College Grads of 1957 to Be In Big Demand

MINNEAPOLIS—Earlier, faster and more furious than last year—this describes employer competition for the services of college graduates of 1957.

On many campuses, the number of employing firms represented is greater than the number of seniors available for employment.

Various corporations are now trying to set up campus interviewing schedules for the next five years—up to and including the class of June, 1962.

Employment scouts are so numerous that some schools have been hiring hotel facilities for group interviews—to supplement the schools' one-on-one interview rooms.

Salary offers are up \$20 to \$40 a month over last year's record figures, and are edging still higher as commencement time nears.

Columbia University reports that in all areas, including liberal arts, there are more employing companies represented this spring than there are available senior candidates for jobs.

One hurried placement official declared the major difficulty to be simply "a problem of trying to maintain opportunity for would-be employers to get together with would-be employees, and still save out a little time for seniors to attend classes."

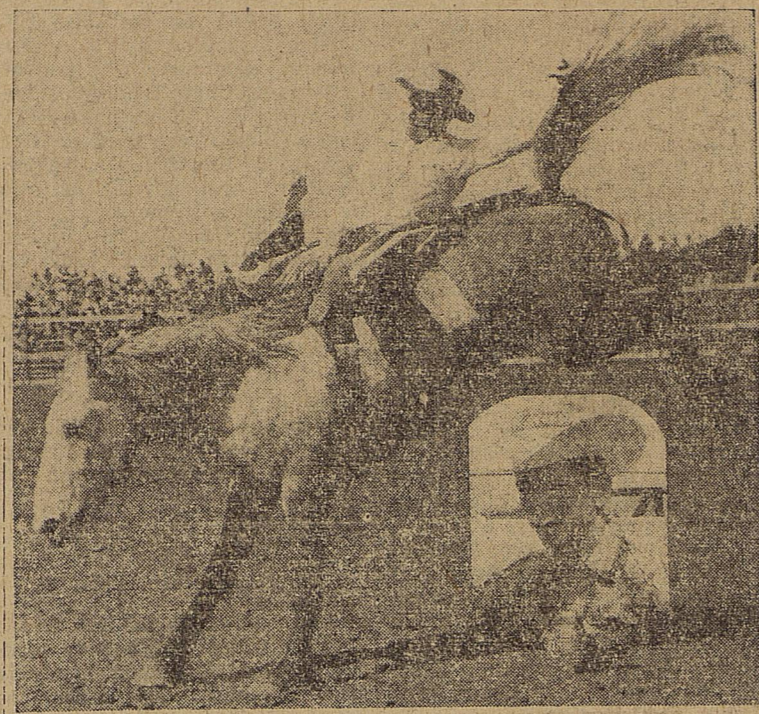
Regular Field Try Is Staked Near Gorman

David Fry, cashier of the Eastland National Bank, will attend a two weeks school of banking at LSU.

Fry will be one of 13 Texans in the class of 150 at the School of Banking of the South. This will be the first session of the three semester course.

Fry will enroll June 2 and his wife will stay with her parents in Sulphur, La. during the two weeks.

These high-school boys and girls meet (in groups of about a dozen) one night each week in JA centers, usually unused space in a downtown office building which can be partitioned off into shops for woodworking, plastics manufacture, printing and metal-working.

The groups form small corporations, each sponsored by a business firm in the community. Directed and helped, but not pushed, by three adult advisers (one for production, one for sales and one for accounting), the youngsters choose a product or service, sell 50-cent shares of stock to friends and neighbors to raise working capital, then develop and sell the product or service—or try to.

All company members are workers, including the officers. They keep books and pay themselves hourly rates. At the end of the school year they liquidate the company, and if the enterprise has been a success, pay back to the stockholders and declare dividends and bonuses.

More than 2000 of these miniature corporations now operate in 61 industrial areas. Their life-span is only about 30 weeks, yet this brief period gives bright youngsters opportunity to develop ingenuity in grappling with the same problems of production, sales and management that are encountered by every business.

Production ordinarily gets under way two to four weeks after a corporation is created—and the first thing the youngsters meet is trouble. Not one of the 150-odd groups I visited had escaped it. One JA group's supplier ran out of leftover redwood for the hanging flower baskets they were manufacturing; another miniature corporation sank all of its money (Continued on Page Two)

## Worse Than Needless School Aid Bill Faces Bleak Future

The House education and labor committee, refusing to face the political facts of life, has reported out a \$1,500,000,000 bill for federal aid to the states for school construction.

The committee did make a faint bow in the direction of public opposition to this particular measure and to big spending in general. It knocked \$500,000,000 off the amount the sub-committee had recommended. It gave scant consideration to a Democratic bill calling for a six-year \$3,600,000,000 program.

As the bill comes to the House floor it calls for a five-year program, at \$300,000,000 a year in grants to be matched by the states. The President had asked for a four-year program at the rate of \$325,000,000 a year.

But even before this measure reached the floor its size had become comparatively unimportant. Of all the new spending programs before Congress, it has the least chance of passage. It's about as dead a pigeon as if it had been buried in committee.

Much has been made of Southern opposition to federal aid to school construction based on the undoubted fact that an amendment to deny aid to segregated schools will be brought up on the floor although voted down in committee.

But the integration issue is not the decisive one. There are plenty of other arguments swaying opponents to this measure. Two big ones are determination to keep control of schools at the local level, and to hold down federal expenditures. Congress, striving to inject a measure of fiscal sanity into the 1958 budget, simply isn't going to pass this new spending measure. Although calling for "only" \$1,500,000,000 in five years, all past experience indicates that if adopted it would snowball through the years under pressure from the National Education Assn. and the bureaucrats.

Finally, there is no real need for federal aid for school construction. The backlog of needed classrooms is being whittled down, and will be wiped out by the states and communities themselves if they continue to stand on their own two feet in this respect.

As Raymond Moley, Chronicle columnist, concluded after careful study in several of the states which would be unable to meet their own needs if any were, there isn't a state in the Union that can't solve the school building problem for itself.
