Game Warden Explains Fish License Laws

Do you know when a fishing license is required? It might be a good idea for you to find out if you don't. At least that is the opinion of Maurice Dry, game warden for Eastland county.

Dry said Thursday that there are three general classes to fishermen who do not need a license if they fish for sport. You do not need a license if you fish for sport in salt water only, if you are under 17 years of age or if you hold a commercial fishing license.

The game warden explained that "Even though you may not fall into any of the three classes named, you still might be able to fish without buying a license."

He explained that when a person is fishing in his home county a license is needed only if artificial lures are used in fresh water.

When fishing in an adjoining county a license is required only when fishing in fresh water with artificial lures or with live bait (minnows or fish only).

When fishing in the rest of the state a license is required of every one using any kind of bait or lure in fresh water outside a person's own or adjoining counties.

She was born in Morris county August 30, 1875. She was Maud Roxie French before her marriage to Mr. Burnett in November of 1891.

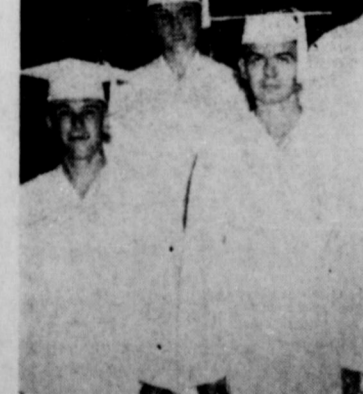

Two miles northwest of Rising Star, J. W. Harding of Fort Worth No. 1 Robert H. Stone has been completed as a regular field producer. It is in Section 25, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

The well produced 39.5 barrels of 38 gravity oil, plus 50 per cent water, on pump from 48 perforations at 1,048-92 feet. Casing was set at 1,176 feet, total drilling depth. Plug was set at 1,135 feet.

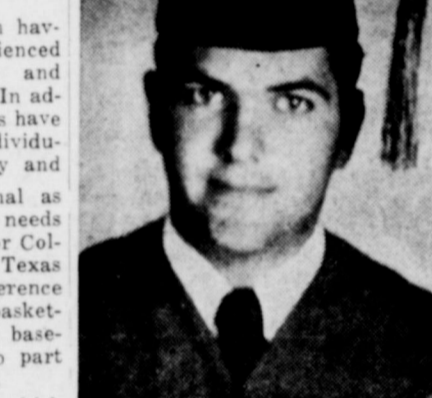

Mrs. Art Johnson as chairman with the executive board were the hostesses.

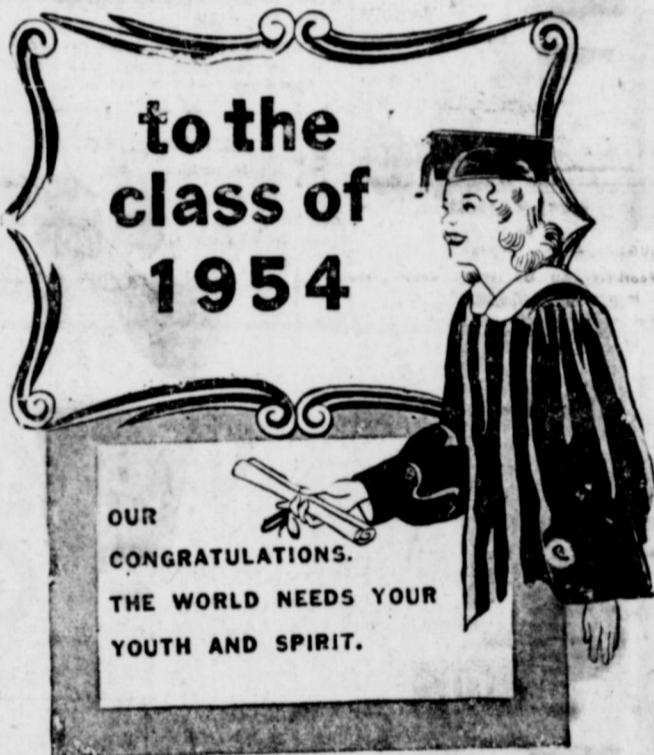
