**Scott's Secrets**

Here is a true and tried Baked Ham Loaf recipe: 1 pound fresh ham ground; 1-2 pound smoked ham ground; 1-2 cup milk; 2 eggs beaten; 1 cup soft bread crumbs; 2 tablespoons chili sauce; 1-3 t. grated lemon rind; 3-4 teaspoon salt; 1-4 teaspoon pepper; 1 cup canned tomato juice.

Combine all ingredients except tomato juice. After loaf has baked 30 minutes pour juice over it and continue cooking another 30 minutes. Then pour liquid off and make sauce with: 1 tablespoon flour, 11-2 tablespoons cold water; 1 teaspoon onion sauce; 1 teaspoon minced onion. Cook until thick. Serve with loaf.
