





### Your New SOCIAL SECURITY



(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles prepared for farm families by R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of the Social Security Administration office in Abilene.)

In our previous articles, we have described the general coverage provisions of the self-employed farmer and rancher, and those working as employees on farms and ranches. In today's article, we would like to describe how farm earnings for social security purposes is determined, and reported.

A self-employed farmer or rancher determines his net earnings for social security purposes in much the same manner as the business man has been doing for the past four years. However, the farmer and rancher has a simplified manner of reporting with two options available to him to determine his net income for social security purposes. This does not change the manner or method that the farmer and rancher reports his income for income tax purposes, and the option can be used only for social security purposes.

For low-income farmers and ranchers, those of you who report

their income tax on a cash basis, and whose gross income is \$1800 or less, have the choice of reporting your actual net earnings, after taking all deductions allowed by law necessary in the operation of your farm or ranch, or reporting one-half your gross income. Either, the net or one-half the gross must be \$400 or more.

For farmers and ranchers whose gross income is over \$1800, you must determine your actual net earnings. If these net earnings are less than \$900, then you can report either the actual net earnings, or \$900, whichever you prefer.

Free upon request from Abilene Social Security Office, is an informative booklet called "Facts for Farm Families." This pamphlet should be in the hands of every farmer and rancher, as well as every farm and ranch employee. It describes how you can determine your net earnings from your farm or ranch operations under the new social security amendments, as well as a table showing estimated benefits, how to report your farm and ranch employees, tells how you qualify for benefits, and gives the social security tax rates. ### Pixie Pie For A Party Dessert



Pixie Pie is fun to prepare and a happy medley of flavors to enjoy at dessert time.

First of all, there's a coconut and butter crust. No rolling necessary for this. Just spread the two ingredients in a pie plate as a crust and bake until a golden brown. Then chill in the refrigerator with a rich chocolate chiffon filling.

The chocolate chiffon calls for a blending of sugar, unflavored gelatine, evaporated milk, unsweetened chocolate and eggs. It's a simple top-of-the-range cooking operation. Unflavored gelatine makes the filling high and fluffy.

#### Pixie Pie

**Coconut Crust:**  
2 tablespoons softened butter 1 1/2 cups shredded coconut

Spread softened butter evenly on bottom and sides of a 9-inch pie plate. Sprinkle coconut into plate; press evenly into the butter. Bake in a slow oven, (300° F.) 15 to 20 minutes, or until crust is golden brown. Cool.

#### Pixie Pie Filling:

1 envelope unflavored gelatine 1/2 cup water  
1/2 cup sugar, divided 2 squares (2 ounces) unsweetened chocolate  
1/4 teaspoon salt 3 eggs, separated  
1/2 cup evaporated milk 1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix together gelatine, 1/2 cup of the sugar and salt in saucepan. Add evaporated milk, water and chocolate. Stir over medium heat until chocolate is melted and gelatine is dissolved. Do not boil. Blend with rotary beater. Pour slowly over beaten egg yolks, stirring constantly. Return to saucepan and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened, about 3 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in vanilla. Chill until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon. Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Gradually add remaining 1/2 cup sugar and beat until very stiff. Fold in chocolate mixture. Turn into prepared pie crust; chill until firm. Garnish with whipped cream. Drizzle with mixture of 1/2 square (1/2 ounce) unsweetened chocolate melted with 1 1/2 tablespoons light corn syrup.

Yield: 1 9-inch pie.

following statistics are cited. A bomb 1,000 times as powerful as the Hiroshima bomb will not cause damage 1,000 times as far away - only 10 times as far. It will harm an area only 100 times as large - not 1,000 as large.

The civil defense department has emphasized that, "If you live well beyond any likely target area, you still need to know first aid, how to feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, and aid others less fortunate than yourself. And you should plan adequate cover against radio-active fall-out."

Emphasizing that the best means of protection from the immediate effect of atomic or hydrogen bombs are distance from the center of the explosion and the protection of suitable shelter, the

agency urges all citizens to cooperate fully with local defense authorities. They say, "What you do before the explosion can save your life. What you do after the explosion can also save lives."

## Gulf Plans Gasoline Terminal Near Here

Gulf Oil Company will begin construction this week on a gasoline distribution plant near here, it was announced today. Site of the new plant will be on the junction of the Breckenridge highway where the road splits, one

going to Eastland and the other to Cisco.

First reports, though unconfirmed, indicated that \$750,000 would be spent for the plant and that four families will be employed there.

A pipeline formerly used for crude oil is being cleaned and will now be used for transmission of gasoline from Houston to West Texas.

Reports also indicate that fleets of large transportation trucks will load at the plant and haul the gasoline over a large area. Some will travel as far west as Sweetwater and some as far north as Wichita Falls.

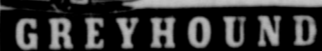

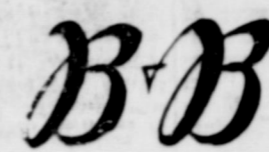

EVER have hot coffee spilled on the top of your TV set? Or have you tried to wipe off rings made by the glasses that careless guests put down on the handiest spot?

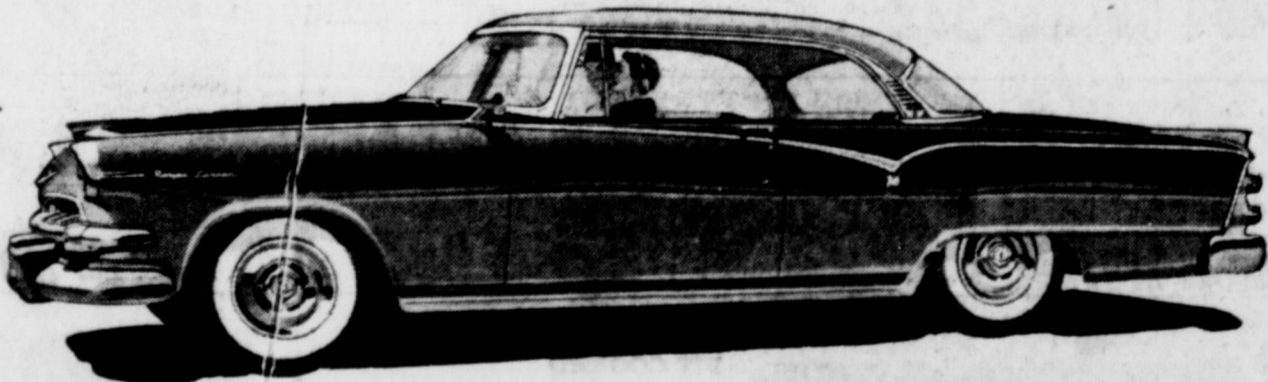

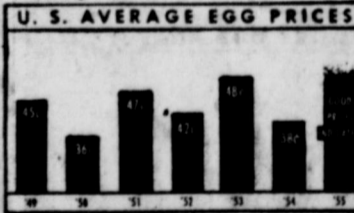
