## EASTLAND COUNTY HISTORY REVIEW

# Indians Won Local Battle

(Editor's Note: This is the ninth in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

**Ellison's Spring Fight**  
On the 8th of August, 1864, J. L. Head, corporal, led out eight men for a 10 days' scout, camping the first night at McGough Springs. On the morning of the 11th the men went west till they struck the Leon, near where the Texas Central Railway now crosses it. There they discovered a large Indian trail leading south east, the signs indicating there were at least 35 or 40 Indians, some riding some walking. The men, knowing they were down to ten horses, pushed hard on after them. The trail crossed Nash's Creek about three miles east of Carbon, where they killed a beef for breakfast, then continued south until they reached the present site of the W. W. Boone place, one and one-half miles north of Lowell. It was then the Gilbert ranch.

before the State Highway Commission Thursday in an effort to get the Commission to add such a designation for the road to the county farm - market road program.

Spokesman for the group, made up of members of the Eastland and Ranger chambers of commerce, will be Dr. James Whittington of Eastland. The hearing was granted last month after a request by the Eastland County Commissioners Court.

Dr. Whittington said that the delegation would submit letters from the Eastland postmaster, the Olden School District superintendent and County School Supt. H. K. Garrett asserting the need for such a road. For several weeks this year the present road was under water and bus routes and postal routes had to make long detours. The road has been pointed out by both the Eastland and Ranger C-C as the most used non-hard surface road in Eastland County.

Involved is some four miles of road. If built, both Eastland and Ranger would have use of a paved road all the way around the new lake.

H. J. Tanner, Eastland chamber manager, said that the local delegation would be made up of Grady Pipkin, Frank Sayre, Dr. Whittington, H. R. (Pop) Garrett, Commissioner J. R. (Tip) Arther and himself. Commissioner B. M. Bennett of Gorman will also make the trip, Tanner explained.

The Eastland - Ranger delegation is No. 2 on the Commission's docket Thursday. The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. and the local delegation expects to be before the commission, headed by Marshall Formby, by 10. "We plan to leave Eastland shortly after noon Wednesday," Tanner said.

### Funeral Services For J. W. Cooper Held Here Monday

Funeral services for J. W. Cooper, longtime Eastland resident, were held Monday at 2 p.m. in Long Branch, with Rev. Lee Fields, Baptist minister, in charge.

Mr. Cooper died Sunday. He was 83. Survivors include a step-daughter, Mrs. D. F. Williamson. Mr. Cooper had twice been a candidate for justice of the peace here, and was well known in Eastland.

Hamner Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements and burial was in Long Branch Cemetery. James Worthless Cooper was born Sept. 2, 1875 in Oilthugh, Ark. He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Eastland. Pallbearers were Edgar Alton, Omar Burkett, Earl O'Brien, Roy Lane, John Reed, Ace Howard, Henry Reed and John Hart.

## Decision On Abolishing Smaller Precincts Due

The touchy question of abolishing some voting precincts in Eastland County came up again Monday morning at the regular meeting of the County Commissioners Court, and after a brief discussion the Court voted to hold a special meeting Friday afternoon at 3 to take some final action.

The delay in making and defining a decision was made in order to give commissioners more time to check the reaction of citizens concerned.

In May of 1956 the County Democratic convention passed a resolution urging that precincts polling less than 20 votes during "the last general election" be abolished. When the issue came before the Commissioners Court commissioners decided to let the voters of the smaller precincts decide for themselves whether or not to do away with their precincts. They did. None of the precincts were abolished.

Under the 20 vote ruling, nine of the 25 precincts in the county would have been abolished. Alameda, Scranton, Nimrod, Dothan, Romney, Pleasant Hill, Staff and Cook would fall under the rule. The Court Monday seemed to be

working on a new idea. Precincts which are not close to another precinct are more needed than others, they seemed to agree.

The question is touchy, of course, since the smaller precincts do not want to abolish themselves. The commissioners and county judge are elected by these citizens, it must be remembered.

Many people do not understand that in primary elections it is not the county which pays the cost of the elections, it is the candidates. For instance, during the 1956 election it cost \$67.50 just to run for constable, a job that paid \$900 a year, at that time. And to run for district judge the cost is much more, \$675 the last time around.

## Band Stand at Park Destroyed By Fire

Fire caused an estimated \$1500 damage to the City owned bandstand in Eastland Park last night. Fire Marshall Billy Jack Johnson this morning said he was still

investigating the fire. He said it started in a pile of benches stacked in the stand, which was built back in the mid-1930's by WPA.

Johnson would not confirm or deny rumors that the fire was the work of arsonists. He said he would make his report after a full investigation.

Many Eastland citizens turned out at about 9:40 last night to watch the blaze. The fire attracted a lot of attention since it could be seen all over town. The band stand, used by the community for many years, was built on top of a hill overlooking the city.

Johnson said he did not believe the fire started from a faulty electrical wiring.

## Courthouse to Open Saturday Afternoons Now

County commissioners Monday voted to keep the courthouse basement open on Saturday afternoon so that citizens will have the use of restrooms and lounges in the building.

The Court voted to do so after a suggestion from Commissioner R. L. (Bob) Carter. Tentative plans call for giving one custodian a half day off during the week so that he can work Saturday afternoons.

## Central Texas Turkey Growers Barbecue Thurs.

The annual Central Texas Turkey Growers Association barbecue will be held Thursday at 8 p.m. in the Eastland City Park, Bart J. Frasier, publicity chairman, announced today.

The barbecue is an annual affair of the Association and is held in Eastland each year. Tickets may be obtained from any member of the Association, at feed stores in the county or from the secretary, Mrs. Aubrey Kincaid. Tickets sell for \$1.25 for adults and 75 cents for children. Tickets can be bought at the park, but Frasier said the Association would greatly appreciate advanced sales so that some estimate of how many to expect can be made.

The Central Growers Association was organized in Carbon in 1951. It has since that time been a leading group in the state.

## County Not Ready For Courthouse Air Conditioning

All four Eastland County commissioners and the county judge assumed a representative of an engineering company Monday that they were not presently interested in air conditioning the courthouse.

The representative, Dan Reed, said he had heard that the County might be interested in such a program. Commissioners listened to his talk, but unanimously agreed the county "is not ready for it."

County commissioners Monday voted to pay half the right-of-way costs of re-routing Highway 183. The new route will not go over Cisco Lake dam as the present highway does.

The Court committed itself to such action several weeks ago when a Cisco delegation appeared before the commission. Monday, however, it was made official at the request of the State of the Highway Department.

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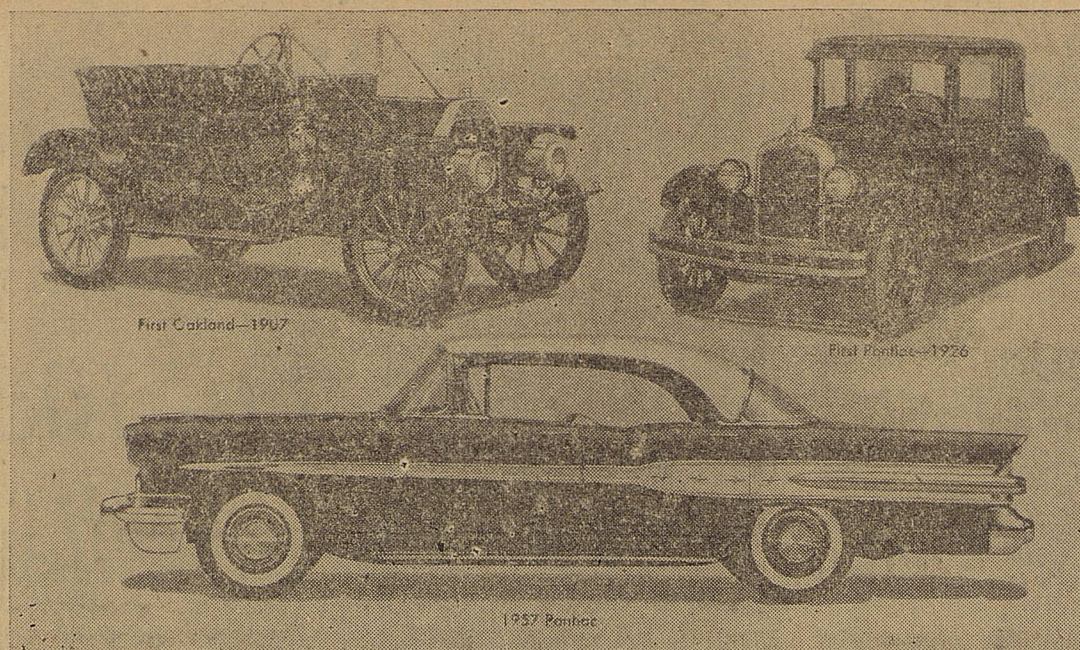

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## Electronics No Great Help To Weatherman.

AUSTIN.—Even with modern electronic computers, the weatherman cannot accurately forecast day-by-day variations in the weather more than one week in advance, University of Texas Meteorologist K. H. Jehn says. "Many persons tend to believe that the computer is the final achievement in weather forecasting. They think that present weather conditions can be fed into the computer, which will then produce a perfect forecast. That is not the case, however. Computers may answer certain problems faster, but they are not necessarily more accurate than man," Jehn says.

Explaining just what the public may expect from professional meteorologists, Jehn says that detailed weather forecasts are possible for two or three days in advance, but the reliability of the prediction decreases progressively after the first day. Individuals or organizations sometimes publish forecasts for conditions more than one month in advance, but they are misleading the public and Don Turner.

lie if they do not clearly describe the forecasts as experimental and of unproved value, he added. Weathermen now have a hard time pinpointing tornadoes and other severe local storms. Such forecasts usually cover a much wider range in both time and space than is actually affected by a particular storm. Current research with electronics equipment is encouraging, however, Jehn says. Such research points toward improvement in weather bureau facilities for alerting the public to impending tornadoes and thus saving lives and property.

Cisco Running Fight
The date of this very interesting event could not be learned but Mr. McGough writes:
"I led the Scout and trailed the

Indians with two dogs, named Colonel and Hats.
The fight began on the hill west of the Methodist church and was intensely exciting as the little band, chasing the Indians north-west, fired as they ran, the Indians as vigorously returning the attack. Mr. McGough says: "There were many shots fired—the Indians having guns. Albert Henning was

wounded, and I was fortunate enough to hit the Indian who shot him."
It was believed at the time that Mr. McGough killed this Indian, but the timber growth being dense the Scout deemed it best not to follow further, especially as Indians had fled, leaving the large bunch of horses they had stolen and were driving to the reservation.
A few years later, a Mr. Sublett, formerly of Comanche, discovered the grave of an Indian near Cisco, and far the headless he supposed to have been a chief. As McGough fired six shots at the chief who had wounded Henning, the discovery gave weight to his opinion that he had wounded the Indian unto death.
There were 13 men who took part in this memorable fight—three of whom Mr. McGough cannot recall:
W. C. McGough, C. Brasherars, L. B. Brittain, T. A. Bearden, H. Edwards, John Hill, Albert Henning, John Beall, George Keith, Jerome McAllister.

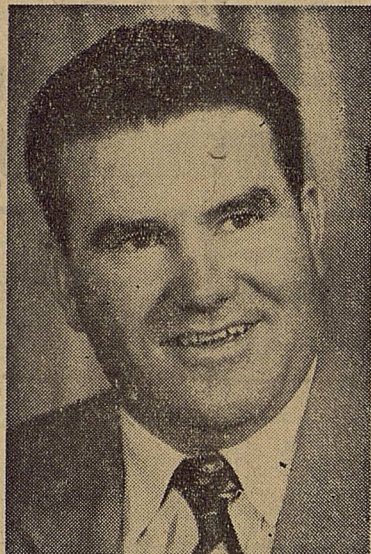
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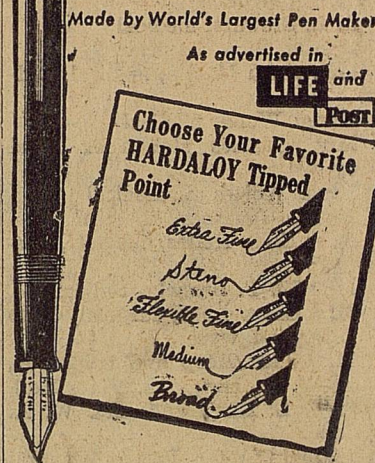

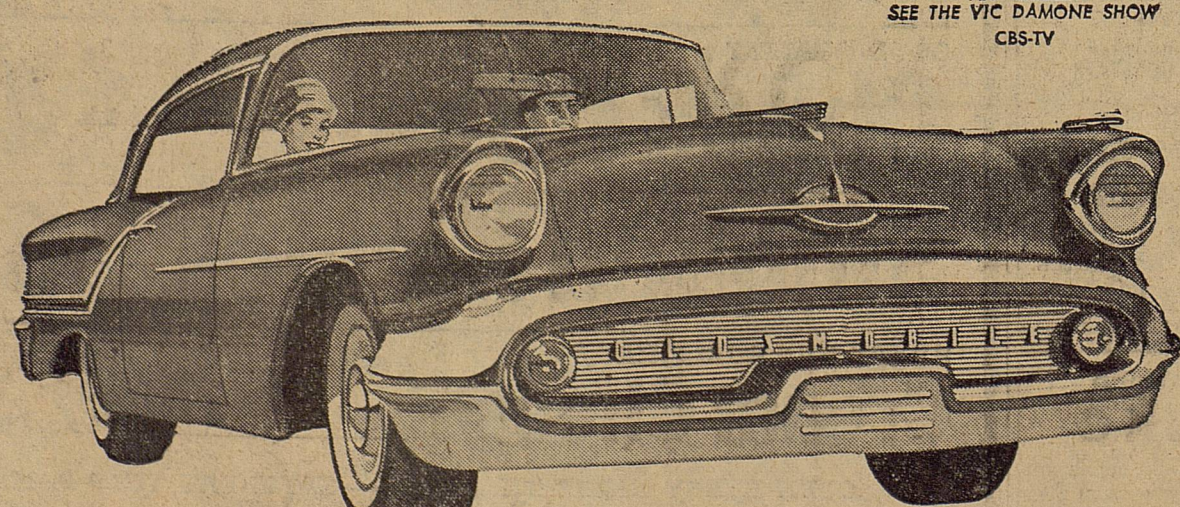
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
