County Cotton Farm Allotments Released

Acreage allotments for the 1958 upland cotton crop have been established for all eligible farms in Eastland County and cards went in the mail this morning notifying farmers of their allotment. Emmett Powell, Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office manager, said today.

Farmers will thus know what their allotment is for the coming year before going to the polls Dec. 10 to vote in the marketing quota referendum.

The Eastland County allotment was sliced again this year. The slight cut pushed the county allotment to 6765 acres. The total 1958 allotment in the United States is 17,554,528 acres.

Most of the county allotment must, under the law, be divided among farms on which cotton was grown in 1955, 1956 or 1957. To the extent that the county allotment is adequate, each of these so-called "old" cotton farms will receive an allotment for 1958 which is equal to the smaller of four acres or the highest number of acres planted to cotton on the farm in any of the last three years.

In addition, a small reserve is set aside for "new" cotton farms, for adjusting allotments for "old" cotton farms, and for hardship cases. In distributing the acreage reserve, the county committee considers the type and productivity of the soil, the labor and equipment available for cotton production, past cotton production and other factors.

Applications for allotments for "new" cotton farms must be filed with the County ASC office not later than Feb. 21, 1958.

Early Cisco Church Had Only 4 Members

(Editor's Note: This is the 49th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

The Cisco Methodist Church had its beginning in the fertile brain of a pioneer "circuit rider," Rev. Lamb Trimble. On the quiet hunt for any one who wore the name of Methodist, where he might find a kindred spirit, shelter and something to eat, he discovered M. V. Mitchell and wife (in a log hut 10 x 12 feet—running a sheep ranch). The tired preacher was not long in accepting a large hospitality in small quarters. The dirt floor to the little room had been overlaid with grass and on this was spread a carpet. The cubby-hole, (or shed room) and a bed of skins was the only place for the preacher, while plenty of blankets for cover and a good case of religion made him happy.

In 1880 this preacher organized the first church, and when the roll was called the only names

were M. V. Mitchell and wife and Mr. and Mrs. Walton. Mr. Mitchell was elected steward. This church was begun in a little log school house, located where now lies the beautiful cemetery. Rev. Andrews was the next circuit rider, and John Lane steward. In 1881 Cisco was founded at the junction of the railroads, and everybody moved to town, the school, post office and church following the people.

Rev. Mills was the next pastor. He and Rev. R. B. Vaughan canvassed the new town for Methodists and found about 20. The people were all living in tents. A school house was soon built with popular contributions, and this sufficed as a place for the monthly preaching.

Two or three years later, during the pastorate of Rev. John A. Wallace, a small church, costing six or seven hundred dollars, was erected on the lot where the present building now stands.

During the pastorate of Rev. T. C. Ragsdale the house was enlarged to meet the growing demands of the congregation. This was swept away by the cyclone in 1893, and a beautiful and commodious house was erected at a cost of about \$6,000. The church has a parsonage valued at \$1,200, and a membership of 330 members. Survived by one son, Jack of Anchorage, Ala.; two daughters, Mrs. George Grosecove of Pleasanton and Mrs. Sam Davis of Muskogee, Okla.; five grandchildren.

Motorists Are Reminded It's Inspection Time

With only one-tenth of the motor vehicles in Texas inspected for the year 1958, automobile and truck owners were urged today to obtain their new inspection stickers before the holiday season.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, called upon motorists to obtain their 1958 inspection stickers as soon as possible in order to alleviate the last minute rush on the 4,200 inspection stations in Texas.

Garrison said only about 450,000 of the four million registered vehicles in the state have been inspected and approved.

"While this number exceeds that for the same period last year," he said, "the present rate of inspection will not prevent inspection stations from being rushed again during the last few weeks of the inspection period ending April 15. Vehicle owners who complete their inspections before the holiday period will avoid the inconvenience of waiting at the inspection stations."

The state police director also said that early inspections will be of benefit to motorists who plan trips during the Thanksgiving to New Year's period by eliminating mechanical defects.

Here's Tip: Do Not Forget to Put On Stamps

It seems incredible, but it's true: many people at Christmas time will spend days getting Christmas cards ready for mailing, and then dump some or even all of them in the mail box without stamps.

This unusual behavior of some Christmas mailers was related today by Mrs. Marene Johnson, postmaster of Eastland.

"Often," she explained, "we will find a large batch of Christmas cards in the mail pick-up boxes—all in the same handwriting and all without stamps.

"The only thing we can do in such a case is to return the envelopes to the sender, if he has indicated a return address. This, of course, means delay, and it may be too late to get the cards mailed again and delivered in time for Christmas.

"The only alternative, in case no return address has been indicated, is to notify the addressee and permit him to pay postage due. This, of course, constitutes an annoyance for the addressee and destroys much of the good will value of the Christmas card."

So, in addition to her standard tip of urging mailers to mail early for Christmas, the local postmaster added that it is a good idea to make certain before leaving the house with your Christmas card that each and every one contains postage.

"And it should be the three-cent first class postage, which assures forwarding privileges for the letter if the addressee has moved, and permits the mailer to write a personal message on the card, the postmaster said.

Fatigue, too much food or not the right kind, tension and excitement, all are factors in lowering body resistance to the common cold. The holiday season ahead will be happier if you plan now to help your family guard against this health hazard.

Food makes a difference. Start family members with a good wholesome breakfast every day. Follow through with simple balanced meals at noon and at night. Eat at regular times as much as possible. Reserve the sweet or rich foods for mealtime dessert. Keep in-between meal refreshment snacks light and nutritious. Fruits, fruit juices, crisp, colorful vegetables served with special dips can be just as tasty as rich, heavy foods. Tension and fatigue may be hard to control when the holiday rush season starts. But proper food before and during the busy season will help keep resistance up.

Proper care can keep white nylons looking bright throughout their lifetime. Wash white nylons separately. Colored articles included with white garments are likely to fade and discolor the white.

Wash nylon garments thoroughly after each wearing. Home furnishings articles, too, should be laundered as often as necessary to maintain a pleasing appearance. Pretreat heavily soiled areas with a paste of water and heavy-duty detergent before placing in the machine or hand-washing. Machine washing, whenever possible, is the most effective way to launder white nylon. After pretreatment, wash in warm water, using a heavy-duty detergent, a non-precipitating type water softener, and a liquid sodium hypochlorite bleach. Nylon brighteners such as "Pro-Nyl" or "Nylonu", available for consumer use, will help maintain the whiteness level of nylon garments when used repeatedly.

Though washable garments, such as slips, blouses, shirts, in

the new synthetic fibers are tops in ease of care and length of wear, they sometimes tend to cling to the body in cold, dry weather.

Scientific research, which developed these fibers, has come up with an effective, easy way of combating this tendency—just add a small amount of liquid detergent, fabric softener, or a special liquid anti-static agent to the final rinse water. Liquid detergents and fabric softeners—often marketed as "laundry rinses"—can be purchased at most grocery stores. Liquid anti-static agents can be obtained at notion counters in drug or department stores.
