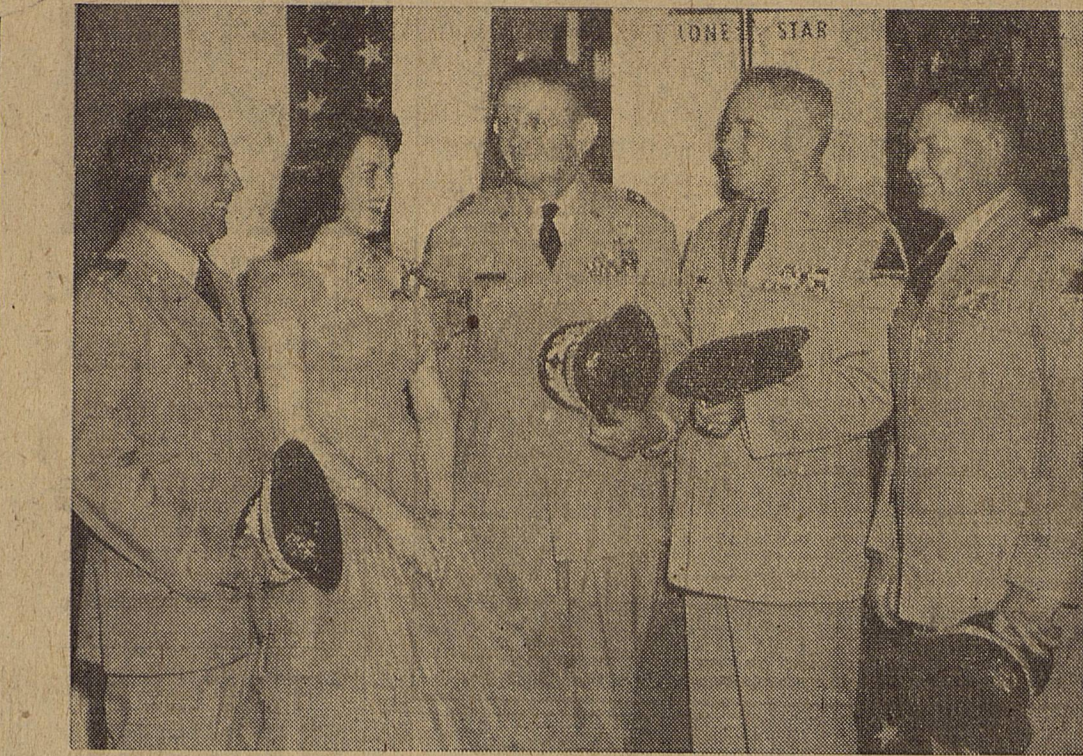
New Wide Screen To Be Installed In Joy Theatre

Dr. Churchill, who was introduced by program chairman David Fry, was giving a report made by the ACC agriculture department on a 15 county area which included Eastland County. He told Lions that there is a trend to move away from the farm and to increase the size of farm acreages while decreasing the total number of farms.

"More than dry weather has caused this trend," Churchill declared. He said today's farmer must be an educated man. He must be a man with many knowledges as well as a good business-

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Crawford Trial Will Go To Jury Today

Final Arguments To Be Made Before 12

Final arguments in the George Crawford murder with malice trial were being heard this morning in 91st District Court.

Crawford, charged with the fatal shooting of his wife, Lilly Pearl, last September, sat through a bitter day Tuesday as the State sent witness after witness to the stand to testify against him. The State continued their parade of witnesses Wednesday morning and then turned things over to Defense attorneys. The Defense used some 15 character witnesses and then put Crawford on the stand to tell his version of the shooting. Crawford claims he doesn't remember the shooting.

The trial, except for the fact that there is a new jury on hand, has almost been a repeat of the February hearing which ended in a mistrial after the jury couldn't reach a verdict. The only new State's witness was one of the accused man's young sons, who testified that he had seen his father and mother argue on a number of occasions and had seen his father strike his mother. Other witnesses included Anna Bell Douglas, a neighbor of the Crawfords. She testified Crawford beat his wife. Then the three women who were sitting at the same table with Lilly Pearl when she was shot—Ada Evans, Elizabeth Nelson and Gloria West—were put on the stand.

Evans admitted they were sitting around the table when the shooting took place, but all said they didn't actually see her shot. Armstrong West, in whose home the shooting took place, was the next witness. He testified he was not in the house when the shooting took place. He said he heard the shots, started running for the house and saw Crawford run from the house, jump in his car and take off. Entering the house he said he asked what had happened and was told "George has shot Lilly Pearl."

Shannon Daugherty, another neighbor of the Crawfords, testified Crawford surrendered a gun to him the night of the shooting.

Dr. H. J. Bulgerin testified Mrs. Crawford died as the result of an extreme loss of blood caused by six bullet wounds. Sheriff J. B. Williams took the stand and told of witnessing a "voluntary statement" from Crawford on the night of the shooting. Then the State put a fire arms examiner, Fred Rymer of Austin, on the stand. The two Crawford children were next and the final witness was Vivian Jones.

The Defense put some 15 character witnesses on the stand, most of them white.

Crawford took the stand then to testify about how he and his wife were separated, saying she was high tempered and would go home and leave him several times a year. He said he went to the scene of the shooting to get his wife to go home with him.

The jury is expected to get the case about noon Thursday.

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Tricycle Rider Has Eastland Breakfast

A sun burned, 56 year old man stopped by the White Elephant cafe in Eastland Tuesday morning to rest and have breakfast before continuing on his way. He had spent the night Monday in Ranger. What is so unusual about that? Well, this man, Wilford E. Wright, was traveling on what he called an adult tricycle, and was on a 5000 mile tour from his home in Bay Pines, Fla. to Junction, Alaska.

And this isn't the first trip this World War I Veteran has made in this rare manner. He told this reporter that since 1943 he had made five transcontinental trips and had traveled 100,000 miles on the tricycle which has only one gear and three wheels the size of bicycle tires.

When asked how he coped with Ranger Hill the man, wearing khaki pants and a t-shirt, said "It was pretty tough. I had to push my tricycle all the way up it and stop about eight times to rest... You get used to things like that though." He said he preferred his tricycle to a bicycle because he could go any speed he wanted to and didn't have to worry about having to balance it.

Hanging on the back of the vehicle was a sign which read "San Petersburg, Florida to Juneau, Alaska."

He said he would ride the tricycle to Vancouver, British Columbia and from there take a boat on to Alaska.

For luggage he had only one canvas bag which among other things contained a small portable radio and a scrapbook of clippings from the places he has been. In his pocket he carried an autograph book with signatures of people all over the United States. The scrapbook was one of two he keeps. The one he had, he kept with him all the time and the other remained at his home in Bay Pines.

To get an idea of how fast he travels, Wright spent Sunday night in Fort Worth, Monday night in Ranger and planned to spend Tuesday night in Abilene. He travels only three months out of the year.

And the tricycle went rolling on!

George Harmon Killed By Tractor At Featherlight

George Harmon, about 50, died at Ranger General Hospital a 4:45 this morning, Thursday, of injuries he received at about 1:30 a.m. Thursday at Featherlight Corp., in Ranger, when a tractor apparently turned over on him.

Harmon lived at Strawn, and his body was taken to Baum-Carlson Funeral Home there where arrangements are pending.

According to Charles Bomar general manager of Featherlight Harmon was operating a front end loader, which is a bulldozer type tractor with a bucket on the front of it which scoops up shale and moves it from place to place.

Harmon was an experienced operator and had been scooping up shale on the night shift and moving it around for processing. When some of the workmen missed him they went to investigate and found him severely injured with indications that the tractor had turned over. Bomar said the machine turned all the way over and landed up on the way over and landed up right with the motor still running.

Harmon was rushed to the hospital by a Killingsworth ambulance, but his injuries were fatal.

Local Citizens May Have Money Coming To Them

A lot of Eastland County citizens may have money coming to them that they know nothing about.

Thousands of North Texans are entitled to reopen claims for a refund of income tax previously disallowed for sick pay exclusion under the 1939 Internal Revenue Code, according to A. E. Fogle Jr., administration officer of the Abilene Internal Revenue office.

A recent Supreme Court decision has allowed a taxpayer's claim for sick pay exclusion under the 1939 Internal Revenue Code. This decision makes it necessary for the Internal Revenue Service to reconsider thousands of claims for sick pay exclusion for tax years of 1953 and earlier under the 1939 decision for tax years of 1953 and earlier that were originally disallowed.

The Internal Revenue Service officials estimated that the claims would average between \$40 and \$50 each, amounting to some 400,000 to \$500,000 total.

Fogle emphasized that taxpayers who have not filed a claim in the past are not eligible to file a claim now. He advised the taxpayers who have filed a claim in the past to write to the Sick Pay Exclusion Section, Internal Revenue Service, P. O. Box 101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Texas, giving full details concerning their claim and request that their claim be reconsidered.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

John Wesley Hardin is supposed to have killed more men than any other gun-fighter in the history of Texas—40, say some chroniclers.

Without a doubt, he was the most adroit of all when it came to handling a pistol. When he had been arrested and was being escorted, overland, by Rangers to stand trial, while in camp, one of the officers would hand him a pistol—unloaded of course—and these men, who knew a thing or two about handling a gun themselves, watched with admiration his quickness and skill.

Some credit Hardin with originating the maneuver known as the "border roll." In any case, he was a master of this maneuver, which consisted of offering a pistol, barrel first, with a finger in the trigger-guard, then—with a swirl—the pistol was pointed squarely at the other. Hardin used this trick to keep Marshal Wild Bill Hickok from disarming him in a Kansas cattle-drive town.

At the end of the trip under the Ranger's guard, Wes was tried and sentenced for the killing of a

deputy sheriff. He served a long term.

During his outlaw days, Hardin demonstrated daring and fast thinking. For example: he and a companion were being pursued by a posse. As the two men dashed over a hill, here came another posse toward them! What was to be done?

The two posses, of course, could not see each other. Hardin and his friend wheeled their horses rode into the first set of pursuers and, yelling and shooting, they. This totally unexpected development naturally created confusion. And, next moment, here came the other posse. The two parties of horsemen became almost hopelessly entangled and, in the mix-up, the two outlaws got away.

While in prison, Hardin studied law and, after he was freed, went to El Paso, ostensibly to practice law, but perhaps with the plan in mind of resuming a career based on his skill with a gun. That town had more gun-fighters than any other in the country at that time. They were not daunted by Hardin's reputation. Each was anxious to be pointed out as the man who had killed John Wesley Hardin.

The years in prison had taken their toll. Hardin was no longer young and dashing. He was a shell.

Even so, he was shot from behind as he was rolling dice at a bar. The man who killed him got killed soon afterwards—and that man in turn was killed. Being a pistoleer in the old days was not a healthy career.

FUTURE TENSE LAW

You can tell a lot about people by the way they regard time.

Do they put stock mostly in the past—their record; the present—their direct joy in work or play; or the future—their plans? Why not use all three dimensions of time? Past experience to guide, the present for zest, and the future to realize dreams.

Lawyers report a sharp shift in the way people regard time and the law; Of old they thought of law in terms of past facts like failures to meet legal duties, misdeeds, etc.—facts useful chiefly in lawsuits.

You still have to think of the record, since you may have to go to trial some time. So keep good records of your affairs.

But more and more people now also think of the law in the future tense—in terms of built-in safeguards for plans which they want to go through without legal hitch-ups.

Our heavy income and death taxes have made people plan ahead legally, rather than wait for the axe to fall.

Any time you buy or sell a home or a business or make an investment you have choices of how you may do it—some wise, some not, in view of your circumstances.

Should you do business as a sole proprietor, a partnership, or corporation? Do your contracts set out ways of meeting unexpected events? How best may you serve your estate (and also carry out your wishes) by a will or a trust or by direct gifts?

While all of these things point forward, the past in the form of court records can serve you by showing where trouble may come from.

As more and more people know the symptoms of legal trouble—where to look for legal hitches in plans before big trouble starts, there will be fewer law suits and better human relations.

And where does trouble sometimes start? Most often when you lack a clear grasp of your relation-

ship, your rights and duties, and your own and the other fellow's resources—in transactions involving large personal or financial stakes.
