
After successfully concluding treatment for their dental ills, these same patients were able to return to a diet with moderate amounts of carbohydrates and yet remain relatively free of dental

The State Health Department now has a service whereby saliva specimens may be submitted to be checked for decay-causing organ-isms. When the laboratory analysis is completed, the Department will recommend a diet designed to overcome those organisms. The service is available only through practicing dentists, and is intended for adults and children highly susceptible to dental decay.
