Ranger Boys "Road-Blocked" By Ft. Worth Cops In "Robbery"

Little did Jackie Neeley and Dale Cozart know when they left Ranger Wed. morning to visit a twirling school at TCU that they were soon to have the biggest portion of Cow Town law enforcement officers' down on their necks.

With Jackie driving his daddy's green and white Chevrolet, the two boys were approaching the traffic circle on the western city limits of Fort Worth where four carloads of plain clothes detectives had thrown up a road block.

Not recognizing it for what it was, Jackie drove his car carefully through the block and kept going until his rear view mirror told him that a car was bearing down on him from behind. The car was coming at great speed, weaving in and out among other cars, passing them on the wrong side, and violating every other known rule of the road. Pretty soon the occupants of the car began blowing the horn and waving the two boys to pull over and stop.

The car had nothing on it to identify it as a police car, and its occupants looked like a bunch of rough characters out of a gangster movie. Jackie said his first thought was that they were being held up and high-jacked.

Jackie and Dale pulled over to the side of the road and stopped, fearing they would be shot if they didn't, and the men in the pursuit car unloaded with guns bristling.

The surprised youngsters were told not to start shooting or to try anything violent because they were covered from all sides and were wanted for robbing a filling station in Weatherford.

Treasure Charged With Infringement Of Rights

An Eastland County farmer charged this week that County Treasurer Richard Cox refused to cash a check as turned over to the county for payment of work done for him by the county and also refused to give him a receipt of payment.

The farmer, W. H. Hailey of Route 1, Gorman, declared in a letter to the Eastland Telegram editor that County Treasurer Richard Cox "... infringed upon my rights as a tax payer and a free American citizen when he refused to give me a receipt for my check upon my request without proper authority to do so."

The letter to the Telegram editor was sent as a result of a news item carried in Tuesday's edition of the Eastland Telegram and Ranger Times telling of a "warm debate" between County Attorney Joe Nuessle and Cox concerning the check. Nuessle, asked by the commissioners court what could be done to get the money, said the Court could look to three places, "the farmer, the county treasurer or the county treasurer's bonding company."

At the commissioners court meeting Cox was asked several times by Nuessle if he had not been requested by the farmer to write him a receipt for the amount of the check. Each time the county treasurer said he had not. In Hailey's letter, he said that he requested Cox to write him a receipt on more than one occasion and the county official refused to do so.

Here are the contents of Hailey's letter:

"I read your account of the proceedings before the county commissioner's court last Monday regarding a check for about \$190 delivered to the county treasurer last March 'by a farmer' for terracing work done by Commissioner (B. M.) Bennett.

"Mr. Cox was reported as saying he had never been requested by the farmer to issue a receipt. That is not correct. I am the farmer involved. After my check had failed to be cashed for over a month I called on Mr. Cox and asked him to issue me a receipt. He refused saying Mr. Bennett had asked him to hold up on it until he had talked to me. I went to Judge (John) Hart's office and asked him if the commissioners court had entered an order not to accept my check and he said no. I went back and told Mr. Cox what the Judge said and if he did not issue me a receipt I would stop payment on the check. Again he refused, said it would make Mr. Bennett mad if he did so without seeing him first. The next day I

stopped payment on the check as I said I would. I understand that during the several weeks he held my check, Mr. Cox was requested once orally and once in writing by the county auditor to put the check in the county depository.

"I think Mr. Cox infringed upon my rights as a tax payer and a free American citizen when he refused to give me a receipt for my check upon my request without proper authority to do so.

"I have at no time been unwilling to pay this debt. Yesterday, June

12, I sent another check for this work and this time I expect to receive a receipt within a reasonable length of time."

Cox said Friday that the check had been deposited. He also again emphasized that he was acting under orders of Commissioner Bennett.

If it has been tradition in Eastland County for the commissioners court to go along as a body with whatever steps a commissioner takes in his precinct, although this does not stand the full letter of the law test.

Farm Tanks Full; Owners Want Fish

AUSTIN — Land owners whose stock tanks and farm ponds have been dry since they were built now are wanting fish to stock them, according to the Director of Inland Fisheries of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

On Tuesday the Department received 204 applications in one mail. During the past two weeks thousands of others have poured into the office.

Several of the hatcheries have been badly crippled by flood waters, curtailing the production materially. Applications will be processed and efforts will be made to distribute the fish as equitably as possible to the major impoundments, according to the Director. On ponds smaller than ten acres, no fish can be delivered by the Department before September 1. Owners, however, whose applications have been approved, can pick up fish by calling at the hatcheries. Since bass fry are no longer available, lakes in excess of 9 acres cannot be stocked with them before the spring of 1958.

Time to Get 1958 Wheat Allotments

Producers that do not have a 1958 wheat allotment may make application for a 1958 allotment. If there has been wheat grown on the farm in 1955, 1956 or 1957 the farm would be entitled to a regular allotment.

If a producer should be interested in an allotment for 1958, application may be made in the county ASC office.

The closing date for accepting applications is July 1, 1957.

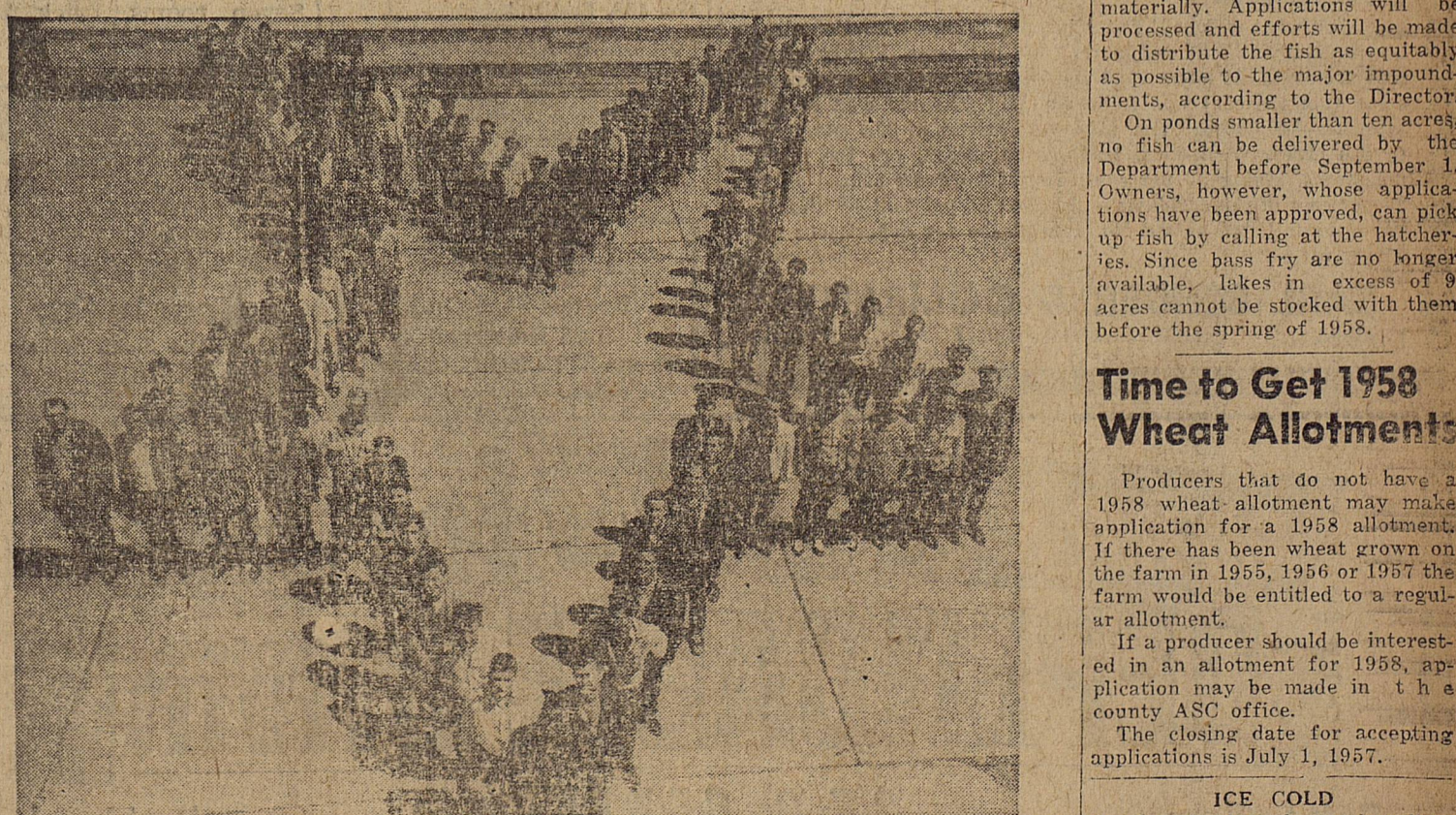

Status of Forces Treaty

The Status of Forces Treaty which the United States has with Japan and a number of other countries, and which is causing all the uproar today over Specialist William S. Girard and his up-coming trial for murder by a Japanese court, can be compared with the agreement you have with your baby sitter.

For example, you can tell your baby sitter that it is all right for her to spank your baby if he does something he is not supposed to do, but it is NOT all right for her to spank him if the baby does something you have told him he CAN do.

That is where all the trouble hinges in the Girard case. He was doing something he had been TOLD to do, and therefore Japan has no right whatsoever to "spank" him. Girard's own commanding general has said the boy was on duty and his actions were in the line of duty, when he fired a warning shot that killed a Japanese woman who was picking up scrap metal on the firing range.

The commanding general said that competition had become so great among the women picking up the scrap metal that it was almost impossible to keep them off the firing range. He said they had learned to time the firing practice and they were very much like spectators at a football game who swarmed onto the field a few seconds before the game was over.

On this particular occasion the American GIs who had been using the firing range were off for lunch, and Girard, among others, had been assigned as guards to keep the women off the field. This particular woman walked on to the field, and Girard fired a warning shot at her. He did not even fire a bullet. He fired an empty cartridge case that had been attached to a grenade launcher. It had about as much accuracy as a bunch of firecrackers tied together. The empty shell case accidentally hit the woman, causing her death.

Japan demanded that Girard be tried in a Japanese court for murder. For some unexplained reason that no body can figure out, the United States consented to turn him over. They are denying Girard his inherent constitutional right as a citizen of the United States to be tried by a jury. They have denied Girard all of his rights as an American citizen in order to appease a foreign government, whose cruelty against Americans during the war was hideous, infamous and unspeakable.

Fair minded people in the United States do not want to see any American boy made a sacrificial lamb to appease anybody. That is why they are objecting so loudly to the stand taken by Eisenhower and his henchmen in their rape of the democratic process.

The next time it could be your boy!

CAPTURE PICNIC SCENES



Picture possibilities on a picnic are infinite. And pictures in color and with depth—3-D, or stereo as they have become known—are just that much better to recall happy picnic occasions.

Stereo photography is easy to catch onto after a little experimentation. The simplest way to understand stereo is to think of your two eyes as the two lenses on a stereo camera, your brain becoming the film. What your eyes see is registered on your brain in two separate images; one from the left eye and the other from the right.

The difference between these images is slight, representing a shift in viewing position that is exactly the distance between the eyes.

Thus it is with stereo camera. It has two lenses, two shutters, and takes two pictures simultaneously. The images on the film duplicate those registered on your brain when you see the object being photographed.

To achieve the 3-D effect when looking at the finished picture, the two images must be viewed at the same time, either through a battery-illuminated hand viewer, as with stereo slides, or by projection on a screen or through a ground glass.
