

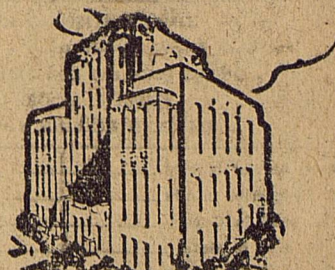

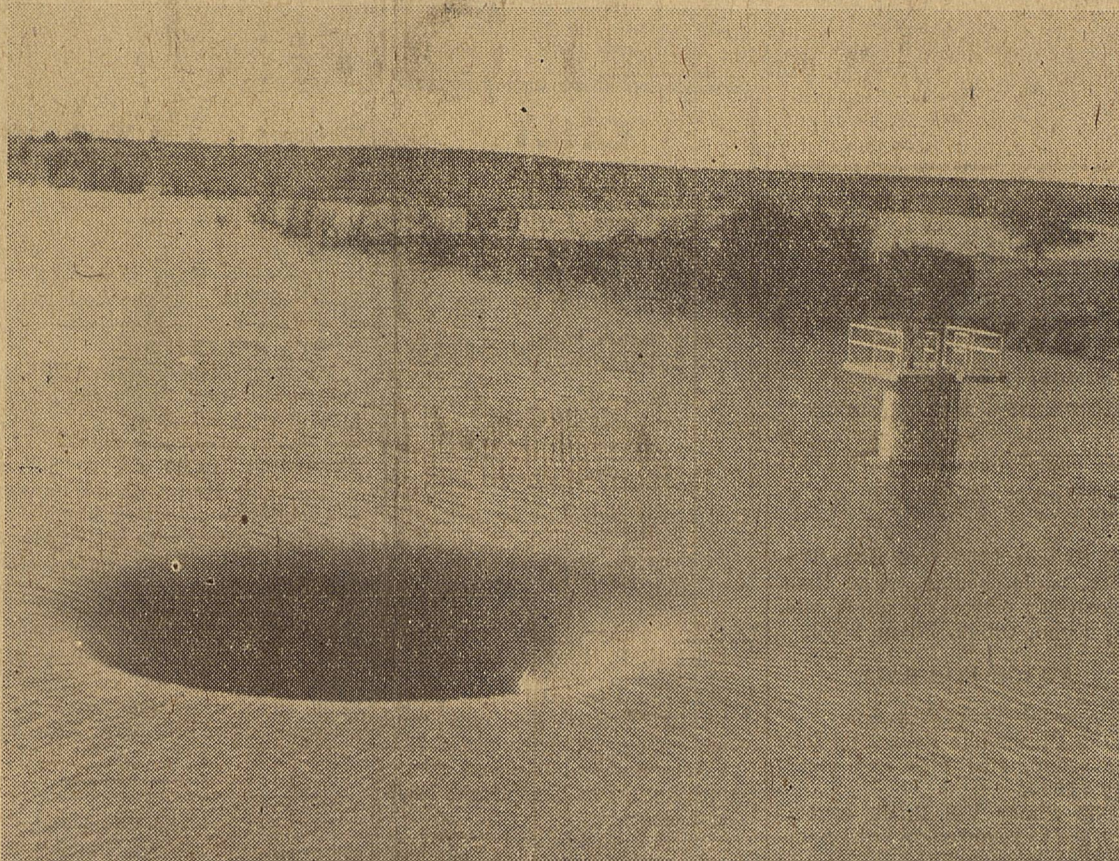

Two Young Men Face Charges of Burglary

Eastland County officers believe that they have put a stop to a wave of burglaries in the Cheaney community with the arrest of two young men.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Johnny Boyd said the two are believed to have burglarized at least three homes in the Cheaney community and maybe more. Officers recovered a large amount of articles taken from

the homes when they arrested the two men.

Bond of \$1000 was set and Barns was free on bond this morning. McCarty remained in Eastland County jail in lieu of bond.

Boyd said that a number of complaints have been received from the Cheaney community and the arrests came after work by the Sheriff's Department and constables.

The young men allegedly stripped homes they entered, taking everything they could carry.

Serving on the food committee for the banquet are Joe Manning, Tip Arthur, Bonnie Robertson and Willis Moore.

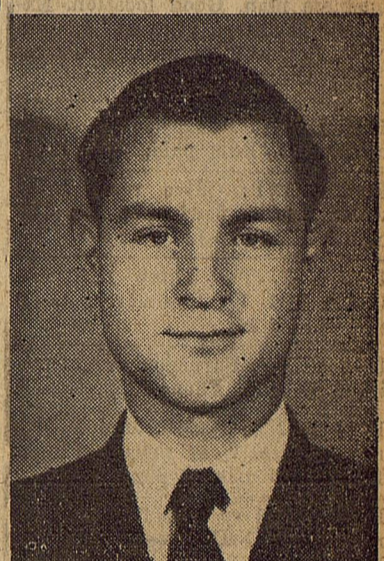

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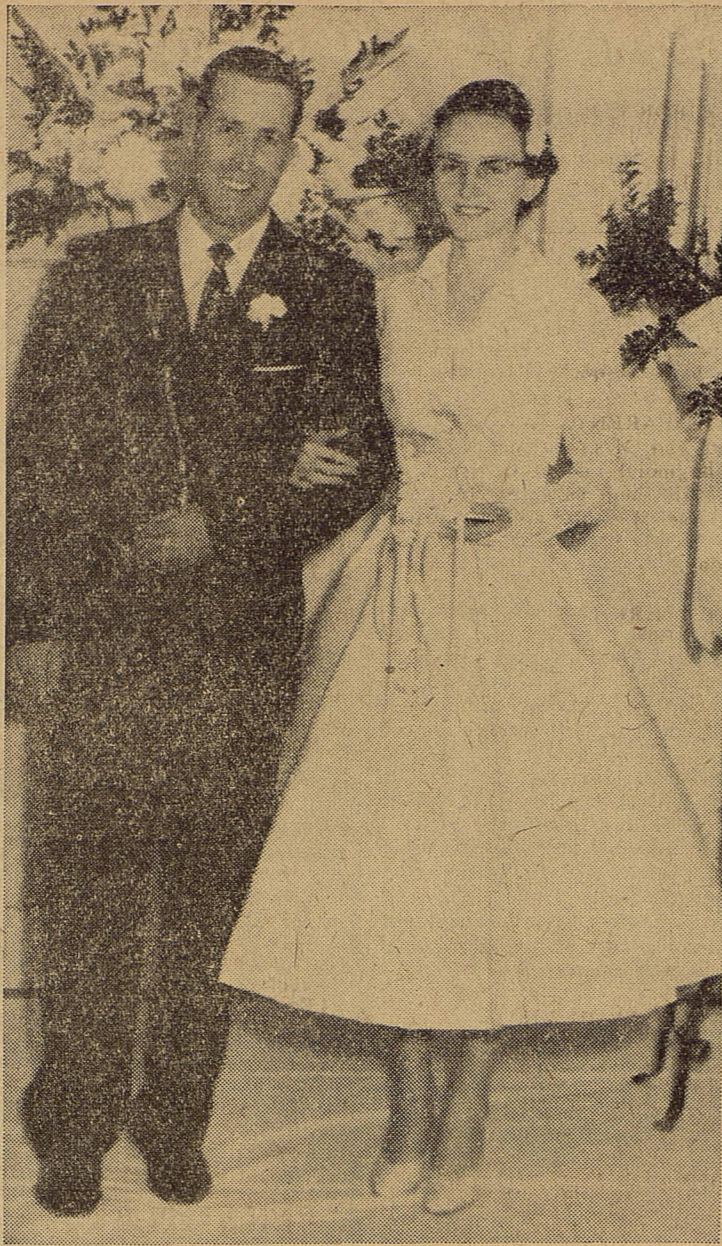

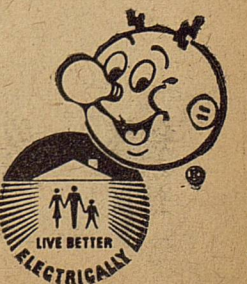
