## Willie Boggs Taken by Death

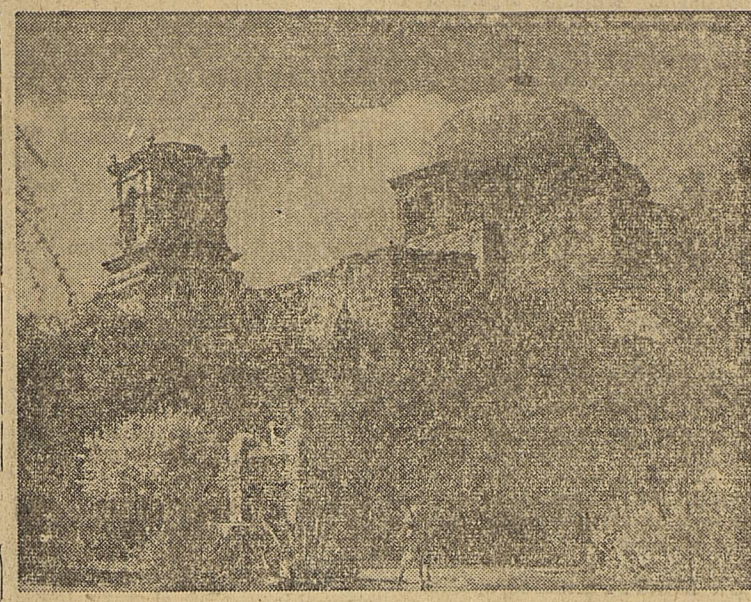
Willie N. Boggs of Gordon died Sunday night after a lengthy illness.

## Peanuts Up, Crop Is 90% Planted, Looks Good, Rain Needed

Any time from now on, starting right now, Eastland County is ready for another rain.

That is the word from T. C. Wylie, head of Ranger Peanut Company, who gets up before breakfast each morning and personally takes the temperature of every peanut plant in the area.

Both Wylie and Curtis Boase, assistant county agent, reported today that 95 percent of the peanut crop is planted and the biggest part of it is up and looking hale and hearty. Boase said that judging from the stand, every peanut placed in the ground must have come up.

Strange as it may seem, the very small portion of land that is not yet planted is in places that is still too wet to plant, even though the rest of the land is now needing rain. And in some portions of the county, some land is not planted because it is too dry to plant. Wylie said one farmer returned several bags of peanuts to him last week because his land was too dry to plant at the present time.

Wylie also said that he had completely sold out of peanut seed. Farmers are going to have a hard

## Spirit Is Must For Any Ideal Community

(Editor's Note: The following article was submitted by a Telegram reader. Name is withheld by request, but will be given if desired.)

How would you go about your job if you were given limitless funds to design, build and furnish an "ideal town?"

No doubt you would think first of the streets. You would make them wide with plenty of parking room.

Your residential area might have curved streets instead of rectangular blocks, plotted so that the youngsters could go to school with few dangerous crossings.

Even before the streets, you would provide a generous supply of pure water, adequate sewers and sewage disposal, set that pipes and wires went underground before pavements and walks were laid.

You would build stores and offices in the most convenient locations, bright with the best lighting and comfortable with air conditioning.

Modern schools - naturally these buildings would occupy much of your thought. A community hospital and medical center - that you would not overlook. You would revise your plan to make sure of ample parks and playgrounds, and if your site did not already have nice trees in many places you would see that plenty were planted.

Churches? Of Course! What town could be without vigorous churches? A good library? An ample auditorium? What better place than in connection with the most central school building?

Easy, isn't it, to think up ideas for this ideal town? You can picture it now, all modern and beautiful.

But doesn't it lack something? Indeed it does. People! Without people our town would be nothing but an exhibit, a collection of structures and facilities.

"ideal" town? And, for that matter, what are "ideal" people?

No man can decide that, so we'll have to populate the place with people about as they come. And, because some will not be faultless, the town will have to become a little less than ideal?

Then, people have to make a living. So we'll have to locate the town where resources will support business activity. It might best be put in the midst of a good farming region . . . farm towns never seem to become ghost towns. A factory or so should be an essential part of the plan to make jobs for those not in farming, or other businesses or services. After all, this is an economic world, and things have to be grown and moved, and manufactured and sold.

With its fine layout, its lovely buildings and its economic enterprises, something still seems to be missing. What else is essential? SPIRIT! That's the common name for it, and no name could be better.

It is spirit that keeps the people working together to make any town better, and to make them selves better.

Spirit organizes the clubs and pushes the community drives. Spirit does the many practical things and needful things. In the City of Eastland, Spirit built a community hospital, put up modern metal street markers, and built a football stadium and field, built a little league ball park, built the Lakeside Country Club, and is now going to build the Lone Cedar Country Club.

Spirit also built a modern, air-conditioned factory in Eastland.

Town spirit is more than a mere economic and social force: it is best it carries true moral and spiritual tones into the community's harmony. Sure, let our town be modern, efficient, and prosperous only with people imbued the Community Spirit can it begin to approach the ideal.

Duard B. Warren is the Candidate whose name is printed on the ballot.
