It wasn't more than 45 minutes before we got our next good rumor. A soon to be completed plant in another city was going to finish one here, we were told. "For sure?" we asked. "Absolutely," we were told. With such sure information we started not to even bother to check. We got the sad story in lead and almost ready to print before caution got the best of us. Checking it out we found that there was no truth, what-so-ever to the wild, wild tale.

Those are some of the big ones we have checked down here. We have a file drawer of others which we are still working on.

Here's the thing about these bugs. We've found that most of them do not originate in Eastland. We picked up most of ours from folks who learned directly or indirectly from someone who lives out of town. They are repeated by we Eastland folks enough that they begin to seem real. It is rather like slogans. If some yells "I Like Mike" at you long enough, pretty soon you get to thinking you do like Mike. Mike might not be what you were lead to believe he was, and you might not like Mike a little later on, but at that moment you are convinced you do like him.

The same is true of rumors. If you hear a rumor often enough you cannot help but begin to believe it. And rumors such as the ones we have just mentioned—if you did believe them—could throw you into a panic.

Let's face it folks. We can talk recession all we want to but there is not going to be much of one, despite the Republican tight money policy.

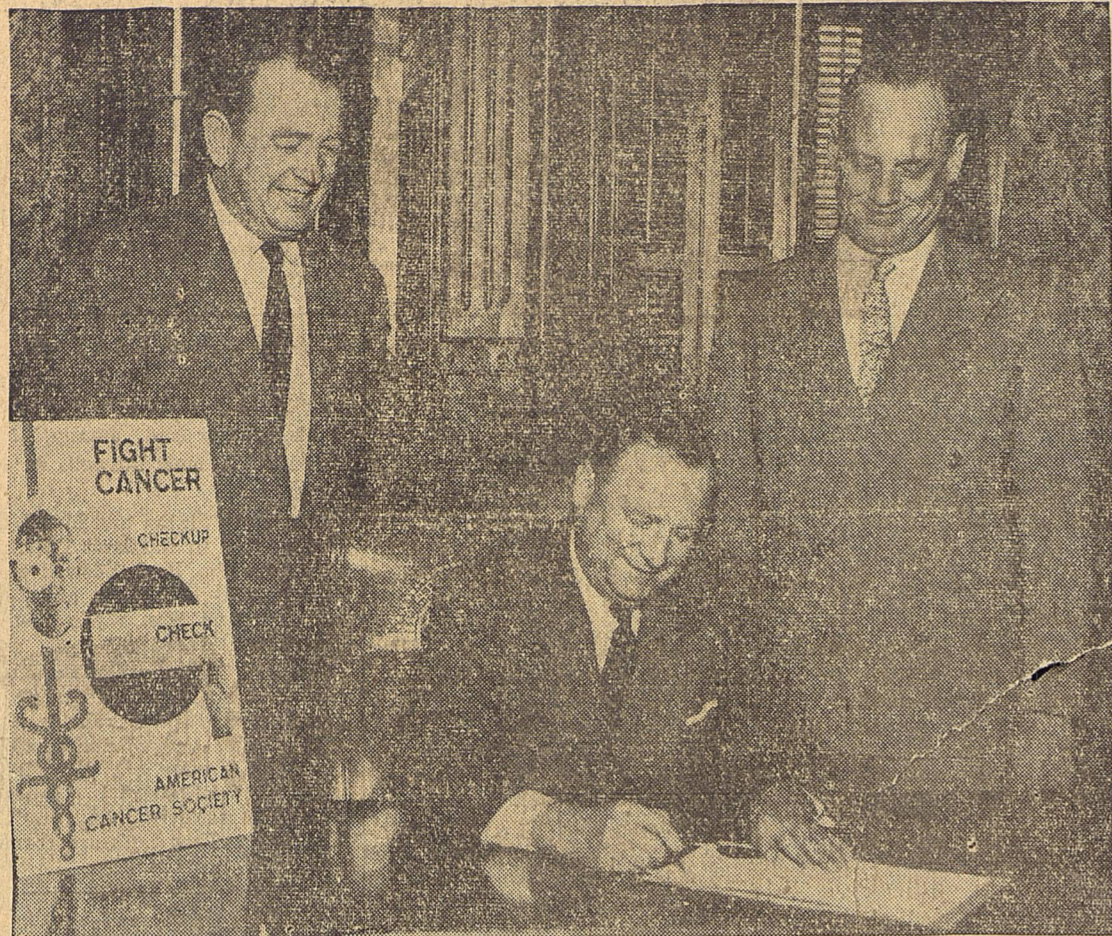

## Youthful Hub Cap Gang Swiped Only Fancy Ones

If the hub caps on your automobile are plain ones you probably didn't have any trouble with the gang of youths who stole hundreds of dollars worth of hub caps in Ranger and Eastland.

If, however, you had hub caps on the fancy side, you probably missed at least one of them.

The group of teenagers—some of them not even yet in their teens, in fact—specialized in "fancy caps." They preferred the extra large type that do not come with your factory equipped car regularly. Some of the hub caps cost as much as \$60 for a set of four.

A check of hub caps rounded up by officers shows that the boys stole only the best. The plain hub caps just didn't interest them.

Members of the Sheriff's staff, and police from Eastland and Ranger were still questioning boys today. A large number have been questioned and Chief Deputy Sheriff Johnny Boyd said 16 have been definitely implicated.

A hearing had not been set this morning, but the youths probably will go before the county juvenile judge sometime this week.

### Carbon Senior Play Thursday Night at Eight

The Senior Class of Carbon High School will present its class play, "It's a Girl," a comedy in three acts, by Dwight W. Jensen, Thursday night at 8 p.m. in the school auditorium.

The prices are 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

Deputy Boyd said that in addition to boys from Eastland and Ranger, some boys from Carbon have now been implicated. He said that it was a group of Eastland boys who set fire to the Church of God building, however. No boys from Ranger or Carbon were involved in that incident.

He said that somehow the boys had a key to the car made and took it from the parking lot at night. They drove to Eastland, he admitted, and stole a number of hub caps. Then they returned the car to the parking lot. Later they tried to "borrow the car again, but it was in a showroom and they couldn't get to it.

Chief Deputy Boyd said the gang had been operating in the two towns since sometime last Summer. He said boys from towns were working together.

Officers had not issued a call Tuesday morning for owners of the hub caps to pick them up. They are holding them as evidence for the time being.

## Livestock Judging To Begin Saturday

As of this morning indications were that there will be four bands in this year's Eastland County Sheriff's Posse parade which will kick off the annual County Livestock Show, sponsored by the County Livestock Raisers Association.

Five bands were invited to participate and only the Cisco band, which the director said had a previous engagement, has turned down the invitation. That will mean that high school bands from Eastland, Ranger, Rising Star and Gorman will march in the parade, to be held Friday.

From all indications a large number of floats will also be entered in the parade. Floats are expected from all towns in the county, according to Sheriff's Posse spokesmen. The Posse itself, rated as just about the top men's riding group in this part of the nation, will be on hand, of course, as will the prize winning Posse Anns.

The Stock Show itself will be held at the Eastland Airport.

Deadline for all livestock to be on the ground properly entered and in their respective places is noon Friday.

Judging will begin Saturday. Judging of Angora goats is scheduled for 8:30 a.m., judging of breeding classes of sheep will take place at 9 a.m., fat lambs will be judged at 9:30, fat pigs will be judged at 10 a.m., judging of breeding classes of beef cattle will begin at 1 p.m., fat steers are to be judged at 2 p.m. and at 3 p.m. judging of dairy cattle begins.

C. M. McCain is general show superintendent and Johnny Aaron and Keith McDonald are assistant general superintendents. Superintendent of the swine division is David Massengale. Walter Kurklin, assisted by Bob Leveridge, is superintendent of the sheep and goat division, Earnest Reich and Marshall Berry are superintendents of the dairy cattle division, Clinton Humphreys is superintendent of the fat steer division and Ed Harrison and A. D. Campbell are superintendents of the beef cattle division.

Rules for the journalism scholarship award have been forwarded to high school principals and newspaper editors and publishers throughout West Texas.

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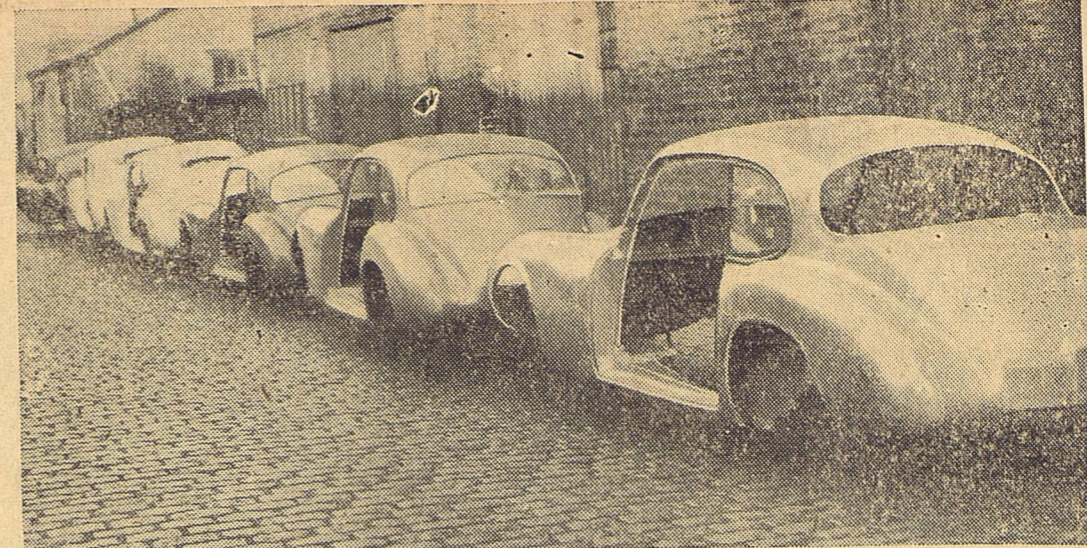

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The economic theories I studied in school are either wrong, or the changes which have occurred through the years have reversed or erased most concepts of that time.  
Never before has a continued rise in unemployment taken place at the same time that there has been a continued rise in the cost of living.

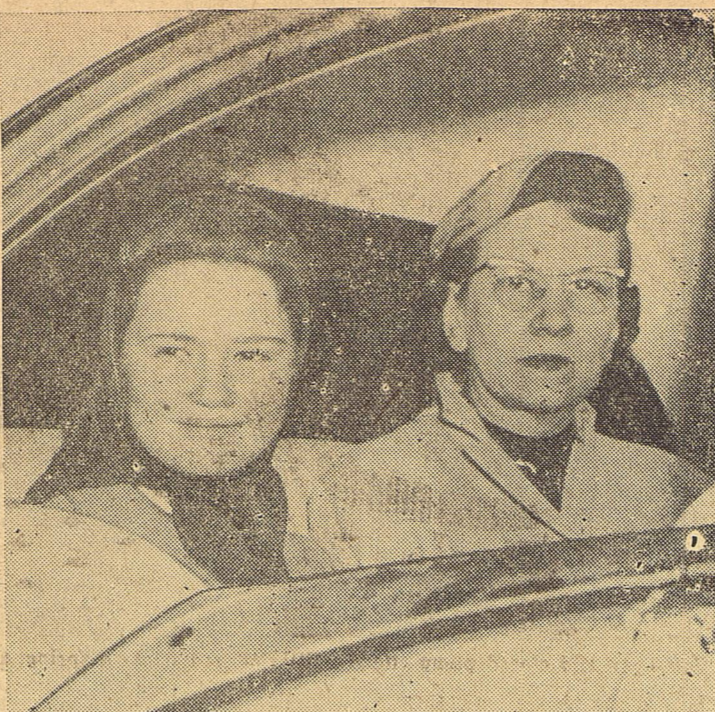
Living costs continue to increase, and so do wages. Wages increase during unemployment. We are in a "recession" and we have inflation.  
Which came first, the chicken or the egg? Obviously, it is the opinion of the majority of the "learned" people in Washington that there is no need for an answer to this age old question. Their idea seems to be that Government will bail out everything and everybody.  
By reason of the high living costs, Secretary of Agriculture Benson is beginning to get substantial support from the cities. City people have been led to believe that the high cost of food is attributable directly to the high farm price supports. Little consideration is given to the fact that the farmers' purchasing power continued to decrease while all these other things are taking place.  
The Department of Agriculture was created in the interest of farmers and agriculture. A century ago 65 per cent of the people lived on farms. The farm population was down to 26 per cent twenty-five years ago. In 1957 only 12 per cent of the population lived on farms. Between 1950 and 1957 nearly five million more persons left the farms. Thus, the consumer, believing that the farmer is the cause of the high prices of food, can really get in the

saddle.  
The new Soviet Ambassador in Washington, Mikahal Menshikov, is unlike any Russian who has appeared on the scene in Washington. He is personable, agreeable, and seemingly has a smile on every occasion. Where his predecessors lived in seclusion, Ambassador Menshikov is on hand at every opportunity when three or more are gathered together. Undoubtedly the new Ambassador is making friends and influencing people.  
Latest incelligence reports say that the Soviet home front and satellite troubles, plus military weaknesses, will keep Russia peaceful for several years. The reports indicate little chance of even a limited warfare involving Russia. At the same time, they will continue to foment unrest and difficulty in the Middle East and Africa. These are real trouble spots and fertile fields in which to raise trouble.

Watch developments in the situation involving France, Tunisia and Morocco. Within the next week or ten days, something has got to "give" or there is a chance for a blow-up.  
Any blow-up in Tunisia would not create a loud explosion by itself. The after-effects in the whole Arab World and in Africa would be tremendous.  
France can either save Tunisia, Morocco and much of the Arab Middle East, pull North Africa from the West or can plunge into Tunisia and lose much, if not all, of this important area and millions of people, to the Soviet orbit of influence.  
Another week or so may determine which of these conditions will prevail.

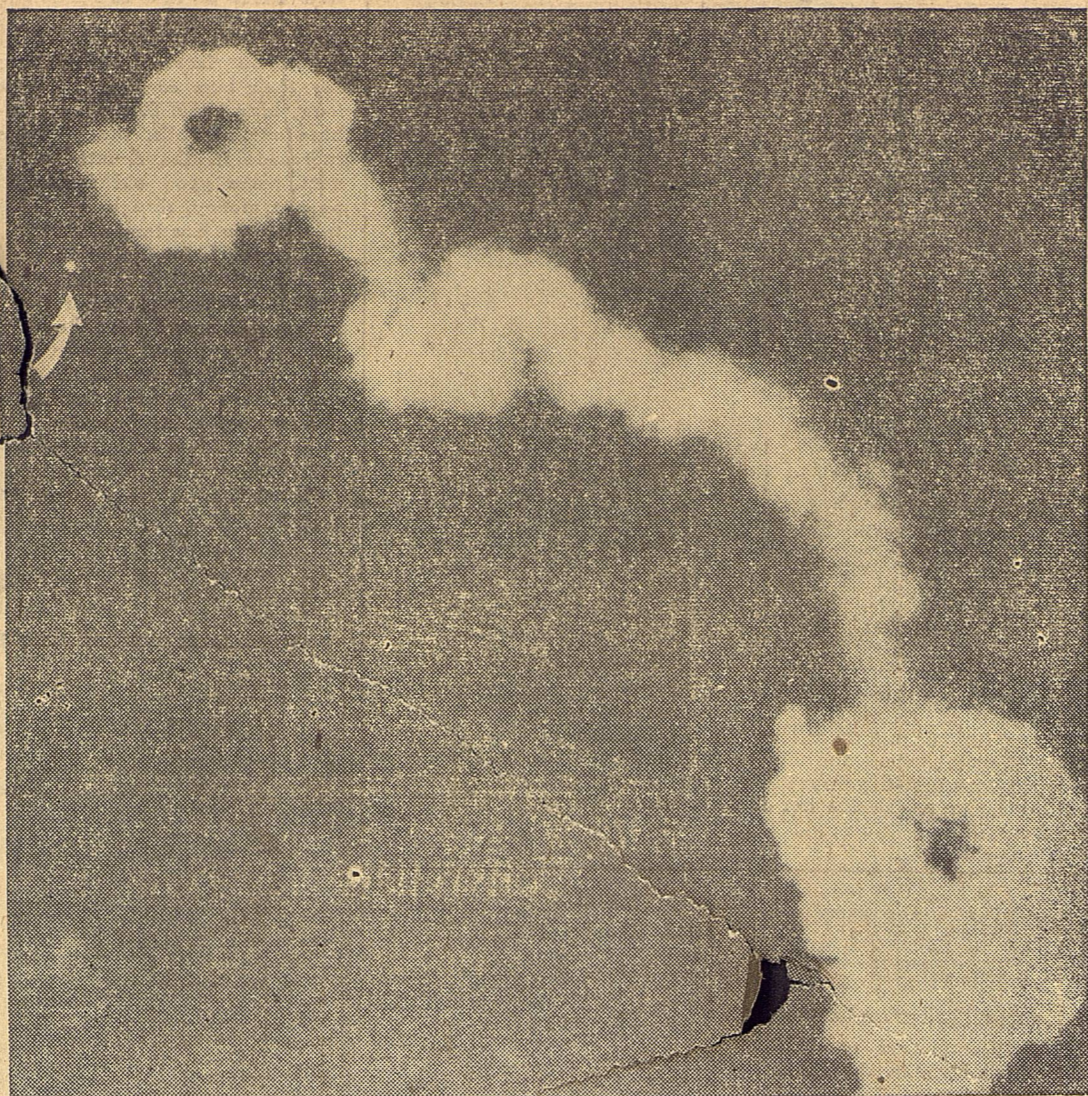

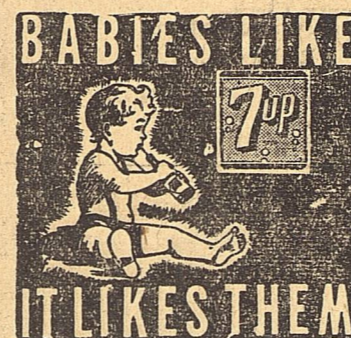
## Texas Composers Day Is Noted By Music Study Club Wednesday

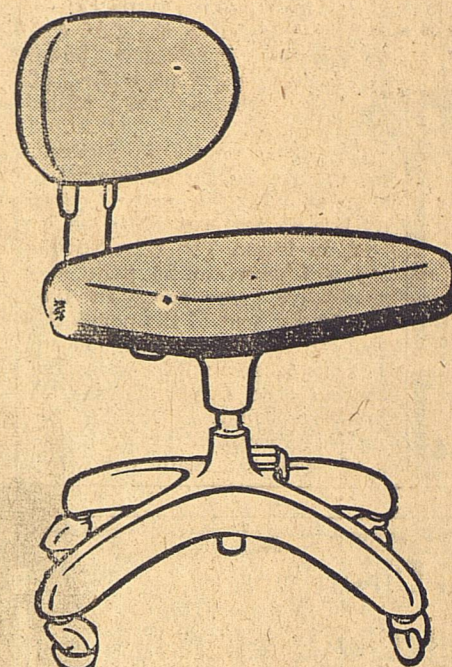
