

WASHINGTON, March 9 .- The State of Kentucky joined the biuminous coal producing states today in petitioning the supreme court to uphold the Guffey coal control act in opposition to Harlan ounty, Kentucky, producers who contend the law is unconstitution-

The Kentucky brief was a highlight of the session which marked the beginning of the second phase of the new deal litigation in the court, a phase expected to be marked with dispute over the power of federal and state governments to regulate industry.

As the Kentucky brief was filed Rep. Kent Keller, Dem., Ill., received permission from the court to file a brief for the State of Illinois, citing its support of the law. This brought the total of states intervening in the Guffey act test case to five. Their move is designed to meet any arguments that the states have the power and ability to control bituminous coal production.



Both Parties Silent About Chief Issue

It begins to look as if the American electorate were about to treat itself to the spectacle of a presidential campaign in which the principal issue is ignored by the common consent of everyone involved.

To get a parallel, you would have to imagine the campaign of 1860 fought out without a single mention of the issue of chattel slavery.

Today's principal issue, of course, is that of unemployment.

You hear precious little about it in the preliminary skirmishing. Instead, you get fine words about a more abundant life, a balanced budget, inflation, security, the road to Moscow and a tolerably well-rounded whole. And while these things are interesting they do not go to the root of the nation's most tremendous problem.

No one knows exactly how many unemployed people there are in America today. The best estimates seem to agree that the total is at least 10,000,000. This, it is true, is a drop of some four or five millions from the depression's worst; nevertheless, it represents a continuing, unsolved empt from the income tax and problem which is nothing less than appalling.

Here is why it is appalling. Not only does our country contain more people than live in Greater New York who ceeds from life insurance policies are unable to support themselves; there is every reason paid by reason of the death of the to believe that even when our industrial machine gets back to normal, the vast majority of these people still will be the death of the insured and interwithout work.
