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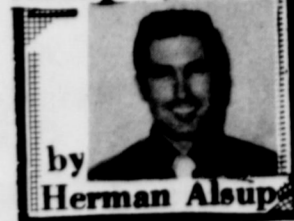

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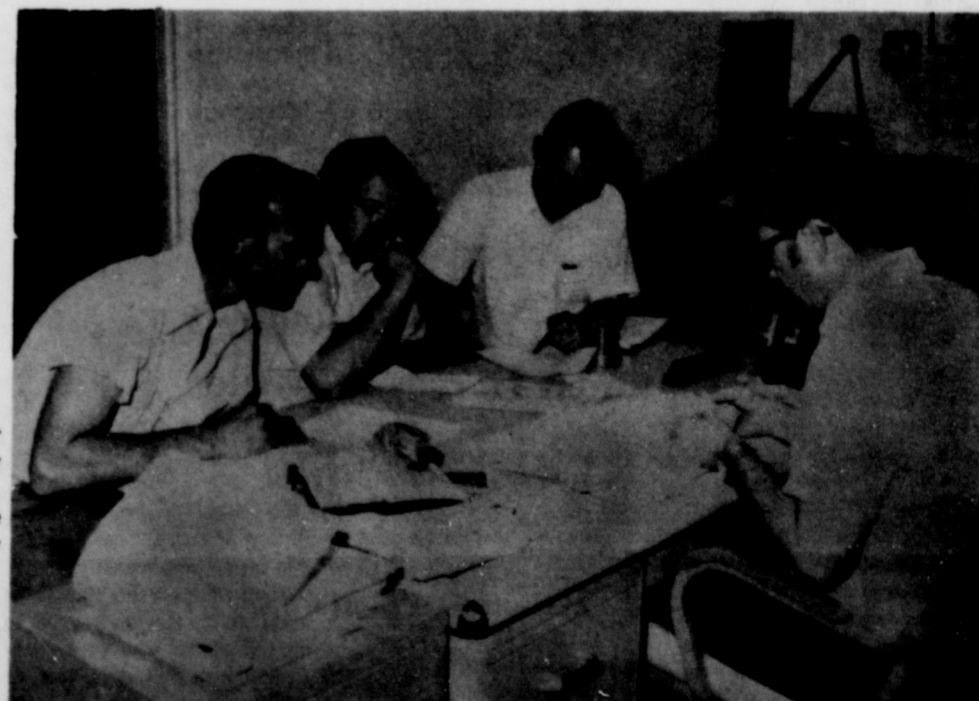
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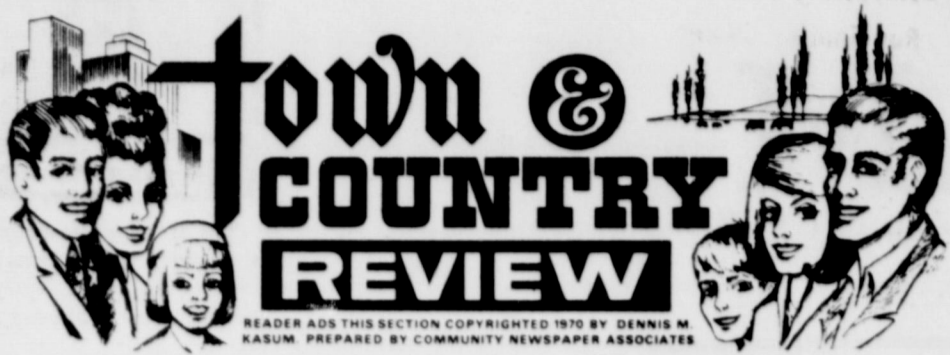

I know third step fitters that will tell you they have been called in for the weekend and cut and fit one 1/2" pipe coupling for welding in a period of 16 hours, and this was on swing shift. Another will tell you that in three weeks of continual work, weekends and all, he has not done one bit of work. Has tried to beg work, weekends and all, he has not done one bit of work. Has tried to beg off of overtime, but to no avail. He was and still is working three shifts. Each of these are good men and good workers, but your supervision is the costly part, using no judgment at all. The above fitter had a welder consigned to work with him in order to install one and only one 1/2" butt weld coupling.

This sounds far fetched but it's all true and can be verified to the exact points.

Asked why nothing has been done to correct such things in our government, Mr. Moore says either everyone is involved in this or no one cares. You the taxpayers are keeping this yard in operation.

Yet, Mr. Moore has ruined his eyes on this job and the government won't even buy him a pair of colored glasses for his eyes. This was another error by the so-called company doctors.

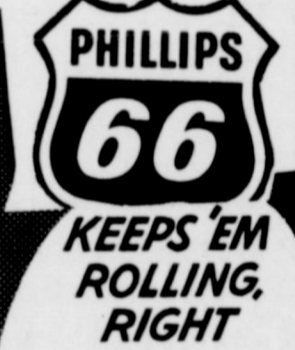

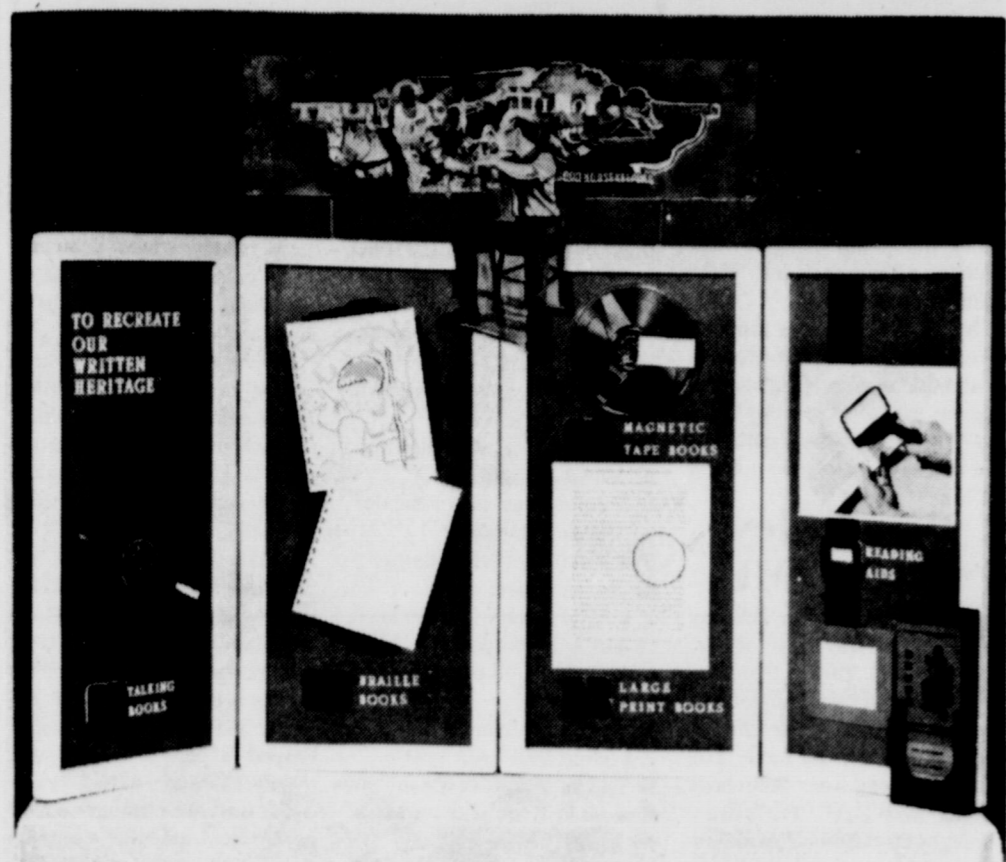

In addition, titles of such popular magazines as *Sports Illustrated*, *True*, and *Newsweek* are featured in the collage. All of the materials are available in talking books, braille, large print, or magnetic tape books.

In addition, the display features a pocket for the State Library's brochure which provides detailed descriptions of the services offered by the Division for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. Designed by Robert Cisneros of Austin, the display utilizes the key artwork that was prepared for a poster issued in

CONSERVATION THE KEY TO SURVIVAL Joey Baker Carbon

The conservation of our resources is a problem that is of interest to people of all countries of the world. It will continue to be a problem for many years in the future.

Food, clothing, shelter and, in recent times, machinery, are the most fundamental needs of human life. In many countries, items that formerly were classed as luxuries are so commonplace today that they might reasonably be called necessities. To live happily people not only need the necessities of life but also need protection from disease and accidents that would shorten their lives or cripple their bodies.

As civilization progresses, man has learned not only to conquer nature but has also found it to his advantage to specialize in doing a particular kind of work. This in return made him more dependent upon others. He has failed to learn that his very existence depends upon that which nature

has supplied for his life and conduct. Anything that nature provides that is necessary for living or a better enjoyment of life is a natural resource.

Conservation means getting the maximum use of the greatest number of available natural resources that are valuable to the greatest possible number of people for the longest period of time. We should consider the welfare of our fellow man at the present time and leave sufficient abundance of resources to those who are to follow us that they, too, may enjoy the natural gifts with which we have been blessed, and consider necessary to physical existence and a reasonably happy life.

Inasmuch as most of our food and clothing comes from the soil, we can think of it as being an immense storehouse. Throughout the history of the world, we have gradually been emptying this storehouse. An old German story that compares our store of soil fertility to a bank account, to be added to in times of prosperity and drawn upon in times of need, would be good advice for any country. However, this advice is rarely followed by most of the world because of perpetual need for all the food that can be produced. The amount of food a nation can produce or the number of people it can support depends not only upon the number of square miles or kilometers of territory but rather upon the arable land that is located within its limits and how much the soil can be made to produce at any given time.

The productivity of the soil depends upon the parent mineral material from which it is derived, the latitudinal location, climate, the flora and fauna, the slope of the land, its accumulated fertility, soil erosion and how it is cultivated and taken care of by man.

The use made of soil is dependent upon the need for food, clothing and shelter by man at any particular time and place. If land is plentiful, it may be left in timber or used for the grazing of animals, thus giving man more meat to eat or

more wool or hides for clothing. As the population grows, more land must be used to grow grain to feed more people.

The organic matter in the soil acts as a binder to hold the soil together. It also makes it possible for the soil to absorb and hold more water. Without organic matter, soil not only washes away more easily when it rains but also dries out faster in times of drought.

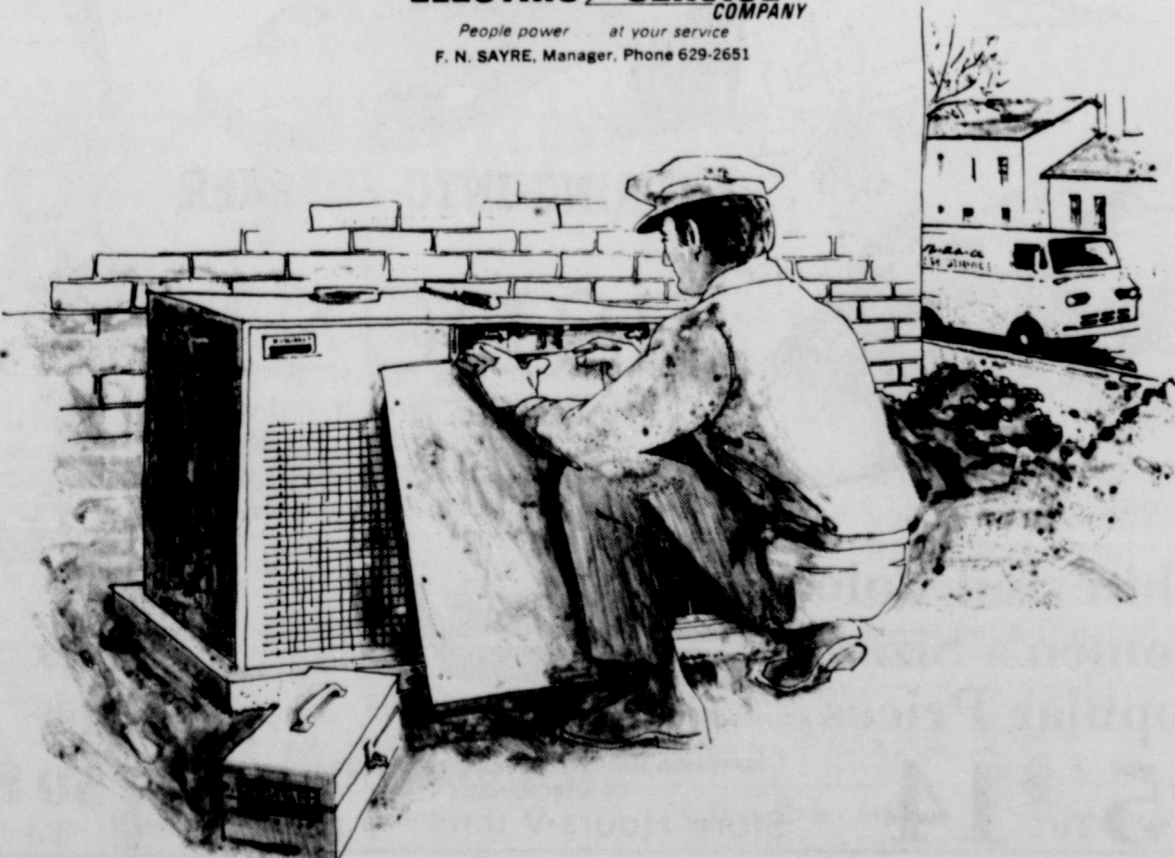

Dry weather seems to be the main topic of conversation around the county. We normally expect a lot of dry weather in this area, but not usually this time of year. The last two winters were two of the driest most folks can remember.

The planting of crops is going to be short also if rain does not come soon.

Dry weather affects the farmers and ranchers the most but it also has homeowners concerned. With temperatures beginning to climb and a shortage of soil moisture, maintenance of the home lawn can be a perplexing job. If you haven't spent any more time managing your lawn then I have, it's in pretty bad shape.

However, by following certain basic maintenance practices, an attractive lawn

can be maintained with a minimum of problems.

First, adequate amounts of plant food are important to keep a lawn green and to maintain growth and health of the grass. Start by applying a complete fertilizer in the spring as the grass begins to grow. Then follow with another application in the fall about a month before the first frost.

During the summer, an application of nitrogen every 30 to 40 days will keep the lawn green and growing. Well - fertilized grass is able to withstand dry weather considerably better than grass that is hungry.

Nitrogen is a key fertilizer element in turf production. If deficient plant growth will become stunted and a condition often called "firing" will develop. Lack of phosphorous

1971. During that period he has had an authorized expense account totalling \$13,125, but has spent only \$4,375, leaving \$8,777 unspent.

Hanna said most of his spending has been for a secretary and telephone expenses. He explained that while representatives are allowed to use a full time secretary and a half - time secretary during legislative sessions, he used only one secretary.

Discussing the purchase of the Abraham Lincoln books, Hanna declared, "I bought them and the record plainly shows that I did. Certainly I wasn't trying to hide the purchase. Since becoming a legislator I have been called on many times to speak. I bought not only the Lincoln books, but several others concerning speech - making and speech writing. They not only have helped me with my duties as a legislator, but they have helped me better communicate with the people who elected me to this job."

Hanna said he had great admiration for Lincoln.

"I think Abraham Lincoln was about the best speech writer who ever lived and I have tried to pattern my speeches after his style. It may not be the professional way to develop oneself as a public speaker, but I feel that it has helped me."

Hanna said other purchases he has made include Black's Legal Dictionary, English Words and Phrases, Vocabulary Building, Officials of the State of Texas and

will retard growth, and shortage of potassium will likewise inhibit plant growth and vigor. There must be a balance of these nutrients.

As rainfall becomes inadequate, waterings must be increased to supply needed moisture. Do not water the grass until it begins to show a need. Then soak the soil to depth of eight or more inches to maintain a good turf root system. Frequent shallow waterings should be avoided.

In regard to mowing, I would caution against scalping the lawn if it is not mowed often. Removing a lot of growth at one time is detrimental to the grass. Close mowing is advisable if the homeowner can mow often.

Close, frequent mowing will cause the grass to produce a lot of leaves very low to the ground. This produces an attractive and dense sod. Since most homeowners do not mow more often than once every week or 10 days, they should mow at some greater height to avoid scalping the grass too severely.
