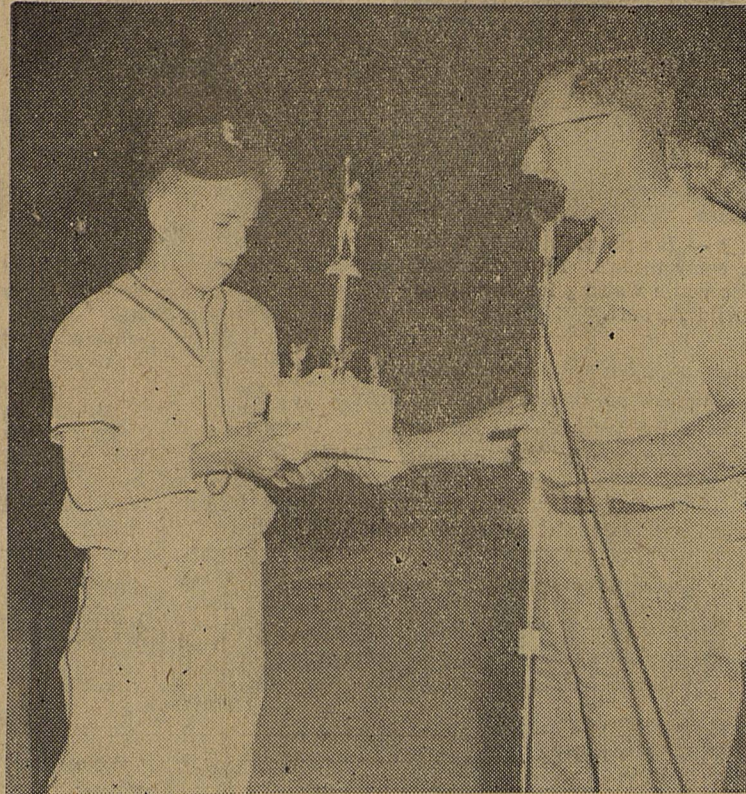

# Marine Reserves Return to Homes

A tired, weary group of men returned to Eastland Saturday from two weeks of extensive training in Coronado, Calif. The men were members of the local Marine Reserve unit.

The Marines boarded their plane Friday at the Naval Air Station in Coronado and flew back to Abilene, then motored to Eastland where their loved ones, friends and civilian jobs awaited them.

The Eastland Leathernecks were weary from the intensive and fast-paced two-week training program

at the Landing Force Training Unit, and they were veteran in the fact that they had wet their feet in an amphibious landing such as has made the Marine Corps the efficient and well-trained fighting organization that it is today.

The last week of training was spent at Camp Matthews, the rifle range, where all hands got their share of firing various basic weapons of the Marine Corps, including the Browning automatic rifle, machine guns, and mortars. The mornings were spent on one of the huge rifle ranges sighting in their own rifles for the big event, qualification day. Every round fired has a total value of five points. The bulls-eye, the little black dot in the middle of the target, counts for the maximum points and they decrease as the bullet strikes further and further from the magic circle. From 300 yards the bulls-eye looks like a pinhead.

The week of training was not spent in vain. Such sharpshooting tricks as "trigger squeeze," "sight picture," "breathing" and a host of other techniques that will send the bullet squarely into the middle of the black spot were learned by the reservists.

Also included in the week's training were helicopter tactics. The Reservists were formed into heliteams and were trained in various tactics necessary to launch helicopter operation. All personnel were given rides in the helicopter after which they landed and formed into units for the assault. The helicopter assault is one of the most important functions of the Marine Corps in the atomic age, according to Marines.

Before leaving, Capt. Tyson J. McMahon, USMCR, the company's commanding officer, commented, "The instruction our unit received while at Landing Force Training Unit was highly satisfactory and I believe that all hands learned a great deal from the stay at Coronado."

"And," he added, "in view of the excellent recreational activities afforded by the area, I feel sure that everyone enjoyed the time spent on liberty."

## County Peanuts Get Good Drink

Eastland County peanuts—most of them at least—got that rain they have been needing so badly for the past few days yesterday.

Rainfall as high as 2.60 inches was reported over the county, although moisture here in Eastland was limited. Highest reading reported was at the Texas Electric Power Plant on the Leon River. Larry Kihard, superintendent, said the official measurement there was 2.60. At Gorman 1.60 inches was reported and at Carport just less than an inch. Near Carport readings ranged upwards to 1.09 inches. The peanut growing section of the county generally in the south, almost all got some moisture. At Rising Star the official reading was .40. Cisco had .20 to go with their inch which fell Sunday, and Eastland had .13 on top of Sunday's .17. Here in Eastland the rainfall was much heavier in spots, however.

Heavy clouds still hung over most of the county this morning and prospects for more beneficial rainfall is good. A check with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in Eastland proved to give an optimistic outlook. Field workers for the ASC, who have been measuring crops, reported they were looking real good and

said the rainfall came at a perfect time. Area farmers were just as optimistic. O. B. Kofe of Carport summed up their thinking when he said, "My peanuts look good. They had a fine drink this morning. Others sharing his opinion included Glen Justice, Dean Collins and Frank Stubblefield.

One Eastland citizen hit the nail on the head this morning when he exclaimed, "That's okay with me if it doesn't rain a lot in Eastland. Just so we get it on those peanuts."

In addition to his other work he is a member of the Good Neighbor Association, and has been credited with making the Mexican-United States labor agreement a successful one.

## CONSTABLES PAY HIKE, TOO

# Precincts All Receive 'Emergency Money'

Eastland County Commissioners Monday morning made quick work of a problem, which has worried them off and on for several weeks. The Court voted four to one to raise the pay of constables in Rising Star and Gorman to \$100 a month. And in another move which has been under study for several weeks, the Court voted unanimously to transfer \$32,000 to individual precincts.

The raise meant that the constables will be getting \$25 a month more than they did before, and \$25 a month more than any other constables in the county. Constables at Eastland, Ranger and Cisco will continue to draw \$75 a month.

Actually the issue was cut and dried way before Monday morning. A vote on the same motion was passed back on May 13. The Court at that time failed to advertise the raise, however, and the Attorney General ruled the pay increase was illegal. The Court voted at their last meeting to advertise the raise, and a legal ad appeared last week in the Rising Star Record.

Monday only Commissioner J. B. (Tip) Arther of Precinct 1 opposed the increase. He voted against it on grounds it wasn't fair to other constables. Commissioner R. L. Carter of Rising Star introduced the motion and it was seconded by Commissioner B. M. Bennett of Gorman. Commissioner J. E. McCanlies of Cisco and Judge John Hart, also of Cisco, voted yes.

Back in May Carter's motion lowered Eastland, Ranger and Cisco constables' pay to \$50 month and increased the Rising Star and Gorman constables' pay to \$100. He got that motion passed, but Arther pushed one through right behind it raising the three constables who had their salary slashed up to \$75 a month.

Monday Arther declared the Court was giving the constables an increase in pay even though they would have to pay money out of the general fund, "which already is in the red."

Carter reasoned in asking for approval of the increase that Eastland, Ranger and Cisco all have city police protection where Gorman and Rising Star do not. Speaking of Eastland, he also pointed to protection offered by the Sheriff's department.

**\$32,000 Transferred**  
The Court also voted to transfer \$32,000 from the Road and Bridge fund to the individual precinct funds. A unanimous vote gave each precinct an additional \$8000 to spend this year.

The transfer came after Commissioners Bennett and Arther had asked for an emergency transfer at the last meeting of the Court. In

going ahead and giving all four precincts the \$8000, the Court acted in true tradition of commissioners courts in sharing equally among precincts.

A delegation from Cisco which had indicated they would appear before the Court to ask for County cooperation in building 13.5 miles of Highway 380 from Cisco to the Shackelford County line, failed to appear.

The Court got their business over in near record time, ending their work at 9:45. Usually the Court meets all morning long, and then sometimes an afternoon session is needed to complete the work.

**Postmaster Is Approved Here**  
Mrs. Marene Johnson has been approved by the Senate Civil Service Commission for the position of postmaster here.

Mrs. Johnson, Eastland's first woman postmaster, was among the first approved for Texas this season due to the change in Texas senators.

## Southern Juries No Good? Here's A Prize Northern Jury

Backers of Civil Rights legislation in Washington, from the President on down, say they must do away with the right of trial by jury in the enforcement of Civil Rights because no jury in the South would convict a man charged with violating them.

Well, let's take a look at a jury that has just returned a verdict in the James R. Hoffa case—a "Northern" jury, mind you, that can do no wrong.

Hoffa, a Teamsters Union big-wig, who was being tried on a charge that he had conspired and bribed to plant a spy within the Senates Rackets Committee to keep him posted as to what was going on, was acquitted by this so-called jury.

If there ever was an air-tight case against a man, they thought they had it against Hoffa. Some 30 or 40 witnesses of the highest repute testified that he had really conspired with a lawyer for him to obtain a position of trust with the Rackets Committee and to tell him (Hoffa) everything that went on relating to the Teamsters Union and Hoffa's shady dealings—to keep him tipped off in advance so that he could be prepared for anything that might come up.

Indeed, they even found on Hoffa's person certain communications from his spy disclosing secrets of the Rackets Committee. This, alone, was enough to sew up the case air tight.

It so happened there were eight Negroes on this jury, some of them Negro women.

What did Hoffa's defense attorneys do? They brought in several Negro attorneys to sit with them at the council table, although the Negroes took no part in the proceedings.

Then to cap the climax, they had former world's heavyweight champion Joe Lewis march into court during the middle of the proceedings. Lewis announced that he had come to see what was happening to "my good friend Hoffa."

After that, when the eight Negro jurors and four white men got the case, they turned Hoffa loose in a record short time.

The federal government, though, cannot trust Southern juries.

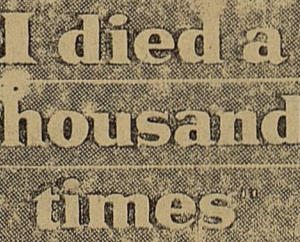

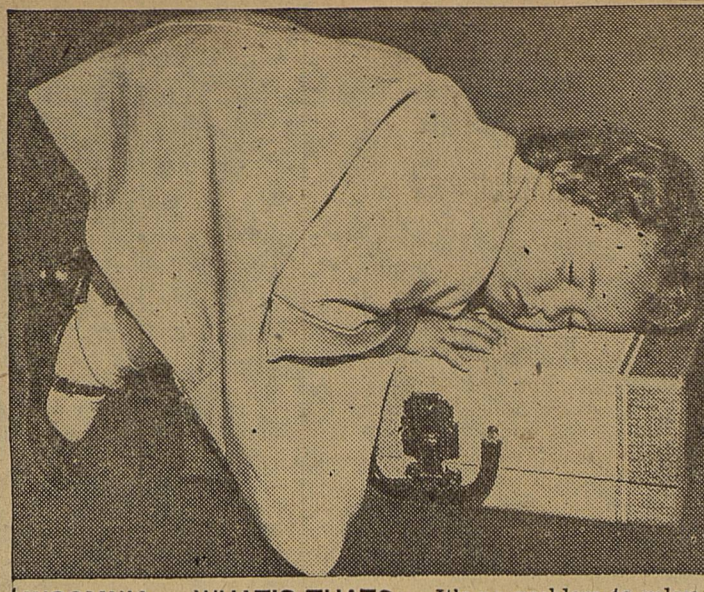

## IT'S THE LAW in Texas

HERE'S HOW STATE DIVIDES ESTATES WHEN THERE IS NO WILL

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property - - cash, stock, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of his portion, and the other (or one-fourth of the real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving

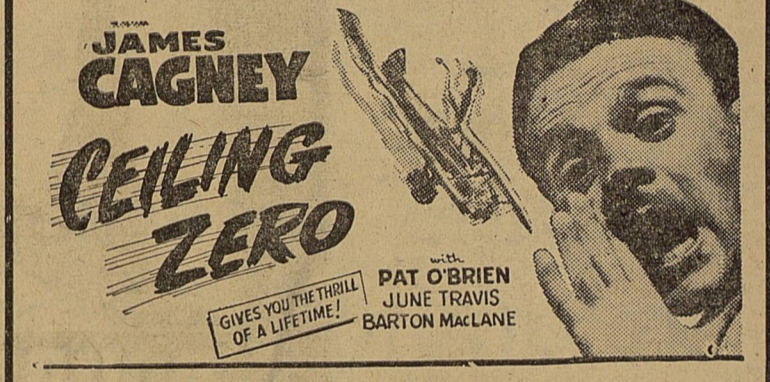

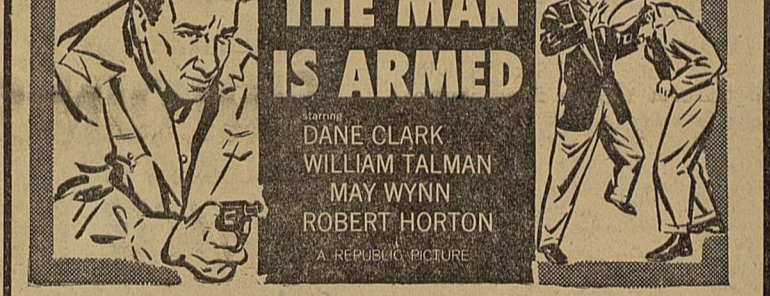

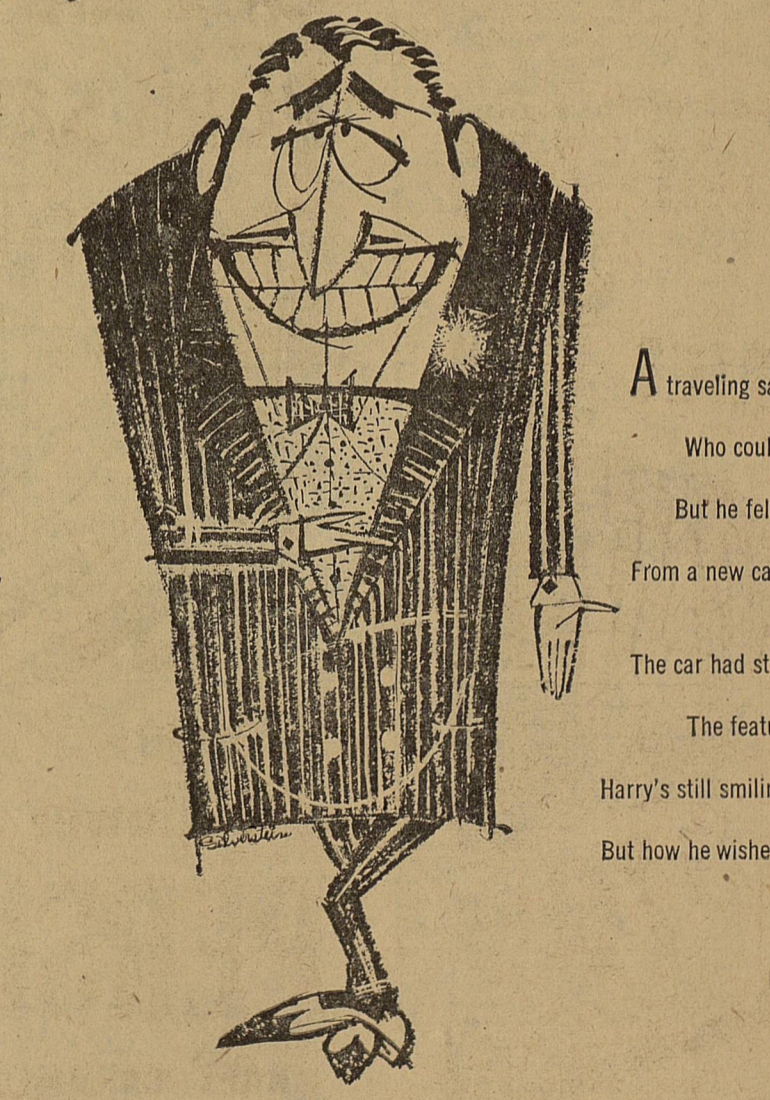

### O. W. Horton, Kin of Ranger Man, Buried at Post

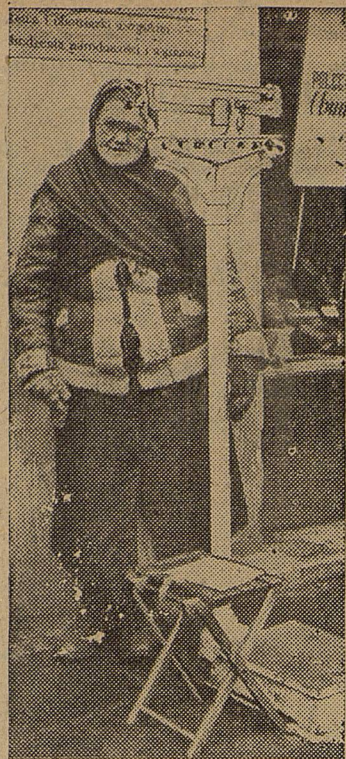

### Lawn Insects Can Be Controlled With Chemicals

College Station—Many kinds of insects and insect-like pests damage lawns, but this damage can be greatly reduced by proper use of available chemicals, says C. F. Garner, extension entomologist.

Grubs of several kinds of beetles, weed on the roots of grass, leaving bare spots where plants have been killed by their feeding. Others, such as sod webworms, armyworms and cutworms feed on the leaves or stems. Still others, such as chinch bugs, false chinch

bugs, Rhodesgrass scale and leafhoppers suck juices from the grass. Ants and earthworms dig holes in lawns and throw up mounds of earth, and ants may invade the house from their nests in the grass.

All of these pests can be controlled, according to the entomologist with insecticides such as chlordane, DDT, aldrin, dieldrin and heptachlor. For quicker results chemicals should be washed into the soil by watering after application. Insecticides may be applied whenever desired. Follow the application rates on the container and observe all precautions on the label, because insecticides are poisons.

The problem of moles in the lawn is related to insect problems since moles invade lawns and build tunnels in search of worms and

grubs. So controlling insects may help control the moles as well, suggests Garner. Finally, the entomologist suggests that you visit the office of your local county extension agent and ask for publications on lawns and insects.

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### Johnson Reveals Flood Damage On Texas Rivers

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson said recently that no basin-wide plan of improvement has ever been completed on any Texas river and the result is that State's principle streams lack adequate basin-wide protection against floods.

Senator Johnson, in his statewide weekly radio broadcast, said the Corps of Engineers had given him estimates of this year's flood damage in six Texas river basins as follows:

- Red River basin, \$11,000,000.
- Sabine River basin, \$2,200,000.
- Trinity River basin, \$17,000,000.
- Brazos River basin, \$38,000,000.
- Colorado River basin, \$2,700,000.
- Guadalupe-San Antonio river basin, \$10,300,000.

"Here is part of the other side of the picture," the Senator added. "Except for the flood control projects we have built on the Trinity River, damage in that river basin would have been \$81,000,000 more than it actually was."

"Property owners in the Brazos River basin were hard hit. But their losses would have been \$26,000,000 greater if we had not built some dams. The tragic thing about this is that some \$28,000,000 of the damage would not have been done if flood control projects authorized but not built had been in existence."

### Man-Made Moon To Be Exhibited At State Fair

A fullsize replica of the "man-made moon" which will be launched into space to circle the earth will be exhibited at the 1957 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 5-20.

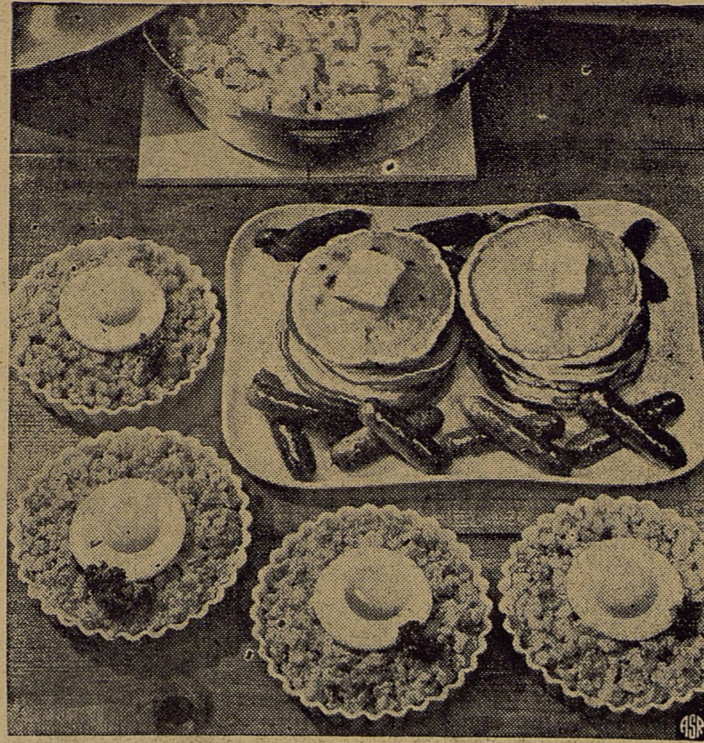
The Dallas Health Museum will display the earth satellite model, along with much of the IBM calculating equipment which will gauge its flight and record its reports. A model of the three-stage launching rocket which will carry the "moon" into space also will be

on exhibit. The exhibits will be furnished by the U. S. Naval Research Laboratory in Washington, D. C., where the technical program is being carried out for Project Vanguard. "Vanguard" represents man's first real attempt to conquer space. The earth satellite, a sphere 20 inches in diameter packed with intricate instruments, will be fired into outer space where it will circle the earth in an orbit some 300 miles out. Its instruments will send back data by radio which will assist scientists in their studies of space.

The launching of the "man-made moon" is one of the experiments to be carried out in the United States' scientific program for the current International Geophysical Year which began July 1.

It is estimated that the "Vanguard" project has already cost \$57,000,000, with hundreds of the nation's scientists involved in work to perfect the satellite sphere, design the equipment to track it and build the giant rocket to take it up.

### Canned Meats Grace Breakfast

Divide corned beef hash into 4 individual baking dishes. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) 20 minutes. Make a depression in hash for eggs. Break an egg into each dish. Sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper. Continue baking until eggs are set, about 12 minutes. YIELD: 4 servings.

**Partly Scrambled Ham 'n' Eggs**  
1 dozen eggs      1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup milk      1/4 teaspoon Tabasco  
2 small cans (2 1/4 ounces each)      4 tablespoons (1/2 stick) butter  
    deviled ham      Paprika

Break eggs into large mixing bowl. Add milk, deviled ham, salt and Tabasco; beat with rotary beater until foamy. Melt butter in chafing dish or large skillet; pour in egg mixture. Cook over medium heat, stirring from bottom and sides as eggs become firm. Continue until eggs are thick and creamy. To serve, sprinkle with paprika. YIELD: 6 servings.

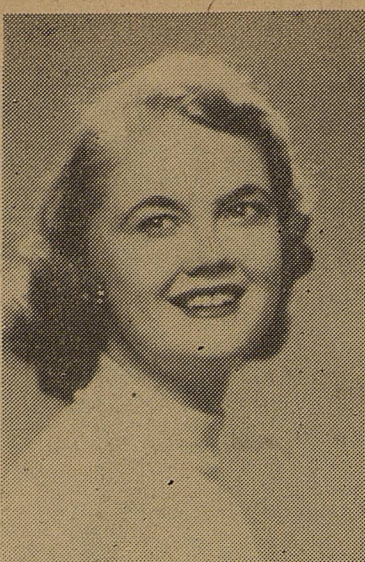

### Home Poisons Heavy Cause of Accidental Death

A harmless-looking headache pill in a home medicine cabinet can be a headache to parents of young children.

Nearly a fifth of the 1,400 children treated for accidental poisoning in a Midwestern city had swallowed aspirin, the National Safety Council said today.

More than 1,300 deaths from poisoning - mostly from medicine and household items - are reported annually in the United States, Council statistics show.

Chief victim of accidental poisoning is the tot under four years of age. But right up there as poison victims are persons in the 25-64 age group.

The types of accidental poisoners are as varied as the containers they come in - bleach, permanent wave solution, shampoo, nail polish remover, furniture polish and cosmetics. The toddler will even drink kerosene if he gets a chance.

While weed-killers, pesticides, cosmetics, kerosene and cleaning agents are hazardous, the main villain is medicine. It accounts for more than half of all accidental poisoning deaths.

"Old houses, too, can be booby-traps for youngsters," said Ralph Kuhl, assistant director of the Council's home safety division.

"Tots can be poisoned by peeling paint on window sills and frames, by peeling wallpaper and paint from crumbling plaster."

Each can cause lead poisoning. What's the solution?

"Education," said Kuhl. "Parents should be made aware of the seriousness of the problem. There should be stricter state and federal laws requiring that

the ingredients be listed on bottles containing these valuable - yet potentially harmful - substances."

The best way to cut down on deaths from poisoning? Prevent the poisoning, answered Kuhl. Follow these rules, he advised:

1. Store medicines out of the reach of children. Don't leave them in purses or bureaus.

2. Don't take medicine in the dark.

3. Don't put poisonous substances in soft-drink bottles, used jelly jars, or pans. Children may drink out of them.

4. Have a medicine cabinet with a locked poison compartment installed if you remodel or build a new home.

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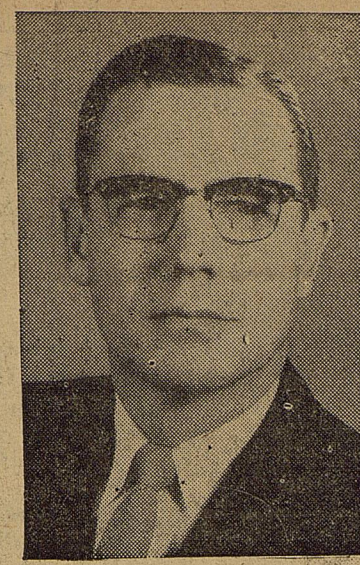

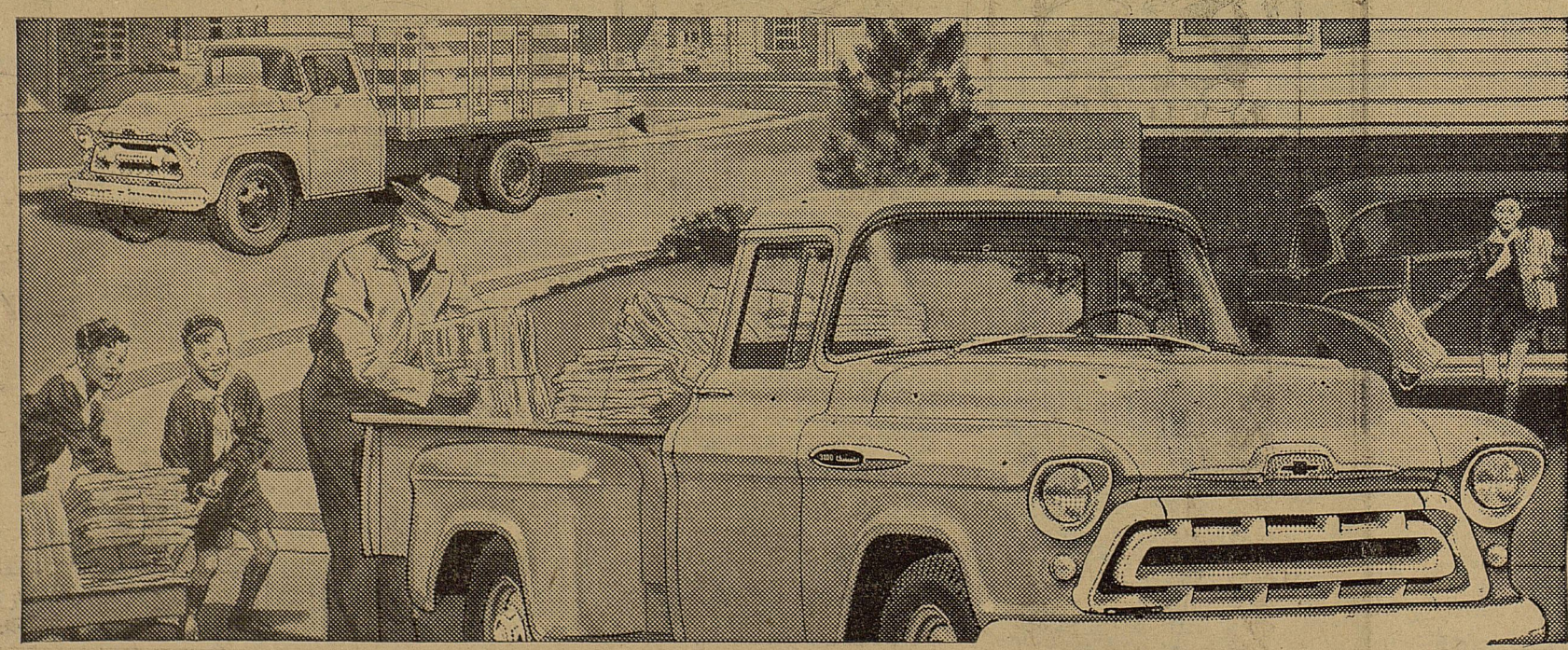

## Pickles Put Life in Those Party Sandwiches

TANG and surprising flavor—that's what pickles can add to sandwich spreads and tidbits for the party. These three recipes tell the story well.

### Pickle Liver Ribbon Sandwiches (About 4 dozen sandwiches)

One 4½-ounce can liver spread, 1 tablespoon finely chopped onion, ¼ teaspoon sage, ¼ cup drained sweet pickle relish, 1 tablespoon chili sauce, 2 slices crisp cooked bacon, crumbled, salt to taste, 20 slices white bread.

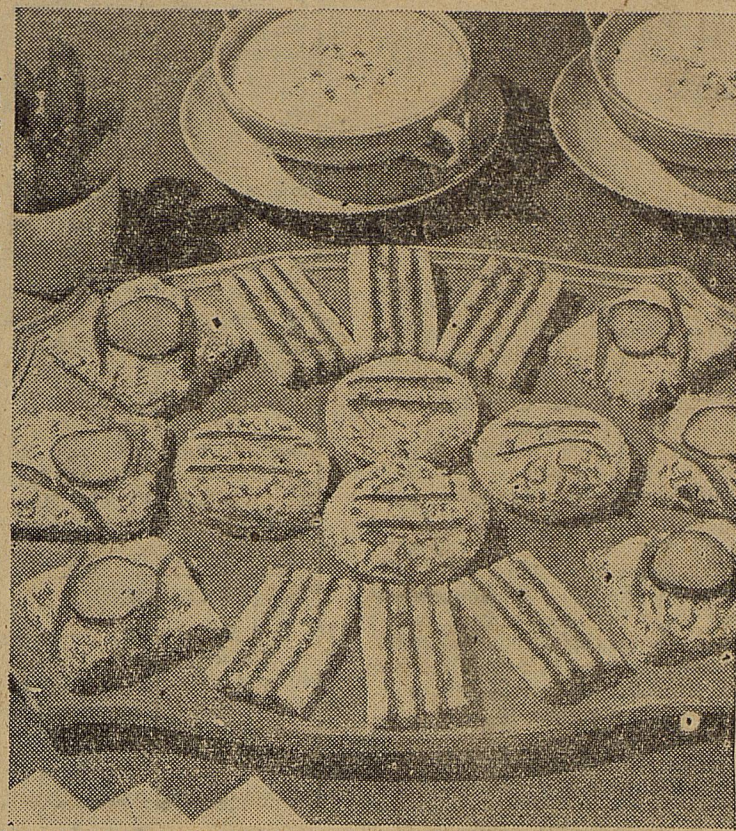
Combine liver spread, onion, sage, pickle relish, chili sauce and bacon; mix well. Season with salt and chill. Trim crusts from bread and spread 15 slices with liver spread mixture. Put 3 slices bread together to make 5 sandwiches. Top with remaining 5 slices bread. Wrap tightly in waxed paper and chill. Cut into ¼-inch slices to serve.

### Egg and Dill Pickle Spread (About 2 cups spread)

Four hard-cooked eggs, chopped, ¼ cup chopped green pepper, ¼ cup chopped dill pickles, ¼ cup mayonnaise, ½ teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon chopped onion. Combine all ingredients. Mix well and chill. Spread on buttered bread or rolls, as desired.

### Spley Pickle Crab Spread (About 2 cups spread)

One 6½-ounce can crab meat, 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion, ½ cup chopped sweet

fresh cucumber pickles, ¼ cup finely chopped celery, 1 3-ounce package cream cheese, softened, 2 tablespoons sherry (optional), ½ teaspoon salt, pepper to taste, buttered bread squares. Drain and flake crab meat.

Add onion, pickles and celery; mix lightly. Combine cheese and sherry; blend well. Add to crab mixture and mix well. Add salt and pepper. Chill. Spread on bread. Garnish with additional pickles, as desired.
