U. S. TO KEEP OUT OF STRIFE IN EUROPE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—
United States today stood firm its determination to keep clear of European wars, to the extent of refusing to join proposed international mediation efforts to end Spain's bloody civil war.

LISBON.—Lisbon was quiet today and conditions were normal. Excitement was caused in European capitals last night by reports there was a revolt against the ruling Portuguese government as President Antonio Carmona had been killed.

MADRID.—A conglomerate of allist army of soldiers, policemen and civilians is driving the rebels back in the country southwest of the capital, at present the most vital area in Spain, it was announced today.

VERA CRUZ, Mex.—Thirty six railway carsloads of war munitions, contain 50,000 rifles, arrived here last night. It was expected that the would be put aboard a Spanish steamer today to be sent to the Spanish government.

LONDON.—Great Britain today officially notified both the Spanish government and the Spanish rebels that "British ships will be protected against any illegal interference."

Both sides were warned also that if their airplanes flew over Gibraltar, British guns would fire three times in warning, and then aim at the airplanes.

To borrow a phrase from a popular song, "there's moonlight and love and romance" at the Regal theatre this week where Miss Matthews, with Robert Young, in the GB picture "It's Love Again."

Jessie comes to town in a sprightly comedy and Jessie goes to town with some new dancing that is absolute tops in this kind of entertainment. Her tap routines, her ballroom dancing and finally her sensational new Temple-dance achieve perfection.

**Insects Add Injury To Drouth Damage**

WASHINGTON—Unusual mid-summer activity of important crop insects is following the widespread hot, dry weather, according to the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Conditions have been ideal for grasshoppers and chinch bugs, which are cleaning up many fields of grain and forage crops that survived the drought.

The heavy grasshopper infestation—known all along to be inevitable because of the enormous number of eggs laid last fall fully met expectations. Conditions were exactly right for egg hatching and continued right for topper growth. Grasshoppers were particularly destructive last month in Colorado, Montana, Wyoming, Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma.

July weather accelerated chinch bug migration from small grains and grasses into corn. Scattered damage from this bug is reported from most of its range, especially in northeastern Ohio, in the western tier or two of Indiana counties from Lake to Greene, in central Illinois, in west central Wisconsin, and throughout the southern half of Iowa.

Two varieties of cricket—Mormon and coulee, both general feeders—have swarmed over parts of the Northwest. In spite of control measures that completely wiped out many bands, Mormon cricket infestations in Idaho and Nevada are alarmingly large. Montana also has enormous numbers of this cricket and Utah, Wyoming, Colorado and Oregon have smaller infestations. Coulee crickets are unusually numerous in Washington.

Blister beetles—which consume truck and garden crops, grasses, shrubs, and flowers—have been generally destructive in Maryland westward to North Dakota, and Kansas, notably in areas overrun by grasshoppers in the last few years. Although the adults do much damage to vegetation, the larvae feed on grasshopper eggs and may be of much aid in reducing hopper infestations for next year.

The fall army worm made an early appearance in Florida, North Carolina and Puerto Rico, damaging grasses, corn and young

sugar cane. Other serious mid-summer pests are the rose chaffer that has damaged corn, garden crops, and shade trees in Wisconsin, and roses in Minnesota.

The turnip root weevil, a comparatively new pest, has ruined a lot of mustard and cabbage seed in western Washington and Oregon, and the tomato pinworm that

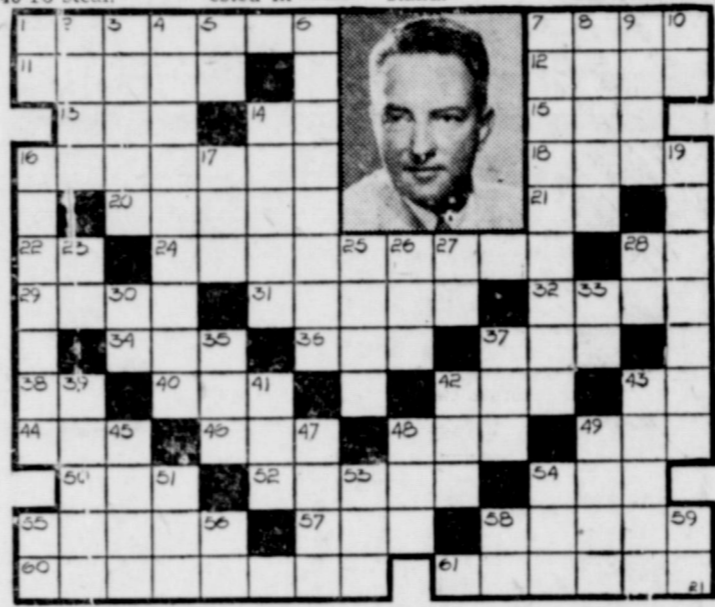

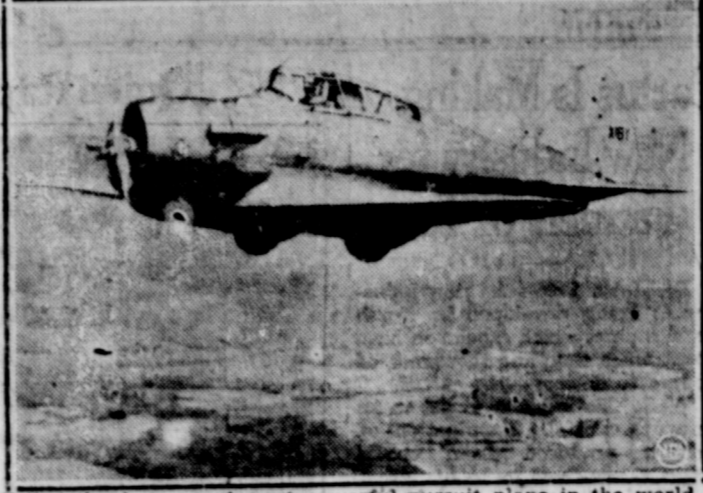

Other charges by Garrett: That Congressman Wright Patman was heard to say in Eastland that, if he had known the situation in the 17th district, he would not have come into it to sneak for Blanton; that Patman said 85 per cent of ex-service men in the district wired him not to come; that a majority of Stephenville ex-service men refused to attend a banquet for Patman.

That Blanton went to Dallas recently to get endorsement of Vice-President Garner but failed; that Blanton had read to the voters letters received from Garner as far back as 1916 that were written purely through congressional courtesy but "these do not erase Garner's own words in the Congressional Record that Blanton is not a man but a communist and would attempt to put anything in the record to make people believe food was given free in Washington and that Blanton continually charged nepotism yet kept members of his own family on the government payroll."

That the late R. Q. Lee, not Blanton obtained the new post office and federal court house for Abilene "and all Blanton did was scale down the appropriation for it, \$100,000."

That Blanton offered to make a campaign speech for Congressman McFadden of Pennsylvania who attempted to impeach the Roosevelt secretary of the treasury.

"I believe in an adequate and liberal federal old age pension. I want to do my part to make the declining years of our older people happy ones," he said.

 ey in their hospitals, lights, parks, swimming pools, tennis courts, golf courses, polo fields and playgrounds.

"But," explained Blanton, "you don't get any benefit. Only the Washington people get the benefit. I held hearings night and day. I know how to get the truth out of the witnesses."

Blanton declared that many high-salaried executives had paid no taxes for years until a stop was put to the practice. Blanton stated Garrett had printed in circulars a letter from Bernard L. Henning, Washington taxicab company operator, that he sent him \$5. Blanton ridiculed the small contribution report because, he claimed, Henning had the biggest taxicab monopoly in the world. He stated his efforts at rate cuts has brought taxicab fares in the city to a reasonable figure, and 3,000 veterans are drivers.

If Garrett was elected, Blanton said, his obligations would make "him stand up to the lick log and there he'd be as helpless as a little kitten."

An individual who interrupted Blanton was booed down by the crowd.

Blanton charged that forces opposed to him have lately been circulating the district with many misrepresentations against him, "including a malicious and wholly false accusation that I have been writing laudatory letters to myself, saying they were written by colleagues in congress and reading them at my speaking dates."

"Within the past few days such a circular has been given wide distribution, and among other untrue statements was one to the effect that two letters which I have received from Congressman J. E. Rankin and Wilburn Cartright are forgeries, written by myself, and demanding that I produce the original letters."

"Well, my friends, here they are," Blanton said, exhibiting the letters. "Here in Clyde Garrett's home town I am showing you the originals and I want you Garrett men to come up here on the platform and see these letters and satisfy yourselves that instead of being forgeries, written by myself, they are genuine letters from Rankin and Cartright and that I have been quoting exactly from them."

Rankin is chairman of the committee on world war veterans legislation. On his congressional stationery he wrote Blanton last July 30. Excerpts from the letter:

"I have often wondered how far that bunch in Washington would go towards trying to help defeat you. I know the power trust which is robbing the people of Texas of more than \$25,000,000 a year on light and power rates—I know they will do anything to defeat any man who tries to protect the consumers of electricity from the highway robbery which they are perpetrating through unreasonable light and power rates."

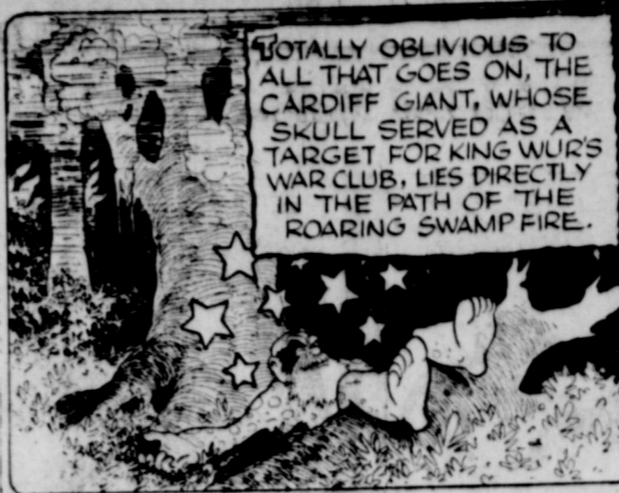
"But I don't know how far these Washington tax-dodgers will carry their fight. I have said time and again that you have the hardest job of any man in congress, as chairman of the subcommittee on appropriations that handles the appropriations for the District of Columbia. The people of the District get more out of this government than any other people in the United States, and manifest less gratitude for it; and every time we get a man like you who tries to hold down expenses and curtail their raids on the treasury, then they set in to destroy him. I hope you whip them to a frazzle, and that you return to congress by an overwhelming majority."

Cartright Letter  
 Cartright is chairman of the house committee on roads. His letter to Blanton, dated August 6, said:

"It has just been reported to me that one Clyde Garrett claims that he caused the Cartright road bill to be passed. He certainly is a bold and presumptuous mortal. I never knew such a man existed. He had no more to do with that bill than a man in the moon. I had charge of the bill from start to finish and his name was not mentioned in any way in connection with the bill."

"You had as much or more to do with the passage of that bill as any member of congress npt to be a member of the roads committee. You made a good speech in support of the bill and very materially assisted in its passage."
