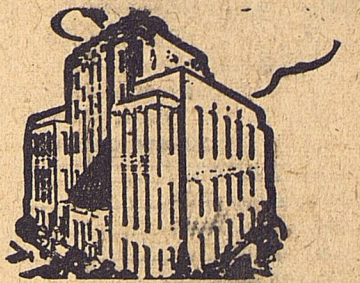

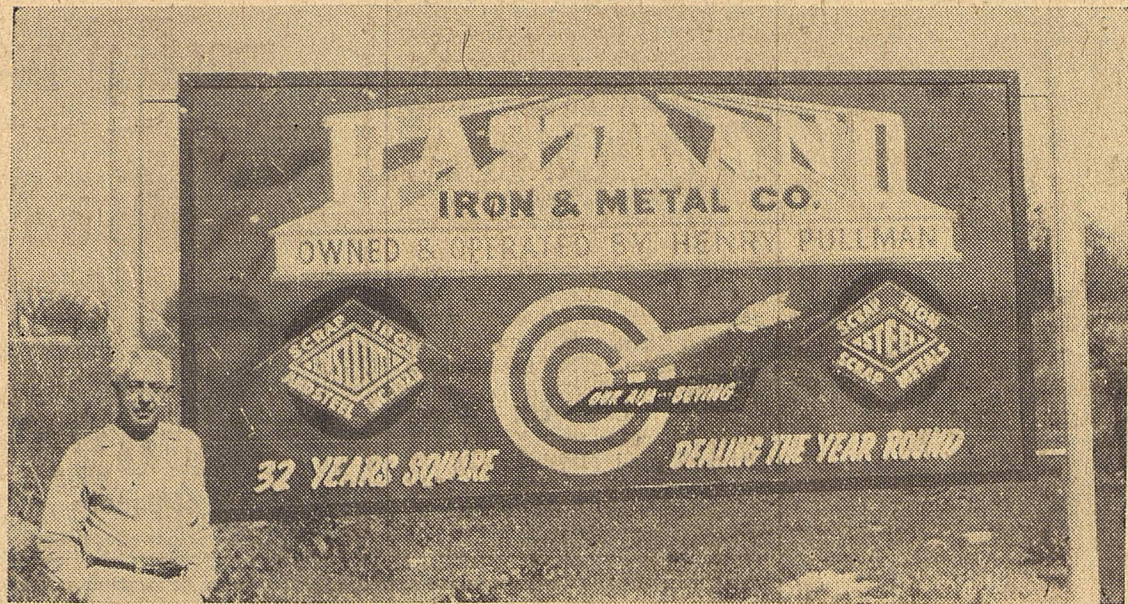
"We are expecting to take a vacation in May and it is quite likely we will stop by in Eastland. If we can make it we will pay our debt for the letter at that time."

JOHNSON WARNS OF TORNADOES

Clean Up-Captains Listed by League

Eastland's Clean-Up, Paint-Up, Fix-Up campaign got some jet power behind it Wednesday afternoon. Members of the Civic League and Garden Club completed their plans for co-sponsoring the drive with the Rotary Club.

Mrs. Earl Stephens, Civic League drive chairman, named 20 women, from all parts of the city, as captains. Thus the drive takes on a residential look. Rotarians earlier had revealed they would stress a business area clean-up.

Mrs. E. R. Townsend was program chairman for the day and she introduced Mrs. Stephens and

Mrs. Larry Kinard, Mrs. Stephens and Mrs. Kinard, in turn, introduced the guest speakers for the day, Ronald Burton and Fire Chief Billy Jack Johnson.

Burton outlined work done so far by the Rotary Club on the clean-up drive and stressed that Rotarians believe the two organizations, working together, can stage a highly successful drive.

He pointed out that visitors to Eastland judge the city on three things, the outward appearance, personal contact with local citizens and what they hear. "We will all benefit from this drive," he asserted.

Burton read the contents of a letter mailed to local businessmen urging their backing. He also reported that there had been a lot of early acceptance by owners of stores.

Tornado Warnings  
Fire Chief Johnson outlined Eastland's storm warning set-up.

Johnson revealed that 40 families who live in an area circling Eastland, bordered on the north by the E. C. Johnston home, on the east by the Staff community, on the west by the Kindricks Dairy and on the south by an area about six miles out, have volunteered.

The Eastland Ground Observer Corps, "a very small group," works with the Abilene weather bureau and GOC filtering stations, the speaker revealed.

Chief Johnson said that information on tornadoes in this area is immediately flashed to radio and television stations in Abilene, Dallas, Lubbock, Fort Worth and Wichita Falls.

He said that from March through September are the danger months for tornadoes, and reminded that the funnels of death usually strike from the southwest and move west.

What should be done if a tornado is spotted here? Call the fire department or the police department, report where it is, then run for cover. A cellar is the best cover, Johnson said, and frame

Farm Bureau to Sponsor County Health Program

A countywide animal health program, sponsored by the Animal Health Committee of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, will be held at the Eastland Auction Barn Thursday, April 17 at 7:30 p.m. Lee W. Starr of Cisco, chairman, announced today.

Starr said arrangements have been made for some outstanding speakers on the subjects "Brucellosis Control," and "Symptoms and Treatment of Undulant Fever in Humans."

Dr. H. J. Bulgerin of Eastland will discuss the symptoms and treatment of undulant fever, which is contracted by drinking milk from animals which carry the disease.

Brucellosis, which is being widely discussed in dairy circles, is the topic Dr. John L. Wilbur, Texas livestock sanitary commissioner of Fort Worth will speak on.

Dr. L. R. Noyes, executive director of the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission of Fort Worth, will also appear on the program. Starr said, "These timely discussions by these men should be worthwhile driving out to hear. We urge you to come and tell your neighbors and friends about this meeting."

Preliminary events in the district meet got underway at 9:30 today and finals will be run this afternoon.

The Mavs, who have won the district title four out of the last five years, and finished second the only time they failed to get the blue ribbon, are not favored to repeat this year, however.

Albany is expected to field a strong team and Coach Carrol Shelton says they are the team the Mavs will have to beat.

Teams participating in the meet, which is being held at McMurray College, are Eastland, Albany, Throckmorton, Clyde and Wylie.

Eastland will have 16 boys entered in the senior division, five in the junior division and 12 to 14 in the junior high-grade school division.

Saul Pullman, Mav sprinter, has been Eastland's high point getter for the year and Coach Shelton will look for him to take some firsts. The Mav mile relay team is also one of the bright spots on the local squad.

Running the 120 yard high hurdles for Eastland will be Billy Paul Turner and Marvin Agnew. Pullman, Bill Norwood and Jerry Penn will enter the 100-yard dash.

Turner and Agnew will run the low hurdles. Pullman, Penn and Norwood will carry Eastland's colors in the 220.

Mike Manning and Jimmy McElreath will run the 440. Mike Lisenbee and Mickey Garner are entered in the 880.

Stanley Reed, Roger Taylor and Ray Denny will run the mile. Penn, McElreath, Phillip Lewis and either Manning or Lisenbee

Local Cancer Drive Starts

Volunteer workers this week began their annual drive to get Eastland citizens to "give a check and have a check up." The aim of these workers: To do their part in helping to blot out dreaded cancer.

The 1958 Cancer Crusade was kicked off with a coffee and doughnut gathering at the First Christian Church Tuesday morning. Dr. H. J. Bulgerin, Eastland physician; Mrs. Roscoe Hopper of Ranger, county drive chairman; and Mrs. R. L. Carpenter, local chairman, spoke at the breakfast.

Dr. Bulgerin told the 25 volunteers present for the breakfast that many citizens have too much fear of cancer and others do not fear the disease enough.

He said the number two killer in America causes many people to worry needlessly. A sore or bump, to many, he said, immediately causes a rush to the doctor's office.

On the other hand, he explained, too many cancer victims do not see their physician soon enough. An early diagnosis is necessary to fight cancer.

Dr. Bulgerin told his listeners that while \$2500 county quota was important, the educational value of the drive is even more important. "If we can get just one of you who are attending this meeting to have a check up we will have accomplished a lot," he declared.

Mrs. Hopper outlined the county-wide drive and said she knew that Eastland would carry its load.

Mrs. Cyrus Frost Jr. announced that a film could be obtained by any club or organization during the month of April concerning cancer.

April 15 is National Crusade month, Mrs. Hopper told fellow volunteers, and the entire month of April has been set aside as Cancer Crusade Month.
