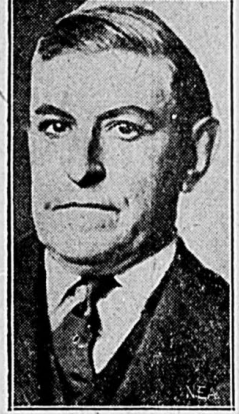
POSSE SURROUNDS 3 BANDITS WHO ROBBED BANK

00 In Loot Secured From Oklahoma Bank

Examiner Was Taking Money From Vault When Bandits Entered. Bank Had Been Held Up Three Months Ago

OWE, Ok., May 22.—A posse of 100 men and Craig county surrounded three bandits in the area of the Verdigris river this today two hours after the bank of Alluwe had been reported two of the bandits had been separated from the posse and that their capture was imminent. The bandits, both tall and dark in overall, entered the bank about a half hour after it had been closed for business today. R. A. B. bank examiner, R. B. B. a director and J. D. Parks, a director, and three women customers were forced to lie on the floor in the vault containing considerable money that was to have been taken from the vault. The two men had about \$2,000 in currency and their companion, waiting out a small coupe. The bank had been held up about three months ago.

Sheppard that in the past 9 1/2 months, refunds of \$295,583 on the four-cent state gasoline tax have been claimed by purchasers of gasoline for farm uses. This would involve a total of around 7,400,000 gallons of gas used in farm purposes between July 15, 1929 and May 1, 1930.

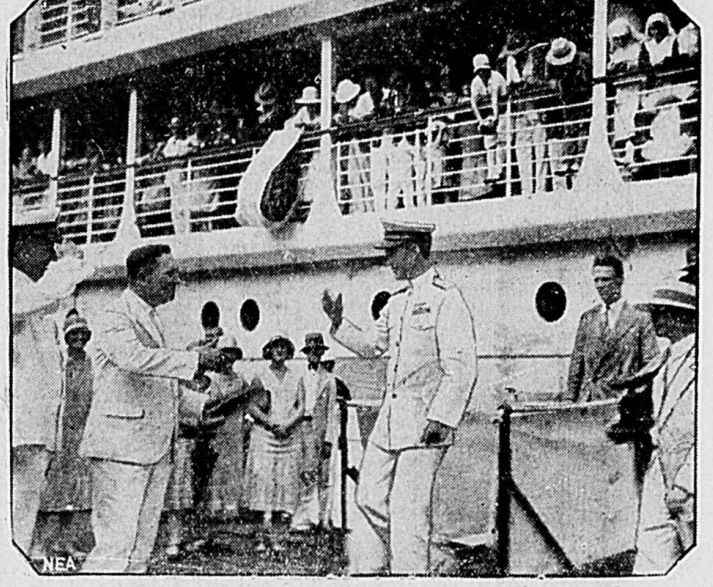
Cradle Roll Day Be Observed By Baptist, Sunday

Eastland County Officers Due To Get Salary Cut

County officers in Eastland county will get a cut in salary next year because of the fact that the county dropped below 37,000 in population.

A new law concerning fees of county officers states that where a county has less than 35,000 inhabitants and more than 25,000 the salaries of the county officials shall be as follows: County judge, \$2,500; sheriff, \$3,000; county clerk, \$2,400; county attorney, \$2,400; district attorney, \$2,500; district clerk, \$2,400; tax assessor, \$2,400 and tax collector, \$2,400. It provides, however, for fees as follows. Excess fees may be retained in full by the county officials until a total of \$1,200 has been collected and one-fourth of the remaining excess fees may be retained until a total of such fees amounts to \$750, provided that no officer received a total compensation in excess of \$4,500.

Olden Population Is Given At 943

Announcement of preliminary figures on the Eastland county census gives the population of Olden at 943. No figures were available on which to base comparisons for former years.

Population Of County Shown To Be Over 33,981

Preliminary Census Figures Announced Today Give That Number. Comparative Figures For Each Ten Years Since 1860

A preliminary announcement of the population of Eastland county, made by Walter R. Southworth, district supervisor of the census, shows that Eastland county now has 33,981 inhabitants as compared with 58,505 enumerated in 1920.

Although the county shows a decrease over the 10 years period since the last census was taken a decided increase over the population of 1910 is shown. It was expected by everyone that the figure for 1930 would be below that of 1920 because the census was taken at the height of the oil boom.

Compared with the census figures of other years Eastland county has shown a steady growth except for the period immediately following the boom days. The figures for the county of each census since 1860 are as follows:

Figures on each precinct of the county are not available as reports have not been received on Precincts 3, 4 and 6. However, a tabulation of all figures released to date by the supervisor show the following population figures by precincts and cities:

The number of farms in the county increased during the ten year period between 1920 and 1930 from 1,499 at the time of the former census to 1,978 in 1930, making an increase of 479. This is a decided decrease over the number in cultivation in 1900 and 1910, however, as there were 2,510 farms enumerated in the census taken in 1900 and 2,981 listed in the census report of 1910.

One interesting fact disclosed by the census reports is that only one farm was enumerated in the city limits of the City of Eastland while 30 were counted in the city limits of Ranger and five were counted in three census districts of Cisco on a preliminary report which listed only 1,688 of the 5,918 inhabitants.

Jury Out Only 14 Hours When Verdict Given

Case Completed at Night Session Wednesday. Defendant May Appeal

After being out approximately 14 hours the jury in the Danny Leach murder trial brought in a verdict of guilty shortly after 1:30 this afternoon and assessed a penalty of 15 years in the penitentiary.

The verdict brought to a close one of the most sensational trials that has been heard in district court here this year.

Council for the defense gave the usual notice of appeal after the verdict was brought in.

The Danny Leach murder case went to the jury last night about 11:00 o'clock after the five lawyers trying the case before Judge George L. Davenport in the 88th district court had spent three hours arguing before the jury.

Earlier in the day Danny Leach took the stand in his own defense. He admitted being with the deceased, as claimed by the State's witnesses, up until 2:30 on the morning of the murder. He admitted freely that he had gone to negro town with Hill and two carnival employees to buy whiskey and that he had been with the deceased after leaving the Stuart Hotel with him at 1:00 o'clock in the morning.

The only part of the testimony of the State witnesses that he denied was going to the room of A. B. Morton at 3:00 o'clock and saying that he had just shot a man.

Leach also admitted that he had stolen an automobile in San Angelo, another in Big Spring and had robbed a store in Vernon. He is now under indictment for the three crimes, he said on the stand.

Joe H. Jones, county attorney, brought out the fact that Danny had been sent to a reformatory when he was 14 years old, when he crossed examined the defendant on the stand.

W. B. Collier, assistant to the county attorney, was the first to present arguments to the jury. He was followed by Frank Jenkins, defense attorney. Grady Owen was the next to present arguments for the state and was followed by Oscar Chastain, the other attorney for the defense. Joe H. Jones was the last of the five to present arguments to the jury.

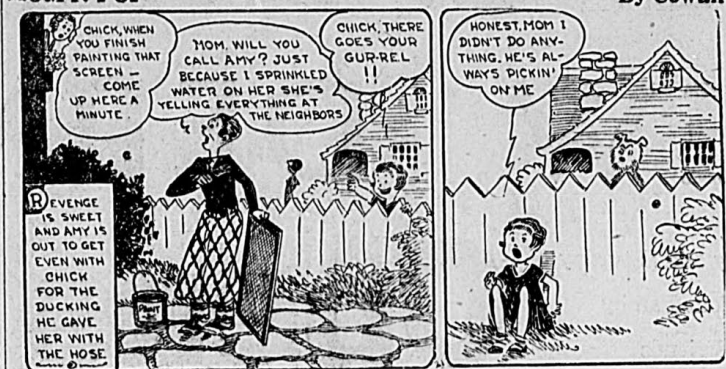

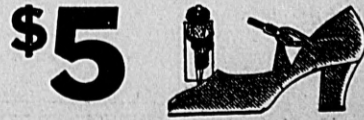

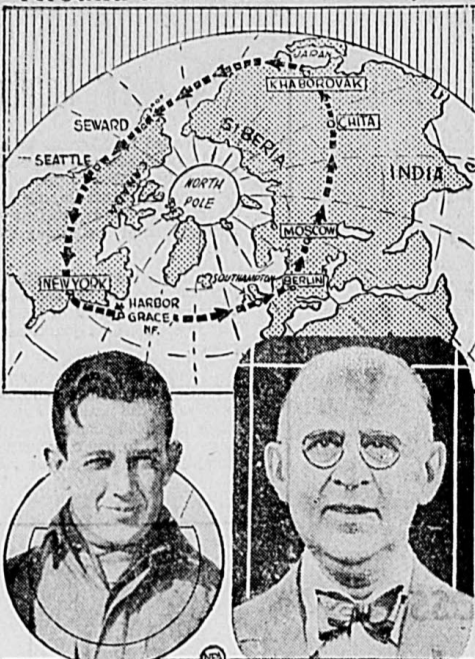

Five clubs loom as possible pennant prospects in the National League, while the Washington Senators and Cleveland Indians are furnishing stern competition for the Athletics in the American League.

Philadelphia's Athletics jolted the New York Yankees' hopes of improving their position, during the current seven game series. Despite Babe Ruth's three home runs in the first game of a double-header, the Athletics took both contests.

A nine-run rally in the seventh enabled the Athletics to take the first game, 15 to 7, and George Walberg turned in a 4 to 1 win in the second game.

Effective pitching by Sam Jones and Ad Liska gave Washington a double victory over the Boston Red Sox, 10 to 2 and 6 to 1.

Dazzy Vance enabled the Brooklyn Robins to hold their half game lead in the National League, beating Boston, 12 to 1. Burling Grimes pitched for the losers and was the victim of four run attacks in the first, sixth and eighth.

Jakie May's wild pitch gave the second-place St. Louis Cardinals the winning run in their 3 to 2 win over the Cincinnati Reds.

Pittsburgh pounded two Chicago Cubs pitchers for a 10 to 3 win, Cuyler's homer with two on producing the only Chicago runs.

Pat Crawford and Mel Ott led the New York Giants in a 11 to 4 win over Philadelphia. Crawford drove in 4 runs with a homer and a triple. Ott homered with two men on base.

Ted Lyons turned in his seventh victory in eight starts this season, giving the Chicago White Sox a 9 to 2 win over Detroit.

Alvin Crowder checked seventh and ninth inning rallies by the Cleveland Indians and the St. Louis Browns won, 6 to 5.

Einstein Is A Bath Whistler

NEW YORK, May 22.—Professor Albert Einstein is an active member of that world-wide fraternity of bath tub whistlers, Mrs. Einstein discloses in an article which will appear today in the American magazine, giving a glimpse of the home life of the great mathematician who startled the world with his theory of relativity.

He also whistles while he shaves. One kind of soap is sufficient for all ablutions.

"Two kinds of soap make life too complicated," he says, according to Mrs. Einstein.

"Upon rising, the professor puts on a black and white bathrobe and goes to the piano where he plays until his bath is ready," Mrs. Einstein continues.

"On the way to his bath, perhaps he thinks of an idea that came to him during the night. He is not absent minded. He is thinking. But he is not thinking of what he is doing at the moment. He never remembers to close the bath room door. Never. We must always close it after him."

"In the bath he whistles and shaves, but will use only the usual soap. Friends give him all kinds of soap, and my husband says: 'Yes. It is nice of you. I take your soap and thank you very much, but I will not use it.' It is one of his profound convictions that one should take from life only that which is necessary. For him, two kinds of soap are quite unnecessary."

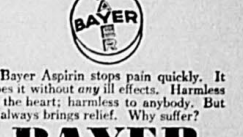

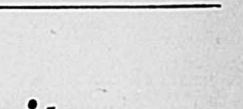

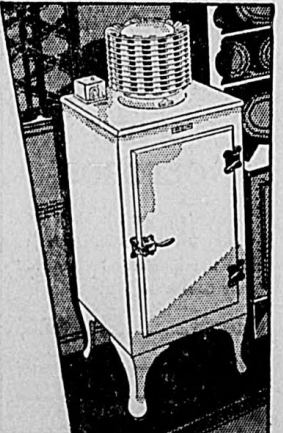
