Elementary School, Mrs. Marshall To Receive Freedom Awards

Edward L. Kirk, associate professor of education at Abilene Christian College, the Eastland Elementary School and one of its former faculty members, and a Hawley school teacher will be honored by Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge on Tuesday, April 25.

Dr. Leon R. Blair, University of Texas Bureau for Economic Understanding, will present the awards on behalf of Freedoms Foundation at a 7 p.m. dinner of the West Texas Schools American Heritage Project. Approximately 450 teachers from ten counties circling Abilene, Taylor County, will attend the dinner awards ceremony.

Mr. Kirk, active in Texas educational and historical

societies, will receive an Honor Certificate for his essay, "America - Guardian of Human Values." This is the tenth Freedoms Foundation award to Mr. Kirk. He previously received seven George Washington Honor Medals and two Honor Certificates.

Misses Allouez Blackburn, high school social studies teacher at Hawley and Lois Marshall, former teacher at Eastland Elementary School, and now an instructor at Cisco Junior College, will each receive a Valley Forge Teachers Medal.

The medal to Miss Blackburn is for her innovative teaching techniques focused on responsible citizenship. She initiated a patriotic poster

contest, sponsored educational trips to the county seat to supervise the registration of those students eligible to vote and conducted a fund raising campaign to purchase U.S. flags for each classroom.

Mrs. Marshall will get her medal for instilling in youth a deep and abiding love of country and respect for the concepts and principles that undergird the American Way of Life.

Eastland Elementary School will receive an Honor Certificate in school category for a unique language arts project utilizing the theme, "The Principles that Have Made America Great."

The awardees were selected by the Freedoms Foundation's National and School Awards

Jury composed of 11 state supreme court justices and 22 principal officers of national patriotic, civic, service and veterans organizations.

This year's National Awards Jury chairman was Dr. Maurice B. Mitchell, chancellor of the University of Denver, Colo.

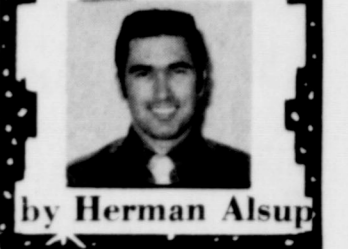

It's community improvement time again. Monday April 24th, is the date two Eastland County communities will be toured and judged.

The Kokomo tour will be from 9:30 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. Monday morning and the Nimrod tour will be from 1:30

p.m. until 3:30 p.m. Monday afternoon.

Everyone is welcome to attend these tours and see the progress made during the last year.

We have been busy with several other major activities

in addition to the tours just mentioned.

Last Thursday was the big day for Lion's Club members in this area as we celebrated the 50th Anniversary.

The 19th Annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School was held last Friday at Cisco and the annual district 4 - H demonstration and judging contests were held Saturday in Stephenville.

Farmers and ranchers are also very busy getting land ready for peanuts and other crops. As we drive through the county we see tractors in

almost every field.

With the warmer weather insects are getting busy too, particularly in aphids. You had better check your ornamental plants for aphids. They thrive on new plant growth when nights are cool and days are moderately warm.

Most ornamentals are susceptible to one or more species of aphids. Spring flowering bulbs, mums and roses are just a few that these insects attack. Aphids cause loss of plant vigor, stunted growth, deformation of buds and flowers, and curling or puckering of leaves.

Aphids pierce the plant with their needle-like mouth parts and feed on plant sap. The insects create a sweet sticky substance called honeydew which attracts ants, flies, wasps and lady beetles and provides a medium for mold growth. Infested arborvitae, pines and other trees drip the honeydew on sidewalks and patios.

Aphids can be many different colors, including black, green, yellow, pink, red and gray. These pests cluster in large groups on buds, stems, leaves and the bark of willows and arborvitae.

Daily spraying with a strong stream of plain water will discourage light infestations. However, young, tender growth can be broken and buds knocked off.

Diazinon, Meta-Systox-R, dimethoate or malathion sprays give excellent control of heavy aphid infestations. When spraying, wet the entire plant with a fine mist. Choose a warm, still day to apply insecticides if possible.

Dry systemic insecticides in granular form or in fertilizer mixes are also effective against aphids and certain other sucking pests. However, these

should be used as a preventative measure applied soon after annuals become established or when perennials are growing vigorously. If a systemic insecticide is applied to the soil, a heavy watering should follow to distribute the chemical in the soil. If aphids are present, four days to a week may be required for control, depending on the size and vigor of the plant. Another insecticide application may be required in five to six weeks if reinfestation occurs.

Read the labels on pesticide containers and follow all directions and precautions.

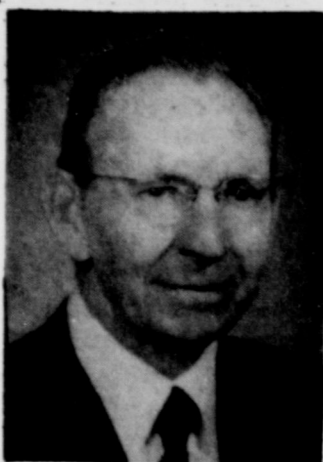

CONSERVATION - The Key to survival

When you get to thinking about it, the world is actually a very small place. For each of the more than two billion people in the world there is only about five and a half city blocks. Four of these blocks are covered by water, one and a half blocks are land. This is not much land especially since most of this is desert. Only one large corner lot is land suitable for farming. Three lots this same size are covered with trees. Now that we have come to realize how small each person's part of the world is, we begin to see the importance of conserving our resources.

We can only use or borrow these resources for a lifetime. If we waste them, there will be none for the generations to come. Therefore we must save these resources because the future generation's share of the world will probably be smaller than ours because of the rapid increase of population.

If it is at all possible, we should replace the resources that we use. An experienced forester will only cut down trees where he knows other trees will grow to replace those that he has cut.

The government has been wise in setting aside a national forest system whereas the forest is harvested in a way to preserve it. But, in other places the great waste still goes on. The loss of wood through the wasting of stumps, tops and branches, saw - dust, bark, slabs, and trimmings is approximately 60 percent while in Germany this waste is only four percent. Something must be done! Why can't we follow this country's example and do the same?

Destruction of forests results in more than the loss of timber. Erosion, depletion of the soil

turned back to pasture land by sprigging native grasses. This will hold the soil to prevent erosion. Our government has also set aside programs where land is taken out of cultivation for further use when there is a need. This preserves the land, and keeps down surpluses to insure farmers better prices.

For years, coal, industrially the most important of all minerals has been mined as though it were inexhaustible. Approximately one ton of coal is wasted to the one ton mined. People should realize that there is an end to everything. Lakes and streams are constantly being polluted with sewage, trash, and industrial waste. Many streams have become so polluted that the birds and fish have been completely killed out. Some once beautiful streams have even become public nuisances and a menace to health. Contaminated streams are also hazardous to the animals that drink from their eaters. As a result our fish and wildlife are completely wiped out!

I believe that the time has come for everyone to recognize the fact that the wasting and misusing of our natural resources is really becoming a big problem.
