

# Mavs End Season With 43-6 Win Over Dogs

## Moore... ABOUT EASTLAND by Virgil E. Moore

In our lowly opinion Eastland commissioners Thursday night made a mistake in not going along with recommendations from the State Highway Dept. for increasing speed limits on Highway 6.

The commission is due thanks for taking the advice of experts as to speed limits on Highway 80 and for initiating a study of speed limits here. We do not question the sincerity of those commissioners who held out against increasing speed limits. They argued that Highway 6 travels through some of the main residential areas of the city, and passes by one of the city's elementary schools. To increase the speed limits would be to increase the danger of having one child killed, they reasoned.

On paper that argument looks good. But in fact it just doesn't hold up. For the state recommended their new proposed speed limits after studying traffic conditions. They clocked traffic for one entire day, coming up with average speeds. So the truth of the matter is that all the City will accomplish by not increasing speed limits is to keep the State from putting up speed signs on the highway. For traffic already moves at the rate of speed recommended by the state.

I have long maintained that the reason traffic laws are always broken is that they are impractical in the first place. How many of you folks slow down to 20 miles per hour on Highway 6 for the six downtown blocks? You break the law every time you get on the highway. And how many of you stop for every stop sign in Eastland? Stop signs, like 20 mph speed limits, are in the main a joke. "Yield Right of Way" signs are proving to be a success all over the state, and experts say they cut down on accidents, not increase them.

You State Highway boys can wipe that smile off your faces too. For you folks are more to blame than anyone for stupid speed limits. Frankly, we do not know if you are bound by a Legislature-passed law that prohibits speeds of more than 60 mph or not. If you are it should be repealed. If you are not you should do something about it.

It's just plain stupid to reason that you can travel 60 mph on highway 6 between here and Carbon. A man is taking chances even getting on the highway. But that's what the sign says. Then it's kinda stupid to try to hold a man down to 60 mph on Highway 80 between here and Ranger. You have to keep your foot on the brake to go that slow in some of these new superdoozers.

## Speed Limits On 80 Upped Again By City

Eastland commissioners Thursday night voted to approve recommended speed limits for Highway 80, but turned thumbs down on new limits for Highway 6. The State Highway Department, at the request of the City, had surveyed both highways earlier this year and submitted their recommendations.

This was about the fourth time the problem had come up before the commission. Under the ordinance approved Thursday night new speed limits along Highway 80 will be as follows: From the west edge of the city limits to Madera Street, some nine city blocks, the limit will be increased to 45 miles per hour. From Madera to Connellee Street, another five blocks, the limit will be 40 miles an hour, and from Connellee to Green Street, three blocks, the limit will be 35. A 30 mph limit will be enforced from Green to Rosewood (four blocks including the square). From Rosewood to Halbryan, three blocks, the

limit will be 35 mph and from Halbryan to the east city limits the limit will increase to 40 mph. At present the top speed on the highway in the city is 30 miles an hour, and at points the limit is 20 miles an hour.

The State had recommended that limits on Highway 6 be changed as follows: The limit from the south city limits to Mulberry Street would be 45 mph, from Mulberry to Plummer (17 blocks) the limit would be 40 mph, and from Plummer to Patterson (five blocks) the limit would be 30. From Patterson to the T&P railroad track the limit would be 40 and from there to the city limits on the north the limit would be 45. The State also made provisions for a special 20 mph school zone.

At present, top speed along Highway 6 is 30 mph and some 20 mph zones are included. Commissioner Virgil Seaberry Jr. was the leader in opposing the new limits for Highway 6. He

pointed out that the highway ran through some of the city's best residential areas and by a school. Commissioner Cyrus Frost argued in favor of approving the recommendation, saying, "After all these figures were arrived at by experts and not by someone just picking a limit out of the air." He said he felt the State was better qualified to set the limit than the City Commission was. Bob Perkins seconded Seaberry's motion excluding Highway 6 and Jack Germany voted for the motion, giving it passage.

**Collections Good**

The monthly financial statement showed that \$33,151 had been collected in taxes during the past month. It was one of the most favorable statements commissioners had seen in months. County Attorney Joe Nussle, in a letter to Mayor Horace Horton, asked the City's opinion on pool halls operating in the city. City Manager James Young said police told him there had been no trouble here.

Young told City dads he was ready to start mailing out letters to persons owing delinquent personal taxes. The letter will state the unless back taxes are paid the City will take the matter to court.

**A Touchy One**

A touchy question concerning parking meters came up. Following a discussion, Manager Young was told to notify local automobile dealers that they would not be allowed to park their display cars on City parking meters in the future without "feeding the meter." Young was also to notify dealers to stop blocking public walks. Commissioner Frost made the motion and it was seconded by Seaberry. All voted favorably except Commissioner Perkins. Perkins didn't vote either way.

The Commissioner also turned down a request made by Chamber of Commerce Manager H. J. Tanner. Tanner had asked that parking meters be covered up on Saturdays from now until Christmas. Commissioners were unanimous in agreeing such a program would hurt rather than help businessmen. "Employees would park on the square," they concluded.

(Editor's Note: This is the 42nd in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston 1904.)

A gin plant was built by Mr. Winters in 1899. From the standpoint of modern machinery and up-to-date equipment it has no superior in the state.

**Carbon**

In 1881 the first lot in Carbon, a town on the Texas Central Railway, between Gorman and Cisco, was sold to H. S. Haynes, who put up a small business house. An attempt to move the town three miles east having failed, J. P. White established a lumber yard. Mr. Fowler and son put up a cotton gin, and Mr. Train taught school.

From the number of business houses in this little town, shops, hotels and gins, a good weekly newspaper, with a hustling editor, its bank soon to open in its own brick building; its Baptist and Methodist churches, Masonic hall and neat two-story school building, Carbon bids fair to rival some of her more pretentious sister towns. When to this is added the fertile soil (a sandy loam), which produces corn, cotton, and a very great variety of vegetables of enormous sizes; also fruit, as apples, peaches, pearms apricots and plums, as well as the grape

and berries of all kinds, one is not surprised that the country round about Carbon is being cultivated by thrifty farmers in rapidly increasing numbers.

Among the enterprising business people of Carbon are Finley Bros., dry goods; T. J. Morris, general merchandise; Puett & Son, dry goods; W. A. Seastrunk, hotel, and many others.

There are about 600 inhabitants.

Near this place Mr. J. H. Bradford, who has been in the county many years, successfully irrigates a truck patch.

The Mavs wasted no time in getting the show underway. Larry Hollis went over from the four after an 89 yard drive to make it 6-0. Kenneth Watson failed to convert.

It didn't take long to light up the scoreboard again. Quarterback Clint Humphrey intercepted a pass off the arm of Leon Crane and carried it to the Dog 28. Hollis went to the 20 on first down, then Fullback Saul Pullman carried to the 11. A penalty drove the Mavs back to the 16, then

ed a long 55 yard pass to Pullman for the score. Stamey's extra point try was wide.

Joe Martin got the final Maverick touchdown. From the Dog 46 Truman Lane carried to the 35 then Martin went to the 26. Lane then went to the 12 and Martin boomed across on the next play. Pullman attempted to convert, but his try was no good.

It was the easiest game of the year for the charges of Coaches Shelton and Jon Tate. The Mavericks moved at will against the Dogs, and Eastland reserves were more than a match for Clyde.

Albany downed Wylie 27-7 as expected to wrap up the district championship. The Lions will play Mason in bi-district play at Albany next Friday night at 7:30.

Gorman lost to Baird 19-0 to lose out in their bid to repeat as 7-B champions. The Panthers went into the final period with the score tied 0-0. A 15-yard penalty set up a Baird score early in the final stanza, however, and then two quick 50-yard punt returns put two more TD's on the scoreboard.

Ranger was upset by weak Winters, 14-6. It was the second win of the year for Winters, the other being over Cisco. The Dogs apparently were looking a week ahead at Hamilton, their bi-district foe. Their star back, David Wharton, was hurt in the game and wasn't at his best.





## Gray Matter

When that North Carolina billy goat butted Billy Graham down the hillside that old billy butted Howard Butt, Jr. right into the closing address of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Originally, the famed evangelist was scheduled to make the principal address at this convention. But for most of two weeks prior to the big event Billy Graham was confined to his home, and most of the time to his bedroom.

Texas Baptists weren't hurt, though. They had about as good a preacher, if not better, to address them in the form of a layman. There's a good moral here. Anytime a bunch of preachers get together and want to say something that amounts to something worth hearing, call on a layman to say it.

Howard Butt is as good a preacher as three-fourths of all the preachers who heard him at this convention. And for the 45 minutes he held the audience spellbound there wasn't a preacher present who could have done as well as he did.

He really singled the hinges of Hell in an all-out hellfire and damnation sermon. Right behind me, though, I heard a Baptist layman say something that somewhat disturbed me.

I heard this laymen ask another,

"I wonder why the knucklehead in the pulpit of my church doesn't preach like that sometime?"

That's bad. Baptist laymen shouldn't say things like that about Baptist ministers.

Don't Baptist laymen have any respect at all for their clergy; don't they have any respect for the dead?

The plain facts of the matter is that any preacher at the convention could, and often does, preach a sermon just as dramatic as the one the Corpus Christi grocerman preached. The thing of it is that most preachers know that if they do level down on the old devil with both barrels a lot of their own members would resent it. He knows some of his members would pull stakes and to someplace else, and if the preacher were to keep it up long enough he would be preaching in a short time to the biggest collection of empty seats he had stood in front of since he went out and walked through the empty football stadium.

Then, too, there is this to consider. The local pastor has to

(Continued from Page One) preach two sermons every Sunday. That's 104 a year, but we'll give him a couple of Sundays off for his vacation, so he still preaches 100 times a year.

To do what Howard Butt did at this convention one has to prepare only one sermon. Anyone can do that. Almost anyone can deliver a real soul-stirrer once every few months, but it takes lot of real hard work and thoughtful prayers to deliver two sermons a week. That takes a bit of doing.

A man can be an evangelist on the radio, speaking to some of the biggest crowds ever assembled anywhere and get by on about 30 sermons. About the longest one of these evangelists stays at one place is a month, and if he speaks every day about 30 sermons will get him by. He then can go to the next town and deliver the same 30 sermons again, like the old-time vaudeville performer could use the same set of jokes all season.

The local pastor can't do that, though, without repeating himself. And if a pastor in Our Town were to repeat himself a couple of time the board of his church would run him off faster than they would a bum on the back steps trying to mooch a free meal.

Please, don't misunderstand me. I'm not opposed to the radio evangelists who speak to the big crowds and put on such a good show. I think they are fine. They do a tremendous amount of good. The Tuesday morning session (beginning of the convention proper) will feature an annual report by TFB Secretary - Treasurer Loys D. Barbour, Iowa Park; and the annual address by TFB President J. Walter Hammond, Tye. Recognition ceremonies to honor counties and individuals who have made outstanding accomplishments in membership work, service programs and public relations will also be held Tuesday morning. Lynn and Gov. Daniel will speak at the afternoon session.

District caucuses of voting delegates will be held at 4 p.m. that day to nominate directors. Williams will be banquet speaker that evening. A dance will be held after the banquet.

On the final day of the convention, Wednesday, Nov. 20, the more than 600 official voting delegates will meet in business session to debate and vote on proposed state policies and recommendations to the national convention. This is the culmination of the Farm Bureau's policy development process on the state level.

Adopted resolutions pertaining to state issues will become policies to guide the TFB through next year. Adopted resolutions on national matters become recommendations to the national convention.

More than 180 organized county Farm Bureaus in Texas have already held their annual conventions and have forwarded their recommendations on state and national issues to the Texas Farm Bureau. A 39-member state resolutions committee will meet Nov. 13 in Dallas to write tentative resolutions based on recommendations from the counties. These tentative resolutions will be submitted to the voting delegates Nov. 20 at the concluding session.




