Mavericks Face Bluecats Friday

7:30 p.m. In Local Stadium

The Miracle Mavericks who proged their snuff last week, holding the potent Breckenridge Buckaroos to a 7 - 7 tie in Maverick Stadium, begin the non - conference climb this Friday night when the Coleman Bluecats come to town.

Kickoff time for this Maverick Stadium duel will be 7:30 p.m., and a game extraordinary is expected.

The Bluecats have had an outstanding pre - season showing: defeating Anson, 16 - 6, losing to Brady, 28 - 20; whipping Winters, 21 - 18; bowing to Ballinger 9 - 7; and losing to Breckenridge.

The Carbon Wolverines go to Santo Friday night.

The Eastland Junior Varsity and Junior High Teams will host Ranger teams here Thursday night. The Seventh Grade game begins at 5; the Eighth at 6; and the JV at 7:30 p.m.

A football publication earlier called Coleman a contender and added:

Coach Jack Baucom and his staff are looking forward to this football season with much enthusiasm. There are several reasons; number one, the Bluecats are definite threats to possibly get into the 9 - AA throne room. Number two, they will be working with some outstanding football talent namely Randy Goodwin among others. Number three, possibly the most important, is the 1972 district championship to defend and having enough hoses to do it with. Yes, it could be a good year indeed at the home of the Bluecats.

The 'Cats will have some seventeen seniors to count upon for leadership. Also there will be ten juniors to blend with the seniors for a definite age edge on some of the Coleman foes.

Possibly the only weakness evident in the Bluecat camp is the lack of returning starters at the skill positions. However, by district time these positions should be well in hand.

The offensive line looks to be the strongest point in the Cat attack. Randy Goodwin is one of the largest factors in this trench strength. Goodwin (5 - 10, 240) senior is an All - State prospect as well as top college pick.

Goodwin is very strong and will play both ways at a tackle where he was a regular last fall. His counterpart in '72, Kenneth Jackson (6 - 1, 205) senior will be moved to fullback. Jackson was also a starter at linebacker in '72 and is slated to drill many an opposing ball carrier from this position again.

The tackle slot opposite Goodwin possibly will be settled among Alan Green (6 - 2, 180) junior, Paul Bedell (6 - 1, 160) junior, and Ronnie Humphrey (6 - 0, 200) junior, big Ervin Wells (6 - 1, 260) junior and Travis Moore (5 - 9, 150) senior.

JUDY LYNN ... miss show business herself

Unlike the "Elusive Butterfly" whose song she sings so well, there is nothing faint or fleeting about the solid success of Judy Lynn, who will appear in person at Cisco Junior College on Tuesday evening, October 23. Long a standout with devoted Country and Western audiences, the cocoon has matured and the Judy Lynn that now appears is capturing that vast mainstream of popular music as well.

And to expose another myth, the roads from her native Boise, Idaho, the glittering stages of Las Vegas and Reno are not really paved with gold. It only seems that way. Yet, if you can reroute over 2,000,000 people annually, from the lounges and caress a lyric the way that Judy does, maybe it is after all.

A young veteran of the country circuit, she has made most of the stops since her discovery by the Grand Ole Opry, and back again. Without any detours, Judy has won faithful following that is huge, even by Country and Western standards, without diluting any of the freshness and spontaneity of the simple life in Idaho. This, in itself, is a novelty in the illusory, often plastic world of entertainment.

Her background is modest, with music being a staple of her early life. Her father had his own band and the twang of guitars and banjos were as familiar around the house as the sounds of crickets and the whistling winds that whip through the Rockies.

But as a teenager her guitar had to compete with her love for horses...and by the time she reached high school she was riding well enough to earn honors as a rodeo champion. Together with another rodeo queen, Judy formed a vocal duo that played dances and social functions around Boise. Judging from her scrapbook, the girls were the "stars" of Ada County. At least until the Grand Ole Opry came to town.

Judy was untangling particles in an English class when the show's promoter, John Kelly, contacted her that one of the Opry singers had taken ill.

That night she did a duet with Ferlin Husky and won the plaudits of Red Foley, Ernest Tubb, Jean Shepherd and the rest of the regulars. Her debut a rousing success, she joined the Opry tour upon graduation from school.

Before long, she had married her personal manager and began working as a solo performer in the north country...that bleak distant region around Montana and the Dakotas where dances are arranged in grain elevators, barns and quonset huts and where country music is legend.

This eventually led to a long, dry period in Nashville, where

Judy sought stardom. She played the local clubs and made the studio scene with only token success. As folks as Nashville is, Judy never seemed to get the rhythm of the town.

Vegas. The gambling palaces were still foreign territory for country singers.

Against overwhelming odds she became the first female country artist to have her own show there. The Judy Lynn Show opened at the Golden Nugget and her unprecedented success showed the way for half of Nashville. Most ranking country artists now depend upon Las Vegas revenue for a large share of their income, thanks to Judy.

Low-keyed and cheerful, hardly a female activist, Judy broke the barrier with good, honest music. Her delivery is warm and spirited which should be a tonic to her new pop audiences. She personifies the description... "Entertainer".

Appearances on the Johnny Cash, Mike Douglas shows and her own syndicated television show, plus excellent production by her new label, Amaret Records, has given broader exposure to her musical magic.

In addition to all this, the Judy Lynn Show continually stars at the biggest fairs, rodeos (Judy is the only female ever to star at the big rodeos on San Antonio and Fort Worth, Texas and at Madison Square Garden) and night clubs throughout the entire world.

There is nothing elusive about Judy Lynn. She's for real!

All seats are reserved for the Tuesday night Judy Lynn - Tanya Tucker Show at CJC, and tickets are available through the Business Office at the college. They may be picked up there or reserved by telephone 817, 442 - 2567. The show will begin at 8:00 p.m. in the Harrel Fine Arts Auditorium, and a capacity crowd is expected.

She recorded briefly for three labels (two of her singles made the Top Five Country Charts) but was dissatisfied. Disciple and a hard worker, the casualness of and the lack of preparation of studio musicians (who preferred to sit around, pick a little and wait for the right feeling to arrive) didn't suit her more professional style. Judy knew that she could do better even if it meant leaving the mecca of country music.

Forsaking the "Country" and tackling the "Western", Judy set her sights on the Golden West and headed home, following an itinerary that would eventually lead to Las

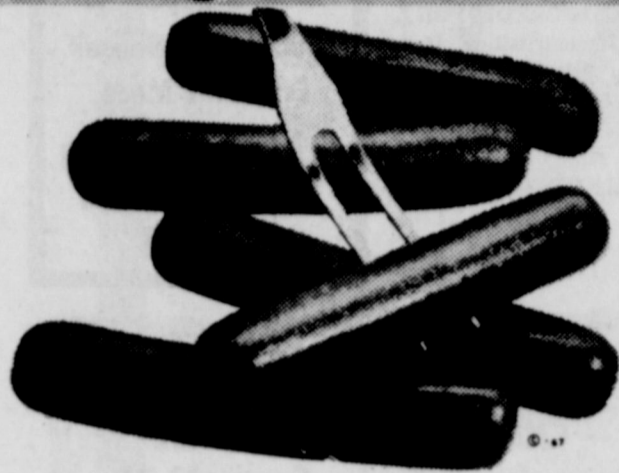

Nutrition Promotes Health

This is first in a series of articles pertaining to health problems in Eastland County as identified by local physicians and those in neighboring towns. These articles will be presented from a nurse's viewpoint, and will not attempt to give medical advice.

The first problem to be discussed is the matter of nutrition - a "bug-a-boo" in the long history of man. Good nutrition should promote health of an individual, aid in prevention and treatment of, and recovery from, diseases, to provide for activity, and to maintain a desirable weight. Quality is as necessary as quantity.

Inadequate diets can be attacked by education and recognition of nutritional values of foods as well as money. Many families lack adequate nutrition because of lack of knowledge, faulty food habits, diet fads, and religious beliefs. Families with children and persons living alone (especially the older person) seem to be the most affected. More thought could be given to spending money wisely; however, with education, money, and availability of food, nothing much can be accomplished without motivation to eat the food we need.

Changes in family organization and living patterns in recent years have taken their toll on family nutrition and eating habits. It has become increasingly difficult to plan and serve nutritious meals to the family - especially as a group. Tiredness, obesity and anemia are among the numerous results.

Homemakers should select food from four major groups: milk and milk products, meat

and eggs (vegetables high in protein can be included, such as dried beans), fruits and vegetables, enriched or whole grain bread and cereals.

Many times it is impossible, if not impractical, to include all of these in each meal; therefore, meals should be considered on a 24 hour basis. Coffee and doughnuts are not an adequate breakfast if the body has had no food intake for ten or twelve hours. If there are children or working family members, protein should be an important part of breakfast; bread or cereal help to provide energy for the day. Whether or not fruit or juices are helpful in meeting vitamin requirements depends on length of storage in the store and at home. Freshness is essential for vitamin content; some vitamins may be destroyed by long cooking. If lunch is skimpy, then breakfast should be adequate, or vice versa. Fresh fruit or raw vegetables should be included in a "sack lunch". The evening meal should include a root vegetable and a leafy one.

Low income families tend toward a "starchy" diet because these foods are cheaper, give quick energy, and are temporarily filling; however, they do not meet requirements for growth and development of muscles, bones, and teeth - nor for general health.

The county agent is an excellent resource person to help with economic budgeting of nutritious food - or how to get the most for your money. (Next: Special dietary needs of growing, active children.)

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- THE COST OF RUNNING FOR POLITICAL OFFICE HAS gotten ridiculously high. No person should be denied the right to seek public office simply because he or she is unable to either pay for it himself or is forced to receive contributions from sources which obligate him after he is elected.

THERE IS NOTHING WRONG WITH FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS TO POLITICAL campaigns. Large sums, however, should be prohibited and the sources of contributions should be made an open book for all to see.

OUR STATE LEGISLATURE HAS DONE A GOOD JOB AND WILL PROBABLY go further in subsequent Sessions to accomplish this purpose.

ON THE FEDERAL LEVEL, THERE IS WIDE SUPPORT FOR CONTROLLING expenditures, revealing the sources of donations and other methods of control. There are already numerous provisions on the law books for limits but there are loopholes which need

to be closed. Legislation has been introduced proposing numerous approaches. The U.S. Senate has passed a broad bill which places strict compliances on Federal candidates in the general election. Under the Senate bill, individuals could contribute no more than \$25,000 to all Federal candidates. No more than \$9,000 of that sum could be given to any one candidate. If strictly enforced, such a law would effectively curb the influence of big individual contributors.

THE CHALLENGER OVERCOMES THESE AD-

VANTAGES ONLY BY RAISING THE FUNDS required to mount a strong and effective campaign. The Senate bill would severely limit his ability to raise those funds unless, however, the candidate is supported by "write off" of union dues which goes into a campaign fund, not necessarily contributed to the candidate, but used to promote him in numerous ways. Other organized groups have a similar provision for support of their candidates in the general election.

CONSIDERATION IS NOW BEING GIVEN TO HAVING FEDERAL ELECTIONS FINANCED from tax money on a formula which divides the funds between parties or between candidates.

THE LAW NOW PROVIDES THAT A TAXPAYER MAY HAVE A \$25.00 CREDIT FOR A campaign contribution. It is something else to pay these costs out of the Federal Treasury from everyone's tax money.

ANOTHER QUESTION ARISES. SHOULD THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT PLACE CONTROL over

campaigns for Federal office, how long would it be before they would want to include State primaries?

AS A MATTER OF FACT THERE ARE THOSE IN CONGRESS AND IN INFLUENTIAL GROUPS outside who want to include all primary elections under the control of Washington. Those of us who maintain that the State legislatures should retain this authority and responsibility have been opposing any such ideas for a number of years.

Plant Bonds Sold; Progress Seen

Eastland's sewer plant bonds are sold and bids from contractors should be asked for in the very near future, as the result of action at the City Commission meeting this week.

The \$92,000 bond issue, approved overwhelmingly by voters about two years ago, was sold to the First Southwest Corp., a financial services firm of Lubbock, at 6 percent, and will be repaid over an 11 year period, requiring about \$1,000 a month payment of principal and interest. The city's present monthly \$1,000 payment on the sanitary landfill tractor will be finished about the time the payments on the sewer plant bonds will begin. The city recently raised sewer fees and water rates, which overall is

believed sufficient to handle the new indebtedness.

The bonds are labeled revenue which means they will be paid out of money received by the city for these services, rather than from increases in taxes.

Joe Smith of the First Southwest is handling the transaction after making a 6 percent bid for the bonds. It will mark the first time in nearly 50 years that the city has sold bonds, it was reported, and while the city's present financial condition is good and sound, the early history of default which the city suffered made it questionable as to whether it would be advisable to put the bonds on the open bond market, so the city Commissioners were happy to

receive the 6 percent offer. Presently such bonds are going at from 5 1/2 to 7 percent.

Mayor Pro Tem W.Q. Verner presided and introduced a delegation of citizens with Ray Pryor as spokesman, who asked that the city assist in helping with a dangerous situation existing on property near the citizen's homes. The group was assured that legal action was being taken.

Another visitor was Jim Owen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Owen, who was present to learn about city government in preparation for an Eagle Scout Merit Badge award.

In other action, the commission re-elected Dr. M.A. Treadwell Jr., as city health officer.

The bond issue was the city's share of a projected cost of \$251,700 for a new sewage disposal plant.

Eastland City Manager Lewis Tiner said there will be no state money involved now and that 75 percent of the total projected cost of the plant 188,700, will be funded by the federal government.

According to Tiner, commissioners are scheduled to meet again with Smith Oct. 23 to close the deal. Construction on the plant in the southeast part of the city is expected to begin early in 1974, Tiner said.

Tiner, along with Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey, will be attending a sub-regional meeting of the West Central Texas Council of Governments in Breckenridge at noon Wednesday. The meeting is scheduled so members can be elected to the organization from cities under 10,000 population, Tiner said.

Area cities and towns participating are Breckenridge, Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Carbon, Gorman, Rising Star and Desdemona.

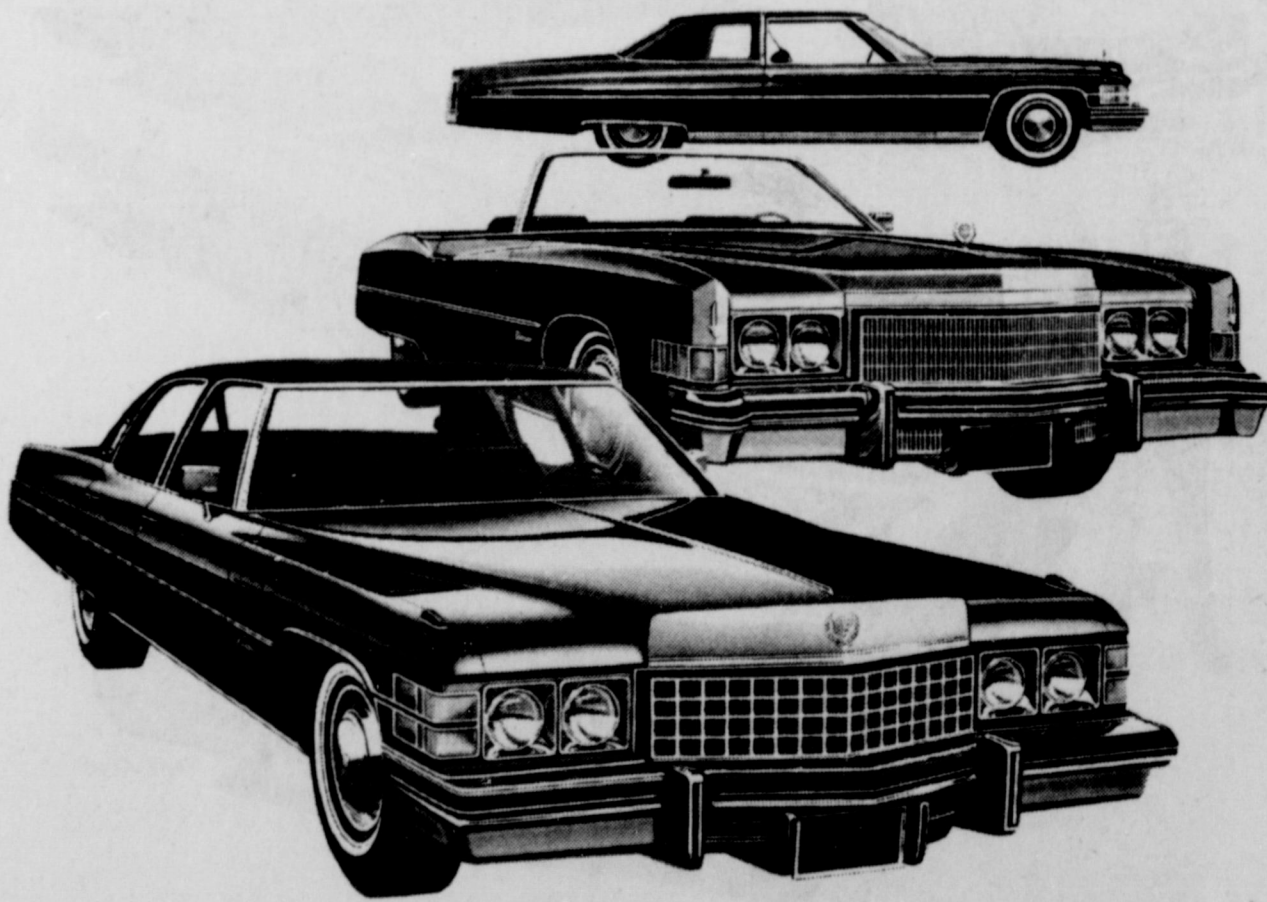

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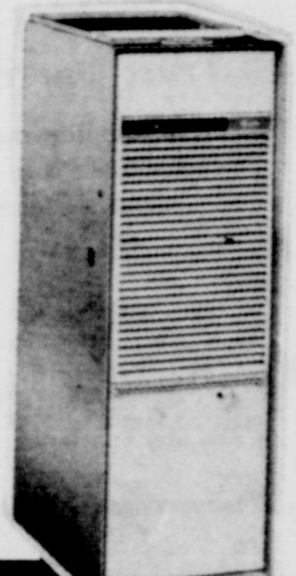


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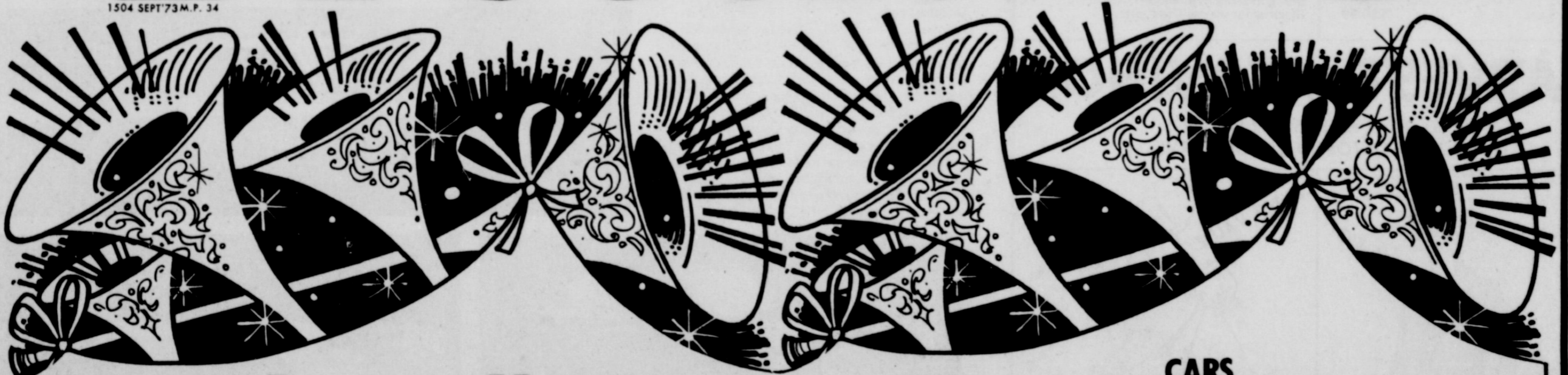
