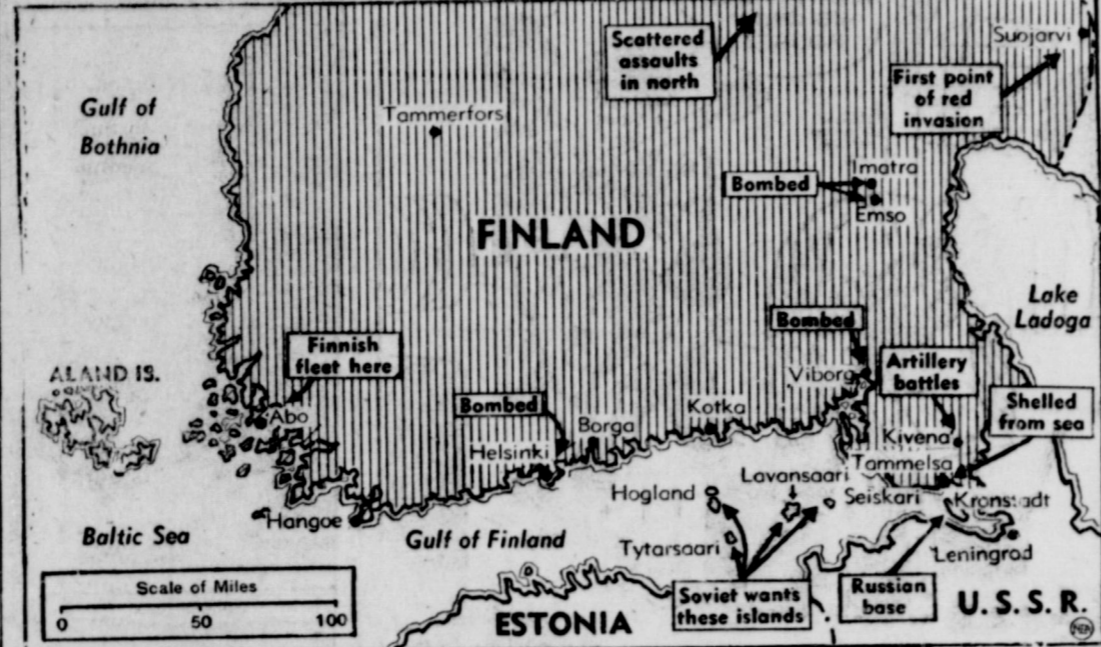

Assorted and sundry experts continue to argue lustily over what to do with the women. In Buffalo, N. Y., recently, Will Durant, author of books on philosophy, warned that civilization would "decay" unless women put on aprons again and took up their old posts at the kitchen sink.

Springing nimbly to Mr. Durant's side is Dr. John Edward Brown, president of John Brown University, Siloam Springs, Ark. Dr. Brown regrets that we are training our young ladies "for a man's world rather than a woman's world," and adds cryptically that we are "putting out twice as much dog food as baby food."

Both gentlemen are worried because the modern woman is more at ease over a comptometer machine than over a kettle of turnips. They hate to think of what might happen if that sort of thing were carried too far.

Down New England way, a woman who carved a comfortable niche for herself in this "man's world" is equally worried over what is happening to woman's status. Miss Sybil Holmes is the only woman member of the Massachusetts State Unemployment Compensation Commission, and she believes that girls should train themselves for business careers—especially if they want to get into public life.

Miss Holmes sees the fine hand of masculine jealousy in legislative measures designed to cut gals down a peg or two. Men, she says, who aim to put their feminine colleagues back into house dresses just want to get women's jobs for men.

Furthermore, Miss Holmes thinks, bills which would equalize hours for men and women are discriminatory against the ladies. The gals have consented—a little grumpily perhaps—to hang onto street car straps, but they'll be darned if they're going all the way in this equality business.

Anyone who knows anything about domestic affairs ought to know better than to believe the debate will ever be settled. Maybe the relatively new ideas on feminism are just whims, and maybe they're here to stay. But the battle between the sexes isn't new. It's just being staged on a new field.

Reactions to the Good News

Text: Matthew 11:16-30. BY WILLIAM E. GILROY, D. D., Editor of Advance. If a great teacher should come into a community, benign, kindly in his personal life, with good news for all, it might be supposed that the community would welcome him, and that everyone would listen to his words and accept at once the blessings that he offered. How seldom has such a thing happened among men! The proverbial stories of history are of the stoning of the prophets, and of the ways in which both individuals and masses of people have reviled and rejected those who have come among them with the purest motives to offer them grace, mercy and truth. In our lesson Jesus complains of this attitude of the people of His time. He compares them with those sitting in the market places, saying, "We piped unto you and ye did not dance; we wailed and ye did not mourn." He points out that John the Baptist came as an ascetic, neither eating nor drinking, and the people said, "Behold, a gluttonous man and a winebibber, a friend of publicans and sinners!" Then Jesus, in plain and rather terrible words, pointed out that it is not opportunity that makes character and destiny. He turned to the towns of His own day, and He pronounced we upon them, saying that if the mighty works that had been done in them had been done in Tyre and Sidon (cities that had been destroyed by their iniquity) these cities would have repented long ago in sack cloth and ashes. YET in life, even today, we meet with this persistence. Character is a matter of opportunity and environment. Nothing could be fundamentally more untrue, for of the same environment have come saints and sinners, heroes and cowards, saviors and destroyers of their fellowmen. Character depends on choice. Character is a matter of self-determination. Even with the Master did not men do as they pleased, but as they were led. It was only definite choice and the willingness to follow Jesus that brought to men the blessings of salvation. But it is the true function of the prophet and the teacher and the Savior to bring to men the opportunity and the environment of grace whether they respond or not. Thus it is that Jesus started today, as He did in ancient Galilee and Judea, pronouncing the words of the great invitation: "Come unto me, all ye that are weary and heavy laden, and I will give you rest. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." It is not the invitation, but the acceptance of it that determines man's destiny or grace.
