Wright went on to add, "But it is a good thing they had a jinx of something working because that is ALL they had going at Maverick Stadium."

Wright, in all his wisdom, added, "Never was a team so soundly licked as were the Mavericks to walk off the field with the big end of the score." Wright raved on and on like that, then at the bottom of his story, on he last page, he got through writting his editorial for the day and did some straight reporting for a change. He even put down that Eastland made two touchdowns, on the back page that is.

Wright questioned the statistics we kept. Say he, "Moore has reported here that the Mavericks made 152 yards rushing, but statistics kept by The Times shows that they made 113 yards rushing."
