Chrysler Shows Shipping Jump During 1953

A record 34 per cent increase in shipments of Chryslers during 1953 over 1952 is reported by E. C. Quinn, president, Chrysler Division, Chrysler Corporation.

During 1953 Chrysler shipped 156,366 cars as compared to shipments of 116,693 cars during 1952 he reported.

"It is interesting to note that the demand for our FirePower V-8's is steadily increasing," Mr. Quinn said.

"In 1952 we shipped 70,208 V-8's and in 1953 increased demand resulted in shipments of 80,844, representing an increase of 15.2 per cent."

Quinn contrasted this with the year 1950—the year before introduction of the FirePower V-8 when 40,927 straight-eights were shipped, out of a total of 164,730. This, he said, represented 24.8 per cent of Chrysler Division's total

production, the remainder being in six-cylinder automobiles.

"That V-8 power and performance are growing rapidly in public popularity is evidenced by the fact that in the past year our V-8 production accounted for 51.7 per cent of our production. In 1953 we shipped 75,512 six-cylinder automobiles," Quinn said.

This record year is the second highest in Chrysler history, being exceeded only by 1950 in the number of cars shipped, Quinn said.

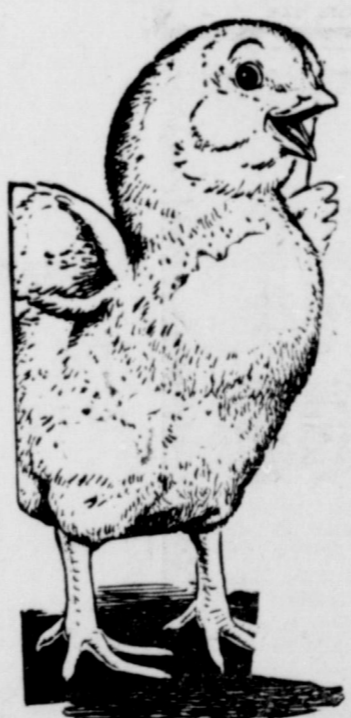

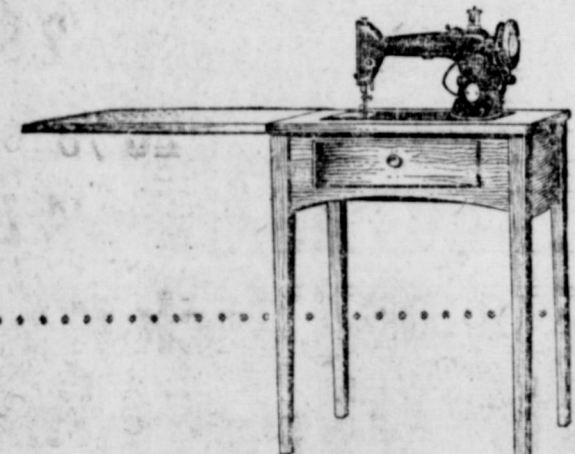

As It Looks From Here Only Senate Needs To Pass Bill To Up Cotton Allotments For '54

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Spl.)—From mail received, there is evidently considerable confusion as to the present status of legislation having to do with cotton allotment.

Before the Congress adjourned last year, the House of Representatives passed a bill increasing the national allotment from 17 1/2 million acres to 22 1/2 million acres. In that bill was a provision that farmers allotted acreage which they did not intend to use, could turn it back to the county committee for reallocation to farmers whose acreage was short. This could be done without prejudicing the cotton planting history of the farm turning back such acreage.

The bill also allows the county committees to request that they be permitted to use the County Factory system, or to allot acreage to the individual farmer on the basis of his cotton planting history.

These three provisions of the measure are highly important to our area. We also contended that we should be allowed to count

acreage prepared for planting but not planted because of the drought. The Secretary of Agriculture has refused to go along with this contention although he has ample authority to allow it.

The Senate did not get around to taking action on the bill completed by the House of Representatives. Since the present session is a part of the 83rd Congress, which started the first of 1953, it is not necessary that the House of Representatives re-pass this bill, but only that the Senate take action. It is hoped and expected that the Senate will speedily pass this measure, although it is not expected they will increase the national allotment to more than about 21 or 21 1/2 million acres. This, however, would be a great help and would mean a lot to our area. Particularly are the other provisions important to us.

The second session of the 83rd Congress is now underway, with President Eisenhower having delivered his State of the Union message. He delivered it in person before a joint meeting of the House of Representatives and the Senate. As usual, it was a colorful and historic occasion.

The President discussed foreign

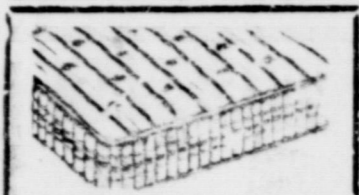
affairs, including foreign trade; defense; his atomic energy proposal; internal security; our domestic economy, including taxes and the budget; agriculture and conservation; labor and welfare; health, education and housing.

Necessarily, the President must submit special messages and recommendations later on, specifically dealing with a number of issues referred to in his State of the Union message. For instance, he will wait for a report of a special commission on foreign trade before he makes definite recommendations. A separate message will be sent to the Congress on the budget and on taxes. His reference to an agricultural program was rather brief but he will have a special and detailed recommendation within the next few days. Likewise, he is to send special recommendations spelling out his views on amendments to the Taft-Hartley Act.

To know definitely how one stands on the President's full program, it is necessary to wait until all his views have been presented. This is the first of a series which I shall endeavor to present to my constituency each week throughout the year. It will be my intention to describe and report the work of the Congress and matters relating to our Government.

Some women have made tremendous amounts of money from a combination of cheesecake and athletic prowess, says "Cheesecake." Two outstanding examples are Esther Williams, swimmer, and Sonja Henie, ice skater.

By the twentieth century, "womanly dignity" was just a quaint phrase to female athletes. Television—and its demand for fast action—has made it even quaint.

Two roughly similar phenomena have appeared on the video screen—roller rimbies and lady wrestlers. TV brought new blood such as Toughie Brashun, Slugger Kealy, and Dottie Gertie Scholl to the roller derbies. World title holder among the lady wrestlers (who add feminine hair pulling and "rights tearing to male grunts and groans") is Mildred Burke, pushing 40, who is still billed as the Pin Up Girl Who Pins 'Em Down.
Mildred may have shocked the nineteenth century, but male acceptance of cheesecake in sports today, says "Cheesecake," is complete.

Novelty Dessert

For a "different" dessert, try steamed orange balls. Cream 1-3/4 cup butter with 2-3 cup granulated sugar. Add 2 beaten eggs, and grated rind and juice of 2 oranges. Sift 1-1/2 cups flour, 1-2 teaspoons baking powder and first mixture. Fill greased custard cups 1-2 full; tie waxed paper or aluminum foil firmly over top and steam in covered kettle or top of your automatic gas range for 45 minutes. Serve with foamy orange sauce made as follows: Beat 2 egg whites stiff; gradually add 3-4

cup powdered sugar, juice and rind of 1 orange, plus juice of 1-2 lemons.
