



### SENATOR MOSES DESCRIBED AS **DISCORD MAKER**

Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald Says He Appears To Be Apostle of Sectional Hate.

### HUGH NUGENT FITZGERALD

In Austin American Senator George H. Moses of New Hampshire is a dyell-in-the-wool Republican of the vintage of civil war days. As permanent chairman of the Kansas City convention he made a notable speech. In days of old the Republicans of the north waved the bloody shirt and sought to inflame or to arouse the pastions and prejudices of civil war time.
