18-19 Draft To Be One Of FDR's Topics

Second Front, Manpower Problems In Tonight's Talk

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12. (AP) - The White House indicated today that a presidential fireside chat tonight would touch the issues of a second front and the drafting of young men of 18 and 19 for the armed forces.

President Roosevelt gave over most of the day to finishing the address, scheduling only one conference. Significantly, that was with Paul V. McNutt, in charge of war manpower mobilization, and with Brig. Gen. Lewis E. Hershey, selective service director.

Asked about the drafting of 18- and 19-year olds, he replied: "I think you'll find that in there."

To an inquiry whether the speech would touch on European problems and a second front, Early answered: "I think you'll construe what he says as applying to a second front."

Early said there had been numerous requests that the talk include an appeal to the people to turn out and vote at the election next month but he said he did not know whether such an appeal would be made at this time.

Mr. Roosevelt already had called for a heavy turnout of voters in a statement pertaining to politics in his own state of New York.

While the chief executive said at a recent press conference that the fireside chat would not be in the nature of a general war review, Early's remark about a second front suggested that the chief executive might have decided to broaden his subject matter to some extent.

The president will speak 30 minutes, starting at 9 p. m., Central War Time.

Four Nazi Subs Damaged In Long Battle At Sea

LONDON, Oct. 12. (AP) - A 48-hour battle in the Atlantic in which four small Norwegian Corvettes and the British destroyer Viscount seriously damaged four German submarines and perhaps others was reported today by the admiralty.

Govt. Denied The Right To Break Petrillo Ban

CHICAGO, Oct. 12. (AP) - Federal Judge John P. Barnes today refused the government's request to restrain James C. Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians, and the federation from enforcing its ban against making recordings.

Little Fishing Now At The City Lake

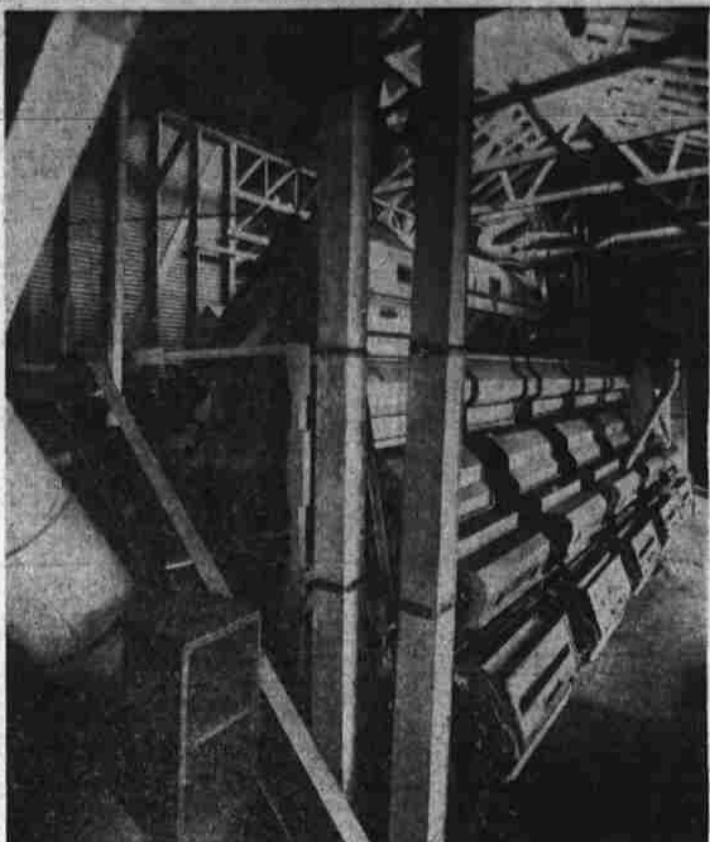

Farmers Gin Installs New Equipment To Turn Out Cleaner Cotton Products

Farmers Gin Co. is doing its best to help farmers meet a government request for the cleanest ginned product in years.

Nomads blow in the air at around 180 degrees and agitate it to the point that it is either bone dry when it reaches the other end of the drier, or it is so fluffed that it gins perfectly. Temperatures are kept around 180 to prevent any possible damage to staple.

Those who have used the drier consistently this year have estimated that it has resulted in raising their cotton one full grade.

Farmers Gin has five huge 80-saw stands and gins with a loose roll to insure maximum length of lint. The equipment is as modern as can be had and Farmers Gin has a record of spending what is necessary to keep it on edge for the best possible work.

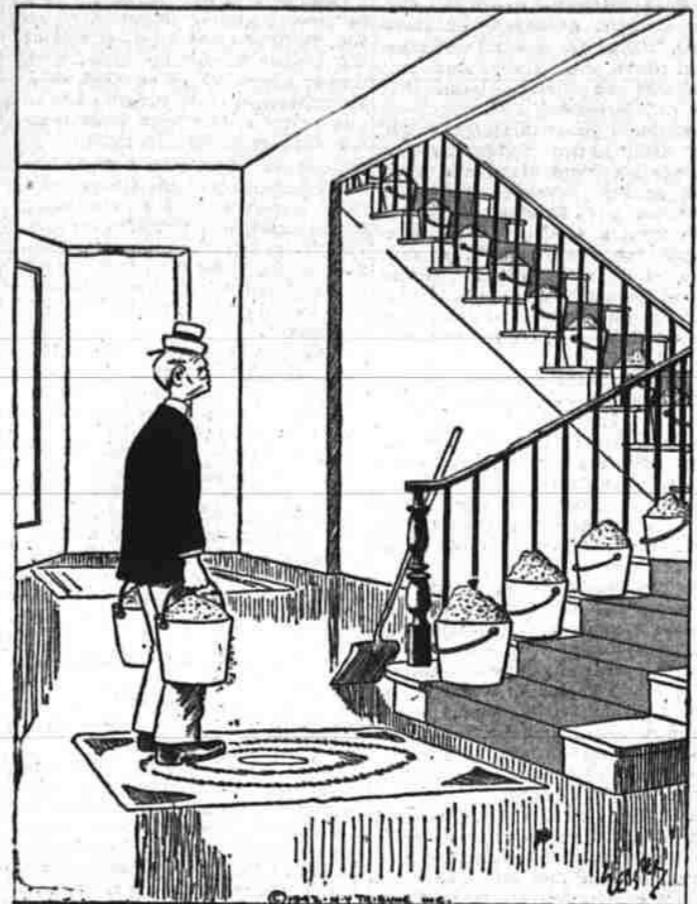
