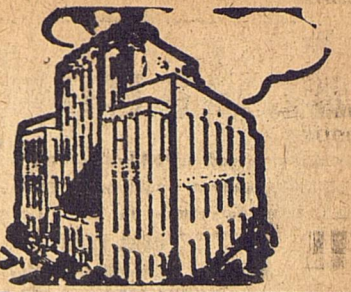

Judge Hart Proclaims March 1-8 4-H Week

County Judge John Hart today proclaimed the week of March 1-8 as "4-H Club Week in Eastland County."

The proclamation was released by Nancy Weathers, assistant county Home Demonstration agent, and Curtis L. Boase, assistant county agricultural agent.

The proclamation follows: "On the farm, in the home, and in the community, 4-H Club members 'learn to do by doing.' By selecting and carrying out a result demonstration, club members learn improved practices in agriculture, home economics, and related fields.

"It was in 1914 that the United States government made a unique investment in the rural youth

through the 4-H Club Program. Since then 4-H Club work has given millions of youth a chance to improve their lives through the development of their head, heart, hands and health. Today in Eastland County, 630 boys and girls between the ages of 9-21 are members of 4-H Clubs. Through the State, 4-H Club work is directed by members of the Agricultural Extension Service which is a part of the Texas A. and M. College System. The county extension agents work with 4-H members, their parents, adult leaders and friends of 4-H to develop a program that will provide educational and leadership opportunities for the youth of Texas.

"Although 4-H Club members have contributed much to the material wealth of our state and nation in raising the quality of agricultural and the level of living in homes where they have put the latest research to work, the club members themselves are our richest resource. 4-H Clubs are a proving ground for the training of future leaders.

"Now, therefore, I, as County Judge of Eastland County, do hereby designate the week of March 1-8, 1958, as 4-H Club Week in Eastland County. In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 20 day of February, 1958."

Deadline For Entering Stock Show Is Set

All animals to be exhibited at the annual Eastland County Livestock Show, in Eastland, March 28 and 29 must be properly entered and in their place by 12 o'clock noon on opening day, according to C. M. McCain, general superintendent.

Judging of the show, one of the largest county shows in this area, will begin at 8:30 a.m. on the second day with Angora goat classes. The judging of all animals will be completed by late afternoon according to show officials.

Animals in the breeding classes must be representative of their breed though they do not have to be registered or purebred and is open to both adult and juniors. Juniors defined as FFA and 4-H Club members from Eastland and adjoining counties are the only ones eligible for the fat animal classes of steers, pigs and lambs. Only county boys are eligible to enter their animals in the auction on April 1 following the show it was pointed out.

The show is sponsored by the County Livestock Raisers Association, Bob Pressley, Cisco, president. Other officers include Vernon Humphreys, Eastland, vice president, Ben McKinnis, also of Eastland, secretary and McCain, treasurer.

The show is expected to be strong in the fat pig and lamb classes, with some changes in both classes from the previous years show it was explained.

Four Teams Dominate 2 32-B All-District Teams

Early, District 31-B champions, sport a record of 19 wins and just three losses. Olden, who came out with a perfect 8-0 record in district play, has a season record of 18 wins and 10 losses. The two teams have met only one mutual opponent. That was Cisco, Class AA Lobos beat both Olden and Early by eight points.

Coach Gene Woods' charges will give away a height advantage to Early. In Wayne Deats, a 6' 8" sophomore center, the Eagles will sport the tallest man on the court. There also is 6' 7" Jack Snipes, a junior forward. He is taller than

Blount to Speak to Area Texas U. Exes

R. E. (Peppy) Blount, former legislator and Texas University football star, will address University of Texas Exes of the Oil Belt area in Eastland Monday night, March 3.

The meeting, which is the annual Independence Day celebration of the club, will be at 7 p.m. in the White Elephant Restaurant. Reservations may be made by telephoning vice president Jack Germany by Wednesday, February 27.

Blount, who is a partner in the law firm of Hurst and Blount in Longview, lettered three years in football at the University, once under D. X. Bible and twice under Blair Cherry, in addition to winning a varsity numeral in basketball.

He played his football in the late 40's, teaming with Bobby Layne to sweep Texas to two successive post season bowl championships in the Cotton and Sugar Bowls. He returned his senior year as right end on the championship Orange Bowl team.

During Blount's six years as member of the Texas House of Representatives, he utilized his leadership in fighting through farm-to-market road and water conservation measures. His efforts in securing the passage of the Texas prison reform and eleemosynary institutions improvement legislation was widely heralded.

A veteran of 31 minimum altitude combat flying missions, Blount is a captain in the Air Force Reserve.

In 1947, Blount married his campus sweetheart at the University, the former Eva Jean Finch of Longview. She will accompany him to Eastland.

The popular after-dinner speaker is a member of the Executive Council of the University of Texas Ex-Students' Association.

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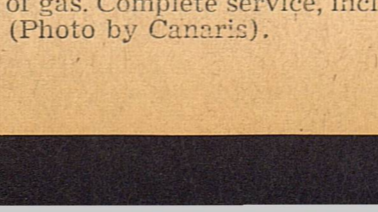
Miller's Phillips Station Opening Set For Saturday

Eastland Lions Favor Tri-City Phone Exchange

Eastland Lions came out in favor of the proposed tri-city telephone hook-up at their regular weekly meeting Tuesday.

Lions quickly approved a motion from the floor that the club go on record as favoring the set-up, which would mean that citizens of Eastland, Ranger and Cisco would have local service between the three towns.

W. E. McAnnally, traffic manager, spoke to the club, and dispelled the belief that no new telephone building would be built here if the program is adopted. He said there would still be exchanges in all three cities, the only difference being a tie-up of the three towns for local calls.

Thus the Lions of Eastland joined the Rotary clubs of Eastland and Cisco in favoring the change over. McAnnally spoke before Ranger Rotarians Wednesday but they did not vote on the issue.

Tri-City Telephone Hook-Up Desirable

(An Editorial)
The plan to put Eastland, Ranger and Cisco under a one telephone exchange arrangement, the Telegram believes, would strengthen this county many-fold.

The idea has already undergone the supreme test. It has had some cold water poured on it by a number of citizens from all three of the towns who believe that the three towns are better off divided. Despite these doubters, who are ready to oppose the plan even before hearing a report from the telephone company concerning rate increases—if there is to be any—the plan still has a full head of steam back of it.

We believe the majority of Eastland County citizens want the service if it can be provided at a reasonable price. If Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. reports the service would be warranted only alongside of a big rate increase, the Telegram will reverse its field and fight the plan.

We believe that citizens of the three towns hold a lot in common. We believe, in fact we know, that the large majority of us have friends and relatives in the other two towns which we could enjoy more if we could pick up the phone anytime we chose to and give them a call. We believe it would help businessmen in all three cities. We believe it would give us a strong economic unity.

We do not believe that many of us would oppose a slight increase in our telephone rates. We are confident that Bell will recognize the fact that businessmen have the most to gain, and are certain, therefore, that most of any increase which would have to come, would be placed on their shoulders.

For once, let's quit talking unity out of one side of our mouth and division out of the other. Despite the overuse of the phrase, we must say, "United we stand, divided we fall."

Delinquent Tax Suits Are Filed By City

The City of Eastland this week filed 15 test suits to collect delinquent personal taxes. The cases were filed in Justice C. E. Owen's small claims court.

The City has been working on preparing the tax suits for months. Members of the City Commission and City Manager Jimmy Young filed the suits.

Commissioners had ordered Young to get ahead and file the suits at their meeting a week ago today. They say these are the first in a large number of such suits. Personal taxes, for the main part at least, are filed against automobiles.

During the months that City Fathers have been preparing the suits, they have on several occasions notified persons who have delinquent taxes that such suits would be filed.

Mayor Horace Horton once said at a Commissioners meeting that the City of Eastland could solve most of its financial problems if citizens would just pay their personal taxes. Most of the suits involve only small sums.

I go to Church because it will cost me something. Anything in life worthwhile will cost me something. It will cost me money, time, energy much praying, but it will be worth this.

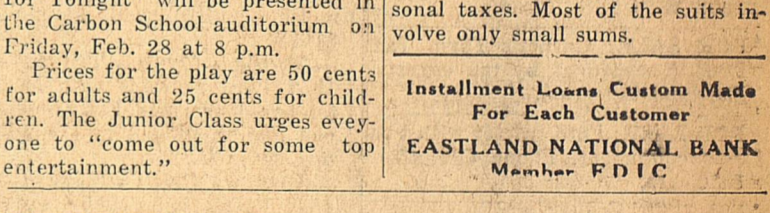
I go to Church because it takes me above the clouds where the stars shine. The clouds get heavy and dark at times—but above the clouds the stars are shining.

Had lunch recently with the man who made Sam Bass famous.

Bass has always been famous in Texas but not until Wayne Gard wrote the outlaw's life back in the 1930's did the "Robin Hood of Texas" become nationally known.

Since then, Bass has been the subject of a dozen motion pictures.

Gard's next book — (it will be out in the Spring) — is the biography of a horse: Steeldust, the old-time racer that has become almost a legend.

"Cap" Curry of Fort Worth who lived in Breckenridge during the oil boom and afterward, recalls a wagon going through the streets with a sign reading:

"Water or oil, \$1 a barrel; take your choice."

There was a rock-and-roll song which, when it came out, I thought had reached the absolute limit in simplicity of words. It went like this:

"Jim Dandy to the rescue" (Thump-de-thump by the drum) "Jim Dandy to the rescue" Thump-de-thump

But one has come along since then that makes Jim Dandy's words complicated. The words of this latter song are just two and they are as follows, to-wit:

"He's mine."

This is said over and over with now and then, "Yes", thrown in for good measure.

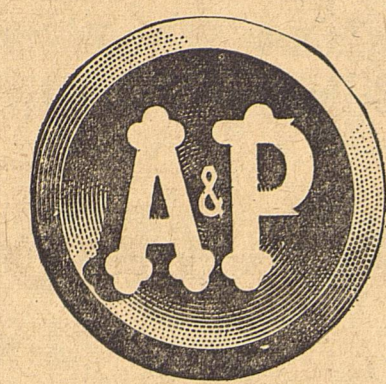

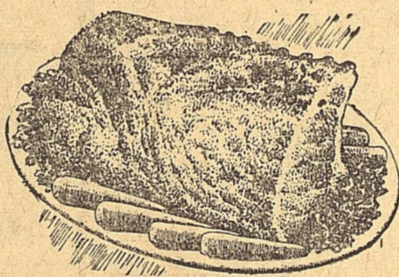

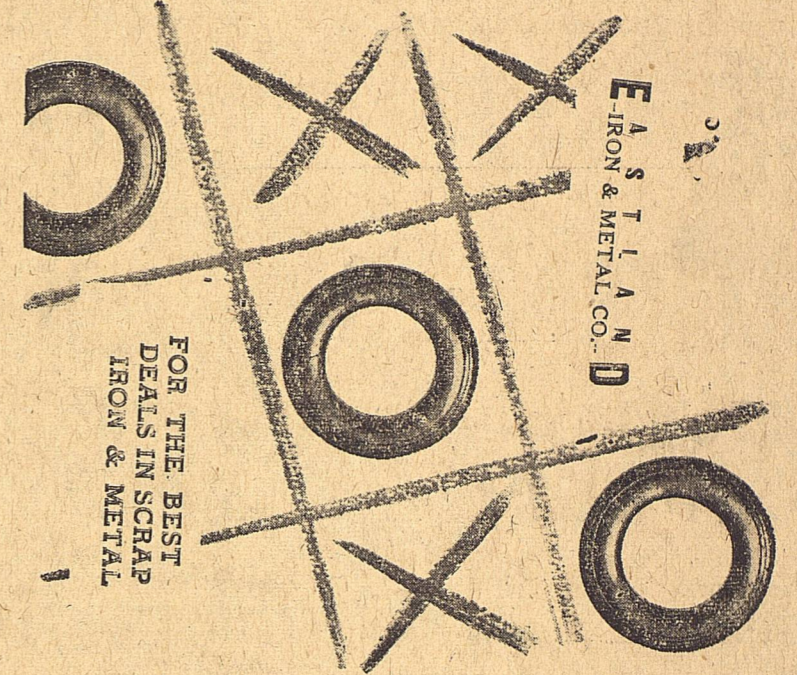
