## Bonds Total \$23,042 For April

During April there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$23,042. Sales for the first four months of 1972 totaled \$80,467 - 27 percent of the 1972 goal of \$300,000.

Texas sales during the month were \$17,331,291 - while year-to-date purchases totaled

\$74,258,429 for 37 percent of the 1972 goal of \$202.3 million.

National sales of E and H Savings Bonds amounting to \$502 million were reported for April - 8.4 percent above 1971 sales of \$463 million. Sales for the four month period totaled \$2,142 million - 40 percent of the national goal of \$5.3 billion.

## ASC NEWS

**SET ASIDE ACREAGE** - Cropland set aside under the Feed Grain, Wheat and Cotton programs must not be grazed between April 30 and October 1, 1972 for Eastland County. Set aside acreage must be at least average in productivity to other land on the farm on which the crop is usually grown.

**EARLY CERTIFICATION** - Farm operators are reminded they must certify to their feed grain, cotton, set aside and peanut acreage again this year. It is very important that these acreages be accurately and timely reported. Any farm failing to certify will be ineligible for any program benefits. Spot checks will be made after certification. There will be no opportunity to adjust acreage after certification.

The final date to certify feed grain, cotton and set aside acreage is JULY 1, 1972.

The final date to certify peanut acreage is AUGUST 1, 1972.

REMEMBER - EARLY CERTIFICATION MEANS EARLIER PAYMENTS.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE

**REQUEST** - July 15, 1972, is the final date to request measurement service. Those not sure of their exact acreage should consider requesting measurement service now.

**FINAL PLANTING DATES** - The final date for planting cotton is June 15 and grain sorghum is July 1 for Eastland County. Producers who are prevented from planting or replanting their feed grain or cotton acreage may request acreage credit not later than 15 days after the planting date.

**WORKMANLIKE MANNER** - Crops must be planted and cared for in a workmanlike manner with the normal expectation of making a crop to be eligible for cotton or feed grain program payments and to be considered for history credit.

**POST CARD REPORT** - Producers in Eastland County who have a feed grain base or cotton allotment on their farm and are not participating in the programs will soon receive a post card requesting a report of crop acreage. The reverse side of the card explains why this report is very important. Those receiving the post card should complete it, even though no crops are planted, and return it to the ASCS office promptly. No postage is necessary on the card.
