## Bridge Across New Lake Gets Okay

### \$125,000 APPROPRIATION IS GRANTED BY HIGHWAY DEPT.

The Eastland County Commissioners Court, meeting in a special session Thursday morning, accepted the provisions presented

them by District Engineer Robert J. Milligan, representative of the State Highway Commission, to construct a bridge and road which will connect Staff with Eastland and Ranger when the new Leon River reservoir is completed.

Milligan said the State Highway Commission has authorized the construction of a road from a point four and four-tenths miles east of Eastland on Farm-Market Road 570, south-east six and three-tenths miles to an east-west road intersection, south of Staff. The bridge will cross the lake one mile west of the present county road. The Highway Commission has granted a \$125,000 appropriation for the work. The bridge alone will cost \$50,000.

### PUBLIC SCHOOL WEEK

GREETINGS:

The Public School System in Texas goes back literally to the very beginning of our State. Texas' first Constitution made provisions for a system of public education. President Mirabeau Buonaparte Lamar, in his message to the Texas Congress in 1838 stated, "It is admitted by all that cultivated mind is the guardian genius of Democracy, and while guided and controlled by virtue, the noblest attribute of man. It is the only dictator that freemen acknowledge, and the only security which freemen desire."

The progress of our public schools from small beginnings to the fine educational system we have today has not been easy. It has required a cooperative effort of State and local officials, the active interest of parents and of citizens generally, and the energy and devotion of public-spirited men and women who have been willing to devote their lives to the teaching profession.

In recent years we have had to face great problems in the administration of our public schools. We have learned that the solution of these problems is only possible with public interest, understanding and cooperation.

One of the best evidences of public support is a definite effort on the part of each citizen to become familiar with the public school system and to keep in touch with it.

THEREFORE, I, Allan Shivers, Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the period March 1-7, 1954, as Public Schools Week in Texas and urge every citizen to visit one of the public schools during this period and become acquainted with the programs and accomplishments of our educational system.

In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 15th day of August, 1953.

### COUNTY LOST MANY ACRES IN COTTON QUOTA OVER YEARS

ABILENE (Sp.)—The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has called for official recognition of the region's loss of cotton acreage because of the drought.

In a letter to the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, the regional chamber said that 80 West Texas counties lost 2,016,717 acres in 1953 as compared with 1951 and 1,805,627 acres as compared with 1952.

The report showed that Eastland county had lost 1,492 acres in 1953 as compared with 1952 and 1,392 acres as compared with 1951.

Total acreage in Eastland county in 1953 was listed as 7,408 acres, as compared to 8,900 acres in 1952 and 8,800 in 1951.

"The cotton farmers in these drought counties certainly have not contributed to the surplus of cotton in 1953, and to fail to recognize drought-lost acres as 'cotton acres' would doubly penalize the farmer when allotments are set for 1955," the statement pointed out.

"The cotton history or record of cotton acres in 1953 in each county must be adjusted upward because it will be used in determining any cotton acreage quotas which may be allotted to these counties in any control program which may be in effect during any of the succeeding five years," R. M. Fielder of Abilene, chairman of the WTCC's Agriculture Committee, commented.

Representatives of the Chamber conferred last week with officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Washington and were assured that the adjustments will be made if the state committee requests that it be done, Fielder explained.

In announcing the WTCC action, Fielder said that the organization had been preparing data for the request and had been conferring with representatives of the cotton industry, the State ASC, U. S. congressmen, and the Department of Agriculture since August of last year.

Reliable figures on actual cotton plantings in 1953 were not available until recently. The WTCC letter to Claude McCann, chairman of the state committee, pointed out that the 1,805,627 acres lost in 1953 as compared with 1952 acres "is more land than is planted in cotton in any other state except Arkansas and Mississippi," and that Dawson County alone "showed a reduction of 304,184 acres, which is more land than is planted in cotton in the entire state of New Mexico."

"The trip to Washington followed the advice of Representative Clifford Hope of Kansas, chairman of the House Agricultural Committee, who told WTCC representatives in a conference on January 13 at Waco, that the "best course of action" is to get an administrative decision from the office of the Secretary of Agriculture that the losses can be adjusted."

Fielder said that this decision, obtained last week in Washington, clears the way for the state committee to request action by the Department of Agriculture.

### Infant Died In Roadside Park Outside Of Eastland

A long trip in search of employment was halted in Eastland early Wednesday morning when death struck the two-month-old child of a transient family.

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph C. Davis died about 2 a.m. Wednesday while the family was bedded down for the night in a roadside park four miles west of Eastland on U. S. 80.

Reached by phone late Wednesday, Davis said, "I woke up and looked to see about the baby and found that he was dead. I began hollering for my wife, telling her something was wrong with our baby. We got everybody up and drove into town to the hospital."

Another couple and three other children of the Davises were also in the car. The infant was rushed to the Eastland Memorial Hospital where it was declared dead on arrival.

Justice of the Peace Jim Bogus of Eastland, returned a verdict of death by natural causes, following an inquest.

"We had plenty of cover," Davis said, when asked if the infant was well covered while sleeping in the chilly air. "Sure, we had plenty of cover," he said.

The infant's body was taken to Hamner Funeral Home in Eastland. The father indicated Wednesday night it would be buried in Eastland. "I don't know when we will have the funeral," he said, with emotion rising in his voice.

"We'll leave just as soon as the funeral is over," the grieving father said. "I hope we can get in Albuquerque Thursday night."

The father of the dead infant said he was going to Albuquerque in search of a job. He admitted that he didn't have much money, but said, "I'll pay for it (the funeral), just as soon as I can."

Davis said the family started out Monday night from Grayburg, 21 miles from Beaumont, and drove all night and all day before stopping near Eastland to rest.

"People here sure have been nice to us," Davis said, "They got us eats and stuff, and there's a preacher here that's been all right good to us today."

Survivors of the infant include the parents; two brothers, Roy, five, Joseph Christopher Jr., 2½; and a sister, Norma Sue, four.

### Pvt. Tom Moody Wins Expert Rifleman's Award

Pvt. Tom Moody, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Moody of Ranger, has been awarded the Marine expert rifle marksmanship medal, it was announced recently by the Marine Corps.

Pvt. Moody, who attended school both in Ranger and Eastland before enlisting in the Marines, is stationed at San Diego, Calif. Moody also received the Platoon Iron Cross.

Eastlanders Urged To Mail Heart Fund Contributions Before First

Bill Hunter, chairman of the Heart Fund Drive in Eastland, Thursday urged Eastlanders to mail their contributions to HEART in care of the local postoffice, as soon as possible. Hunter said, the drive will definitely end March 1 and everyone is urged to contribute before that time.

Early reports from district and local chapter headquarters of the Texas Heart Association indicate contributions have passed the half-way mark. Dr. W. R. White, Baylor University president and Texas Heart Fund chairman for 1954, reported today.

"Approximately \$250,000 in contributions has been received according to early campaign reports," Dr. White said, "placing the state Heart Fund drive well ahead of last year's campaign at this time."

The chairman of the state-wide drive to raise funds to combat the nation's number one killer—heart and blood vessel diseases—jointly cut that reports received by state campaign headquarters "are incomplete at this time and we are certain that still more generous contributions have been made which have not yet been reported."

Governor Allan Shivers and Attorney General John Ben Shepherd are serving again this year as co-chairmen of the Heart Fund drive and have urged in radio talks and personal appearances that Texans support the Heart Fund.

Dr. White also said that contributions to the 1954 Heart Fund "will be used in the three-point program: conducted nationally by the American Heart Association through the state and local affiliated organizations to support heart disease research, public education and community heart rehabilitation work."

Pointing out that "approximately one out of every 16 persons in the nation suffers from some form of heart or blood vessel disease," Dr. White urged that "Texans continue their generous support of the 1954 Heart Fund drive. The Heart Fund campaign lasts only through February, but heart disease strikes every day of the year."

The state Heart Fund chairman said that contributions to the campaign may be made to local Heart Associations or mailed to "Heart" care of the postmaster.

#### Eastland

Ever thought seriously about water? That's a stupid question in itself, since most of you remember when the liquid became a costly and scarce product here.

Since the new dam across the Leon River is soon to be completed, and since Eastland's water supply is apparently to be plentiful, it might do us well to remember just how important water is.

About all most of us know about water is that it comes out of a faucet when you twist the handle. We know that it comes from a well, creek, river or lake. Most of us can even tell you if the water is hard or soft.

But beyond these few simple and basic facts, the average person, who depends on water for life, knows very little about the liquid for which there is no replacement.

Experts tell us that the average person, who weighs about 150 pounds stripped, is made up of about 105 pounds of water. If you lose 10 pounds of this water you are seriously ill. Lose 20 pounds of the liquid in your body and you are dead.

Water is our transportation system. It carries the necessary foods to various parts of the body. It also supplies fuel and eliminates waste.

The food you eat is nearly all water. A third of every slice of bread, four-fifth of every potato, and 90 per cent of every carrot you eat is water. In addition you drink upwards of a half-gallon every day.

The average American uses about 1,100 gallons of water every day. That is, that is the figure reached when you divide the total number of Americans into the total gallons of water used daily in the U. S. By this same yard stick, a family of three will use more than a million gallons of water a year.

Each shower you take uses 25 gallons of water; a tub bath requires 36 gallons; flushing a toilet takes a minimum of five gallons. There are a good many folks who turn the water on and forget to (Continued On Page 8)

Neglected Ranges

If you've inherited a badly neglected gas range, don't despair. Porcelain top-of-the-range fixtures, drip and broiler pans respond magically to a strong solution of washing soda and water. You'll have to do the top burners in two installments, as two of them will have to do the work of boiling up the range parts in the pan containing the washing soda solution. Place parts in pan when water is cold and let come to a boil, continuing to boil for five minutes. Wait until fixtures are sufficiently cooled off to handle comfortably, then scrub with a stiff brush. For dirt-encrusted ovens, apply one of the new brush-on pastes and leave on overnight.



## INTESTINAL DISEASE MUST BE WATCHED BY CATTLEMEN

Cattle raisers were warned today to watch for signs of a late winter intestinal disease which seems to be growing more serious every year.

The American Foundation for Animal Health said the next two months will mark the peak period for outbreaks of winter dysentery, especially in stabled cattle. The problem is particularly serious in dairy herds during early spring, officials said.

Today's report says that a typical outbreak may at first involve only one or two cows with mild colic, which appear unimportant. But 24 hours later a majority of the cattle may be affected and milk flow may be cut in half.

Because the disease may be confused with another cattle problem, scours, an immediate diagnosis was advised.

"Winter dysentery is seldom fatal but takes a toll through reduced milk production and dehydration of affected cattle," the Foundation says. "With proper treatment, the course of the disease may be limited to three days or a week, but dysentery outbreaks often run two weeks or more if left untreated."

Veterinarians have reported good success in combating the

condition if treatment is started early.

The Foundation also recommended several routine preventive and control measures, including the barring of visitors from feed alleys, reducing the feed intake when the disease strikes, and avoiding sudden changes in rations.

## HAWTHORN TREE ALSO HOLDS LUCK OF IRISH

For good luck on St. Patrick's Day, a hawthorn tree rates with the shamrock, according to a tree expert, Martin L. Pavey, Jr.

Irish legend holds the hawthorn sacred, for the wee folk are said to dance beneath its boughs at night. St. Patrick's Stone, an island in the River Shannon, is shaded by a hawthorn tree. Water that collects in the hollow of the stone is believed to be medicinal.

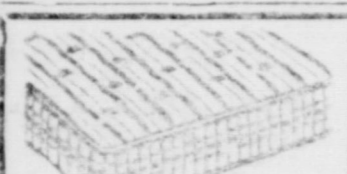

### ANIMAL FATS SATISFACTORY IN LAMB FATTING RATIIONS

Rendered animal fats at levels of five to 10 percent are satisfactory sources of energy in lamb fattening rations.

In a 100-day feeding trial conducted recently by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Choice white grade tallow and Special grade tallow was incorporated into the rations of three groups of fattening lambs at levels of five, 10 and 15 percent. A fourth group of lambs served as a control.

Other feeds in the rations were grain sorghum, cottonseed meal, molasses and alfalfa hay.

Lambs on a ration containing five percent rendered fats made the highest, most efficient and cheapest gains, had the highest dressing percentages and the highest carcass grades.
