
Richard Bumpass To Attend Clinic On Youth Revivals

Two Vacancies To Be Filled In April Voting

Three candidates filed Wednesday in the Eastland city commission race. Cyrus Frost is seeking re-election and Tom Wilson and James Eidson are asking for first terms.

Two seats on the five man commission are to be filled. The terms of Frost and Mayor Horace Horton are expiring.

Wilson and Frost filed first and Eidson put his name on the ballot a few hours later. None of the candidates made formal annoucements.

Voters will go to the polls Tues-day, April 1. The deadline for ff. ing in the race is Saturday.

The two commissioners elected will join Virgil Seaberry Jr., Bob Perkins and Jack Germany on the. commission. The five commissioners elect their own chairman, or mayor, from the group.


Three Eastland Boxers to Fight Saturday In Cisco

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
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

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
