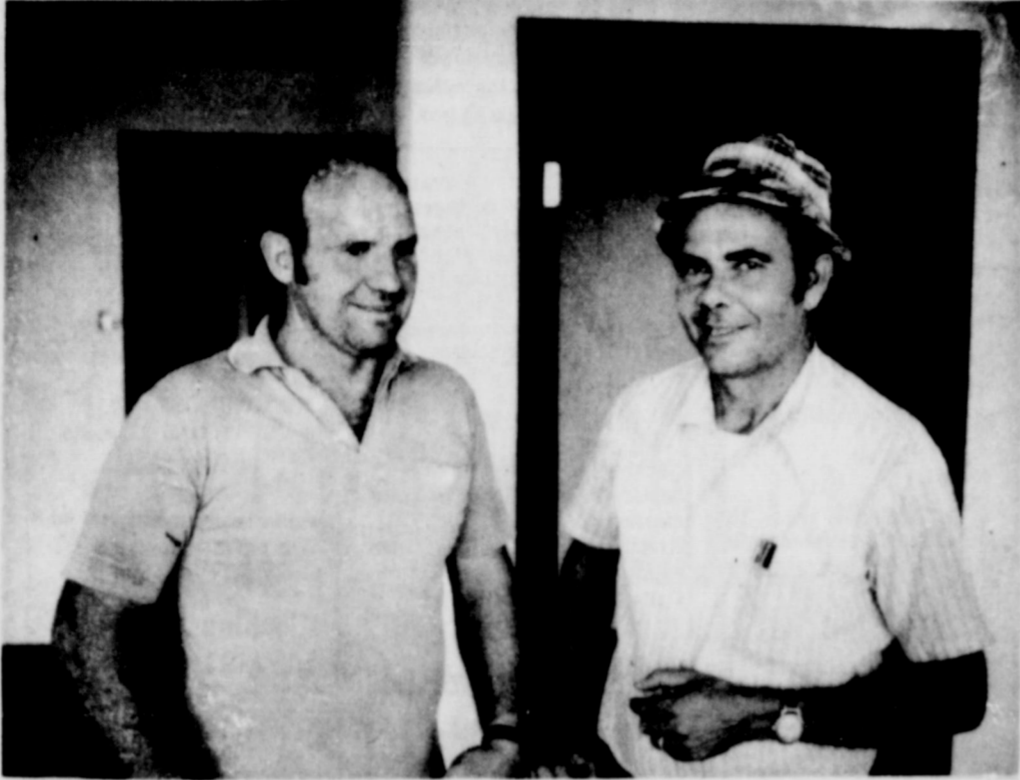

"Perhaps the puppets couldn't hold a high 'C' to Enrico Caruso (whose recorded voice also is heard) but they help tell the entertainment story, and in an entertaining way," Mrs. Gorr said.

Animated puppets also are used to depict a living room scene of the early early 1930's as a family listens to the then-popular "Lum 'n Abner" radio comedy series.

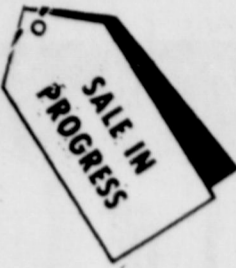

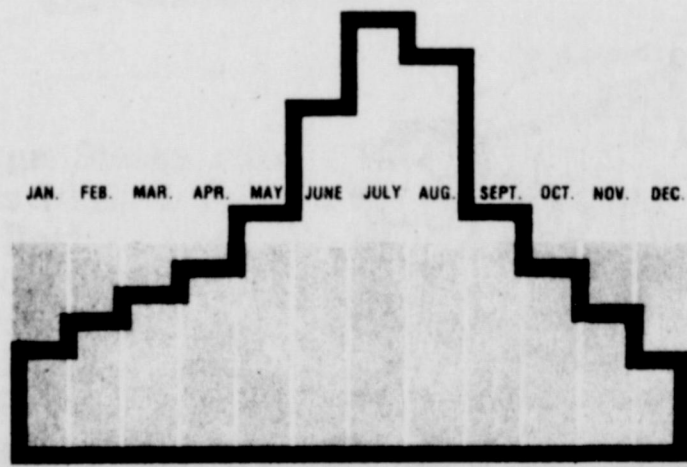

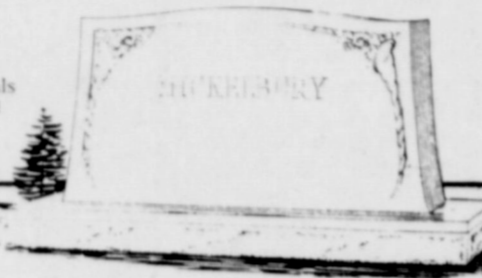

Wash and slice cucumbers in to 1/4 inch thick sticks. Add lime to 1 gallon of water and mix well. Soak cucumbers in lime water for 24 hours. Rinse well. Soak cucumbers in clear water for 2 hours, changing water every 30 minutes. Drain; cover with pickle solution made of spices tied in bag, 6 cups sugar, vinegar and 1 quart of water. Simmer 30 minutes.

Let stand 2 days; drain off pickle solution. Add to it remaining 4 cups of sugar and reheat. Pour again over pickles. Simmer 10 minutes. Let stand 2 days. Pack cucumbers into hot jars. Fill jars to 1/2 inch of top with boiling pickle solution; close. Process 5 minutes in boiling water bath. Start to count processing times as soon as jars are placed in water bath.

work program for Eastland and surrounding counties apparently found new life this week, and appears destined to provide help until the next school term begins.

County School Supt. O.L. Mr. J.B. (Tip) Arther, project director, and Emma Morris, bookkeeper, resumed their duties Thursday. Counselors will be named as the program gears up to handle the program.

Youngsters throughout the county are invited to contact either their school administrators or Mr. Arther regarding placement in the program.



Dr. Hightower Gets Award at A&M

Dr. Dan Hightower, Professor in the Texas A & M University College of Veterinary Medicine, was honored by the Texas Veterinary Medical Association at the College's Honors Convocation on July 5, 1973. Dr. Hightower was recipient of the TVMA Annual Faculty Achievement Award for Research.

Dr. Hightower was born in Eastland, Texas on October 15, 1925. He earned the D.V.M. degree from Texas A & M University and M.S. from North Carolina State in applied physics. He was recognized as a Distinguished Student while at Texas A & M and received the Hoskin's Award from the Army Medical Service Graduate School.

An outstanding specialist in nuclear medicine and biophysics, Dr. Hightower has served as Deputy Director, Division of Nuclear Medicine, Walter Reed Army Institute of Research, Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Washington, D.C. He held the rank of Colonel in his retirement from the Army Veterinary Corps and joined the staff of the Department of Veterinary Physiology and Pharmacology in 1966.

Dr. Hightower conducts research in the area of nuclear medicine and teaches in the professional and graduate programs. His research involves studies concerning the diagnosis and treatment of thyroid disease in animals, the relationship of proton radiation to space to space travel and neutron radiation in cancer therapy. He has published numerous scientific articles and serves as a consultant to several agencies including the Atomic Energy Commission and National Cancer Institute.

Dr. Hightower is a member of many professional organizations and honorary societies. Among these are the American and Texas Veterinary Medical Associations, Radiation Research Society, Society of Nuclear Medicine, Phi Zeta and Sigma XII.

He is married to the former Grace Landsbach and they reside at 1208 Broadmoor, Bryan, Texas.
