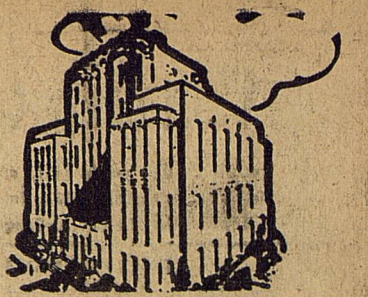

Mavericks to Open Title Defense Friday

Wylie's Advantage Is Playing at Home

All eyes will be on the quarterback slots when the Eastland Mavericks and the Wylie Bulldogs kick off the 1957 District 10-A gridiron race Friday night in the first conference clash of the year.

Fans will be watching the Wylie quarterback slot since big Joe Rex Schulle is being boomed as an all-state prospect. Schulle is the leading Class A scorer in all West Texas, and Wylie fans are first to admit that as Schulle goes, Wylie goes also.

Eastland backers will also nervously be keeping an eye on the Maverick man-ander position. This morning Clinton (Button) Humphreys was flat on his back with the flu. Humphreys is still being listed as a starter despite the fact he may not play a down. His fellow teammate, Co-Captain Johnny McMahon, also has the flu and Coaches Carroll Shelton and Jon Tate say he will definitely not be a starter. Also ailing is Saul Taylor.

Eastland, of course has won four and lost two. The Mavs hold wins over Dublin, Cross Plains, Ranger and Gorman, and lost to DeLeon and Cisco.

The Mavs were making no bones about it. Eastland will have to stop Schulle if they hope to win, and the Mavericks have been working hard on a defense to do just that. Although the Mavs were supposed to be running at two-third speed in yesterday's drills, they were hitting much harder than usual in drills, and looked sharp.

The two teams match off about even in the weight department. Both teams have average lines and both have one big man in the backfield and three small ones.

Coaches of the Wylie team are T. R. Baack and Wallie Cayton. Game time for the opening district game of the year is at 7:30 p.m.

Judge Milburn S. Long, associate justice of the Eleventh District Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, will be buried at 2:30 p.m. today with services at St. Paul Methodist Church in Abilene.

Four ministers will officiate at the service. They are Dr. John Donaho, pastor of St. Paul; Dr. O. P. Clark, a former district superintendent now retired and living in Abilene; the Rev. Jackson C. Oglesby, pastor of the Riddle Methodist Church in Fort Worth and immediate past pastor of the Eastland Methodist Church; Rev. Richard Smith, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Eastland.

Pallbearers will be Homer Smith, Bill Frost and Virgil Seaberry Jr., all of Eastland, and J. R. Black, Jr., Davis Scarbrough, Alex Bickley, Maurice Brooks and Esco Walter, all of Abilene.

Honorary pallbearers will be Judge Clyde Grissom and J. Cecil Collins, both justices of the Court of Appeals in Abilene.

Burial will be in Elmwood Park under direction of Kiker-Warren Funeral Home.

Judge Long had been in a serious condition with a kidney ailment and been a patient in Abilene for 10 days before returning home Monday. He was rushed back to the hospital Tuesday, however, and apparently suffered a heart

Cisco Library Project Of Late Frank Vernon

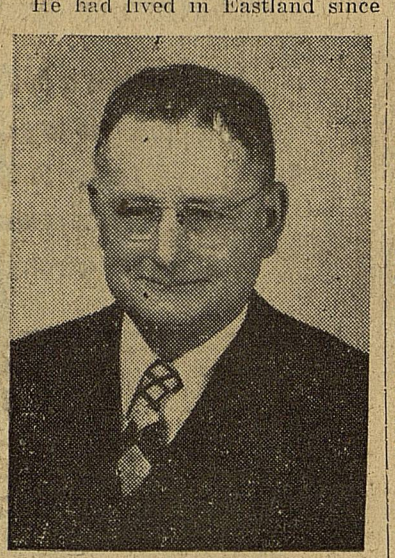
(Editor's Note: This is the 29th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

JUDGE M. S. LONG long to be remembered

1944, moving from Abilene when elected associate justice of the Eleventh District Court of Civil Appeals.

Judge Long was born Oct. 23, 1893, in Grambury. He married the former Ida Clausell of Albany Aug. 30, 1915, in Albany. It was there that he entered politics, making the race for county attorney.

A graduate of Glen Rose High School and Reynolds Presbyterian College in Albany, Judge Long had served as superintendent of Moran schools before being admitted to the bar in 1916. He studied law at home. A year later he became prosecuting attorney of Shackelford County, serving until his election as district attorney in 1922.

In 1927 Judge Long was appointed district judge by Gov. Dan Moody. He served as district judge until 1944 when he was elected to the Court of Civil Appeals.

A charter was applied for and granted, and the members went to work at once to raise funds to endorse the grounds. This and much more has been accomplished. Not only has a substantial fence been placed around the grounds, but a handsome iron gate swings on huge stone posts that were contributed by the owners of the land.

Wylie's Schulle Is Top District 10-A Scorer

Big Joe Rex Schulle, the lad the Eastland Mavericks will have to stop Friday night, ran for three touchdowns and kicked four extra points Friday night as the Wylie Bulldogs smashed Roby 40-0. The performance was good enough to push the Wylie quarterback into the top scoring spot in District 10-A.

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Teamwise the Mavs now have a record of four wins and two losses. Eastland has scored 115 points and allowed 87 points. First downs stand 88 to 74 in favor of the Mavs and Eastland has gained 1500 yards rushing while allowing 1304 yards to six opponents.

Eastland has netted 265 yards in the air, completing 14 of 39 passes. The Mavs have allowed 13 completions of 50 tosses, for 355 yards. Eastland has intercepted six aeriels and had three of their own fall into wrong hands.

Humphrey has punted 18 times and has a fine 32 yard average. Mav opponents have booted the ball 15 times and have a respectable 31 yard average. The Mavs have broken the rules 34 times and have seen 370 yards stepped off against them. Their six opponents have 43 penalties against them, but just 235 yards. Eastland has lost eight fumbles, but the Mavs have recovered 11 of their opponents'.

Promotion of a district judge to the Civil Appeals position left vacant by Judge Long's death is expected to be made by Gov. Price Daniel.

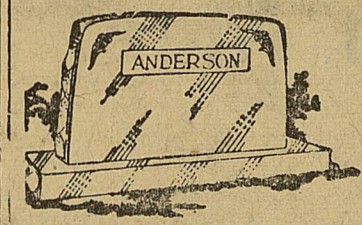
The vacancy will likely be filled by Gov. Daniel so that the appointment can be confirmed by the Senate in the current special legislative session.
