



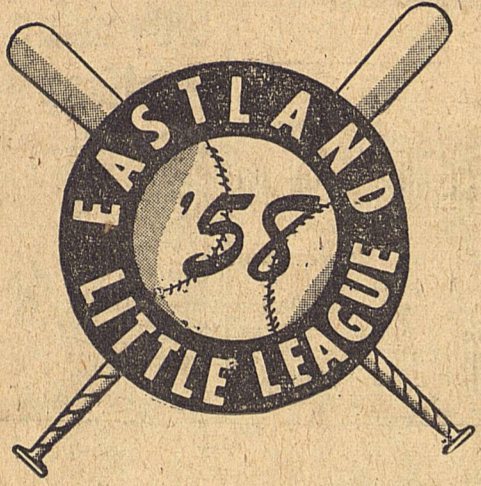

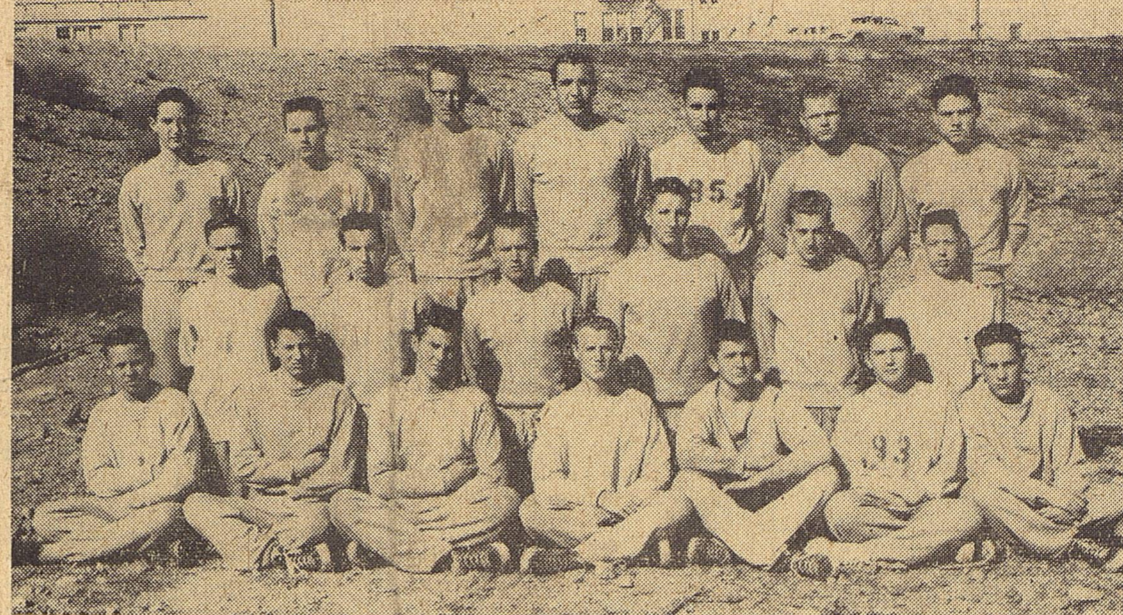
Funeral Services For Ed Sanders Held In Dallas

Large Veterans Building Program For County Set

Plans were announced today by C. C. Broyles, Abilene building contractor that recent Government legislation will once again permit the building of GI loan homes in Eastland and surrounding cities.

In an interview with the Telegram, Broyles stated that the recently enacted housing legislation, part of the Government's program to stem the reported recession, makes it possible for eligible Veterans to construct 2 and 3 bedroom homes in Eastland County without a downpayment.

Previously, according to Broyles, the Government had required a downpayment of two percent of the price of the dwelling, with a 4 1-2 percent interest rate, and maximum term of 25 years in which to pay for the house.

Today's announcement by Broyles now makes it possible for the prospective homeowner to build with no downpayment.

Amateur Photo Contest Plans Are Announced

Arrow Foto Service, of Eastland, announced today plans for a weekly amateur photo contest.

A spokesman for the concern stated that the deadline for entering each weekly contest is Saturday at 5 o'clock of each succeeding week. As films are processed during the week, Arrow Foto will pick what it thinks is the outstanding amateur photograph.

Seaberry Attends State Bar Meet Galveston Thurs.

More than 13,000 lawyers will begin expressing their preference for appellate court candidates in the Texas State Bar's secret judicial poll in May.

Bar President Virgil T. Seaberry of Eastland said Wednesday the ballots will be mailed to all State Bar members soon after the May 5 filing deadline.

Seaberry and Joseph A. Chandler of Stephenville, bar director for the 17th Congressional District, will leave Thursday for Galveston to attend the State Bar board of directors quarterly meeting, where details will be completed for the biennial sampling of lawyer opinions on qualifications of all candidates for higher court places. The ballots will include candidates for contested places on the Texas Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals and the Court of Civil Appeals for the district in which the voter lives.

Seaberry said the ballots will be tabulated and counted June 15 at State Bar headquarters in Austin and the results made public soon thereafter.

The two-day Galveston meeting over which Board Chairman Frank W. Hustmyre of Orange will preside, will include the study and adoption of the State Bar's 1958-59 budget; a progress study of plans for the "Law Day U.S.A. in Texas" observance May 1; and final plans for the Bar's annual meeting July 2-5 at San Antonio.

Broyles, through the Tri-Cities Real Estate Exchange, has recently completed the construction of 15 FHA homes in the Rivercrest Addition to Eastland.

In further explaining the new housing act, Broyles said that it would be possible for the veteran to select his own lot, which must be approved as to location, or he will supply the lot, and add the cost of the lot to the price of the house. The veteran thereby is actually able to pay for the cost of the lot on a long-term basis.

Broyles has asked that eligible Veterans contact the Tri-Cities Real Estate Exchange, on the Southeast corner of the square, in Eastland in person, or by phoning 768, for further information.

The hearings—as the law provides—will be held behind closed doors. The public, including the press, will be barred. Records will not be made public, the Judge said.

The boys, who county officers claim were working as a gang, reportedly stole hundreds of dollars worth of hub caps and other articles off cars in Eastland and Ranger. Some of the youths, officers have reported, were responsible for the blaze which damaged the Church of God camp grounds building in Eastland.

The United States Treasury Department has issued a regulation liberalizing deductibility of educational expenses of teachers from income subject to Federal Income Taxes.

This regulation is retroactive to 1954 but amended returns must be filed within four years of the tax year under consideration. Today, Tuesday, is the last day for filing return for 1954. H. R. Garrett, County School Superintendent suggests that any teacher who has a claim to file should discuss the matter with a representative of the Internal Revenue Department of his area. The regulation of the Treasury Department is TD 6291. It appeared in Federal Register for April 5, 1958.

### 'Flowers' Topic Of Mrs. Poe At FHA Meeting

Mrs. J. C. Poe spoke to the Future Homemakers of America about flowers at their recent meeting.

Mrs. Poe mentioned some of the occasions for sending flowers such as birth of a baby, birthdays, dinner invitations, weddings, anniversaries, flowers to cheer the sick and for holidays.

The seven basic designs for arranging flowers were explained by Mrs. Poe. She said flowers should be one and a half times taller than its container; and if one is using a shallow container, the flowers should be one and a half times taller than the container is long.

In conclusion she said that one could send flowers anywhere by paying their local florist the cost of the telegram plus the amount they want to send for the flowers. It is well to allow substitutions to be made in the flower order in case the flowers ordered are not available, she said.

### Fullen Attends Zone Meeting of Check Dealers

T. M. Fullen of Fullen Motor Co. has just returned from Dallas where he acted as spokesman for fellow dealers of his zone at a meeting of the Chevrolet Dealer Planning Committee.

Fullen was elected to the committee by Chevrolet dealers of his district under a nationwide program which the country's leading automobile and truck producer pioneered in the industry in 1937. The system operates as a medium for dealer representatives and company executives to discuss industry developments, retail sales conditions and other mutual business.

The Chevrolet National Dealer Planning Committee is organized at district, zone, regional and national levels. Dealers in each of the nearly 500 Chevrolet districts in the United States elect from their group a committeeman to represent them at the zone level. Each of the 47 zone committees thus formed elect a regional representative from their midst. Each of these 10 regional committees then select one of their members to serve on the national committee which meets with company executives in Detroit. Zone, regional and national meetings and elections are held twice a year.

### City Clean-Up Discourages Insect Breeding

A voluntary spring clean-up campaign will discourage insect breeding. Week-end rains have greatly increased beds for breeding.

The State Health Department urges early control of injurious insects. Only by constant fighting does man hold his own against the hordes of insects that inflict stings or bites which are always painful and sometimes fatal. The housekeeper, the farmer and especially the handlers of food must continue on the alert against the invaders and destroyers of food and clothing.

Of the million known insects there are 600 of the known—injurious species in the United States. Discoveries of new species are being discovered at the rate of about 6000 per year. The vast majority of insects are neither harmful nor beneficial to man.

However, there are many which are highly beneficial, providing pollination of seed and fruit crops and flowers. They eat other troublesome insects and feed on noxious weeds.

Greatest carriers of plague and fever germs are the fly, flea and mosquito.

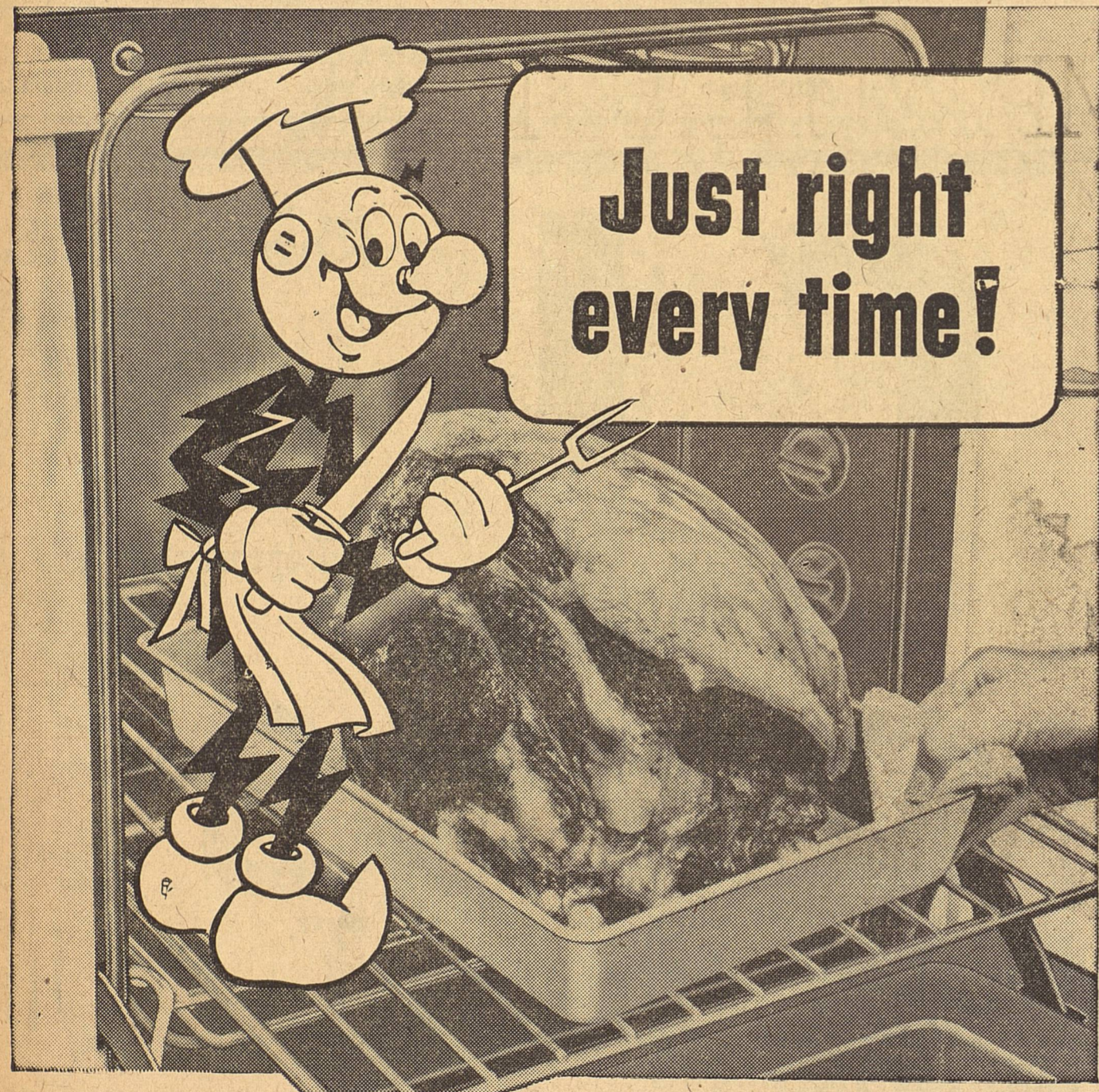
The Health Department states that there is small danger if any from the proper use of the powerful insecticides which have been developed for use in the control or eradication of injurious insects.

Today the Social Security program covers nine out of 10 people who work for a living - over 90 percent.

You may wonder how many of the present aged population are eligible for Social Security. There are about 14.7 million people in the U. S. today past 65.

The fact that 90 percent of those who are now covered and only 60 percent of the present aged have this protection is evidence of the newness of the Social Security program.

Retirement payments can be made to you in your old age and to your dependents. Men workers are eligible beginning at age 65; women at age 62.

Wives of workers also get reduced payments at 62 or full payments at age 65.
