



Water Over Top Of Lake Leon Spillway

Subsoil Moisture Best Since 1949

Eastland ended one record rain month and got off to a good start in another one Wednesday. That news, combined with the announcement from Lake Leon that the lake had for the first time gone over the spillway, that subsoil moisture is the best it has been since 1949 and that crops look just wonderful," made everyone have a big smile on today.

A total of 6.33 inches fell during April and an additional .37 has already been recorded here during the first two days of May.

Water began seeping over the spillway at Lake Leon Wednesday afternoon. This is the first time in the Lake's history that water has not past the big dam. It is now capacity full, holding 28,000 acre-feet of water.

Soil conservation men in this district have just completed an extensive survey of subsoil moisture conditions. Here is their report:

"Our land is really soaking up the rain. Present subsoil moisture conditions are better than we have had since about 1949. For this we may give thanks for the wonderful rains of the past ten days and our good cover of winter grasses and small grain which is helping us soak up the water. We have had more rain and our land was in better shape to receive it than has happened in a long time. Ten days ago soil moisture was getting low but since then most localities have received around six inches of rain and a surprising amount has actually gone in the soil.

"Mixed land and sandy land pastures with a good grass cover are saturated from five to six feet deep, and moisture is still percolating downward. This land has probably gained about six inches of water, with negligible runoff. On the other hand the same soil types with light needle grass and annual winter weed cover moisture has penetrated only one and a half to two feet. It is estimated this land has only two to possibly three inches of water in the ground.

"Moisture in mesquite flats and other hard land pastures looks especially good. Most of this land

has grown a cover of winter grass which has allowed the rain to wet deeper than it has in many years. This land is generally wet to field capacity three to four feet deep. This land holds about two inches of water per foot of depth, and thus holds enough moisture to grow a lot of grass this summer. Where this land was bare last fall and now has only a light fallow cover moisture has penetrated only about a foot. Such places hold less than two inches of actual water. Not sufficient moisture to grow much grass.

"The moisture picture has really changed on hard land grain fields. Ten days ago moisture was critical on most fields with plants wilting in many places. Today these fields are soaked three or four feet deep. They have absorbed most of the rain and prospects of a grain crop are good indeed.

"It takes water to grow grass, and it takes grass litter to get water in rangeland. Our present moisture in the ground gives us an excellent opportunity to allow our ranges to recover from the effects of a prolonged drought. Conservation minded livestock farmers are now making plans to take advantage of this opportunity through proper stocking and range deferments to grow more grass in the years ahead.

"Rainfall has interrupted the construction of ponds and terrace systems the past few days. Several ponds being built filled with water and will have to be pumped before they are completed, and it will be several days before terracing equipment can get back in the fields. A few farmers got some grass planted before it rained, others will be planting as soon as they can get in the fields."

County Citizens Will Share In New Bond Rates

Eastland County citizens, who purchased \$621,961 worth of U.S. savings bonds during 1956, will share in improved interest rates on new purchases of Series E and I saving bonds, Guy Parker, county chairman, announced today.

Parker said Series E and H bonds purchased currently will now yield 3 1/4 percent per annum, compounded semi-annually, when held to maturity. The former rate was three percent.

Parker gave the following information on the increased interest rates:

Another improvement in the new bonds is higher interest paid to holders who find they have to cash their bonds prior to maturity. Both redemption values for the new E bonds and interest payments on the new H bonds are substantially increased for the earlier years.

For example, the redemption value of a new E bond is increased to as to yield 3 percent at the end of 3 years, compared with 2 1/4 percent heretofore, and to yield 3.20 percent at the end of 6 years, compared with 2.64 percent heretofore.

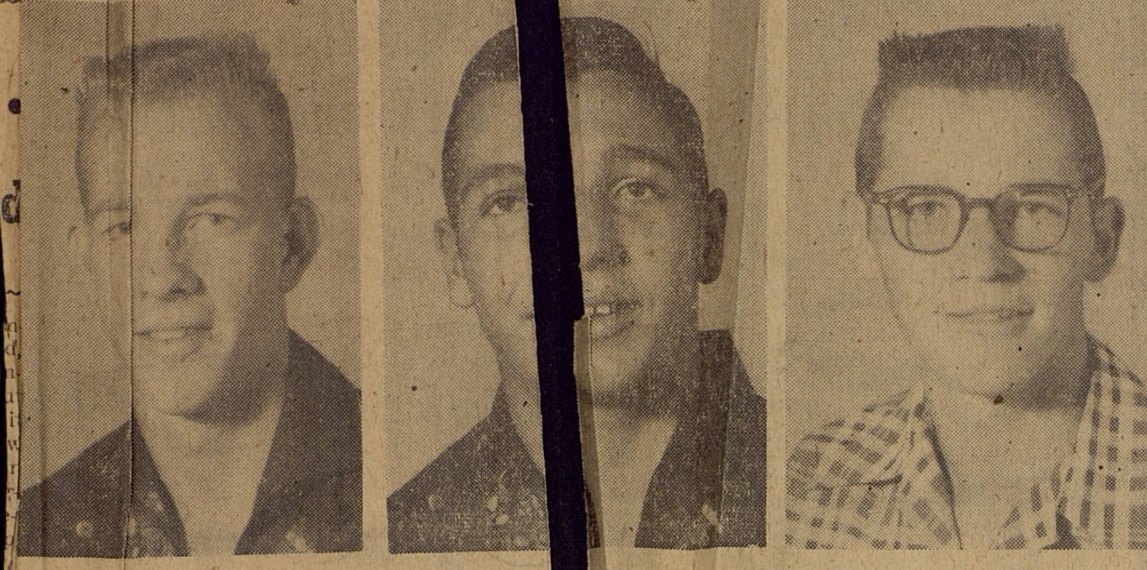
The improved rates apply automatically to all E and H bonds purchased on or after February 1 persons who have bought these bonds since that date need not take any further action to assure getting the improved terms. This is true even though the E and H bonds purchased since February 1 may have imprinted on them the former (and now obsolete) tables of redemption values or interest payment scales. The issue date shown on each bond will be controlling in determining the actual redemption value or scale of interest payments, and banks and other paying agents have been furnished tables of the new values.

The new E bonds mature in 3 years and 11 months and the new H bonds in 10 years. Both issues formerly matured in 9 years and 8 months.

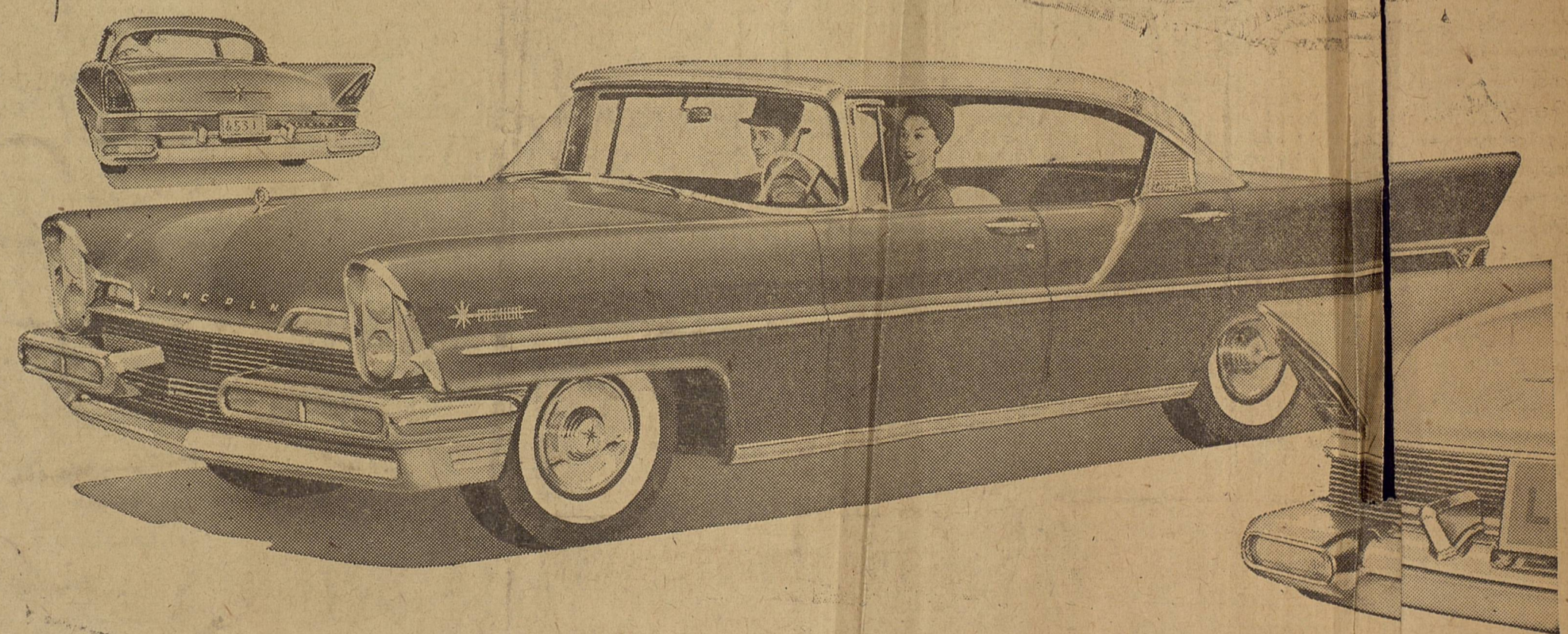

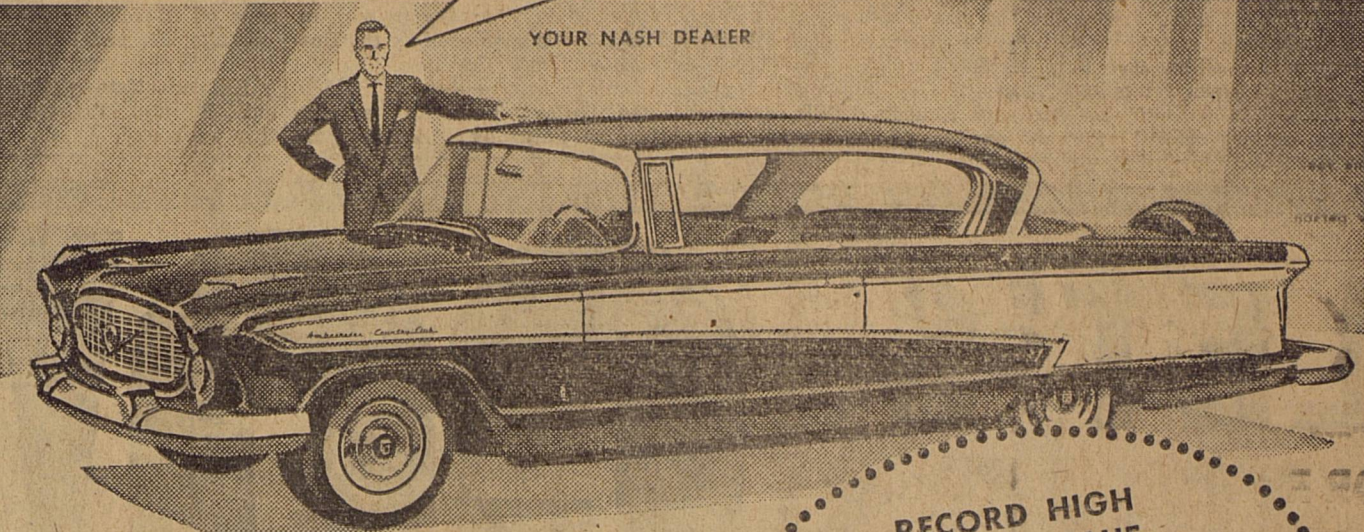

"Urge stores not to stock asphalt coated sacks. Ask them to concentrate on selling plastic dot, plastic coated and plain duck sacks. That way, we'll all benefit," he stressed.

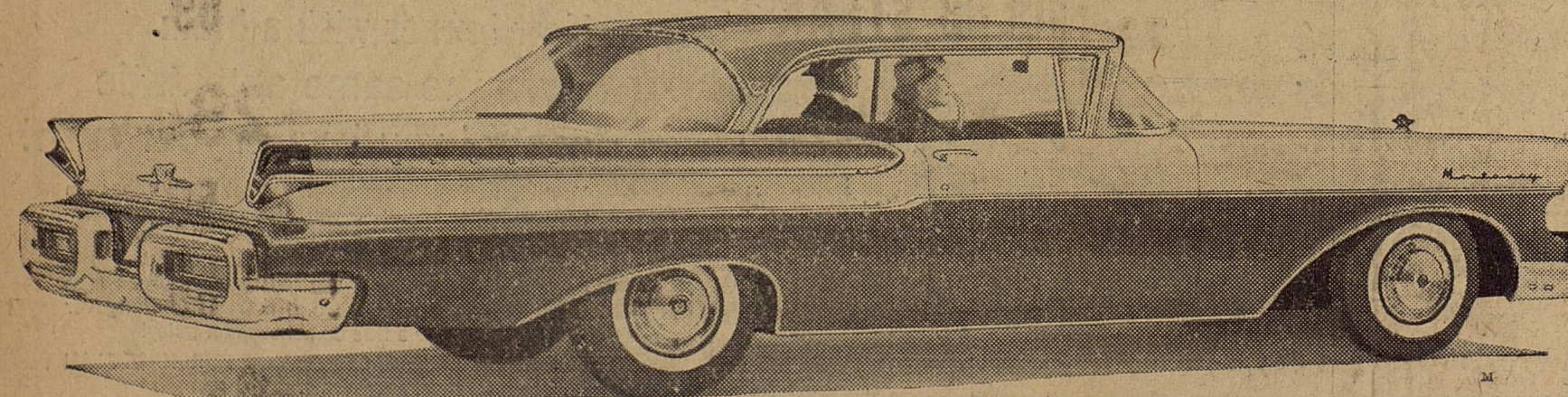

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

When the new junior United States Senator from Texas made his first State-wide race (in 1938 for Attorney General), your columnist handled the publicity in his campaign and we traveled together for six months.

There were lots of opportunities to observe his campaign. He was absolutely tireless and went at top speed from morning till night. When he went up to a group of say, five men and one boy, he would shake hands with each one, including the lad, and hand him a card, as he did all the rest. I commented on this and Judge Yarborough said, "When I was a boy and a candidate came up to a group of voters, he never saw me at all and I felt 'left out.'"

In meeting a voter, the Judge would always learn his name and make some comment, such as, "Are you any kin to the doctor by that name over in Palestine?" The answer usually was, "No, but I've heard of him." When I remarked afterward that Texas was a big State—(hardly a novel comment!)—and that it would take a lot of time to inquire about the kin-folks of every man he met, the Judge replied that a man takes pride in his name; he likes to feel that it stands for something in the eyes of others and, if he himself had not achieved deeds that the world considers great, he takes a

measure of pride in the fact that someone else bearing that name has given it some degree of renown.

He was right, of course. Senator Yarborough has a good sense of humor. During that 1938 campaign, he entered a lawyer's office and introduced himself. The attorney said, "Yes Judge, I've been hearing lots of good things about you among the people here." After leaving the office, the candidate walked down stairs—(the office was on the second floor)—and then paused at the foot of the steps to consider for a moment which way to go. As he stood there, he heard the lawyer call to his secretary, "What did that young man say his name was?"

When the Judge came back to the car, he chuckled as he related the incident.

Notary Publics Must Request New Appointments

Secretary of State Zollie Steakley has announced that he will reappoint persons now holding notary commissions but that such persons must re-qualify by the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1 and June 10.

Steakley emphasized that notaries public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires the County Clerks to approve notary bonds. In Eastland County, Johnson Smith, county clerk, approves bonds.

Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between May 1 and May 20. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of reappointing present notaries.

Secretary of State Steakley further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a notary public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

Masters Degree from Bread Loaf School of English, Middleburg College, Vermont. She spent one summer in Europe as graduate student of Texas Christian University English Seminar travel group. She is a member of the Eastland Methodist Church, Alpha Gamma Delta, Midland Little Theatre. She will be counted among the many returning for the Eastland High School Homecoming in June.
