Mavericks Open District Race With 31-27 WIN Over Coleman

"Eat your hearts out, District 9 - AA".

The Magic Mavericks have given notice.

Notice that they'll be around when the loop champions are being picked.

It was a spectators' treat as the Mavericks outdid the Coleman Bluecats, 31 - 27, in the opening Conference Tilt in Maverick Stadium Friday night.

Fans saw 48 minutes of swap-out: mostly of fumbles in the first quarter and of scoring leads throughout the game.

In other District games, Cisco beat Hamilton, 19 - 14. Eastland goes to Comanche next week.

The game started with Eastland losing the toss and kicking to Coleman. After Coleman exhausted three tries at first down, they punted and from there, the Mighty Mavericks went to work on putting the first score on the board.

The Mavericks drove the ball from their 35 yard line to the Coleman 8 yard line where Tom Morren booted the ball for a field goal. Eastland 3 - Coleman 0.

After the kick from Eastland to Bluecats and Mavericks swapped ball possessions several times, but finally the ball came to rest with Coleman in possession on the Eastland 45.

From the Eastland 45 the Bluecats moved the ball deep into Eastland territory where Del Rosa romped in for the Bluecats' first touchdown with the extra point no good. The score read Coleman 6 - Eastland 3 at the end of first quarter.

At the middle of the second quarter Eastland had possession on about the Coleman 25 yard line following a pass from Terry Ensor to Brent Parker. From the Bluecat 25 Ensor took the ball, handed off to Tom Morren and Morren passed to Tony Thomas for the Mavericks' first touchdown. With Morren's extra point good: Eastland 10, Coleman 6.

After Eastland's first touchdown the Bluecats decided it was time to put another score on the board before the close of the half. With 1:10 remaining in the first half Warrick ran in for the Coleman second touchdown from the 6 yard line, after a drive that started on the Eastland 45.

At the close of the first half the score stood at Eastland 10, Coleman 13. At the opening of the second half Eastland received the ball from Coleman but after several plays was forced to punt. Coleman took the ball on the Eastland 45 and from there, Warrick ran for a 55 yard touchdown that gave Coleman their third touchdown of the night. With the extra point no good the score stood at Eastland 10, Coleman 19.

On the kick from Coleman B.W. Robertson took the ball

for a 50 yard return to the 6 yard line of Coleman, which set up a touchdown run for Tony Thomas that gave the Mavericks the second touchdown and with extra point conversion good by Morren the score read Eastland 17 - Coleman 19.

With 8:40 left in the fourth quarter Eastland's B.W. Robertson, on a punt return, ran and again unoffended this time for a 70 yard touchdown that gave the Mavericks a 24 - 19 edge over the Bluecats.

But the edge was not to stop the Bluecats for in the middle of the fourth quarter Welch for the Bluecats loped in for the Coleman final touchdown from a pass that came from about the Eastland 15 yard line following a long drive which originated deep in Maverick territory. With extra points good by a two point conversion which featured Warrick. The score was Eastland 24, Coleman 27.

Some two minutes after

Coleman last touchdown the Mavericks put it together for the last score of the night with a beautiful executed pass.

The final score in a game that

will be talked about and remembered for many years was Eastland 31, Coleman - 27.

About the middle of the 3rd quarter Eastland's good offense came back, with No. 32 Dennis Lopez carrying the ball for the third touchdown for the Eastland Dogies. The 2 point conversion was good by No. 11 John Hill.

Eastland's great defense held the Ranger Pups back the rest of the game.

The final score was Ranger 6, Eastland 22.

The reason for all this success was from the great effort of the linemen: Kenneth Underhill, Tom Winingar, E.C. Ragland, Jimmy Griffen, Tony Wood, Tom Crowder.

John Hill was the only one to receive skull bones.

Pecan production in Texas, based on October 1 prospects, is forecast at 23 million pounds by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. A crop of this size would be 69 percent less than the 75 million pounds produced in 1972. The

Texas crop will account for eight percent of the total U.S. production.

Pecans are beginning to hull in most areas of Eastland county. Harvesting should get underway the last of October.

much behind last year's early start. Due to a late freeze in April and heavy insect damage, crop prospects for Eastland County are much below last year. However, some orchards have good crops. The quality is expected to be better than last year. Early reports indicate the prices will be above those of last year.

Although warm weather tends to indicate that winter is still a long way off, it's just a matter of time before the season's first freezing temperatures arrive. Such a killing frost can spell danger for livestock producers that have cattle grazing on sorghum stubble or any of the sorghum-sudan hybrid pastures. The

reason is prussic acid poisoning of the animals. The danger of prussic acid poisoning exists mainly in pastures and fields where sorghum stubble is making regrowth and where there is vigorous, young growth of Johnson grass, sorghum-sudan hybrids and related plants. Such growth generally has a high content of prussic acid, especially if produced under stress of dry or cool weather. The main danger to livestock is grazing such pastures and fields immediately after a killing frost. Livestock producers should wait a week to 10 days following a killing frost before allowing cattle to graze suspect pastures and fields. If only a light frost

occurs, remove the cattle until plant growth is killed by a heavy freeze. Each year numerous animals are lost from prussic acid poisoning. These losses are needless and rob the producer's pocketbook. Giving special attention to grazing management and staying abreast of changing weather conditions can avoid cattle losses to prussic acid poisoning.

Fertilizer supplies are expected to be tight during the coming year, so agricultural producers should make every effort to conserve fertilizer and to make the most efficient use of what is available.

One suggestion is to find out what you really need in each field and for each crop. This is best done by using a soil test. Another suggestion is to make maximum use of manure and crop residue. Don't forget that livestock manure adds

organic matter, nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium and other plant nutrients. Manure also improves the structure and till of the soil. Crop residue returned to the soil reduces the fertilizer needs for following crops.

Plan your fertilizer needs in advance. With the use of a soil test, figure your fertilizer needs and then discuss them with your supplier. With the increased demand expected for fertilizer next season due to the nationwide move to expanded production, wise use of available fertilizer supplies is the only answer.

The wellhead cost naturally affects the price charged, and today Lone Star is paying up to 40 cents MCF, compared to 19 cents in 1969, she said.

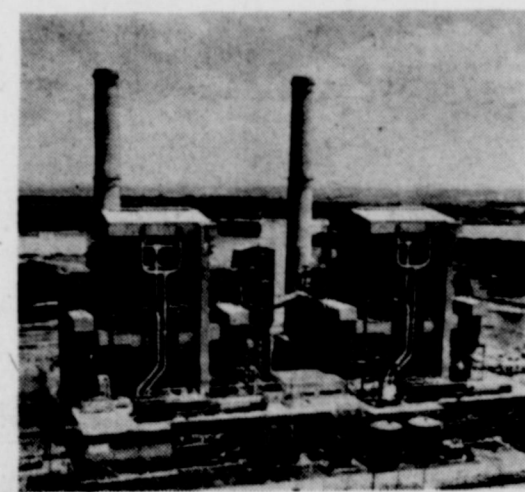
