## Reporter Finds Leon Dam Site Has History That Is Colorful

Overlooking the huge Leon River dam, which is gradually nearing completion, this writer suddenly wondered what the history of this particular plot of ground might be.

In quest of such information, he began to talk to "old timers" who might remember. He hit the jackpot when he brought the question up to R. P. Barber.

"Sure, I remember the spot," Barber said, as his mind raced back through the years. "I used to walk down the bank of the creek to that very spot lots of times when I was a boy. That was the site of the old Duffer's still."

And that's how we found out the rich history of the very spot the new Eastland-Ranger dam is being built on.

"That spot influenced my life more than any one thing I can think of," Barber told us. "It taught me to be a teetotaler. I watched a neighbor of mine one time sit there and 'sample' that stuff so many times that he got drunk and crawled into a pig pen and slept it off. Right then I decided that if that's what the stuff did to you, I could do without it."

Questioned about the still, Barber continued his tale. "Duffer's Still was owned by the government and was operated by John Duffer, who it was named for. It was kinda hard to find, and if you didn't know just where it was you couldn't find it. Folks around here used Duffer's product for medicine."

"Do you remember the names of any of the folks who lived around the still?" the reporter asked.

"Well of course," Barber said. "My father was P. P. Barber. Some of the others were Jack Hazard, George Hazard, Ed Blackwell, George Williamson, Walter Duncan, Doc T. J. Earnest . . ."

The names came forth slowly and you could see Barber smile as he remembered old friends.

When did the still go? That was one question which Barber could not answer.

"It was still there in eighty-nine," he said, "but I don't remember just when it went out. Must have been in the early nineteen hundreds."

What about a name for the new lake. Well, Barber doesn't think Duffer's Lake would be too bad.

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## 'WATER ROARS INTO LEON RIVER LAKE

The drought is broken! At least that is the general consensus of Eastland county folks.

Heavy rains during the last two months, climaxed by a three day rain this week that dumped up to three and a half inches of rain into parts of the county, have apparently done the trick.

During the last three days all parts of the county received heavy, beneficial rains. The condition prompted County Agent J. M. Cooper to say, "It looks better today than it has in a long, long time. We are about fixed up."

And farmers seemed to agree with the County Agent. Although some said the rain came a little late, all agreed it would be a big help.

If it did nothing else it lifted folks' outlook on life. Business was picking up in every city in the county.

During this week's rainy period, Ranger got 2.50 inches, Eastland recorded 1.39, Cisco had almost two inches, Breckenridge reported 2.78, and Gorman, Olden, Carbon, Desdemona and other points all received more than an inch.

Lakes in the area all showed rises. Eastland's Ringland and Eastland Lake were up to the top. Cisco's city lake was also "full."

And farmers' Hageman lake caught enough water to fill it. It now stores 11,000 acre feet. Stock tanks in the county in most cases have all the water they can hold.

And the new Leon River Lake showed a jump of two feet, observers said. A good run-off sent water roaring into the lake, but workers still have a big head-

ache on the rising waters.

### As It Looks From Here

### Burleson Says Chiang Kai-shek Is Unable To Invade Red China

WASHINGTON (Spl.)—More nonsense has been written and more drivel has been talked about "unleashing Chiang Kai-shek" than should be allowed to go unanswerred in an informed country such as ours. It seems to me it is time to set forth a few honest facts.

If there ever was a time when the forces of Chiang Kai-shek should have been used against the mainland of China, it was during the past several weeks. If it had been possible for Chiang's forces to have attacked the mainland of China with any effect, it would have relieved the pressure of the Communists in Indochina.

The fact is that the ability of Chiang's forces for an invasion of the mainland of China was very limited. A lot of Asia-firsters have seemingly gotten drunk on their own propaganda.

The United States has poured millions upon millions into Formosa and it is true that Chiang has approximately 300,000 combat-

worthy troops, of whom perhaps 10 percent are fit for command-type operations. But he has neither the air power nor the naval power to attempt any sizeable re-invasion of China. This means that to put Chinese Nationalists ashore on the mainland of China would require United States naval vessels protected with United States air craft. This, however, is not by any means the big problem or the big question mark as to results. The big question is that it is doubtful if the Chinese troops on Formosa would really fight if they were on the mainland without American boys standing at their side. Even with U. S. naval craft to land Chiang's forces on the mainland, and our air power to protect such landings, it would throw us into a war with Communist China.

So, at the present time, we are being asked for more millions to support Chiang Kai-shek on Formosa.

During the last several days high military and State Department officials have been before my committee asking for more aid

for Formosa. I have questioned these officials as to the purpose of spending more hundreds of millions of dollars on these forces on Formosa and their answer is not very definite. They use the words "deterrent" and "forces in being" which, according to their explanation, mean that they may be used at some place, at some time, for some purpose.

This is not to say that Formosa is not important as a link in the chain of our outer perimeter of defense, but this business of supporting Chiang Kai-shek under the pretense of his reinvading China is in my opinion a phony and unrealistic.

I am for arming Formosa, which we have been doing, to be sure it can be protected against Communist invasion, but the myth of a re-invasion of the mainland of China by Chiang's forces should be dispelled. If they were ever going to be ready for such an undertaking, it should be now and no one suggests that such a thing be done.

During the Korean conflict, Formosa was neutralized on the order of the president, but those who talk of "unleashing" Chiang Kai-shek's forces, as if they were military power, fail to mention that Chiang also holds the Pesca-

dore Islands and the island of Quemoy, and one or two other strong points which are much nearer the China coast than is Formosa. They were not at any time included in the neutralizing order. Nothing happened to these islands, either by invasion by the Communists or as bases for invasion of the mainland by Chiang.

So we are going to continue pouring hundreds of millions of dollars into Formosa for "forces in being" (whatever that means), but publicly it is made to appear as if Chiang Kai-shek is ready to reinvade the mainland of China at the snap of someone's finger. But the snap was not made when the ships were down in Indochina and is not likely to be made in the foreseeable future.

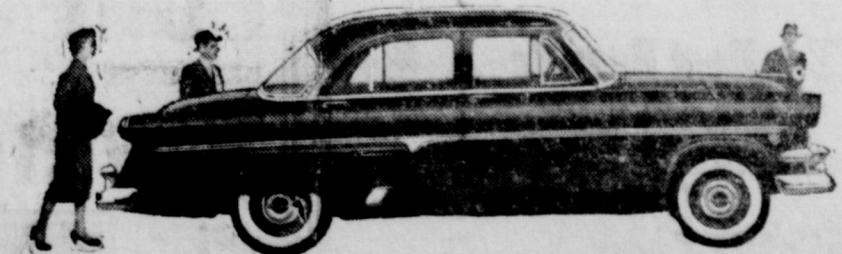

**Florida Highways Made Safer By New Rural Mailbox Turnouts**

A retired postmaster's idea and energetic action by a woman's club are making highways safer in Florida.

The postmaster was worried about the danger to rural mail carriers stopping on the highway. He thought mail box turnouts would eliminate the hazard.

The Orlando Pilot Club saw even greater possibilities for the idea, and it soon grew into a plan for group action by the Fourth District, Florida, of Pilot International.

Through their effort, 50 rural mailbox turnouts were constructed along Florida highways. It was soon apparent that the crescent-shaped bays were an important safety bonus for box holders, for children boarding and alighting from school buses, for motorists forced to make emergency stops, as well as for the letter carriers.

Their efforts were rewarded when the Fourth District became the first club to win the top award in the 1953 Carol Lane Awards for Traffic Safety, receiving a \$1,000 defense bond and a bronze statuette symbolic of their achievement.

The Carol Lane Awards, the nation's only awards which recognize the achievements of women in the field of traffic safety, are administered by the National Safety Council through a grant from the Shell Oil Co.

Heartened by the enthusiastic acceptance of their project, the Florida women are pushing the program vigorously. Mrs. Sara G. Hughes of Orlando, Pilot state chairman of the turnout project and the woman who saw the possibilities of the postmaster's idea, asked that funds for 100 new turnouts be included in the state's 1954 road budget. Instead, 300 turnouts were authorized. The highway administrators, impressed by the work of the club, added \$150,000 to the maintenance budget for paying of turnouts.

This major safety project is an example of the effective work being done by women and women's groups in the traffic safety field.
