WITH NEW LOW DOWN PAYMENTS

Broyles to Build Six More Homes

C. C. Broyles, Abilene builder and developer of the new Rivercrest Addition in Eastland, announced today smaller downpayments on FHA constructed homes in Eastland.

According to Broyles the regulations require only 1 percent down on the first \$10,000. Which means, said Broyles, can now build a lovely \$10,000 3 bedroom home in Eastland, with central heating system, for only \$300 down, providing the owner provides his own lot.

"In the past," Broyles stated, "downpayments in the Rivercrest addition have been as high as seven percent, and later five percent, in addition to the cost of the lot." The Tri-Cities Real Estate Exchange in Eastland, broker for Broyles and the Rivercrest Addition, announced today plans for construction of six more new homes in the addition. Construction is due to begin this week, according to James Dabney, of the real estate office.

New plans, according to Dabney, include two and three bedroom homes, with attached garages, central heating system, and brick veneer fronts. The houses

will be built on East Conner St. between Marsh and Broughter and Marsh and Halbryan.

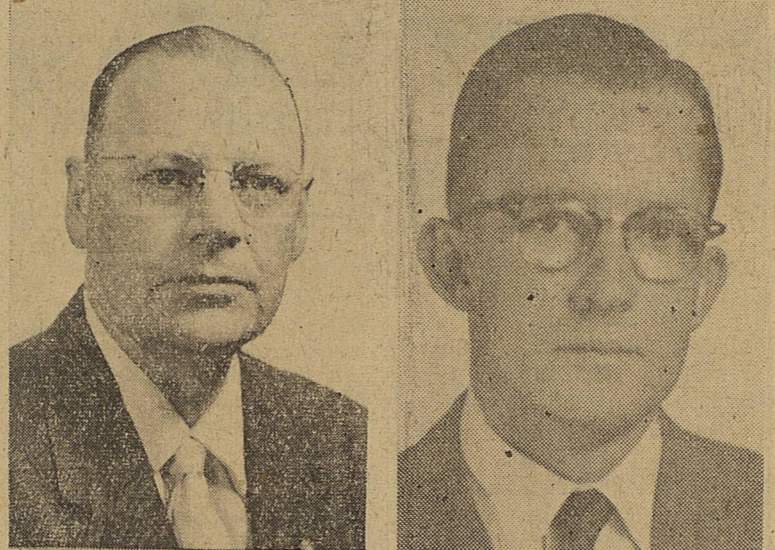
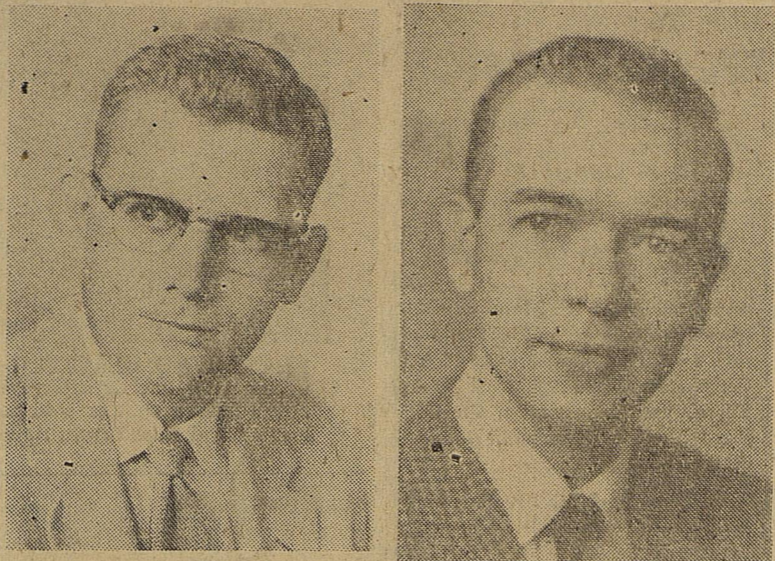
"However, this does not mean," Dabney said, "that persons owning their own lots in other locations in Eastland, Ranger or Cisco, must build in the Rivercrest Addition. If the lots individually owned meet with FHA requirements, then Broyles is permitted to build on it."

At present there are seven houses in the new addition.

IN COURT OF CIVIL APPEALS

Dobie Ranch Appeal Won by George Parr

The Eleventh District Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland Friday ruled that the La Salle County District Court erred in granting a motion for summary judgment against George B. Parr, et al, in a suit filed by Duval County to recover title and possession of the 55,711 acre Dobie Ranch in La Salle and Webb counties.

The District Court previously had ruled that Parr purchased the ranch with \$422,832.50 of Duval County road and bridge fund money which he illegally secured. The Appeals Court reversed the judgment and remanded the case for new trial.

In the original trial, Duval

County alleged that in the Spring of 1945 Parr obtained \$500,000 from the County road and bridge fund without its consent and used \$422,832.50 of the money to purchase the Dobie Ranch, and converted the rest to his own use.

Duval County sought recovery of title and possession of the ranch on the theory that Parr was holding it in trust for the County. The County also claimed damages for the use of the ranch by Parr and for conversion of the money not used by Parr to buy the ranch.

On July 13, 1956, the La Salle County District Court granted a summary judgment and decreed the county should recover title and possession of the land. The Court reserved for a jury trial the question of the amount of damages due the County by fact that Parr used the land for 10 years. Parr swore he paid for 40.2 percent of the cost of the land with his own personal funds. He and the U. S. Government, which holds tax liens on the land against Parr, appealed the District Court judgment.

Highway Hearing Granted By State

C-C Group Will Go Before Commission

A hearing for "a group of interested citizens" of Eastland and Ranger to ask for a county farm-to-market road designation for the road over Lake Leon Dam has been granted by the State Highway Commission.

The hearing will be held in Austin at a date to be announced later, H. J. Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, reported Thursday at a C-C board of directors meeting held in the White Elephant restaurant.

Tanner told directors that he had been advised that the hearing had been granted by the Commission by County Judge John Hart. The County Commissioners Court, at the request of a group of Eastland-Ranger citizens, asked the Commission for the hearing.

Tanner told directors at the Thursday noon meeting that a large number of them needed to make the Austin trip, along with a good Ranger delegation. Virgil Seaberry, Jr., who served as spokesman for the group when appearing before the Commissioners Court, is expected to make the plea to the State Commission headed by Marshall Formby for the road to be added to the Eastland County

farm-to-market road program.

Formby is well acquainted with the situation already, probably, for he dedicated the new Staff bridge back in 1954 after the Highway Department rushed it to completion at the request of Eastland and Ranger citizens. That request of area citizens, which was honored by the Commission, proved to be a worthy one. Had the bridge not been built before the lake filled it is doubtful that it could have been built at anywhere near its final cost.

Other Business

In other business at the regular monthly meeting, directors approved payment of bills for the past month. They also heard Tanner recommend that at a later date a C-C sponsored meeting of Highway 80 merchants be held to discuss where the clover-leaf overpasses on the new super-highway would be placed.

Plans were announced for another membership C-C breakfast to be held this coming Thursday at the White Elephant at 7 a.m. All members of the C-C and others interested in the progress of Eastland are invited to attend.

Tanner told directors that they would be interested in knowing that the local Hollywood-Maxwell plant was rated as the most efficient unit in operation by the company recently. The local plant gained a 92 percent efficiency rating, he stated.

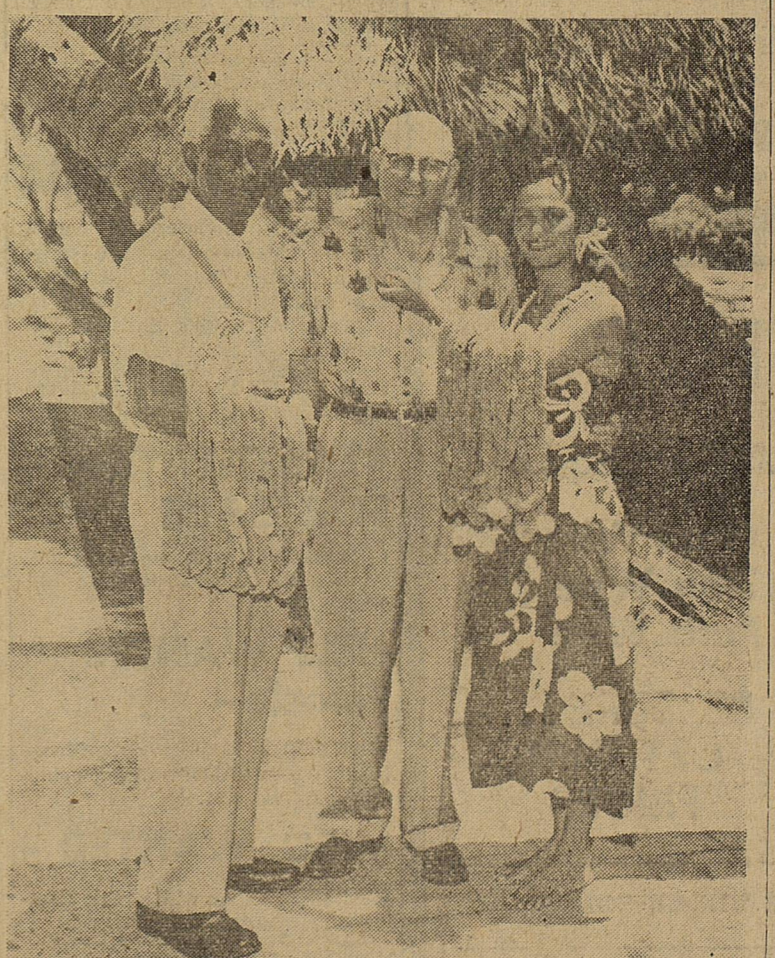

Ringling Lake Being Cleaned Up By City

Ringling Lake is fast being turned into the picnickers dream area by City workmen.

Under orders of city commissioners and City Manager Jimmy Young, roads around the lake are being gravelled and weeds are being cut. The entire picnic area, which extends all the way around the lake, is being cleaned up. There are a large number of concrete picnic tables and barbecue

pits at the lake.

County Commissioner J. B. (Tip) Arther is also assisting in the road work. His machinery and men have been assisting City workers. A boat landing has been gravelled leading to the lake in addition to other work done.

Bill Concock, who is in charge of the Street Department, is directing the work, which began early this week. At the last City Commission meeting, Manager Young was directed to take such action.

The lake can be reached by going out Highway 6 and turning left at the last house inside the city limits. It is owned by the City and in past years, before Lake Leon was constructed, was used along with Lake Eastland to provide municipal water.

The lake has often been stocked with fish, and a number of good strings are reported often, including some large bass and catfish.

"All roads are now in good shape," Manager Young declared, "and we hope Eastland area citizens will take full advantage of facilities at the lake. We just ask them to help us keep the area clean."

Peanut Crop Is Holding On, But Rain Is Needed

Eastland County's peanut crop is holding its own, despite lack of rain. Assistant County Agent Curtis Boase said Saturday.

Boase said rain is definitely needed in the county, but that peanuts were still looking pretty good, due to moisture deep in the soil from rains during March, April and May. He said the crop could probably hold its own until about mid-August, but that rain would be a must then, "and it's needed right now."

It has been 28 days since any rainfall has fallen, and that amount to less than half an inch. The county has 23.41 inches so far this year, however, which is well over normal.

Stock tanks in the county still have plenty of water, although recent 100-degree temperatures have dropped the supply some. The small cotton crop in the county hasn't thrived so well as the peanuts, but a crop could still be made with rainfall in the near future.

The Weather Bureau's long range forecast isn't too promising, although scattered thundershowers are predicted for the last 15 days in July.

At the request of the directors, Hulcy will continue with the company as chairman of the board "even beyond his normal retirement date of December 1, 1957," under the company's retirement program. He was elected board chairman in 1952.

Potter, fourth president of the 48-year-old company, began his

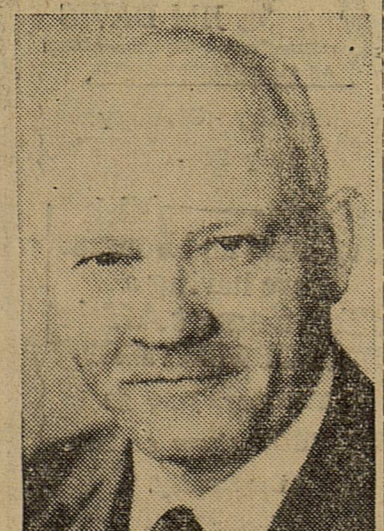
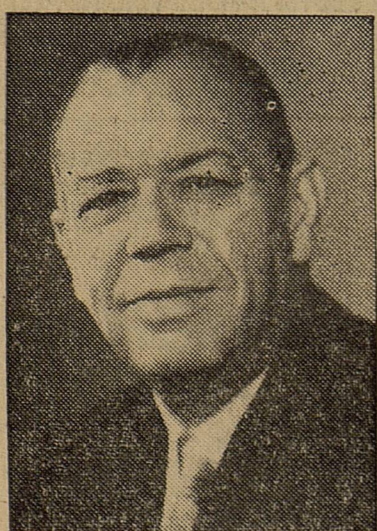
new duties immediately. At 51, he is one of the youngest of Lone Star's official group. He has served with the company for more than 29 years, joining Lone Star in 1928 the day after receiving a degree in mechanical engineering from Texas A & M College. He had been executive vice president of the company since 1954.

Active in the Methodist Church, he is a Scottish Rite Mason and a Shriner. He is also a member of the Oak Cliff Chamber of Commerce, Circle Ten Council Boy Scouts of America, and the Dallas Park Board and he is a vice president of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce.

Texas-born Hulcy began his career with Lone Star in 1920 as a clerk in the accounting department. Twenty years later, he was elected president to succeed the late L. B. Denning.

Under Hulcy's leadership, Lone Star experienced its greatest growth. When he became president, company assets amounted to approximately \$100 million; on May 31, 1957, they exceeded \$411 million. Capitalization has grown from some \$65 million in 1940 to more than \$275 million in 1957. Lone Star's property account at December 31, 1956, amounted to some \$340 million, a gain of approximately \$234 million in 12 years.

If it hadn't been for paternal opposition, Happy Hightower and I probably would have become as big names in the food industry as Birdseye, Armour, Swift or at least Mrs. Beard.

We had a chance to put one of the finest barbecue sauces ever made on the market, but we didn't do it.

Years ago, the colored people of our community used to celebrate June 19th with a big all-day outing and barbecue usually held at the Eastland Tennis Club. This club was just west of our house. There were two tennis courts, the north one extending from behind the Hightower place (this is the house now occupied by the Gris-soms), and the south one extended to behind Will Martin's house. Our house and the Robey house were between these two houses. Thus the tennis club was right behind our house. It eastern limits were just about where the alley now is. At that time there was no alley behind the 10-1300 blocks of South Seaman.

In connection with the courts, the club consisted of a nice clubhouse complete with dressing rooms. Running around the front and both sides of the clubhouse was a large porch.

We didn't have anything else to do Happy and I used to go over and play the piano at the clubhouse. We got to be real good on it to—it was one of the old-fashioned player pianos, common to that era, and all we had to do was change the roll and pump the pedals.

Sam Williams, one of the most versatile fellows I ever knew used to look after the barbecue and June Tenth arrangements. Not only was Sam a good cook but he was a pretty good preacher as was a weather forecaster. He could forecast the weather about as accurately as that fellow does on television, and he didn't have to use a blackboard to do it. Sam sim'y stuck his finger in his mouth, moistened it, and then held it up in the air to see which way the wind was blowing. That's all the investigation he had to make, but from that point on he looked into the skies and forecast and forecast.

For a living Sam was the building engineer down at the Exchange National Bank Building—that is to say that he was the clean-up man there. He used to call himself a teller.

Farm and Ranch Taxes Up 10th Year In A Row

and ranch taxes in Texas have risen for 10 consecutive years and agricultural prices have declined for four consecutive years, almost doubling the tax load of Texas farmers and ranchmen during the 5-year period.

L. P. Gabbard of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Tommy W. Smith of the Agricultural Research Service, USDA, who made the survey said that the average tax per acre on farm and ranch real estate in Texas last year was 31.8 cents, an increase of .8 cents, or 2.6 percent over 1955.

It is the highest average tax per acre yet reached in Texas, they pointed out.

While the average tax increased 2.6 percent for the state, it declined as much as 17.1 percent in some sections of the Rolling Plains, and increased as much as 22.4 percent in the Corpus Christi cotton producing area.

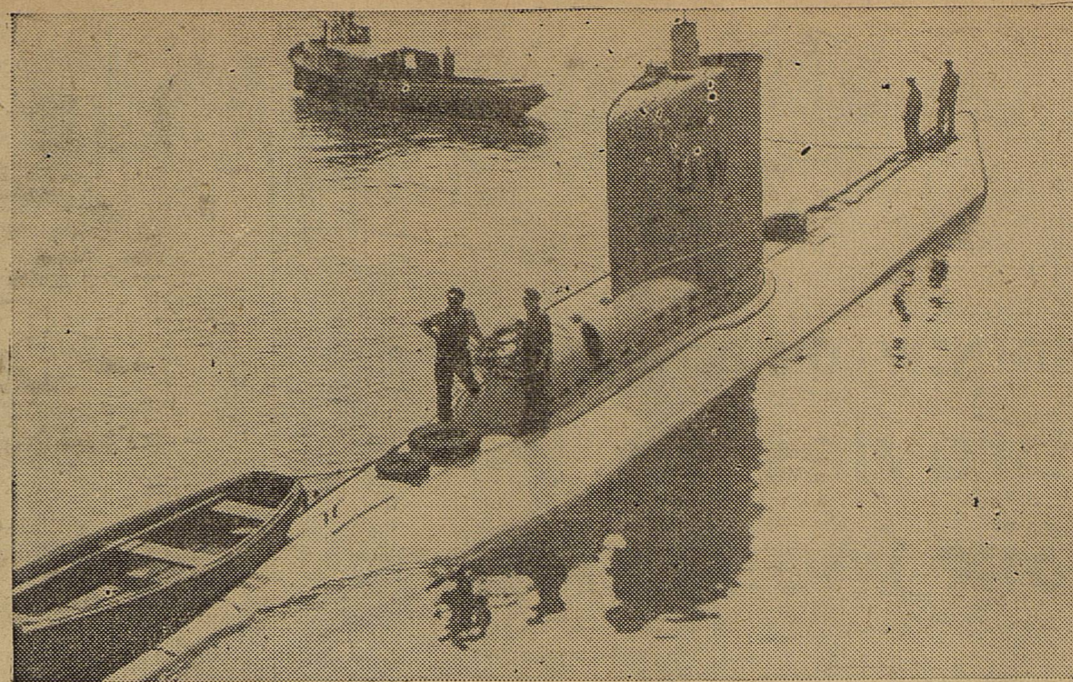
The distribution of farm real estate taxes to the various types of governmental units remains practically unchanged as public schools, including junior colleges, received 56.7 percent of the total. Farm personal property tax declined slightly, probably because of declining prices for agricultural commodities and prolonged drought.

Areas in which the average tax per acre decreased are, for the most part, devoted to grazing. This may reflect the economic stress on ranchmen because of falling cattle prices and drought conditions.

Taxes have risen in Texas generally because of rising costs of local government. Property taxes are the main source of local government revenue, the economists concluded. Therefore, no relief is in sight for farmers and ranchmen, at least so long as property taxes are the primary sources of support of local government.

NO WILL? WHO INHERITS PROPERTY?

What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, yours wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it—but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

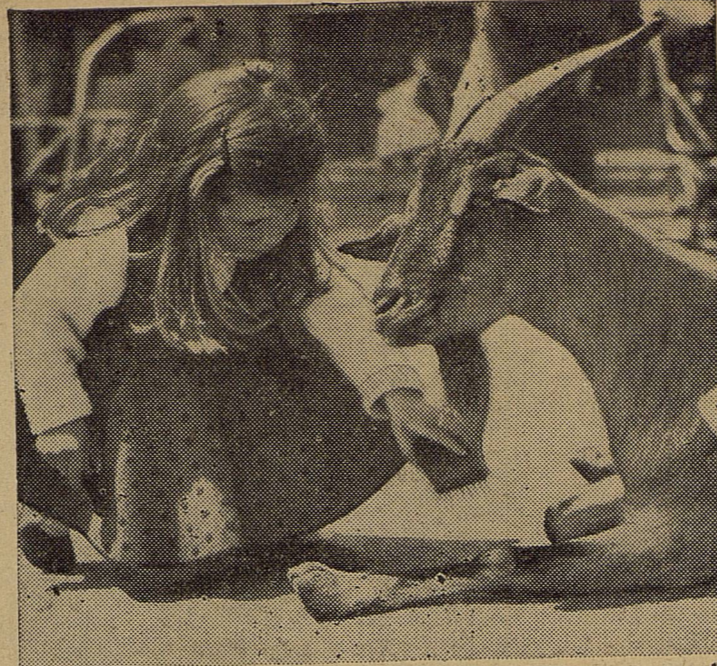

When it came to barbecuing meat, Sam was the best I ever saw, it makes me hungry just to write of the aromatic barbecue he used to turn out at these annual June Tenth affairs his race loved to observe so well.

Happy and I, being inquisitive and bright little boys, always were on hand when anything turned up in our neighborhood, and of course we were there to watch Sam do his barbecuing, and if need be, to act as teasers.

Sam began by digging a ditch about 10 feet long, three or four feet deep, and about three feet wide. In this trench he placed plenty of good firewood. Then across the top of the trench he placed beams of steel and covered this with chickenwire mesh.

One end of this mesh was so arranged that he could work his fire and keep it in good order without having to take down the lattice-work. Then, after all was ready he set fire to his wood. After it had burned for what seemed to be half a day he arranged his pork, beef, and mutton.

Sam turned his meat ever few minutes. Actually after he started cooking it kept one man busy turning the meat. Sam said constant turning kept the juice in the meat. Just about time for a piece of meat to drip grease, he would see that it was turned so that the flow of gravity would pull the juice to the other side of the meat.

It took about 24 hours to do the barbecue job right. And when he was finished he had barbecue that was simply out of this world.

In the meantime, though, he prepared his sauce. Part of the success of any barbecue is the sauce

that goes with it, only at that time Happy and I didn't realize how important a part of the succulent good eating in a good piece of barbecue sauce.

I don't know where he got his formula but it was the best stuff I ever put on bread—or meat.

After feeding all the people who came to the barbecue there usually was some left over. Sam always gave Happy and me a generous portion to take home to our mothers which we did.

One year, though, Sam gave us about a quart of barbecue sauce, which was a lot more than we needed to go with the amount of barbecue he gave us. This sauce was so good, though, we didn't waste any of it.

For three days straight Happy and I put it on our morning's Post Toasties instead of our usual cream.

And I'm firmly convinced that if our mothers hadn't made us quit using it in the place of cream we could have established a new eating habit. Then with Sam furnishing us the sauce we could have put it on the market as a new breakfast food and the three of us would have soon become rich.

price of the ranch out of a bank account of Parr. The Appeals Court ruled that although the trial court found that on June 13, 1945 \$135,638.25 was repaid to Parr out of Duval County money, "It is immaterial that County funds were thereafter used by the Parrs to replenish their personal account in the amount paid out of their account to the purchase price of the land. The only effect of Parr's acquiring additional money from the County after title vested, was to create a debt to the county. This debt had no connection with title to the land had previously vested in the owners of the funds used to buy the ranch. If all the funds used in buying the land belonged to the County, the equitable title vested in the County at the instant the deed was delivered and the consideration paid. If part of the funds belonged to the County and part to Parr, they thereupon became joint owners of the land. The percentage of ownership was determined by the amount furnished by each to pay the consideration."

The opinion was written by Judge Milburn S. Long, associate justice.

The Appeals Court also ruled that Duval County Commissioners acted illegally when they made a deal with Parr to accept title to the ranch in full payment for his indebtedness to the County. The action was taken without the knowledge of the district attorney.

Supplies of turkeys are abundant, reports the Agricultural Marketing Service, and consumers may look for excellent buys on these birds.

Fresh fish is another protein food chosen for the plentiful group, as August is in the height of the fishing season, both in Gulf waters and in inland streams. Supplies probably will vary with the region.

August plentiful foods also will include numerous summer vegetables, although some will be found more abundant in one region than in another. Fresh peaches and pears will go in excellent supply. Lemons and limes will continue on the USDA list.

Vegetable fats and oils and peanut butter are shelf items which will remain on the plentiful list through August.

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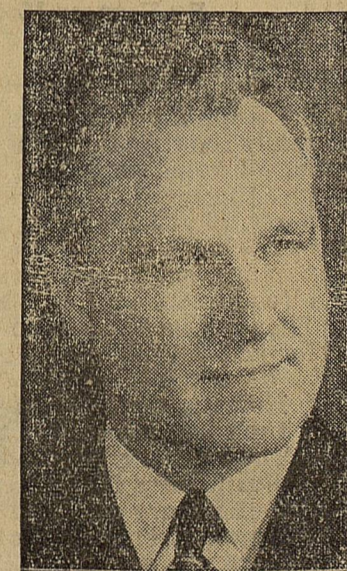
