Sewer Plant Steps Taken With Sale

Completion of Eastland's new sewer plant is estimated for July 1, 1974, with bids likely to be asked for soon after the first of the year, it is reported here now.

Formal inking of bond contracts took place Tuesday as the City Commissioners finalized arrangements with the First Southwest Corp., settling the bonds at six percent rate, to be paid out in the year 1985.

The plant will be paid for from revenue from operation of the city's sewer and water system. The \$92,000 in bonds were approved in an election some two years ago. The engineering firm is expected to present final plans for the plant to the commission in a special meeting Monday.

According to the accompanying date, assembled by City Manager Lewis Tiner and Joe Smith of the First Southwest Corp., the net income from water and sewer service during the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, was \$11,451 a year.

A reserve fund is called for in the agreement in which the city would place funds (actually to be kept locally, drawing interest) up to an amount of \$12,000.

The plant will be built on existing city property, and of the latest no-odor, no-unsightliness design. The \$92,000 figure represents about one-fourth of the total cost of the plant, with the federal government assisting with the remainder in the form of a grant.

November." This money, coupled with a federal grant of \$188,700, will be used to build a new sewage disposal plant in the southeast part of the city on grounds formerly occupied by the city's old dump ground.

Total cost of the project has been set at \$251,700 by city officials.

Tiner said that Abilene architects, Yeatts & Decker, are finished with plans and have suggested that the city begin taking bids in early January. The new plant will replace a disposal plant built in 1919.

Commissioners also passed unanimously a city ordinance clarifying an older ordinance with respects to commercial sewer rates. Tiner said that the old ordinance apparently passed in 1947 set the commercial sewer rate at \$1.25 per month, plus an additional 7 to 12 cents per thousand gallons of water over the metered minimum of 10,000 gallons used by the customer.

The Coleman win for Eastland has to go down as the "Thrill of a Lifetime" for Mavericks and fans. It was a see-saw all the way - and both teams wanted the win bad. But it was Coach Doug Dallas and his Mavericks who wound up with the game ball.

Downing the Bearcats brightened a rather dim pre-season record for the Mavericks which saw one win, one tie and three losses. But

most concede the team learned a lot in the non-conference games, and showed what they'd learned once the title race began.

Two sons, Jack and Lindell preceded her in death.

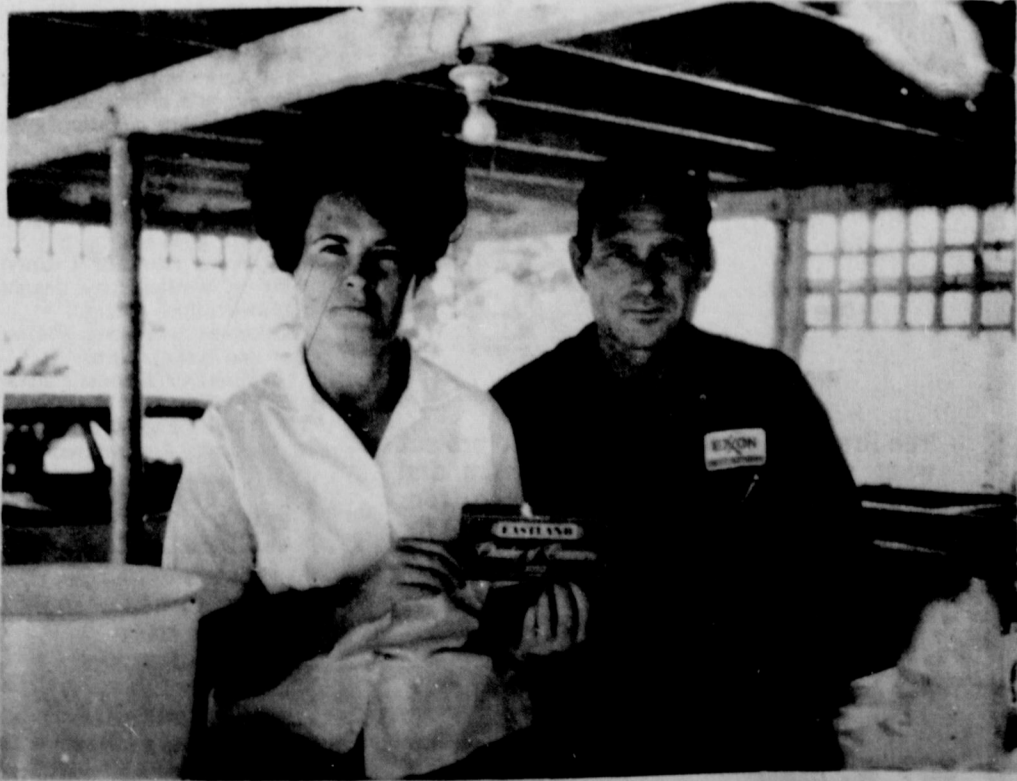

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Hospital Enlargement Modernization On Schedule

Enlargement and modernization of Eastland Memorial Hospital is progressing according to schedule.

Work on the hospital began July 1, after four long years of planning and preparations.

The Wichita Falls firm of Miller and Holmes Construction Co., was low bidder at \$1,698,629.00 for the expansion and renovation of the hospital.

The 58 bed facility will be increased to 86 beds, with auxiliary equipment sufficient to expand beyond that number in the future.

Eastland Memorial Hospital has been accepting patients since June, 1952. The hospital was built by the Community through money, donations, and volunteer labor of the local citizens. Therefore, there is an exceptional amount of "pride of ownership" instilled in the Eastland Memorial Hospital by the citizens of the community.

Modernization of the hospital will enhance carrying out the existing and new programs to serve the sick.

The programs the Eastland Memorial Hospital will provide are as follows:

A. Nursing Services:

1. Patient Care divisions
 - a. Medical and surgical
 - b. Obstetrical and nursing series
 - c. Pediatric
 - d. Psychiatric (limited to observation and holding only).
2. Operating suite and recovery and intensive care (Medical and cardiac in - patient care areas).
3. Delivery suite and labor room.
4. Emergency and treatment or observation rooms.

B. Adjunct diagnostic and treatment facilities:

1. Laboratory, including EKG, EEG, autopsy.
2. Radiology:
 - a. Diagnosis
 - b. Therapy, superficial
3. Physical medicine:
 - a. Physical Therapy
 - b. Occupational Therapy
4. Pharmacy
5. Medical Social Service.

C. Service departments:

1. Dietary
2. Housekeeping (laundry catered)
3. Central sterile supply
4. Dietary storage
5. Employee dressing, maintenance, HVAC, mechanical equipment.

D. Administration:

1. Offices, bookkeeping
2. Medical records and library
3. chapel
4. Public waiting areas

E. Education

F. Additional programs include minor and major surgery offered in Emergency Suite.

The parking areas adjacent to the site and located on the site will be adequate to handle the vehicular traffic to and from the hospital. Thirty-seven additional parking spaces have been added on the site. There is presently an additional fifty car parking lot across Daugherty Street.

The existing building, when completed with the new patient wings will be an asset to the area. The lower elevation property will be used more adequately than it now is being used. Access to the patient wings will be more easily approached from the parking areas.

General Election Day In Texas Tuesday, Nov. 6

Tuesday, Nov. 6, 1973, is General Election Day in Texas, and is of particular significance to veterans who reside in the State. This was announced today by James T. Wright, Veterans Service Officer for Eastland County.

The voters of Texas will this year be asked to vote "for" or "against" a proposal to add \$100 million to the Veterans Land Program to finance purchases of farm and ranch lands by eligible veterans. The 1973 General Election ballot will contain a number of constitutional amendment proposals, and this will be Number 7 on the form. The proposal is to increase the Veterans Land Program bond issued from \$400 million to \$500 million.

The Veterans Land Program has been in existence since 1949, and has helped thousands of wartime veterans to purchase farms and ranches. Under the program, a maximum loan of \$10,000 may be made to an eligible veteran for the purchase of ten acres or more of rural property. Eligible are persons who served 90 days or more in the Armed Forces of the United States since September 16, 1940, and whose service terminated under other than dishonorable conditions. Included are veterans who were legal residents of Texas at the time they entered service, or who have now been residents for five years or longer.

This program has operated at no cost to the taxpayer and at considerable benefit not only to veterans but to the economy of

all Texans. It is one of very few programs ever established which will make a profit for the State. Statisticians have determined that the State of Texas will eventually realize a profit of from \$100 to \$200 million on the Veterans Land Program.

Every citizen of Texas should exercise his or her right to vote on Nov. 6, 1973, and each should cast his ballot for each candidate or issue in accordance with the dictates of his conscience.

Banks Provide Farmer Credit

AUSTIN - Texas banks are providing farmers and ranchers with more credit and other financial services than any other lenders, C. Truett Smith of Wylie, president of the Texas Bankers Association, said today.

Based on the 32nd annual farm lending summary of the agricultural bankers division of the American Bankers Association, T.B.A. President Smith reported that at the beginning of 1973 Texas banks were helping farmers and ranchers with \$1,509 billion in loans, or 25 percent more than a year previous. This total included \$1.226 billion in

production loans and \$283 million in farm mortgages. At the same time \$606 million in farm loans was held by life insurance companies, \$675 million by Federal Land Banks, \$461 million by Production Credit Associations and \$62 million in non - rela estate loans, plus \$11 million in real estate loans by the Farmers Home Administration.

About 70 percent of the production credit extended by lending institutions to Texas farmers and ranchers comes from banks.

Smith said that "bankers in Texas are conscious of the large capital investments required in agriculture today and are making a concerted effort through improved lending programs to meet these changing credit demands of the state's farmers and ranchers."

The increased use of credit by agricultural interests, Smith said, has been accompanied by a substantial gain in total assets of farm and ranch families. Therefore, in the aggregate, the equity position of farmers and ranchers is being maintained at a satisfactory level. Nationally, farm families have \$311 billion of their own funds invested in agriculture. This represents 81 percent of their total capital requirements.

The TBA president stressed the importance of farmers and bankers working closely together to improve farm financial arrangements.

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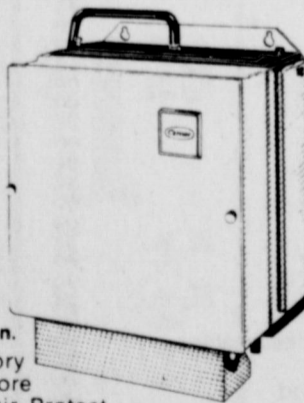
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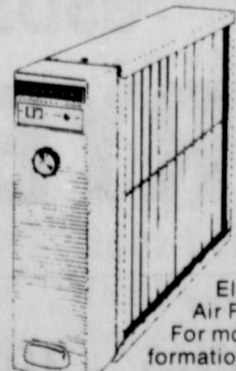
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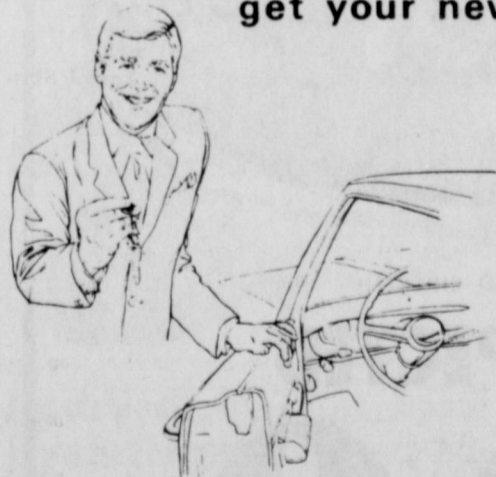
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Completes Training

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State Peanut Crop Expect To Be \$80 Million

Contrary to a recent rash of adverse publicity on the peanut program carried on the wires of major news services, area growers are proud that Texas is the No. two peanut producing state in the nation. Officials of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association and the Texas Peanut Producers Board point out that the 1973 crop is expected to be worth in excess of \$80 million to the state's growers. This figure will be increased several times over as the crop returns are plowed back into trade channels. In addition revenue from peanut drying, handling and transportation as well as substantial payrolls for employees at shelling mills combine to contribute mightily to the economy of peanut producing communities. Of tremendous significance to the agribusiness community is the fact that peanut growers purchase large quantities of fertilizer, chemicals, fuel and farm equipment used in the production of their crops.

Peanut Association officials also point to the fact that the peanut price support program has been responsible for a stable and continuous supply of peanut butter and other products at reasonable prices to the consumer. Peanut product retail prices have increased only slightly while many other food commodity prices have escalated at record rates in recent years.

Peanut program modifications being suggested by the administration through major news media could be disastrous to the present peanut industry. Administration sources fail to point out that present escalating crop production costs have reduced the growers' margin of profit substantially even under normal to favorable production conditions. Additionally

peanut allotment sales values are being grossly overstated. Area growers state emphatically that program modifications being suggested would result in market prices for farmers stock peanuts close to or below costs of production; consequently, the production of peanuts would be drastically reduced or shifted to other areas where production potential is substantially greater. In either event, local economies in present peanut producing areas would incur heavy losses.

Officials of the National Peanut Growers Group, a national federation of peanut grower associations, have also expressed disappointment in recent harsh criticism of the peanut program. They remind that National Peanut Growers Group presented a program modification concept to the USDA in May following several months of conferences between growers and Department of Agriculture officials. At that time USDA officials in Washington voiced optimism relative to USDA-grower agreement on program changes.

Since the May meeting of grower leaders and Department officials, costs of the 1972 crop program have been determined to be approximately \$60 million dollars. This figure comprises only about 57 percent of the original USDA estimate of 1972 crop cost of \$105 million. Indications are that cost of the 1973 crop to USDA will be near the 1972 crop figure due to strong domestic and export markets currently existing for peanuts and peanut products. The point is, of course, that peanut program costs are going down, not up. The cost of the 1972 Peanut Program was only about two percent of the total agricultural subsidies paid to farmers although the program

directly benefits the nation's 85,000 peanut growers as well as all agriculture related businesses and endeavors throughout the Southern and Southwestern United States. In return, peanut farmers have produced a consistent and bountiful supply of this nutritious, protein-rich, economical and delicious food commodity which is readily available to every American family.

Administrative personnel of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association and the Texas Peanut Producers Board state that they are continuing to work closely with the National Peanut Growers Group to maintain an acceptable peanut program. Key area congressmen have confirmed that the peanut program matter will in all likelihood come before Congress for action early next year. Area association officials will remain in constant contact with area congressmen and will be

working closely with national grower leaders on this important matter.
