## Rainfall Figures for Last 7 Months Indicate Record Drouth Is Broken

With four months of 1954 gone, and half of the fifth month past, Eastland's rain records show that two of the four months have snapped records going back as far as 1949—the year the city had 31.46 inches of rain, 5.16 inches more than the 43 year average of 26.46. That, plus the fact that every month has had at least .42 of an inch of rain and that the average for the first four months is 1.75, indicates that the drouth, at long last, has actually been broken. Add to that the fact that May has already brought forth 2.03 inches of rain and things begin to look rosy. The figure for 1954 to date is 9.01 inches. During the first four months of the year, the city has had 6.98 inches, or 2.61 more inches than we had during the same period in 1953 when the rainfall total was 24.32, only 2.14 inches under the average. The four month rainfall total this year is the best Eastland has had in five years.

It might also be pointed out that many surrounding areas in the county have received far more rainfall than Eastland. Adding to the four and a half good rain months this year are the last three months of 1953, which brought 8.39 inches. That makes the total rainfall in the last seven and a half months total 17.40 inches. That total is .38 more than Eastland received in the entire year in 1952.

April of this year was the second best April in 12 years, from the rainfall standpoint. In fact, only five Aprils in the last 43 years have equaled or had more rain.

## Slang Takes Over At Big D Ford Plant

The instrument panel still is called a dashboard. And every Ford has a horseshoellar, the U-shaped stamping that supports the radiator.

"Spaghetti" is used to seal body joints. It's a compound squirted along the edges of fenders and other sheet metal parts before they are welded.

And the stovepipe is the assembly line employee's abbreviation for "duct assembly (ventilator air), right side, Part No. BM7001902A" the tube that brings fresh air through the Ford heater.

So when a Dallas assembly line foreman tells the stock department he wants more dum dum, or eyebrows, he's not fooling. He's just using current automotive production terms for sound deadening compound and front window rain deflectors.

Easters-out in our land left almost \$450,000,000 in tips for the waiters and waitresses on tables in restaurants and hotels last year, says a Department of Commerce estimate.

Chances are that the average motorist would have a hard time finding the sergeant's stripes, railroad tracks, hockey stick, banana, or dog leg on his car.

Yet all these names—and a half hundred more—are part of the routine work day conversation at the Dallas Ford assembly plant.

Engineers usually give a long complicated name to the parts that go into cars to insure positive identification. But the people who put these parts together on the automobile assembly line have invented their own slang shortcuts.

Sergeant's stripes is their nickname for the chrome strips attached cater-cornered to the rear door or quarter panel of a 1954 Crestline Ford. Hockey sticks and bananas are grille parts shaped like their namesakes. For the same reason, Dagmar is the nickname for the '54 grille center section.

A dog leg is the distinctive curve in the body at the bottom of the rear door. Railroad tracks run above the rear window of the Ford Victoria and the Skyliner—at least that's the name for the grooved chrome trim on these models.

Some nicknames go all the way back to the horse-and-buggy era.

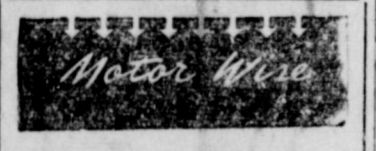

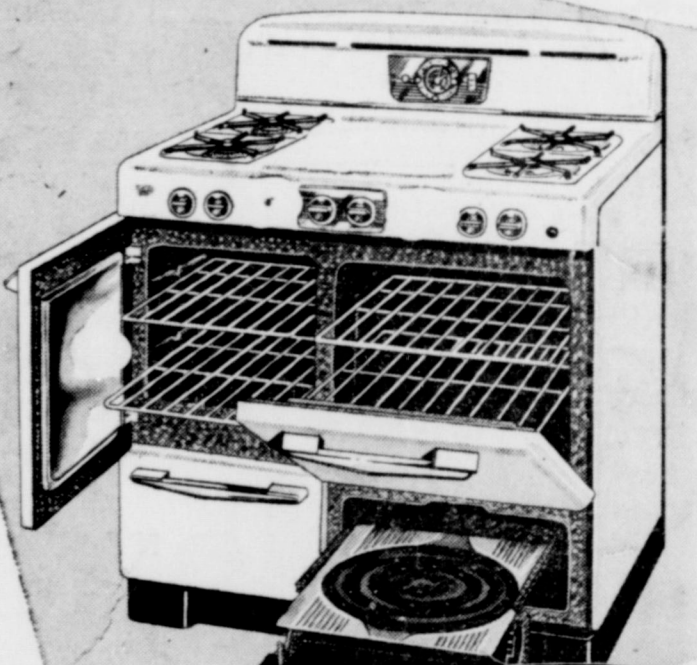
