

How Often Do You Clean Your Henhouse?

Much of the "grief" that sometimes visits poultry flocks is invited by lack of proper cleanliness and sanitation.

A good many folks have the impression of proper cleanliness and sanitation. that cleaning out the henhouse once a month constitutes poultry cleanliness. It is cleanliness, to be sure, compared with the semi-annual cleanings which some bouses get, but it still falls short of the mark and there is no real danger of any house being cleaned too often or too thoroughly.

Most folks would find their flocks more healthy and profitable if they would keep their henhouses clean all the time instead of only periodically. This takes a little more time and effort, but we have seen this difference in flocks time after time, and know that It pays in dollars and cents. It is not merely a matter of keeping the poultry house neat and clean, but also free from filth and vermin at all times.

The matter of sanitation, according to Nature's standards, is another prime reason for removing the droppings frequently. Let us consider the fact that in the wild state chickens roosted in trees sufficiently high that the fumes arising from their excrement would not reach them. Now, on the other hand, when fowls are forced to sleep in domestication on perches only a few Inches, or feet at the most, above the gathered filth of many nights, it stands to reason that sooner or later the hen's throat and lungs are going to get out of order and this leads to germs and infections that soon sap her strength and vitality.-Iowa Homestead.

A Cure for Reckless Driving

Reckless driving on our city streets and public highways is a disease easy of diagnosis. It is not incurable although it requires a remedy rather drastic in nature—a bitter dose to swallow, but entirely without danger to the patient. The remedy has been suggested in Farm and Ranch heretofore. We repeat it: License every driver of a motor vehicle. Make the fee nominal and the penalty for driving without a license or permit, a term in jail. Cancel the license of every driver, who violates the traffic and highway laws, for terms varying from thirty days to twelve months. Enforce the law to the letter. This prescription, if filled and the remedy applied, would reduce violations to a minimum and save several hundred lives which are annually sacrificed in Texas and other Southwestern States, to the speed maniac and other drivers who are indifferent to the rights of others.

It is indulged in by brainless idiots, pin headed young squirts, who try to show off, and irresponsible men and boys with smart-Aleck dispositions. In cities and towns the most cangerous drivers are boys piloting laundry cars and other delivery vehicles, including some big truck drivers. Why should allowed to endanger the lives and property of others? License all drivers and cancel the license of law violators It will cure the disease .- Farm and



A New Swindle

Mr. O. B. Rollins, county agent in Bexar county, reports the following incident to the Extension Service, which should prove interesting to farmers having cotton to sell:

"A farmer called at my office last week and stated that a group of men were trading two German city bonds, 1000 marks (present value \$16 each) for one bale of cotton. The buyers claimed they were sending the cotton to Germany. The banker whom I interviewed about the matter told me the cotton is not shipped to Germany. but is sold here instead at from 10 to 12 cents a pound, or about \$50 to \$60 a bale. Thus the speculators were making from \$18 to \$28, less cost of houling on each bale."-Extension Service Farm News.





First German is Given 8 Months for His Cruelty

Leipsic, May 26. Serg. Heyne accused of having ill-treated British soldiers who were prisoners of war at the prison camp at Herne, Westphalia was sentenced to 8 months imprisonment by the high court here today. He is the first German officer to be tried on criminal charge arising from the conduct of the war.

In his summing up address the prosecuting attorney general demanded that Heyne be sent to prison for two years. Reviewing the testimony, the prosecutor declared that while prisoners of war "could not be expected to be handled with 'kid gloves' Sergeant Heyne was shown to have exceeded the

YOUR TEETH

By REA PROCTOR MCGEE M. D., D. D. S. The Third Hand

It is very amusing to see a couple of foreigners, or even home folks sometimes, waving and gesturing wildly with their hands in an ordinary conversation.

We don't seem to consider that it is up to the hands to help with the talk and do a little of the mouth's work occasionally; the mouth certainly does enough work that belong to the hands.

From our earliest infancy to tottering old age we use the mouth as an amateur workshop, testing laboratory, carry-all, thread-cutter, pencil-sharpener, lubricator, wrench, vise weapon of offense and defense and for unnumbered other duties in addition to its proper work.

In fact the mouth is commonly used as a third hand.

This means an enormous amount of wear and tear-upon the teeth, gums and faws...that does not come from chewing alone.

Almost everything that is put into the mouth has infection of some kind

The very fact that we suffer so little from this overuse of the mouth shows that the saliva must be a germ-killer to a very considerable extent but the saliva does not always protect us from infection from these outside sources.

Many very serious conditions arise from the "third hand" use of the mouth. In addition to infection the unreasonable strain upon the teeth often breaks the enamfel and occasionally breaks off whole teeth, fillings are loosened, decay is encouraged and the irritation to the line, cheeks, gums and tongue favors cancer.

The habit of biting threads instead of cutting them causes a chronic inflammation of the membrane that covers the roots of the teeth and will cause the loss of the teeth. It is much more comfortable - and cheaper - to buy scissors.

Unemployment and Reconstruction.

Americans have tended to think of business depression too narrowly as an American problem, and to blame the policies of an individual or a political party for it. The facts are that all the nations in whose life modern organized industry plays an important role are facing similar difficulties in more or less acute form, and that these result from the play of economic and social forces far beyond control of any individual or group.

Recent reports for the United States have shown that employment in this country is still decreasing although some industries are having a revival. The total of unemployed in the country has been estimated from three to five million. In January the first Government survey indicated that possibly 3,-500,000 wage earners were out of work, with some 2,000,000 definitely listed as unemployed in the majorities. Since that time the total has increased instead of decreasing, as it normally should with the resumption of seasonal industries. A study of unemployment in the United States for the fifteen years from 1902 to 1917, made by Horneil Hart, showed a peak of average unemployment in January reaching about 3,400,000 and a tendency to decline steadily from January to October, when the average stood at 1,900,000. This year, on the contrary, unemployment has increased somewhat since January, according to the investigators, and probably reaches now about 4,000,-000. The New York State report for last month tended to corroborate these conclusions, showing a decline following a two months' revival and a total of unemployed in the State of about half a million.

Great Britain estimates completely and part-time unemployed as aggregating nearly 5,000,000, with some 2,500,-000 receiving Government aid. France had 500,000 unemployed at the first of the, year and recent indications have been that conditions were no better, with 70,000 unemployed in Paris. German estimates show 450,000 unemployed, with 134,500 out of work in Berlin, a condition comparatively better than that of England or the United States, but still representing a decline in activity from 1920. Belgium estimated 100,000 unemployed early in the year, Switzerland has been facing a serious crisis with the unprecedented number of 125,000 out of work in her small population; Italy, Spain and the Scandinavian countries have been and are still passing through similar conditions. In the Far East Japan has reported marked unemployment, following the industrial boom during the war. 





"For more than a century we have heard the cry, 'cotton is gold,' " writes a Wall street financier. "This was because the producer was poor and the European buyer was comparatively wealthy. He was willing to pay the grower the cash because he had the money and because he needed the product. The situation is now changed. The South may have suffered somewhat from the decline in cotton but it is immensely wealthy compared with the Enropean buyer. Cotton therefore is no longer gold. The South will have to work for a few years on the principle, cotton is credit."

Why not state the real facts? It the European cotton buyer poor? Factory lords of Great Britain, the manufacturers of cotton fabrics made the largest profits in their history during the world war. When did they lose their fortunes or their war profits?

For a hundred years the American cotton producer has been poor but never the buyer of raw cotton. The situation is changed to this extent: The European buyer of cotton goods is poor. He is idle. There are 4,000,000 idle workmen in Great Britain and these, with their dependents, represent twelve to fifteen million wearers of cetton goods.

It is not the foreign buyer of cotton that's in financial distress. It is the foreign buyer of cotton goods. Of course the slogan, "cotton is credit," is very attractive. It is attractive be cause it contains truth.

If the Germans for instance were given long time credits they would take 3,000,000 bales of the crop of 1920 and other Europeans who would buy if given long time credits would be in the market for the fleecy staple.

There must be confidence before there is credit. France is backing the Poles, who grabbed Upper Silesia. Great Britain is backing the agreement of the allies' council. France has its hand on the gun and the Pole, instead of going to work, is sharpening his sword for bloody strife.

A man or a nation with money to loan must have confidence in the borrower, must realize that there is a stable government to deal with or a stable individual before he will buy bonds or create credits.
