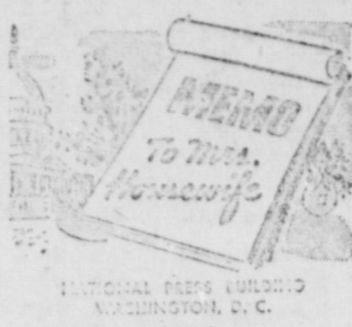
