The program planned for this year's meeting will continue this long time objective. Headquarters for the December 5-6 meeting will be in the Memorial Student Center. The short course is sponsored by A & M's Department of Dairy Science.

husbandman, says the short course is designed to serve the needs of all dairymen, milk plant and commercial feed company fieldmen as well as others interested directly or indirectly in the future of the dairy industry in Texas. On this year's program, such subjects as current dairy cattle research; antibiotic and insect residues in milk; avoiding rancidity in pipeline and bulk tank installations; brucellosis program; cooperative hauling of bulk milk; dairyman's responsibility in selling milk; purebreds in the dairy business; analyzing and using production records; using selective matings to produce superior animals and using and handling frozen semen will be discussed. Speakers, other than Texas A & M College System personnel, include Roy Barnes, manager,

Brazos County Milk Hauling Cooperative; R. E. Bursleson, extension dairyman, Federal Extension Service, Washington; Dr. J. B. Henderson, asst. state veterinarian, Livestock Sanitary Commission, Fort Worth and Sandy Saunders, regional director, American Dairy Association, Chicago. The annual banquet will be held on the evening of Dec. 5 with one of Texas' best known dairy personalities, now retired Prof. A. L. Darnell, as honor guest. The Texas Purebred Dairy Cattle Association group will get together on Friday morning for a 6:30 breakfast meeting and the different breed associations will hold luncheon meetings at 12:30 noon, also on Friday. injection, introduced by Pontiac last year.

The new "Tempest 395" V-8 engine is bigger than ever with displacement increased from 347 to 370 cubic inches, and designed to deliver power where most needed—in the traffic range.

Pontiac engineers list 88 new features in the 1958 models and 135 separate safety features.

Striking "New Direction" styling accentuates the car's longer, lower, wider look. The low, horizontal grille is topped by dual twin head lamps and rises above the heavy bumper, which incorporates massive parking and signal lamps. A new gold, rectangular crest featuring a "V" on a grooved background above the name, Pontiac, in block-style lettering, is positioned in the left side of the grille. Delta wing ornaments ride atop each front fender with twin wind-splitters continuing along the fender.

The missile-type side mouldings sweep back to concave flares in the rear fender and frame distinctive series markings. The Bonneville has, in addition, four simulated front fender louvers.

From the rear the 1958 Pontiacs will be immediately recognizable by dual twin tail lamps above oval, chormed, back-up lamp ports, and the simply styled trunk lid bears chrome handles on each side of the superbly fashioned name plate.

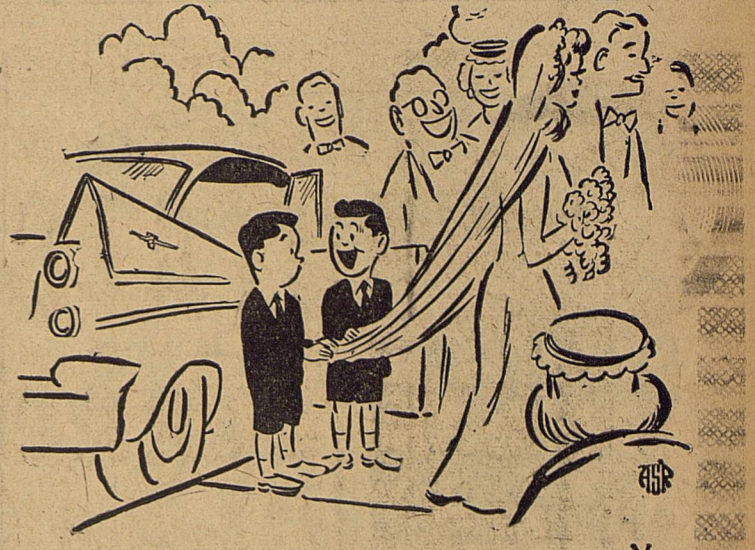
In addition to the five-passenger Bonneville convertible and the sport coupe, Pontiac has for 1958, the Star Chief series consisting of two and four-door Catalinas, a four-door sedan with slim center pillar, and a custom Safari station wagon. The Super Chief line includes two and four-door Catalinas and a slim pillar, four-door sedan. The Chieftain series is led by the convertible, new in this line; two and four-door Catalinas, two and four-door slim pillar sedans, and a two-seat and a three-seat, four-door station wagon.

A total of 21 solid colors and 56 recommended two-tone paint combinations are offered, some in the new acrylic lacquers, while interiors are color-matched in fabric and leather.

On 122" and 124" wheelbases, the new Pontiacs are as much as 4.5 inches lower in height, are 2.2 inches wider and as much as 8.7 inches longer overall. Passenger leg room has been increased by 4.5 inches, ample head room is retained and luggage space is enlarged.

A new sculptured instrument panel has key instruments grouped before the driver for quick, safe reading through the deeply recessed, two spoke steering wheel. A non-glare instrument panel paint protects against glare.

Leading an exceptional parade of optional equipment for the new cars is air ride suspension, new for passenger cars in the middle price range, which gives an ever-level ride regardless of load

**ABOUT YOUR HEALTH**

AUSTIN — Your general state of health can be a first line of defense against illness, particularly now that the season of infectious diseases is here. Resistance to complications of colds, "flu" and other illnesses is influenced by how you eat, sleep, exercise and relax before you get sick.  
Food means different things to different people, but the net effect is the same: food not only supplies energy to the human machine but also provides building materials to renew body tissue. Good nutrition is largely a mat-

ter of getting enough of the right foods. And since this is true, it is a good idea to take a look at your eating habits. Your regular diet should be built around:  
A daily serving of meat or fish, about four eggs a week, some cheese, at least two glasses of milk daily, two daily servings of raw or slightly cooked green or yellow vegetables, two servings of fruit, and some potatoes, bread or other grain products.  
Desserts, candy, and beverages such as soft drinks and coffee are not essentials, but they are sometimes pleasant additions.  
Other items in your diet can be as extensive or as limited as you wish, provided you watch for "spoon-in-mouth diseases", leading to overweight.  
One fact about food that cannot be overemphasized is the value of a good breakfast. And a coffee break isn't breakfast! Many people find the demands of their job in home or office takes so much out of them they feel all used up at the end of the day. This is apt to be literally true, especially if breakfast has been bypassed.  
Many times an "all gone" feeling in the late morning comes about like this: When you get up in the morning you've been without food for a good many hours. Yet, you may not experience a feeling of hunger. You seem to get along for a few hours on a sub-standard breakfast, but around 11 o'clock you can't wait for lunch. Errors in your work are most apt to happen at this time.  
To forestall fatigue, to reduce errors, to assure yourself of a steady level of health, fortify yourself with a sure combination—a good night of sleep and a really basic breakfast, such as fruit, toast, eggs, cereal and milk. If you can't eat breakfast through lack of appetite, start now to cultivate the habit of a good morning meal and soon you'll find you can't do without it.  
Remember, too, as you review your eating habits to take a look at your ways of eating as well. The relaxed, pleasant meal . . . tempting, colorful dishes . . . quiet conversation are all tools for better health.

Good nutrition is so important during these weeks when so much sickness is in our communities. The meals your homemakers serve should be packed with proteins, minerals, and vitamins. Much of these foodstuffs is found in dairy products such as cheese, butter, and milk. Since time is an important element to many of you homemakers, most of the suggested recipes given for dairy food products are simple to prepare.

Whole-meal sandwiches are quickies for lunch. Try this triple decker open-face. Toast one side of bread. Spread untoasted side with butter. Add a spoonful of baked beans, cover with a slice of Cheddar cheese and top with thin-sliced onion. Place the sandwich under the broiler until the cheese melts.

**Vegetable Dishes with Dairy Products**  
Start with butter — just butter, salt and pepper can do wonders for any vegetable. In combination with other seasonings, as savort, basil, or caraway, butter really comes into its own.

**Cheese In Candy**  
Add nutrition to your sweets this way:

- 1 3-oz. pkg cream cheese
  - 2 C sifted confectioners' sugar
  - 2 1-oz. squares unsweetened chocolate, melted.
  - 1-4 t. vanilla
  - Dash of salt
  - 1-2 C. chopped pecans
- Cream the cheese, blend sugar into it slowly, add chocolate, and mix well. Add vanilla, salt, and pecans and mix. Press into a greased shallow pan. Place in refrigerator until firm, then cut into squares.
