MANUFACTURERS FROM WEST TEXAS AREA ARE ORGANIZED FOR DEFENSE

ABILENE, July 18.—Pools of West Texas manufacturers, fabricators and machine shops for cooperative participation in national defense contracts are being organized at several key points, said two announcements today by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

This will be because the raw materials needed in the national defense are going under priorities classifications, with many materials in common use already on a ration basis. Soon it will be impossible to get these unless the operator applying for a priorities rating can show that he is engaged in, or is bidding on, a defense contract.

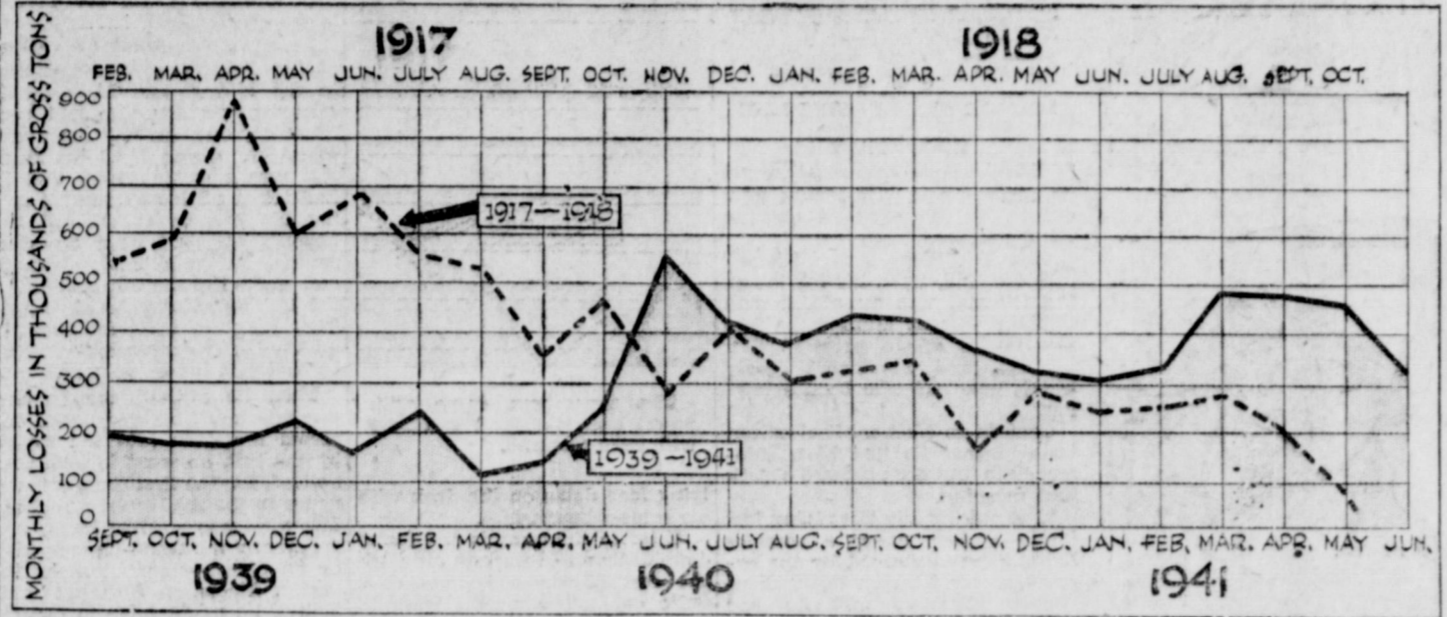


Chart compares British and allied shipping losses during current war with World War losses. British sources believe decrease for June shows way to further effectiveness of British and American patrols.

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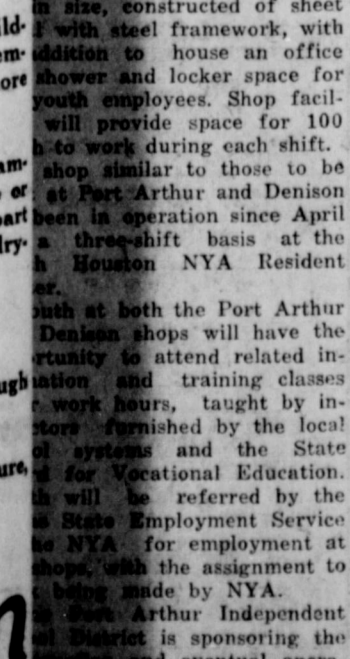
A Shops Will Be Built In Denison and Port Arthur

Jinx Is Relaxed On the Two Dollar Bills, Partly Due To Social Security

DALLAS, Tex.—Jinxed almost into oblivion years ago by superstitious persons, the \$2 bill now is making a comeback. Formerly kept well back in the bank teller's cage, the bill's use was stymied by the superstitious, who shoved it back to the teller and asked for a couple of ones instead.

Then with the advent of Social Security company paymasters began to ask for the \$2 bill as a couple of twos were easier to handle in paying off than four ones. An employee whose wage was \$20 had 20 cents deducted for old-age security and received \$19.80 weekly. His usual \$20 bill then was changed to a ten, a five, four ones (or a couple of twos) and 80 cents in change.

The use of \$2 bills in such a transaction instead of ones would cut the amount of paper handling \$3 1-3 per cent, which means a lot when hundreds of pay envelopes had to be stuffed every week.

Paymasters who realize the great amount of work saved by the use of \$2 bills are partly responsible for the revival of interest in the once infamous \$2. Others who are helping it in its comeback are collectors and professional jinx-breakers who never feel safe unless there are broken mirrors, black cats and a few Indian signs lying around.

However, although experiencing a new rise in popularity, the \$2 still is badly mutilated. Superstition has it that a corner torn off will counteract evil spirits of whatever ilk luck the possessor is expecting.

Merchant Tries Out A Friendly Service

ALBANY, N. Y.—Here's a new wrinkle in courtesy, from merchant to motorist, via the parking meter.

A local merchant on a busy street, has a "watcher" deposit coins in parking meters in the absence of motorists whose parking time expires. This practice has avoided many violation tickets and the consequent \$1 penalty payments.

The "watcher" leaves an orange card on the windshield to advise the motorist of the courtesy. The card reads: "Dear Motorist: We noticed that your parking meter was about to run out. We did not wish you to get a ticket. We have re-established your time for another hour."

Quinn started his railroading career piloting a little steam engine that pulled two and three-car trains through Atlanta streets before electric trolleys came into use.

5,000 Students To Be Reached By An NYA Setup Soon

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas secondary school and college officials who will have charge of the NYA Student Work program next year will be in a much better position to serve the young people employed on NYA part-time jobs in their institutions as a result of the NYA information program concluded this week, which was sponsored by 34 Texas colleges in cooperation with the State NYA School Work Council, J. C. Kellam, state NYA administrator, said today.

An estimated 5,000 summer school students, including scores of school officials and educators, were reached by Council members and NYA personnel through class

lectures, individual conferences, and open forums, during which both the NYA Student Work and Out-of-School Work programs were discussed.

Trimble, director of the Fort Worth Technical high school; and R. C. Patterson, Denton school superintendent.

WATERVILLE, Kas.—Louie W. Roepke, a Kansas farm youth who went to Costa Rica eight years ago to satisfy his ambitions to become a steady pilot, was here on vacation telling friends how it felt to be flying across jungle

sand swamps with \$50,000 in gold aboard. Roepke is a pilot for Transportes Aereos Centro-Americanos air lines. Ford tri-motor planes and Curtiss Condors are shuttled back and forth by the company from the seaports to the rich gold mines of the interior.

Roepke said that hauling large Diesel tractors or shipment of gold were all in the day's work. Airports are scarce; radios are not often used, and fogs often envelop large areas, but Roepke said pilots seldom had any trouble. Eight of the twelve months are rainy.

"For that reason most afternoon flying is bumpy," Roepke said. Most pilots are paid at least \$6,000 a year, he said.

The Phony Choice

Many Americans, consciously or unconsciously, are letting their view of world events be swayed by a portentous question.

It runs something like this: "Well, which would you rather be under, after all, Communism or Fascism?" And then, after surveying this shuddery choice, they admit that the balance falls ever so haltingly toward one or the other, and align all their thinking along such a line.

It is a phony question. The automatic answer which should swell up into a crescendo so loud as to drown out the question itself should be, "Neither!"

To put any such choice up to the American people, even to put it to ourselves in our secret hearts, is to get "off the beam" completely. Our whole effort is concentrated today on avoiding the necessity of making any such choice.

The Russian system has maintained, ever since the Revolution, an international organization devoted to propagandizing and "boring from within" in the interest of supplanting all established governments with their system. There is no doubt of that and no doubt that in many cases have stooped to tactics that seem to the American mind both contemptible and dangerous. But despite favorable conditions, their progress in shaping America to their way is close to nil.

The Nazi menace is newer. Though Fascism began 20 years ago as a counter-irritant to Communism, its German manifestation is only 10 years old. This, too, has only the minutest following in the United States, though its methods in trying to establish such a following have been equally contemptible.

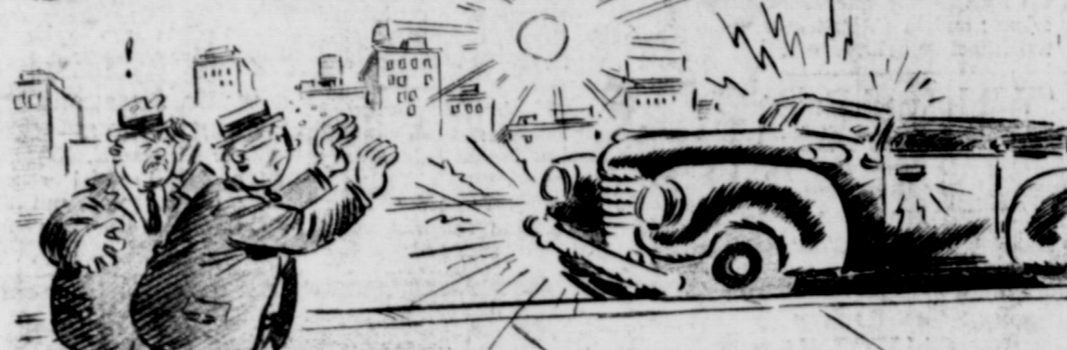
The horrors of a Fascist or a Communist Europe are now paraded before us. If Nazi Germany wins this war over a prostrate England, there is no doubt at all that all Europe will be Fascist. But if Russia and Britain win together, though much of Europe might be engulfed by Russia in Communism, England and other centers of freedom would remain. How they might fare with a bigger and broader Communism on the continent one cannot know, but one can be pretty sure that they would have a chance to rebuild freedom, whereas a Nazi victory means an immediate and total blackout.

The American people are not interested in choosing between Communism and Fascism, in splitting ideological hairs from twin dogs. The American people are interested in freedom, and in a free world in which peoples may develop such political and social institutions as seem to them

Claim Is Entered As Oldest City By A Waco Man
 WACO, Tex.—Waco is laying claim to the title of "America's oldest city"—it has borne its present name since 1541.
 A tribe of Indians had a settlement along the Brazos river here when the first white man visited the territory in 1542, 23 years before Saint Augustine, Fla., generally regarded as the oldest settlement in the New World, was founded.
 Dr. Robert T. Hill, historian and Baylor University graduate, published the findings, uncovered in diaries of the early explorers of the region and reported that a writer had visited the site in 1542. By that year the settlement had been named "Guasco." At that time the letter "W" was not included in the Spanish alphabet and the explorers of Mexico's expedition causing Coronado through central Texas were forced to invent a phonetic spelling of the Indian tribe's name.
 The spelling was not rigid, and it soon became Huasco (pronounced wa-co), still because of the lack of the letter W. The tribe that lived in the Brazos river settlement today is known as "Haco" or "Huaco" Indians.
 A century or so later the town's name was anglicized and became Waco.
 It is on this chain of events that the city's claim to the title of the nation's oldest city rests.

Royal Family Is Saving On Clothing By "Making It Do"
 By United Press
 LONDON.—To meet the new clothes rationing order, Queen Elizabeth has had last season's outfits of Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret altered. Hems have been let down and the princesses are wearing the clothes again.
 Their warm weather frocks have been made at home from lengths of cotton material costing only a few shillings.
 The king and queen and the princesses now use their clothing coupons just as they do their food ration books. They had no larger allocations than anybody else.
 This summer, the queen is wearing gowns and coats which served her last year, some of them slightly altered in style and retrimmed, others dyed and made over to look like new.
 Older clothes have been set aside to be worn at week-ends, when the queen usually joins the princesses in the country.
 Since rationing began the king and queen and the two princesses have had their own individual butter dishes and sugar bowls on the table at mealtimes, and the queen has the same problems of shopping and cooking as other housewives.
 She gets only the official allowance of meat for her household and usually arranges to serve a joint on Sunday and use the leftovers on Monday and Tuesday.

Study Is Directed To Personality
 CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—Scientific knowledge of human personality is a vital need in modern society, according to Dr. Arlie V. Bock, director of the Harvard University hygiene department.
 Believing that man as an individual has reached a point where more knowledge of himself is essential, the department has begun a study designed to develop knowledge of man as a functioning organism.
 Dr. Bock said years of cooperative case studies will be required for the groundwork of such knowledge in many fields—medicine, psychology, psychiatry, anthropology and sociology.
 "The problem that we, in common with others, face is that of finding a basis for judgment of an individual," he declared. "For the young, such knowledge would be of use to parents and schools. And for people of college age, it should be of assistance in personality development and in furthering the selection of the type of career suited to the person."
 The experience of the hygiene is that a large proportion of the students' individual health problems arise from efforts, or failure, to reach certain goals or to establish adequate personal relationships, Dr. Bock explains.
 "Most people, whether students or not, tend to resist the idea that failure to reach goals or inability to make adequate personal adjustments may lead to illness but the correlation appears to be high."

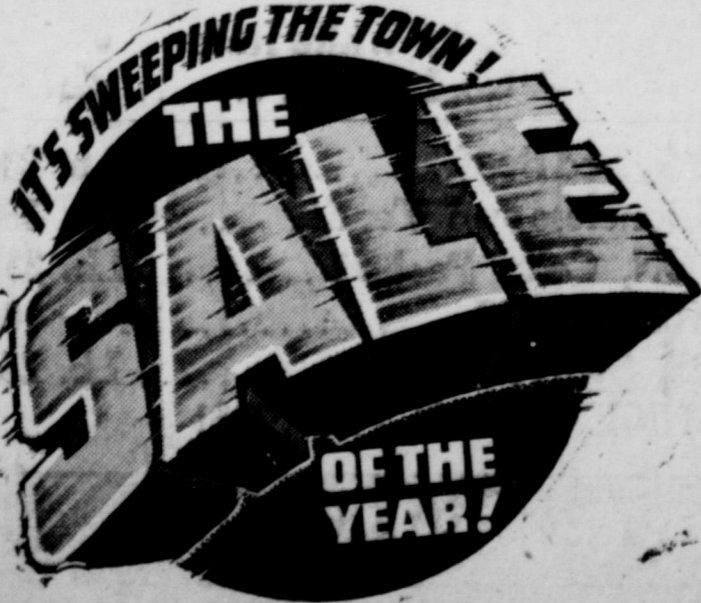
